Clean for the Queen: The Parish Council would like to thank the twenty seven volunteers that made our "Clean for the Queen" event on Saturday 5th March so successful. Additional support was appreciated from the Brownies, Rainbows and Fenstanton Youth Football Club. The response was beyond our expectations and enabled us to complete all our target areas. At the time of writing we now have legible road signs, a revived car park, a spotless play park, and a litter-free zone that extends well beyond the village boundaries. The photograph on the PC website shows the results of our efforts and a further thank you is extended to the Methodist Church and HDC for their support. Feedback on the event would be welcome!

Village and Church Grass Cutting: This month the three year maintenance contract was up for renewal. We would like to congratulate John Carter who won the contract, against two other organisations who tendered to win the work. We are confident this outcome achieves the best value for the Parish but also recognises the quality of John's service to the Parish over recent years and his knowledge of the village. The new contract ushers in some changes to the maintenance regime of the open spaces of the village, in particular restoring more of the Common back to meadow. The Parish Council is grateful for the support of those residents affected by these changes. This work is part of an ongoing commitment of the council to improve the diversity and extent of flora and fauna in this important habitat.

Parish Council Policies and Website: A full review of Parish Council policy documents has been conducted in recent weeks, resulting in some minor changes. The updated documents can be found on Hilton Parish Councils website, which itself has undergone a review and rework. The Hilton PC map will shortly be available as an unframed, A2 rolled sheet, for the princely sum of £5. Should you wish to purchase a copy of this map, please contact the Parish Clerk; hiltonparishclerk@gmail.com

A14 update: We are somewhat in limbo at this point as we await the recommendations of the Examining Authority which have now been passed to the Secretary of State. The Secretary of State's decision will be published on 13th May 2016, after which follows a period of six weeks for any legal challenges to be made. In the meantime Highways England will conduct topographical surveys over the affected area, so do not be surprised to see men and plant at work in the fields around the village.

The Queen's Birthday Celebrations: As part of a village wide celebration of the Queen's birthday involving a variety of groups in the village, we hope to light the reworked beacon at a site yet to be decided, on the 21st April. The order for the new tripod design has been placed and all being well it will be ready for the big day.

Dog Fouling: We are sorry to say there has been a significant increase in the amount of dog fouling in the village. This a real step backwards as we have a very good record considering the number of dogs walked daily in the village. Can we call on all dog walkers to please pick up and dispose of your dog's mess in an appropriate manner. This is an important issue of public health.

The next Parish Council meeting will take place on 11th April at the Methodist Church.

Local Highway Initiative: The Parish Council has been unsuccessful in obtaining grant funding from the County Council under the Local Highway initiative for the provision of parking restrictions on the A14 east bound slip road. **The Queen's Birthday Celebration:** The Parish Council agreed to provide financial sponsorship towards an afternoon tea for Parishioners to celebrate the Queen's birthday. Provision of defibrillators.: The meeting discussed at length the possibility of providing a defibrillator in the Village and the possible location. Due to the complexity of the matter the meeting agreed to defer a decision until the next meeting when further information will become available.

Travelling from Fenstanton to London





Today Fenstanton can be classed as a commuter village with very few people now working on the

land. London is a few hours away from Fenstanton by car or train but it has not always been that way.

Unless one was wealthy enough to be able to keep their own stable of horses there were only three means of getting down to London and back again:

- 1. **The Stage Coach**: A stage coach ran from London to St Ives fairly regularly and depending on the weather conditions, about twice a week. It ran via Fenstanton, Potton, Biggleswade and the Great North Road (A1). This was an expensive journey and far beyond the average working man's means to pay. Strangely, the post house used in Fenstanton was not on the High Street but was the Queen's Head situated in Talls Lane, opposite Chapel Green. This burned down around 1910 and a bungalow now sits in its place.
- 2. **The Trade Wagon from St Ives**: Heavy trade wagons went to London probably once a week, taking from two to three days on the journey. When the weather was inclement a hooded area would be erected at the rear of the wagon. This was bedded with straw and about three or four passengers could squeeze in. They had to provide their own food but the cost of the journey was moderate.

