S.P.G. OVERSEAS TEAM

I should like to draw your attention once again to the visit of the Overseas Team to these parts, which was ment oned in last month's issue. It is indeed a unique occasion; it is the chance of hearing several priests who have been born, educated, and have lived their lives in a different continent. We say in the Apostles' Creed that we believe in the Holy Catholic Church. Now Catholic means Universal. The consequence of that is (amongst other things) that we find we have fellow-members in every continent in the world; (as a matter of fact, it also means we have fellow-members in Paradise and in Heaven, because being a Christian lasts for ever-but we will leave that for the moment).

These "foreign" fellow-Christians differ in many ways from us, in colour, in language, in customs. But the Faith is the same.

This team (in which there will be a priest from Burma, one from India, one from West Africa, and one from Japan) will attend meetings at various towns throughout the Diocese from October 4th to 24th. Our most suitable will be the one at Huntingdon on Monday, October 48th, in St. Mary's Hall, at 7.30 p.m. That is indeed convenient from Fenstanton, as a bus can be caught to take and to return. Please come if you can. I am sure you will not be disappointed.

THE PARISH CHURCH OF HILTON

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Inscriptions

Most of the inscriptions on the monuments date from the seventeen hundreds. And at that time they had become long and wordy, in fact, almost descriptions. There is one in the vestry, evidently erected by a very proud husband, which is worth quoting because it is such a good instance of the self-satisfied feeling of the times:

"Here lies Mary Powell, wife of Watson Powell, Esq., LLB, Sole daughter and heir of John Clench of Botterham in the County of Cambridge, Esq. By Birth great but greater by her Virtues which she was always desirous of concealing. She was of a Religious Life, yet of an easy Conversation, Complaisant to all, vet fully Sincere, Humble without Meanness, Beneficent without Ostentation,

Devout without Superstition; These and many more Amiable Qualities in which she was equalled by few of her own sex, and Surpassed by none; Rendered her every way worthy of the Affection and esteem of her husband, In testimony of which he has Erected this Monument to her Memory. That her Virtues might be known and left to the world for a Pattern. She dyed February 5th 1736, Aged 39 years, Leaving behind her two Sons and two Daughters."

However good she was, it is certainly much too long, and compares unfavourably with the sort of inscription commonly found up to Reformation times (early fifteen hundreds), such as this: "Here lies Sir Alan Guest, on whose soul may God have mercy." Surely such a memorial is far preferable. But even in the eighteenth century they were sometimes more res rained than our Watson Powell of Hilton. This epitaph from Tetbury, in Gloucestershire, for instance, has not a word too much: "In a vault underneath lie several of the Saunderses; particulars the last day will disclose. Amen."

The Free Will Offering Scheme

We hope that everyone in the parish who is in some degree interested in the Church has by now received a letter about the Free Will Offering scheme which we plan to start soon. Quite a number have already signed the accompanying form, by which they undertake to give regular financial support, and have sent it back. We trust that there are many more who are going to send a favourable reply. We ask them to send it fairly soon. We hope to start the scheme working on the First Sunday in Advent, December 2nd, and we want to have everything ready for then.

It may be helpful to have a few details how the scheme will work. Everyone who agrees to take part in it will receive a booklet containing small envelopes, dated for each Sunday in the year. All you have to do is put your weekly contribution in the envelope with the appropriate date on it, and put it in the alms-bag when the collection is made at church. If you are unable to come to church on that particular Sunday, you can probably get a friend to bring it. Or a child may be entrusted with it, to put it in the collection, or else in the box in the church near the Font, which will be used specially for the envelopes. Or of course, if the envelope cannot be conveyed on the Sunday, it can be dropped in the box at any time during the week. The only object is to see that somehow it does arrive each week.

If you come to church more than once on a Sunday, you are not expected to put anything in the second time, if you have already given in your envelope. Of course, you can put a small coin in, if you want to; but there is no obligation. You have made your considered weekly contribution in the envelope, and that's that.

By the way, your name will not appear on these envelopes. Only a number; and no-one will know who the number belongs to except the Treasurer (who is the Vicar, at the moment). So that our giving is as private as ever.

There is just one other point to be mentioned, about special collections. On a few occasions in the year, the collection is devoted to some outside object, not church expenses. The chief ones are Easter Day, Trinity Sunday, Feast Sunday, and Harvest Thanksgiving. On these Sundays the good cause will be extra to the normal contribution. That is to say, you will put in not only your envelope, but also the sum you wish to give to the particular cause. As we think you will agree, this is only fair. The Free Will Offering scheme is for church expenses; and they go on every week.
