FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL -13th NOVEMBER

Police report: During the month of September the following crimes and incidents were reported: 6 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 1 incident of other theft; 1 incident of violence; 1 incident of vehicle crime; 1 bicycle theft.

Parishioners are urged to ensure that all doors are locked and windows are closed when properties are unoccupied and to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour to the Police telephone 101, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

HACTS: As many residents will know HACTS is a community transport service which operates within the district. HACTS provides a free door to door service to holders of a bus pass although a membership fee of £15 per year must be paid. The service is also open to non bus pass holders although a charge is levied.

Planning is currently being undertaken for 2015 which will see an increase in the number of excursions offered.

HACTS are also able to offer their vehicles to groups or organisations for private hire. For further information telephone 01480 411114.

Chapel Green kerbing: The General Purposes Committee considered quotations and options for kerbing Chapel Green to prevent further erosion by vehicles. Upon considering the quotations the meeting felt the most cost effective method is to kerb around the Green in one operation, subject to the Parish Council agreeing to the release of additional funding from the General Reserve to cover the additional cost above the budgeted amount for the works. The Parish Council has agreed to this request. The kerbing will be of the conservation type and, therefore, in keeping with the conservation area. A contractor to undertake the works has been duly appointed. All neighbouring residents and interested parties will be advised formally of the works and an expected start date once final arrangements have been clarified.

Additional benches for Parish: The General Purposes Committee agreed to the purchase of two new seats. An additional seat will placed on Chapel Green and the second seat is to be located at the Hampton Close open space. The provision of the additional seating forms part of the Parish Action plan.

Next Meeting: The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on Thursday **8**th **January** 2015 at 7:30pm at Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. Members of the public and press are welcome.

At the meeting, we were joined by PCSO's Phil Davis and Rachel Anderson who advised us that there continues to be a number of opportunist burglaries in the area. They urged residents to take sensible precautions by securing their property, ensuring windows and doors are locked and valuables are not left in full view and kept in a place which is not obvious. Their message was to be vigilant and also to be aware of cold sales calls at the door step. Make sure you do not invite people you have not previously made appointments with into your property. Neighbourhood Watch have a website worth visiting - www.ourwatch.org.uk. This is updated with regular reports and has the following advice regarding making your property secure. Your property should look secure, appear to be occupied with measures which can deter, delay or stop offenders such as: good fences with trellis fitted with locked gates; locked doors and windows, in good repair; security lighting; no keys in view (house or car); lights on timers (also 'fake TV' - you can Google this); where possible have a neighbour check your property if you are away; keep sheds locked; cover windows so that people cannot see in: consider shed alarms; secure larger garden equipment together with cable lock alarms; paint your post-code on large items to make them less desirable. A14: Members of the Parish Council and the A14 Working Group have now had the opportunity to meet representatives of the Highways Agency and its contractors. We were advised the Highways Agency is preparing to submit the new road scheme under a Development Consent Order (DCO) to the Planning Inspectorate (PI) this autumn 2014. So really anytime soon although no firm date offered. We were further advised that the fine tuning to the scheme including the Environmental Impact Report was still being refined and this will continue right up to the time the scheme is submitted. Once accepted by the PI we understand that the full detail will be made available on the PI website. At this time, and not before, various modelling plans, surveys on environmental issues and supporting documents will be available for inspection. It is further understood that once this goes live there will be a period advertised during which anyone can register as an interested party with the PI. This will be the only way you will be able to make any representation to the PI. The Parish Council will advise each household as soon as practicably possible after we know details of this period of registration and will hold an open meeting for us to all get together and discuss what might be the best way forward in your representations. We were advised that the Highways Agency will not be holding any further public consultations on the scheme but in due course, should the scheme be accepted and approved, there will be local meetings held to discuss the implications of construction and traffic movement. If you would like an email from the Parish Council advising of any developments in the process please email our Clerk, Jo Perez at hiltonparishclerk@gmail.com and you will be added to our distribution list.

Tree and Ditch Work: Approval was given for necessary tree work to be conducted around the village. The work will be started in the next few weeks.

Fenstanton at the time of the Black Death.



As far as I can ascertain there are no records of the Black Death that refer explicitly to Fenstanton. However the pestilence is mentioned in the county records of Huntingdonshire so I have used these records and the reports on the national situation to build a picture of what it may have been like in Fenstanton at the time. The Black Death arrived in England in March 1349 and it reached its peak in May, June and July and died out in the autumn.

It was not until the April that the outbreak took a serious grip in Huntingdonshire and thus Fenstanton. At that time Fenstanton would have been a typical fen-side village probably numbering some thirty families and a total population of about one hundred and fifty people. mostly dependent upon agriculture for their existence. The village was closely knit, introverted and by and large content with their world. What happened in St Ives or the surrounding villages would have had little if any relevance to their daily lives.

