On Thursday 8 November I attended the Field of Remembrance at Westminster Abbey which was organised by the Royal British Legion Poppy Factory as part of the annual Poppy Appeal commemorations.

Every year around 250 plots are laid out in the names of military organisations and associations and Remembrance crosses are then planted in the plots, many with hand written messages from family, friends or colleagues.

Parish Council Report

HILTON

A report from an acoustic expert on the noise problems likely to affect Hilton as a result of the A14 proposals has recently been received and is currently being assessed by the Parish Council and the A14 Action Group. The Council was delighted that the recent fund raising quiz organized by the Action Group had raised over £1300 towards the cost of the acoustic expert. Following selection of the Orange Route by Government, the A14 Action Group has decided that further challenges to the route would not be effective but instead, agreed to focus its efforts on monitoring and challenging the detail of proposals from the Highways Agency and to continue to represent the interests of the village.

Following the decision by the Council to power-wash the build up of slippery algae at the play park rather than replace the rubber surface, prices for this work had been sought and the Council has been delighted to receive a no-cost bid from a local firm. The Council expected to have the play park power -washed twice a year.

The Council has agreed to try and prevent non residents from fishing in village ponds and will erect a notice to that effect at Reeve Ditch.

The Council had been advised that the recent summer had promoted exceptional growth of vegetation along the sides of ditches. It was planned to cut back much of this growth early in the New Year and later in 2008, to clean at least two of the village ponds.

Along with the routine tree maintenance work planned for this winter, the Council advised that the large beech tree just along from the Cricket Pavillion was in a potentially dangerous condition and should be felled. It was hoped to carry out this work early in the New Year

To better protect its title, the Parish Council has recently registered The Green with the Land Registry. This exercise has revealed that two small areas of the Green are already claimed by others highlighting the value of this initiative. The Council is trying to resolve these two disputed areas.

The Parish Council has agreed to replace two notice boards within the village. The board at the Post Office will be replaced first with the one at New England expected later.

Following the resignation of Councillor Adams a vacancy exists on the Parish Council. If you would like to fill this position and help the community, please contact either a member of the Council or the Clerk on 01480 832030.

The Council recommended approval for the planning application for the retention of a farm office at St Francis Toft.

Whilst recognizing the problems of parking along Church Lane, solutions appear to lie with HDC and residents have been advised to approach that Council.

The Council has invited the County Council to re examine the problematical new surface at the Rutland Green area and finally, the Council would like to thank Graham Barradell and all his helpers for a most successful bonfire night and excellent soup.

Parish Council Report

FENSTANTON

Police report.

During the period 11th October to 7th November 2007 the following incidents had been reported to the Police: -1 theft from a vehicle and 1 burglary.

Concern has again been expressed at the number of vehicles parking on corners. This does present a safety hazard and is contrary to the Highway Code.

White Bridge - Low Road.

The bridge has recently failed crucial safety tests. Work is expected to begin in late January or early February and will last for approximately 15 weeks whilst a new bridge is constructed. During this period the Low Road will be closed, except for access, and diversions put in place.

Cambridge congestion charging.

A number of roadshows have been organised to provide information, and as part of the wider consultation process, into the possibility of congestion charging in Cambridge. One of the roadshows will be held in the Free Church in St Ives on 13th February between 4pm and 9pm.

A14 – Announcement of the preferred route.

The Parish Council welcomed the announcement of the Orange route. It was felt the decision would benefit the Village, although it was appreciated that some Parishioners would be disadvantaged. It is the opinion of the Parish Council that the wider picture must be considered and solutions found to stop the continuing problem of rat running through the Village.

Next Meeting.

The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on Thursday 10th January 2008 7:30pm at Fenstanton and Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. All members of the press and public are welcome.

Yanks in the Village!!!

We were not the first, and, perhaps, not the last Americans to reside in the quaint, small village of Hilton, Huntingdonshire. In July 1958 as a U. S. Air Force 2nd Lt., I was joined by my wife, Joyce, and 16-month old daughter Kathy as they came to reside with me at Kidman's Farm Cottage. Joyce was also carrying our second

child Tobey, another daughter soon to be delivered at USAF Hospital Wimpole Park. We moved in just as my supervisor, Major Clifford Fosse and his wife Marie moved out. I had been sent overseas in May, unaccompanied by the family due to a shortage of housing; thus it was incumbent upon me to find and contract for a place before the Air Force would transfer the family to my duty site of RAF Station Alconbury. We were told by Hilton resident Sally Hills that another Air Force family also lived in the cottage prior to the Fosse couple.

The cottage was just made for us in features, cost, and accommodations. It was furnished with everything one needed for comfortable living. Everything belonging there was inventoried so that each item was accounted for when occupants moved in or moved out. One item not on the list was a large resident black cat, named Mr. Kidman, who seemed to be the continuous overseer of the place.

To the rear, in the field outside the hedge enclosing the back yard was a large haystack. Actually, the cottage was really on the outskirts of the village at that time. There were barns to the west and adjacent fencing to contain a number of cattle that grazed in the fields to the southwest. The grounds around the cottage were planted with hundreds of white and yellow daffodils, splendid when they bloomed. The walkway to the front door was

lined with a low hedge of fragrant lilac. Along our side of Graveley Way, was a narrow finger of a pond which at times allowed village swans to frequent our location. At the rear outside wall, a mature climbing rose bush produced blooms that could be picked from the upstairs bedroom window, and a huge coal bin



was in place just outside the kitchen window. All of these features were somewhat awesome to a young couple from Beaumont, Texas who had never been out of the States.

