We have had a busy few months at the pre-school. Behind the scenes, we have been getting our new website up and running. You can find it at <u>www.fenstantonpreschool.org.uk</u>. We hope it will be useful for both current and prospective parents.

In the pre-school, this term we have been exploring winter. We have been discovering what happens to water outside when it's cold, taking winter walks, matching snowflake patterns, exploring winter words, ice painting, cooking winter warmers, counting and weighing out ingredients, mark making in snow dough and practicing putting on our own winter clothing while exploring zips and buttons.

The children are really embracing the free-flow approach we have adopted in the setting, and love being able to choose whether to spend time engaged in activities inside or in our enclosed outside space. The addition of PE lessons on Mondays and Friday mornings has also proved very popular.

With the implementation of the 30 free hours childcare scheme this coming September we are anticipating higher demand for places than usual. We take children from 2 years 9 months, so if you have a child who would be due to start with us in the next school year, we would strongly urge you to contact us now to ensure a greater chance of securing a place.

We feel that our 9am-3pm hours are a great introduction to the structure of a school day, and alongside our close links with the school, we find this all helps aid children's transitions to primary school. ### Fenstanton Lancelot Brown 300 Celebrations

The National CB300 team is still in place until the end of March and after that the celebrations can be regarded as officially over. However, they and the publicity company they use are helping us to develop a press release and donation site to assist with fund raising for the restoration of the memorial in the church while they can. The very last blog that went out on their site was about our fund raising and contained a link to our BT My donate site to which money is still trickling in. We are still waiting for the last 10% of our funding to come through although it has been applied for.

Locally the committee has very little still to do and we no longer meet although some of us have joined the Church fabric committee temporally to help with fund raising and completing the renovations of Brown's memorial in the chancel. The cost of refurbishment is likely to be in the region of £40,000, however, with money already raised from visitors last year and funding promised we are already half way there.

My thanks to everyone who has helped over the last two years we have spent planning and delivering the celebrations. Last summer it was gratifying to see so many people visiting and enjoying our village. We believe the plaque, the memorial renovations and the tree planting will leave a lasting legacy for future parishioners to enjoy and to learn about Lancelot Brown.

One last thing we have to do: We have acquired a Cedar of Lebanon sapling, Brown's favourite tree, which the author of a book on Brown, Stephie Shields will be planting for us on Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> April. We will combine this with a walk along the Fenstanton CB published walk, for those energetic enough to join in, and it will be planted on Chris Behagg's land close to the first gate on the left down the Low Road hope to see you all there.

As you will see from the picture the stone base to the Capability Brown plaque in the church yard entrance is stained in places. While it is lovely to see so many people standing by the plaque and chatting, hopefully about Brown's plan of the village we would ask that, if you have a dog with you, please try to discourage them from peeing on the stone. It's not an easy task to achieve we know but if you can the bucket and scrubbing brush brigade will be extremely grateful.

#### The Medieval Church, (the 11th century to 16<sup>th</sup> century) in Fenstanton



The church played a far greater role in medieval Fenstanton than the church does medieval England, the church todav. In dominated everybody's life. All medieval people, be they village peasants or towns people, believed that God, heaven and hell all existed. From a very early age, the people were taught that the only way they could get to heaven was if the Roman Catholic Church let them. Everybody would have been terrified of hell and the people would have been told of the sheer horrors waiting for them in hell in the many weekly services they had to attend. The control the church had over the people was total. Peasants worked for free on church land.

This proved difficult for peasants as the time they spent working on church land, could have been better spent working on their own plots of land producing food for their families.

They paid 10% of what they earned in a year to the church (this tax was called tithes). Tithes could be paid in either money or in goods produced by the peasant farmers. As peasants had little money, they almost always had to pay in seeds, harvested grain, animals etc. This usually caused a peasant a lot of hardship as seeds, for example, would be needed to produce the next year's crop and therefore feed the family. What the church received in tithes was kept in a huge tithe barn; a lot of the stored grain would have been eaten by rats or poisoned by their urine. A failure to pay tithes, so the peasants were told by the church, would lead to their souls going to hell after they had died.

