We hope that everyone enjoyed the service, which was conducted so beautifully by the Reverend David Busk. We wish to thank all those who have helped and supported us during the last few weeks and to give extra thanks to Bev and Lily for the magnificent floral arrangements in the church and to Thelma's Flowers for arranging the beautiful floral tributes. We also extend our gratitude to William Peacock and Sons for the sympathetic way they cared for Gill and the family. We also want to thank Moira Bond for the lovely food she provided for the gathering in the village hall after the service.

We received more than 60 cards of condolence and many acts of kindness. We were overwhelmed by the village's response

to Gill's passing, which was far more than we could ever have expected. Gill would have been so touched, and we are very grateful.

The nurses in the Critical Care Centre at Hinchingbrooke Hospital were magnificent and went way above and beyond their duties in trying to save Gill and supporting us during such a difficult time. And we cannot fault the staff in Walnut Ward and the hospital's bereavement service. Hinchingbrooke Hospital seems to be in good hands under its new management.

We chose the charity Magpas to remember Gill, because the Magpas team who attended her at home when she collapsed gave us 48 hours during which we were able to communicate with her before the inevitable sad outcome. The donations to this most worthy cause, which is run solely on charitable funding, have so far amounted to £1,123. FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL - February 13th/March 13th 2014

February

<u>Police report</u>: During the month of December, the latest month for which official information is available, the following crimes and incidents were reported: 5 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 1 incidents of vehicle crime; 1 incidents of burglary; The meeting was advised that a vehicle had fuel stolen whilst parked in the Church Street car park and that a shed had been broken into in Church Lane. The Parish Council urges Parishioners to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour to the Police. Telephone 101, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

<u>Potholes:</u> The meeting was advised that County Council Highways has diverted all its funding into the repair of potholes. The County Council is also promoting the use of its online service for reporting potholes. This can be done by visiting www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/transport/roads/reportingafault.htm.

<u>Low Road white lining</u>: The Parish Council was advised that it is not County Council Highways intention to reinstate the centre white lines on the bends on the Low Road following the resurfacing last year. This is despite an increase in accidents on this section of road since it was re-surfaced and the centre lines were removed.

<u>Parking</u>: The Parish Council have been advised that it is the intention of the Police to take action against illegally parked vehicles. This is a County wide initiative and areas around Schools will be specifically targeted.

March

Police report: During the month of January, the latest months for which official information is available, the following crimes and incidents were reported; 4 incidents of anti-social behaviour;1 incident of vehicle crime; 1 incident of burglary; 1 incident of other theft.

The police have advised that that there has been an increase in the number of thefts and attempted thefts from sheds and garages in Fenstanton and surrounding villages. The Parish Council urges Parishioners to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour to the Police. Telephone 101, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

<u>Cemetery Lighting:</u> The Parish Council have agreed to install an additional light on the cemetery path to improve the illumination on this well walked route. Work will commence once funding is obtained.

Great War Commemorations: The Parish Council has agreed to restore the War Memorial by having the Memorial cleaned and the names repainted. It has also been agreed to plant poppies at three selected sites in the Village. One of which will be by the pond the remaining two are subject to agreement by landowners and interested parties.

<u>Parish Seating</u>: The Parish Council have agreed to purchase two new benches to be sited in the village. An additional bench will be sited on Chapel Green and the second will be located at the Hampton Close open space.

Next Meeting: The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on Thursday 10th April 2014 at 7:30pm at Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton.

Members of the public and press are welcome.

HILTON PARISH COUNCIL - 3rd March 2014

Proposed Crossing on Potton Road: Ross Hamilton from Cambridge County Council attended the meeting and advised that notices had been posted on 19 February 2014 and no comments apart from support from the police for the crossing had been received. Work has now commenced on installing the crossing and this is likely to be completed by the end of March. Ross confirmed that the Parish Council would be asked to contribute no more than was agreed under the scheme.

Changes to Streetlights owned by Cambridgeshire County Council: The meeting held in the Village Hall attended by Balfour Beatty and was well attended. Residents of The Paddocks have requested a change in the proposed alterations to the lights in their close. This has been supported by the Parish Council. Work is expected to commence across the village towards the end of March. Full details of the scheme remain on the Parish Council website www.hilton-pc.co.uk

<u>WEEE Recycling:</u> Paul Duggan of WEEE Recycling gave a presentation to the meeting concerning a recycling scheme that has been adopted by other local Parish Council's. This will be discussed further at the next Parish Council meeting.

<u>Play Area:</u> The Play Area remains closed for safety reasons. Agreement was reached for the repairs to the edging around some of the matting to be carried out and these will then be cleaned of the algae before the Play Area is reopened.

<u>Village Ponds</u>: The Parish Council has requested the property owners adjacent to the ponds in Graveley Way to attend to the overhanging tress and vegetation.

The Parish Council is aware of the placement of sandbags in the pond in Graveley Way by the crossroads by UK Power to protect their cable. The Parish Council will maintain discussion with Cambridge County Council regarding the maintenance of the pond bank.

<u>Green Management Policy:</u> The short form version of this policy will be delivered to all homes in the coming weeks.

The Battle of Fenstanton in 1071

It was 1071 just five years after the battle of Hastings and William 1 (The Conqueror) was still struggling to subdue the Anglo Saxon population of England. In 1070 Hereward the Wake had started a revolt against the rule of the Norman lords and King William in particular.



From a base in the Fens, Hereward led a war of resistance against the Normans until he was finally defeated in 1071. As a result of his long guerrilla

campaign and by avoiding the attentions of William's soldiers he earned the popular title "the Wake", meaning "the watchful". In 1070, four years after the Battle of Hastings, Hereward the Wake made plans with the brother of King Harold, Earl Morcar of Northumbria. The Danish king Swein Estrithson sent a small army to England and established a stronghold on the Isle of Ely, where they were joined by the English rebels including Hereward the Wake and Earl Morcar.