Though we lived in this rather rural country setting, our exposure to the village and the residents was quite minimal. Our neglect in integrating ourselves with the village resulted in limiting our contacts to two families – Sid and Sally Hills and their two sons, and George Gingell, a retired London bobby.

Our tour was cut short as my military career took precedence over remaining in England. In August 1959 I was offered a flying assignment at Dreux Air Base, France. Off we went, hardly aware of the real and intrinsic value of our stay in a dwelling dating back to the 16th century. It was only my recent curiosity about the past that the age of this marvellous treasure came to light and our great fortune was revealed.

Today, I am still in awe over this most unique experience. I suppose that, had we tried, we could not have conceived such an adventure in our wildest imagination.

Fenstanton A14 Action Group

Fenstanton residents will now know that the Secretary of State for Transport has confirmed that improvements to the A14 between Ellington and Fen Drayton will involve the construction of a new road following the Orange Route, implementing the CHUMMS strategy with removal of the Huntingdon railway viaduct. The decision was reached after taking into account all consultation views contained questionnaires submitted during both the 2005 consultation period and the 2006 further consultation period, resulting in an overwhelming majority of 62% of views in favour of the Orange Route.

What happens next is contained in the recently issued Highways Agency leaflet or you can find the Preferred Route announcement by accessing the Highways Agency website at http://www.highways.gov.uk/roads/projects/14848.aspx.

Fenstanton A14 Action Group considers that there are several points that need clarification:

- when will the Contractor will be appointed;
- draft Statutory Orders and the Environment Statement are due to be published early 2009 so when and how will any objections be collected and reviewed by the Secretary of State for Transport and the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government;

- bearing in mind the time lag on the decision on the Preferred Route, will the decision whether or not to hold a Public Enquiry take place in late 2009; and
- will construction work start late 2010?

It is expected that the Highways Agency will release, either through the Parish Council or directly to every resident, further information on the schedule of the Contractor's plans and how the major issue of reducing the impact of the new road on the environment (noise and air pollution) will be addressed.

Fenstanton A14 Action Group plan to liaise with Fenstanton Parish Council in any approaches to the Highways Agency on the matter of reviewing and (hopefully) concurring with the detailed plans drawn up by the Contractor, eg noise bund design and tree planting schemes.

Meanwhile, I thank Fenstanton residents and the members of Fenstanton A14 Action Group for their efforts and support during the consultation period. In addition, I would like to offer special thanks to Kevin Thomas who helped Fenstanton A14 Action Group so much by printing all the material used to enable Fenstanton residents to write in free of charge. This meant that we were able to meet our objectives without incurring any costs.

Club News

from the Villages

RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes Nature Reserve

The appearance of Fen Drayton Lakes has changed dramatically over the last 50 years, from agricultural land to gravel pits to wetland nature reserve. Willow trees quickly become established and spread around the damp areas, and we need to remove trees from some areas to provide ideal conditions for other wildlife.

The RSPB has employed contractors to remove trees in three areas over the 2007/08 winter, starting with young willows on the western edge of Holywell Lake. This space will then allow the existing reedbed there to expand, and provide a larger winter roost site for bitterns and starlings, as well as more nesting habitat for reed warblers and other reed specialists.

The islands in Moore, Elney and Oxholme Lakes will be cleared of trees. These islands were designed to attract groundnesting birds, such as ringed plovers and common terns. These birds will not nest near trees, so we can look forward to having these, and other species, nesting on the islands in future summers. Potential colonists include black-headed gulls and avocets. Volunteers and staff will maintain suitable conditions by clearing the islands each winter.

Finally, trees between Ferry Lagoon and the Great River Ouse will be felled, to encourage ground-nesting redshanks and lapwings to nest in the wet grassland in that part of the nature reserve. We apologise for the disruption this work causes, and we hope you will enjoy seeing more nesting birds in the coming years as a result of this work.

Cambridgeshire Guided Bus contractors will begin clearing the line of the busway in early January, in advance of the construction work.

I hope we will see flocks of birds heading to roost at the end of the afternoon walks.

As you may be aware from the local press and information sent by the Highways Agency the preferred route has been announced and disappointingly, for Hilton, this turned out to be the orange route.

The next stage in the procedure is that the Highways Agency is going to engage with local bodies such as the Parish Council and will, as we understand it, look to try and answer or put in place schemes that will resolve local issues in advance of any Public Enquiry.

We are aware that villages such as Brampton are unhappy with the proposed routing at their end of the new road. We will, in conjunction with the Parish Council, look at trying to obtain the best results for the village in terms of reducing the environmental impact of the scheme and ensure that 'Hiltons' voice is not lost if there are other issues looked at by the Highways Agency and its contractors.

We have had the report in from the noise consultant and met him this week to discuss what more we can do.It is apparent from his initial findings that the Highways Agency has not carried out what we would consider suitable or sufficient noise readings of what the present impact of the road is on the village so that these could be measured against what the actual impact is when the scheme is opened.

The Parish Council will be looking at the suggestions of the noise consultant further, especially his recommendations on the most effective amelioration options and the possibility of taking measurements of the existing noise levels to allow us to argue our case as effectively as possible in future, including seeking compensation if appropriate.

Another area that we will be addressing is the possible impact on traffic levels through the village, especially on the B1040, and the options to minimise increases of traffic and, if at all possible, reduce traffic levels especially of HGVs.

Snow Leopards