But it was a pattern of life that would have certainly contributed directly to the spread of disease. Perhaps the most relevant was the overcrowding. The stone church with its Saxon tower and Norman nave would have looked out of place amongst the mud and wattle cottages with roofs of reed and smoke escaping from every nook and cranny probably much like those houses found today in many of the less developed countries. In the houses of the poor, it would not have been unusual to find a dozen people sleeping on the floor of the same room. In most houses pigs and chickens and perhaps even ponies, cows and sheep would share the common residence. It would have been physically impossible to isolate the sick.

The dirt and poor sanitation of these hovels was less relevant to the spread of the plaque, but equally it is true that the plague found its work easier in bodies weakened by dysentery, diarrhoea, malaria and other diseases. The warmth and dirt provided the ideal environment for the rat. The spaces between the houses were mostly open drains, deep in mud and filth, residents emptied their bladders and bowels directly onto dung heaps outside their huts. The idea of cleaning houses and streets would not have occurred to them, the picture was a village squalid and insanitary.

During the course of the summer the pestilence carried off so many people that few of the survivors were willing or able to carry the dead to the church and throw them into a common pit. From this pit there was such a stench that scarcely anyone dared to walk beside the church. Based on national figures between a quarter and a half of the village population may have died. For unknown reasons the plague appeared to have been more deadly to the young, leaving the village populated by older people. Deaths from the plague were still occurring into 1350 and although the full ferocity of the epidemic lasted only three or four months, it was two years between its arrival and the final deaths.

Fenstanton was located on the main route from Colchester to Godmanchester and beyond, so the infection would have been as severe as in any other part in the country. Along the old Roman road would come every kind of hawker, charlatan, free labourer looking for a new home, quack doctors, friars, travelling shoemakers and the occasional minstrel. All bringing with them diseases including the plaque. There was a weekly village market on Thursdays, and a fair held annually on the vigil of the Apostles Peter and Paul and the six following days. The spreading of the plague throughout the village was unavoidable and inevitable.

Medieval agriculture was labour intensive and the effect of the deaths was devastating. So many labourers died that for a year or two large parts of the lord's lands were left uncultivated. In the year following the outbreak there were not enough workers to bring in the harvest except by paying double or treble the daily rate paid before the infection, consequently many of the crops that were grown were left to rot in the fields. Throughout all this drama the village rector, William de Longthorne (1347-1352), continued with his building of the church chancel with its large and magnificent east window. The builders would have been master masons imported for the job and the local men would have been employed in general labouring. How these masons and their families faired in the outbreak is impossible to say but an intriguing thought! Also, was rector Longthorne one of the final victims of the plague? We shall never know.





FENSTANTON FOOTPATHS

One of the best things about the parish footpath network is that it connects in several places to the Fen Drayton Lakes RSPB Nature Reserve. FP No 13* which runs alongside the River Great Ouse is one way of getting access to the Reserve and once you are there you will find RSPB information boards for further exploration. Another way is to follow FP No 5* from the parish church alongside Cranesbrook then across the fields towards Fen Drayton village. From there, access to the Reserve can be gained via the main road or Fen Drayton parish footpaths. If you want to make a circular walk of it, you can walk through the Reserve to the Guided Busway and walk back along the service road to Fen Lane (FP No 12*) or, for a longer circuit, walk right through to the river and follow FP No 13* upstream to FP No 9* which brings you back onto Fen Lane. For an even longer circuit keep going along the riverside to the Permissive Path along Hall Green Brook which will bring you back to Hall Green Lane.

Whichever way you go, Fen Drayton Lakes Nature Reserve is a hidden gem. If you haven't taken time to see the starlings roosting at sunset from the Reserve car park you've missed a fantastic sight – there may still be time. The lakes themselves are nearly always alive with water birds of many varieties and the habitats for land birds are now very well established attracting many different species.



Winston Churchill later wrote about such men as these. "Thus when all the trumpets sounded, every class and rank had something to give to the need of the State. Some gave their science and some their wealth, some gave their business energy and drive, and some their wonderful personal prowess. But none gave more, or gave more readily, than the common man or woman who had nothing but a precarious week's wages between them and poverty and owned little more than the slender equipment of a cottage and the garments in which they stood upright. Their love and pride of country, their loyalty to the symbols with which they were familiar, their keen sense of right and wrong as they saw it led them to outface and endure perils the like of which men had not known on earth."

We in Hilton have proudly acknowledged the Anniversary both publically and privately. Among others mentioned in previous Spectrums, Margaret Andrew has at last, movingly, been to the grave of her grandfather Thomas Haswell in Etaples. She also took a wooden cross to France on behalf of Hilton.

- Switch off fairy lights and unplug them before you go to bed or leave the house. Make sure they confirm to the British Standard and never overload plug sockets.
- Be careful when drinking alcohol while smoking or cooking.
- Finally, make sure you have a working smoke alarm which is correctly fitted and works. And NEVER take the batteries out to power presents!



Hedgehogs