King William planned an invasion of Ely in 1071 to kill or capture Hereward the Wake. It was thrown into disarray at Fenstanton. A strong force under the generalship of Ivo de Taillebois, the High Sheriff of Lincolnshire, was to march from Huntingdon to join other forces at Cambridge. Hereward the Wake was well known to the men of Fenstanton, many had known him as a boy when he visited his godfather Ulf Fenman, the Saxon lord of the manor of Fenstanton.

The men of the village assembled and sent out their scouts to find out Ivo's movements and then laid in wait on the old Roman road (Huntingdon Road). Collecting at the cross roads of the Hilton Road and Huntingdon Road (now Galley Hill), the village men waited for the Norman forces to arrive and in a sharp engagement they overthrew them between the Woolpack Inn and Fenstanton Hill. A few Norman soldiers tried to escape down the lower road to St Ives, but at the White Bridge, (probably then a ford), they found the lower road held by the men of Fenstanton and were forced to escape up the lode road or tow-path, to the Stanton Wharf on the main river. Maybe a boatload managed to escape up river to St Ives, but most were slain or driven into the river to drown and to this day this spot is called 'Normans' or No-man's Friend'.

The Lord of the manor of Fenstanton was Gilbert de Ghent or Gilbert de Gand, who had fought for King William at Hastings and was one of two Norman commanders who assisted Duke William in reducing Yorkshire, where he held the garrison at York. Gilbert was not based in Fenstanton and it is unlikely that he spent much time here. It was probably just the occasional visit when passing from manor to manor.



Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School Involvement with the Commemoration of WW1 8th March 2014



The school was approached by Cambridge University Officers' Training Corps. the same organisation that responsible for the initial training of undergraduates bound for the front during the Great War. As part of the Nation's centenary commemoration of World War 1 (WW1) they had planned an event with the City, County and University of Cambridge and were keen to involve some school children.

On the 8th March 2014 a group of soldiers (running, biking and

rowing) linked the County's WW1 War Memorials by visiting as many of them as possible. As an additional touch they wanted the soldiers visiting the War Memorials to find some evidence of a younger generation's remembrance. The idea was for the children to simply write on a postcard the name, regiment and age of a soldier from WW1 who lived locally, was connected to the school or indeed related to a pupil, the aim being to create a simple link to the past.

We were keen to participate and teach the children about WW1, why we should continue to remember all of those who fought and gave their lives for our country. The children spent the week learning about the War and we asked parents to help with the collation of information about relatives/friends who may have had family involved with the war. We received some very interesting information from the past, which was very

moving and it made the children realise how much everyone can be affected by the harsh reality of war.

During our Friday assembly some of the children walked across to the War Memorial in Church and left envelope containing the postcards for collection by the soldiers on 8th March. Once all have postcards been collected from across the County they will be displayed. Alison Wilkinson





CAMBRIDGE BOTANIC GARDENS

Petal Power

This month our gardens begin to take on the kaleidoscope of spring and summer flowers throughout the colour spectrum. It is quite extraordinary to think that before the angiosperms – the flowering plants – developed around 200 million years ago, the world was largely green.

Petal power brought colour to the earth. The improved adaptability of flowering plants to a wider range of ecological niches fuelled their rapid diversification during the Lower Cretaceous and marked the beginning of a huge range of complex animal pollinator interactions.

Many pollinator-plant relationships have been well observed. Think of the bee orchid - its flower not only mimics the appearance of a bee but also emits a fake pheromone to lure a male bee into thinking he has found an appropriate mate, only to find he has been tricked into pollinating the orchid! Or the Madagascan orchid with a hugely long nectar spur which Darwin famously predicted, correctly, would be pollinated by a moth with a foot-long proboscis, which at the time was still undiscovered. Even the colour of the petals gives good clues – bees can see the blue end of the light spectrum easily, including bee ultra-violet which humans cannot see, but they cannot see red light which is why there are so few red flowers in a border designed for bees, but lots of blues from cottage garden favourites such as borage, delphinium and phacelia. Conversely, birds are better at seeing the red end of the spectrum, borne out by greater number of bird-pollinated red-flowered plants, particularly in the Americas and South Africa. But actually how these highly specialised floral traits are built up in a plant down the generations is still the subject of much research, particularly in the Evolution and Development lab of Garden Director, Professor Beverley Glover.

Petal characters such as colour, texture and insect-mimicking spots, as well as structural features such as nectar spurs and anther cones, all provide vital clues to understanding the diversification of flowering plants. For example, most petal colour is produced by pigments, but some particularly glistening or iridescent colours are produced by periodic ordering of nanoscale structures in the petal epidermis that change the hue in proportion to the angles of observation and illumination. But how and why do plants produce these structural colours? Some petals are spotted, such as many in the daisy family, which appear to mimic other insects, but why? Might the different textures of petals provide grip for some desired animal pollinators, but slip for other unwanted visitors?

Professor Glover and colleagues will be trying to answer some of these questions as part of the Garden's Festival of Plants next month, a day dedicated to bringing plants into focus with pop-up plant science, talking plants with the experts, specialist tours of the Garden, a drop-in Plant Lab for families and a Plant Prom of specialist plant nurseries making sure your garden will be full of petal power this summer!

Festival of Plants runs from 10am – 4pm on Saturday 17 May 2014. Admission is £4.50/£4.95 gift aid (£3.95/£4.30 concession) and accompanied children 16 and under are admitted free of charge. For further visitor information please call 01223 336265 or visit