The great wagon was drawn by four heavy horses; it had no springs and the roads were bad, muddy in winter, dusty in summer and much littered by stones of all sizes. The pace would average about four miles an hour and as Fenstanton is about sixty miles from London would take about sixteen hours of actual travelling time. Of course there would be constant stoppages to feed and water the horses, but they would keep going fairly steadily the passengers eating their own food as the journey progressed.

3. **One could always walk!** Most people walk about three miles per hour, so that would be twenty hours, not including any breaks, overnight stops and assuming that you walk the same speed the entire time. If you were cross country hiking, it is often much slower. So, a long hard journey to London but one that would have been undertaken by a lot of travellers especially those poor people seeking work.

£1275 Raised for Ward C10

Ward C10 is used for treating mum/dad/brothers/sisters/neighbours anyone who is suffering from cancer. Charlie Darling is a real character in this village, many of you will know him as the founder of Fenstanton Youth Football. They now have over 100 players the teams, the under 16's will be celebrating their 10 year anniversary in June. (You may also remember Charlie as Mr Fenstanton at the local sports day. When the auction started, every year he would buy some rhubarb).

Last November I sent an email to the parents of Fenstanton Youth Football Under 16's and asked if anyone would like to have their heads shaved for the cancer charity. Mark Shuker, a linesman for Under 16's and Tim Heagan replied straight away. I couldn't believe it, I thought maybe this time I had asked too much.

They were amazing not only did they raise fantastic amounts of sponsorship but on Saturday 28th November Mark had his head shaved by Becky from Rollers, he also wanted it wet shaved. A true gentleman always willing to help out. I would like to thank Becky for helping out and coming down to the Hampton football pitch. Tim Heagan also made an amazing effort getting sponsorship, I understand he was also sponsored if he did not have it done (people just sponsored him!). We had a fantastic evening at United Reformed Church, for which, I would like to thank Jean Ding.

There was a blanket on the floor and the chair was set, Tim was getting quite nervous. Beth Ball was amazing that night she came with members of her team. Tim had his head shaved and like Mark Shuker had a wet shave.

My husband Steven Parr and Tim had their backs waxed, this completed, a quick run round with a tin raised another £120 in 2mins, also Reece and Bailey Parr had their legs waxed. Beth was busy, I would recommend a visit to her salon in Willingham.

We had a 40" TV donated by ADCOCK, it was won by Charlie's grandson, who had spent some pocket money buying an envelope for £1. I would like to say thank you to Alan in the Crown and Pipes for selling £1 envelopes for the TV and also for having a collection jar on the bar. Kerry-Ann, from the King Bill also collected.

My goal was to get sixteen DVD players and some snuggle blankets that could be left by each bed in the unit. I spoke to a Tesco store manager in Norwich who organised for sixteen portable DVD players to be donated to Ward C10.

Because we managed to raise £1275, Charlie, Val and me sat down and made a list of what else would help. Vaseline makes such a difference as the guests often get dry lips. I purchased forty-nine fleece blankets and twenty flannels from TOWNROW in St Ives at an amazing discount. We then delivered two car loads of boxes to ward C10, the security guard helped carry items to the ward. Staff were over the moon they couldn't believe the amount of money that had been raised. We still had a balance of £300 to spend. Charlie then spoke about Central Line Holders, these were designed by a lady who has herself suffered with Cancer and had a Hickman Line. They cost £15 each we managed to get thirty to send to Ward C10 and I spoke to Anne, staff matron, on the ward, she said, they couldn't believe they had them. The feedback is that the guests staying on the ward enjoy the snuggle blankets. To date 50% have donated, (if by any chance you have registered but not yet donated, please check the NHS Give Blood website for appointments available near you). You could make a difference.



36 ladies met at the United Reformed Church on the 3rd March. Our speaker was Mrs Petronella Britton who spoke about hand painted china.

