My Dear People,

Our autumn this year has been a pleasant and well-extended one. But the temperature seems to be dropping now, and the arrival of November reminds us that the winter cannot be long delayed. I would like to mention two things that have a bearing on the season.

First, although I have done so in past years, I make no apology for mentioning again that in November it is a Christian's particular duty to pray for the departed. Not only at Rememtrancetide, when we call to mind those who have fallen in battle, but throughout the month we should do well to follow the practice of the Church over many centuries and recall that the souls of those who have departed this life are still, most certainly (if they have been in any degree Christian, in faith and life) on their way to God. Those who have been in our family on earth, or whom we have known and loved, should find a place in our prayers. We have the right to believe that our sincere prayers can do as much for them as for our living friends and family around us, whom we no doubt regularly bring before God's throne.

This life on earth is all that we can **see** now, but we **believe** in the life of the world to come. If the Catholic Church means anything, it must mean the Universal Family, transcending time and death. We have the privilege to be fellow-Christians with the souls in paradise, no less than with the blessed Saints in heaven.

Secondly, on a more practical and homely note. When the weather is cold, some people are tempted to stay away from public worship. It seems difficult to leave a warm home and go to church, which may not be anything like as warm. I am sure this is a temptation to be vigorously resisted. There are a certain number of difficulties in church heating, and it seems that the country's fuel position is not as happy as it might be; but we shall do our best to maintain the churches at a habitable temperature each Sunday (weekday churchgoing, of course, often requires heroism). In any case, provided one is in good health, and has not reached real old age, there is a positive duty to worship the

Lord in his House; even if it is sometimes at the expense of comfort.

THE PARISH CHURCH OF HILTON VI. The Tower

We conclude our notes on Hilton Church by a few words about the pleasant looking tower at the west end of the church. It is the oldest substantial part of the building, being over 550 years old. Its main useful function is to house the peal of four bells. Their inscriptions and dates are as follows:—

- Maria Magdalene will sing sweetli before cum mereli after, 1604.
- Joseph Eayre, St. Neots, 1767. Walter Peck, John Hemington, Churchwardens.
- 3. Thomas Norris made me, 1635.
- 4. I: Eayre fecit, 1744. God speed us well.
 Thomas Pain, Edward Martin, Churchwardens.

The north-west corner of the tower was repaired in 1904; consequently the spiral staircase in this corner up to the belfry is in a very good condition, and has been made of a reasonable width. Indeed, it is much easier and safer to go up or down this staircase than most of the ones to be found in ancient churches and cathedrals.

There is an interesting fact connected with this rebuilding of the tower staircase. While the work was in progress, a round-headed stone crucifix was discovered at the top. This has been examined by experts, who say it probably dates back to the early twelve-hundreds. It has now been built into the outside of the west wall.

In the evening, there will be a special Service of Remembrance at 7 p.m., which will be attended by the British Legion.