This is one reason why the church was so wealthy. People were too scared not to pay tithes despite the difficulties it meant for them. You also had to pay for baptisms, if you were not baptized you could not go to heaven when you died, marriages, there were no couples living together in medieval times as the church taught that this equaled sin and burials, you had to be buried on holy land if your soul was to get to heaven. Whichever way you looked, the church received money.

The church was not always used for sacred purposes; it would also be used as a meeting place, a covered market, or even an alehouse. Priests were often married with many children and quite often a mistress or two. They were little better than the lord's servants, and often were required to work in the fields when not in church. Churches did not have seating, rather the congregation stood, with the richer and more important people taking their rightful place at the front. There was one exception. People living in Alms Houses had a seat allocated to them which were attached to the wall, hence the saying 'going to the wall'.

Marriages were performed in the church porch then moved on into the church for the feasting. Baptisms and funerals were also performed in the porch which is why the font is just inside the main door. The village church was also the most substantial building in the village and most probably the only one built of stone. Not only were the churches substantial in their build but they were usually the only building of sufficient size to accommodate the entire village at religious festival or social gathering. They truly were the centre of village life, church, social centre, mortuary and record office all rolled into one.

The north side of the church was regarded as the Devil's side, therefore it was not used by the church and no burials took place there. However, it was used by the villagers for sporting activates and a form of football called 'Camping' was played there. Burials on the north side of the church only began in Victorian times. The north side was also used for buying and selling produce including locally brewed ales. Marriage feasts took place here as was any other outdoor community celebration undertaken by the villagers.

#### **FENSTANTON WI**

#### March

Our eyes were opened to a world largely unknown to us when Nikki Lisle came to talk to us about "The Life of a Prison Officer ". She spoke with great humour about the 26 years she spent working in prisons including 10 years at Whitemoor and 14 years at Littlehey.

Her job was to look after the prisoners, not to punish them and to use pro-social modelling, acting as a good motivating role model discouraging anti-social behaviour and attitudes. This helps to bring out the best in people which hopefully lowers the rates of reoffending. The average age of a prisoner is 24. Lack of education and discipline from an early age is the main reason why many are in prison. There are many educational and training courses available to the prisoners but there is no pressure, as in the outside world, if they do not want to take the advantage.

A very informative talk from Nikki who is now working in the Probation Service having had to retire from the Prison Service on medical grounds because she was injured in a fight.

### **CAMBRIDGE BOTANIC GARDENS**



#### The Primula Parade

Few plants raise a gardener's spirit more than the sight of early spring flowering primroses (Primula vulgaris). Thriving in the dappled shade of woodlands throughout most of Europe, they mark the end of cold, bleak winter months and herald the beginning of the explosion of growth in the woodland. Primroses are one of around 600 Primulas found largely throughout the northern hemisphere. They come in a bewildering array of sizes and flower forms, and fill widely differing

ecological niches. In the Alpine House at the Cambridge University Botanic Garden, starting in February through March is the amazing *Primula allionii*. In SE France and Italy these flowers cling to life in crevices in limestone cliffs until the spring when these surprisingly small plants pack a huge floral punch, covering themselves in an array of pink to white flowers. Next to flower in the Alpine House is *Primula auricula* with elaborate flowers straight out of a catalogue of beautiful buttons. Later in the spring and summer by the stream side and Bog Garden and also this year in our Alpine House Himalayan display, we will have a range of some of the Asiatic moisture loving Primulas. These start with the purple drum sticks of *Primula denticulata* followed by a

host of others until their floral peak in the summer with the tiered magenta *Primula japonica* and nodding yellow bells of *P.sikkimensis.* 

Primulas all have in common a crafty way of ensuring they are cross pollinated. They have two flower forms – either 'pin' or 'thrum'. 'Pin' plants have their stigma (receptive tip of the female part of the flower) sticking out of the petal tube and their stamens (male pollen bearing parts) held deep inside. With 'thrum'



plants it is the other way round. This helps to make sure that pollen transferred by an insect onto the receptive stigma must come from a primula flower of the opposite form. Only the pollen from a 'pin' flower will reach down far enough into the petal tube for a 'thrum' flower and only the pollen from the raised up 'thrum' stamens will reach the similarly raised 'pin' stigma.



