The Parish Council is looking for a Parishioner to take on the role of Tree Warden. The role is not onerous, and entails an annual inspection of all parish owned trees. A Contractor is then employed to survey all the trees and undertake necessary maintenance if required. Anyone who has expertise in this field and would be interested in helping us, please contact the Clerk on 830839.

Litter in the village appears to be on the increase, in particular in Tythe Lane, (the footpath between Chapel Close and Graveley Way). Parents are asked to remind their children to use the litter bins provided or take their rubbish home. Thank you for your support.

Hilton residents are reminded that anyone over the age of 12 must hold an Environment Agency Licence to legally fish in the village.

A14 Action Group: Public Exhibitions of the design of the new A14 will be held at the Marriott Hotel in Huntingdon on Sunday 30th November, Monday 1st December and Tuesday 2nd December, followed by on Sunday 7th, Monday 8th and Tuesday 9th December at Girton College, Cambridge. These events will be bigger than any previous consultation/exhibitions and will include three large models of the scheme including one of the centre of Huntingdon and large scale plans of the whole length of the scheme. The Highways Agency has approved a junction at Wood Green which the Action Group believe this could have a negative effect on Hilton.

The Parish Council have been busy preparing the precept for the next financial year. The final amount must be formally authorised at the December Parish Council meeting for submitting to Huntingdon District Council in December.

The Parish Council send their gratitude to Graham Barradell and his team of helpers for a most successful and superb firework display, enjoyed by many.

Parish Council Report Fenstanton

Police report.

During the period 9th October to 11th November 2008 the following incidents had been reported to the Police:-

3 Anti social behaviour (car windows being broken).

1 Arson attack (shed destroyed at the allotments).

1 burglary.

1 attempted entry to garage.

2 thefts from a motor vehicles.

1 theft from a shed at the allotments.

1 reported but unspecified incident.

Two further incidents of arson were reported, which are of particular concern. Both incidents occurred on the 12th November. The first happened at approximately 7pm in an alley way between Headlands and Simmer Piece. Four wheelie bins and fencing were set alight. Fortunately a resident was able to stop the fire spreading prior to the attendance of the Fire Service. The second incident occurred at the rear of the shops in Rookery Place. Several T light candles were placed on and underneath two parked cars. Obviously the consequences of both actions could have been very serious and most certainly put lives at risk. It is imperative these irresponsible and mindless individuals are caught before lives are lost. The Parish Council urges all Parishioners to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour or information they may have to the Police. Telephone 0845 456 456 4, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

Reduced Stagecoach Bus Service.

The Chairman, Vice Chairman and a Councillor held a productive and constructive meeting with Mr. Campbell, Managing Director of Stagecoach Cambridgeshire. Whilst we must appreciate we will not see a return of the excellent bus service we have enjoyed in the past we are optimistic that improvements can and will be made, particularly during the peak rush hour periods. Because of operational scheduling it is inevitable a gap will exist during these periods. An element of flexibility exists whereby the gap can be moved thus improving the timings of the existing buses. The Parish Council and Stagecoach are working together to find a period that minimizes the effect on commuters.

Disagreement does exist on improving an evening service and the Parish Council will continue to press for one bus an hour to service the Village. It is hoped the County Council will support the Parish Council to this end. Support is also being given by our representatives on both the County Council and the District Council who are also holding meetings with Mr. Campbell. However we continue to urge those who use the buses to write to Mr. Campbell at 100 Cowley Road Cambridge CB4 0DN and express their opinions.

Cycle Rack - London Road Bus Stop.

As part of their Cycle friendly policy Hemingford Grey Parish Council are proposing to install a cycle rack at the bus stop on the eastern side of London Road, which falls into the Parish of Fenstanton. Cambridgeshire County Council Highways Division has no objections to the project but is unable to contribute financially and therefore a request has been made for financial assistance from this Parish. Fenstanton Parish Council has no objection but is aware that the greatest benefit will be gained from the residents of Hemingford Grey. Before the Parish Council makes a decision on this matter we would welcome any comments from parishioners who cycle and use this bus stop.

Guided Busway – further disruption.

Whilst the Over / Willingham Road has now reopened disruption can be expected from 17th November on Harrison Way. Initially work will start on the eastern carriageway and when this is completed work will start on the western carriageway . Work will not take place during peak periods. Outside these periods the lane will be closed and traffic flow will be controlled by lights. This will inevitably lead to queues and delays. Work is expected to continue until March 2009.