Her family were living in Scotland, her children were teenagers and she found she had some spare time so decided to learn a craft. A search of her local paper yielded a china painting course at the local tech. She persuaded a friend to go along but this lady wanted to do a cookery course, which was full, so she tried china painting. The friend gave up quickly but Petronella loved it. She continued studying, but when the family moved to England, she couldn't find a course at first. When she did, she found that the tutor was learning it from a magazine each week just before the lesson. So Petronella started studying from the same magazine.

The paints are like glazes and have to be fired once applied and each one has an optimum temperature. The original colour is usually different to the final result and some colours can change the appearance of others, so have to be fired separately, so each article may have to

be fired a number of times. She normally buys plain, glazed items and paints on top of the glaze, but she has experimented with painting unglazed pieces and glazing on top imitating Moorcroft.

She said she had given her work to family and friends until she could not give any more away. So she now sells through Saints Craft Fairs, such as Saints Crafters.

HILTON FEAST WEEK

The Feast Week Committee read with interest the feedback from a local resident in last month's Spectrum. There appeared to be three core issues: the loss of the Spirit of Feast Week: the "Big Bands" and Feedback. We would like to take this opportunity to address these points.

Spirit of Feast Week: Feast Week is not just about the week of events in July, it is a mechanism in the village which aims to bring together the residents into a community and supporting that community to develop. It is not just about the bands on the Thursday and Saturday nights, the "spirit" goes on throughout the year, with the support of the other excellent organisations within our village. For example: providing the refreshments at the fireworks hosted by our Parish Council; supporting the upkeep of our lovely village hall through regular use; the entertainment for all children with Easter Egg Hunts and Christmas Activities. Also we aim to bring together all faiths at the service held in the Marquee each year on the first Sunday of Feast week. During that day we provide free fairground rides and bouncy castles, as well as entry to the animal farm and children's craft activities during Feast Week all of which are provided free of charge. The list can go on, however that is the "Spirit of Feast Week" and the events which have evolved, to make Hilton such a special place to live and for our children to grow up in.

Big Bands funding: for the above to continue there are two core elements needed: support (to organise and attend) and financial.

The first element is self explanatory, but in our experience, having a tribute band which started in the Millennium with Abba, brings in more profits than a local band, and more than covers the band costs. We would like to expand a little on the second (apologies to those who attend our AGM, you can skip this bit). The money element is important as the Feast Week Committee members are personally responsible for any losses incurred. In recent years, steps have been taken to minimise personal liability, however it is still a risk, so we keep a firm eye on money in and money out. To host all the events cost money and like everything in life costs continue to Many costs are obvious, eq: the marguee; tables; chairs; entertainment. There are however a number of other costs which are not so apparent, eg: insurance; arts and craft material; rosettes; compliance with Health and Safety; rubbish removal - again the list can go on. Significant effort is spent each year to negotiate better deals in order to control these costs. There are two ways we pay for the bills: fund-raising throughout the year and Feast Week itself. Most of the money is raised during the latter part of Feast Week in July. We need money to pay the bills in a quickly. The best way to do this, is to supply quality entertainment which people will want to attend and usually they will buy a drink and a burger. We do accept that there are some, who may not live in the village, or who do not support Feast Week in anyway, but turn up for the bands or the other "free events". We cannot charge for entry, as this goes against all that Feast Week principles. We have donation boxes which help in a small way. Last year we had a very generous donation of £100 from a Fenstanton resident who said her children absolutely love coming to Feast Week and many of our fundraising events are attended by familiar faces from other villages, which is great, and supports Hilton Feast Week. We are very grateful to the many people both in the village and from other places who do support and/or help at the various events. It is very much appreciated.

Feedback: The Feast Week committee always seek feedback from all interested parties. But of the surveys delivered to each house last year, only 6 were returned. The committee members talk to villagers about events, and we hold an annual AGM (there are always spare seats) which is an ideal opportunity for any one to come forward with ideas or offers of help for the coming year.

Feedback is a two way thing, so please talk to us, there are contact details listed each month in Spectrum, we will be very happy to hear from you. We cannot guarantee we will be able to take forward your ideas, but be assured they will be considered very carefully and we would be happy to talk to you.