Fenstanton Reserves sadly bowed out of the Hunts Lower Junior Cup on Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> March, losing 3-0 to Peterborough based team Cardea FC in the final round.

It was a brilliant match ultimately decided by a poor first 15 minutes and the outstanding performance of the Cardea #7.

#### HGV's through the village

We were joined at the meeting by Mr Mick George and the Parish Council thanked him for implementing a voluntary 20mph speed restriction on his vehicles when they pass through the village. This restriction is monitored through the company's in- vehicle systems and driver's performance is checked to ensure they are adhering to their policy.

Once again, the Parish Council would encourage all Parishioners to adopt 20mph as a voluntary speed limit when driving through Hilton.

#### A14 Construction Traffic

Highways England have advised us that they consider any size of vehicle associated with the new A14 route as construction traffic and as such they should not be passing through the village. They would welcome reports of any vehicle not complying with this stated aim.

They suggest that times, description and registration number of any vehicle to be passed to Mrs Perez, our Clerk so that she can forward these details to them. It would also help to have details of which direction the traffic was travelling in.

#### Vehicles on the Green

Following on from our comments last month it was agreed that the Parish would place a temporary rope around the road side of the Green in an effort to preserve the open nature, reduce the risk of joyriding and maintain the safety of everyone using the open space.

There has been evidence of joyriding with tyre marks across the open space and a couple of more specific instances where a car was abandoned in the middle of the green when it became stuck and where another car crashed in one of the ditches.

#### Agricultural vehicles accessing The Wilderness.

There have been 3 trees felled along Wraggs Row in recent weeks to ensure that agricultural vehicles can use the road rather than having to drive across the Green to get to The Wilderness. The next stage of work is for the hedge on the right-hand side of the track across The Wilderness to be cut back. This work should be carried out shortly. It may look unsightly at the outset but the hedge will recover and the cut-ting back is needed to ensure that modern, wide agricultural vehicles can stick to the track rather than using the field.

#### **HILTON WI**

On Monday 13th March Geoff Lambert arrived with his lovely dog Buddy to tell us about the fantastic job that a trained dog can do to help people with life threatening diseases to live a normal life and control their medication.

The dogs are trained to recognise the changes in their owner's condition such as low sugar levels in brittle and type 1 diabetes which if not detected can allow the person to go into a coma a have to be admitted to hospital for urgent treatment.

The charity has trained 76 dogs so far to do this and hope to train many more.

The dogs are often donated or come from rescue centres and are sent to the training centre to learn how to do their job and about 30 dogs a year are being sent to a new home to be their new owner's lifeline and also become their best friend.

A lot of illnesses give off a distinctive smell, diabetes when the sugar level drops, Addison's which has low cortisone levels and is a serious condition if not controlled and narcolepsy when a person can just collapse without warning, but the dogs can sense the changes and by doing so enable their owners to take control and live a normal life. They are trained to either lick their owners or bark so have to be able to see or be near their owner at all times especially at night when everyone else is asleep they are always on duty. A lot of them are sent to help children who cannot recognise their symptoms and need help in the day and at night so their family can relax and know their child is safe.

It costs about £13,000 to train a dog but luckily not much trouble to train their new owners! The dogs can go anywhere as they have a passport and are allowed on trains

and buses and in cafes and hotels. The charity is now doing trials for breast and prostate cancer as early detection means quicker treatment.

It was a most enlightening talk and the little dog was really lovely!