Dog fouling.

Although this remains a village wide problem an increase in owners allowing their dogs to foul on the open space in Hampton Close has been brought to the attention of the Parish Council. This is, of course, a health hazard to children, many of whom play on the open space and extremely unpleasant for parents. We, therefore, request all dog owners act in responsible manner and ensure they clean up after their pets.

Next Meeting.

The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on Thursday 8th January 2009 at 7:30pm at Fenstanton and Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. Members of the press and public are welcome.



Feature from Huntingdonshire District Council

ARE YOU STRUGGLING TO PAY YOUR BILLS?

If you are finding it increasingly difficult to make your money cover all the essential costs in the current economic climate there are several things that you can do to help you make ends meet.

BENEFITS Have you claimed all the Benefits that you may be entitled to?

If you pay rent and or Council Tax and have a low income (either wages, pensions or other state benefits) you may be able to get help by claiming Housing and Council Tax benefit. Currently there are approximately 8500 residents of the district receiving these benefits and this figure has increased by over 1000 cases in

the last three years. Please contact the Benefit Section at Huntingdonshire District Council on 01480 388308 or email: benefit@huntsdc.gov.uk for an application form. If you feel that you may need help with completing the form then a home visit can be arranged.

If you are employed you should check to see if you may be entitled to Working Tax Credit. If you have children you may also be able to claim Child Tax Credit. You should contact HM Revenues and Customs on 0845 300 3900.

Why not give the Department of Works and Pensions a ring on their Benefit Enquiry line 0800

882200 or visit their website @ www.dwp.gov.uk/contact to see if there are any other benefits you may be able to claim.

If you are of pensionable age (60 years old) you may be able to claim Pension Credit by phoning 0800 99 1234 or by visiting www.thepensionservice.gov.uk/p ensioncredit.

SAVING ENERGY HDC's

Environment Efficiency Team may also be able to help you save money on your heating and energy bills so why not give them a call on 01480 388277. There are a number of grants on offer depending upon your circumstances:

Insulation Schemes

There are various discounted offers and grants for loft and cavity wall insulation for homeowners and people living in privately rented accommodation. Please contact the Energy Saving Trust Advice Centre, Anglia (ESTACA) on 0800 512012.

HDC is also working with British Gas who is offering loft and cavity wall insulation at substantially discounted prices. To apply please telephone British Gas on 0845 971 7731, quoting reference: HUNT.

If you are in receipt of certain income or disability related benefits you may qualify for a 100% grant for the above schemes. However, if you are over 70 years of age and you own your own house or are in privately rented accommodation then you will automatically qualify for 100% funding for the ESTACA offer. Call Aran Services on 0800 5877795. Due to its popularity there is now a waiting list in place.

Warm Front Grant

Again, if you are in receipt of certain income or disability benefits, the Government's Warm Front Scheme offers up to £2,700 for energy efficient improvements including:

Loft and Cavity Wall Insulation, including draught proofing

Hot Water tank insulation

Central heating installation and repairs to existing systems

You can contact Warm Front directly on 0800 3162814. Sometimes there is an excess to pay if the cost exceeds the grant. If this is the case you may be eligible for a "top-up" grant of up to £800 through the District Council 01480 388388. Warm Front also offers a "benefit" check. If you are not

sure if you are entitled to a grant, then call the Benefit Entitlement Check Team on 0800 0729006.

Warmer Homes for Life Scheme

If you own your own house or live in privately rented accommodation and receive any of the following benefits, you will be eligible for free loft and cavity wall insulation through HDC's Warmer Homes for Life Scheme:

Child Tax Credit (with an income of less than £15,460)
Working Tax Credit (with an income of less than £15,460)
Attendance Allowance
Disability Allowance
Income Support
Housing and or Council Tax
Benefit
War Disablement Pension
Industrial Injuries Disablement
Benefit
Pension Credits

Along with this offer, all eligible households will also benefit from an assessment of their property to help identify where other improvements can be made and what other grants may be available. To request an application form ask to speak to the Environment Team on 01480 388388.

Department of Business Enterprise and Regulatory Reform (BERR)

BERR provides grants not only for householders but also for community organisations, schools etc. It encourages installation of: solar PV panels; wind turbines; small hydro; solar thermal hot pumps; ground source heat pumps; and bio energy systems.

The programme will end in April 2009 and two streams of grant

funding are available:

Smaller projects for home owners (0800 9150990) Larger projects for businesses, organisations and the public sector (0874 232313)

HDC & Climate Energy Solar Hot Water Scheme

The District Council is working in partnership with Climate energy to promote a new solar scheme. The scheme can provide £600 towards set up costs and potentially a further £400 grant through the Low Carbon Programme. This grant is available to all home owners regardless of income or benefits. For more information or to apply call 0800 0966356.

SUMMARY

We appreciate that many of you might not qualify for some of the above schemes especially if you do not receive a form of benefit already. However, if you feel that you need advice in the current economic climate then in conjunction with other agencies such as the Citizen Advice Bureaux, the District Council has produced a leaflet outlining all Agencies/Organisations within the District and how they can be of assistance to you. We are making arrangements to have copies of the leaflet held locally.



Fen Drayton Lakes

Waterfowl numbers have been steadily increasing through the autumn, and large numbers of several species are easily seen, particularly on Elney Lake. The number of coots is significantly higher than last winter, and we counted 1772 on 19 October. The highest figure from last winter's monthly counts came in January 2008, when we found 1228 coots.

Coots are widespread in the UK lowlands, but large numbers leave their breeding grounds in northern Europe and Russia to spend the winter months with us. As a large part of their diet is made up of aquatic plants, they must move away from areas that freeze over in winter. The number of coots at Fen Drayton Lakes represents about 1% of the national winter population.

Very few people would say the coot is their favourite bird. They are black, with a white bill and facial disk, and have greenish legs, so are not particularly colourful, but they do have character. They are generally sociable in winter, although the occasional squabble breaks out, but once the nesting season arrives, birds will set up territories and vigorously defend their patch from other coots.

Coots are popular with gadwalls, one of our dabbling ducks, especially when the lakes are deep. If the gadwalls cannot reach aquatic plants by up-ending in the water, they will follow coots, as these birds will dive for plants. Inevitably, some bits of the plants brought up by the coots break away, and the gadwalls grab an easy snack.

The winter starling roost has already been established, and can be enjoyed on still, dry afternoons in the last half hour before it gets dark. One of the favoured spots is Holywell Lake reed bed, where people can sit in the relative warmth and comfort of their car to watch the flock gather and swirl around for a while before settling in to the reeds.

Construction work for the guided bus way will close the Holywell Ferry Road crossing to vehicles, probably in the second half of January, for just a few days, although pedestrian access will remain.

Please remember to feed your garden birds throughout the winter, and make sure there is some fresh water for them to drink too. Give your birds a treat, perhaps with sunflower hearts, suet or dried fruit, and enjoy watching them while you enjoy a cuppa, perhaps in your favourite chair.

Sunflower hearts may seem expensive, but there is very little waste, and most birds enjoy them. Shredded suet and dried fruit are very popular with blackbirds, song thrushes and the most popular bird on your Christmas cards, the robin. If you don't want to encourage pigeons, choose seed mixes that do not have wheat, which is too hard for most of our garden birds. The RSPB team wishes you a happy Christmas and good health in 2009.

Hilton Action on Traffic Group (HAT)

The main news on traffic has been the closure of the 1040 between Church End and Papworth from the 3rd - 12th November for road surfacing and repairs and its effect on the village.

Residents in the Graveley Way area were adversely affected due to traffic being diverted in order to join the 1198 and onwards. The volume and speed was considerable - not helped by the lack of visible speed signs, also making lengthy waits for access from homes and several near misses. One person had a journey to Papworth lasting 45 minutes. Also, and seriously, a number of HGVs used Graveley Way illegally . Police were informed but were not able to take action.

Several HGVs and large vehicles failed to read the Road Closed signs, or chose to ignore them, arrived at the Church End turnneeding to turn with difficulty then severely churned up the triangle of grass. For example, one Italian fruit and vegetable HGV driver found himself in that predicament - maybe he did not understand the earlier signs! HAT has been assured by the team leader that it will be made good. It does all emphasise the continuing HGV problem and the need to guard the effect of the future A14 on the village as much as we are able.

On the plus side people living close to the 1040 enjoyed 10 days of the kind of peace villagers love and pedestrians likewise, we could even hear birds singing (but also the A14 traffic even more .)

Members of HAT and the A14 Action group will visit the public exhibition of the proposed A14 design to study the potential for Hilton .Please try to see this yourself ,it is a vital and possibly final chance to air our

views. There will be models and large scale plans of the scheme.

Abacus Scoreboard




