Thank you to everyone who has supported the Love-in-a-box this year. I wondered for a long time if we would be doing the appeal this year with the covid virus and lockdown. I was very excited when the letter arrived from the organisation saying yes, we would but with a different precautions. This year we were responsible for checking every box, removing any money and sellotaping the boxes securely, as when they arrived at the warehouse helpers only had to sort in gender and age groups.

This year Fenstanton managed 127 filled boxes and 2 bags of extras, when joined with Fendrayton a total of 160 was collected from Alison's home along with £591 towards travel. This year with the virus it was decided not to have volunteers to drive lorries through the countries due to quarantine rules but have a large container to freight it over to Moldova where people who work for the charity will collect and then deliver to the orphanages and hospitals. The children will be waiting with anticipation to see what they have in their box

I thank you all once again for helping me achieve the magnificent total of 160 for the organisation.



There's not been much to sing about this year, but during more "normal" times we start our meetings off with a rousing rendition of "Jerusalem". But why?

The poem written by William Blake was published in 1808 during another period of uncertainty – the Industrial Revolution when "England's green & pleasant land" was being destroyed by massive urbanisation. Blake disapproved of this because it led to the creation of over-crowded slums which were the breeding grounds for endemic diseases.

The words were subsequently set to music by Hubert Parry in 1916 and it was adopted by the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies to whom the copyright was assigned. When the NUWSS was wound up, the copyright was reassigned to the Women's Institute.

Fenstanton, When the River Great Ouse Flowed Backwards:

Something a little more modern this month although to an old boy like me it seems like only yesterday! The summer of 1976 was long and very hot with little in the way of rain. This followed a hot summer in 1975 together with a mild and dry winter. Outdoor water use restrictions including hosepipe bans were in force in large parts of the country, critical regional water shortages and failures of supply remained limited mainly to rural areas where in some cases emergency supply had to be supplied by trucks and in some extreme cases even by helicopters.

Among the reported environmental impacts of the drought and heat wave in 1976 were impacts on freshwater ecosystems, i.e. the temporary deterioration of surface water quality algal blooms, extreme water temperatures, depletion of dissolved oxygen to critical levels, massive proportions of sewage effluent, saline incursions, fish kill events, drying up of stream sections with effects on aquatic species and especially migratory fish

The considerable fall of groundwater levels had a particular impact on the low lying areas such as Fenstanton. Crops died in the parched fields and there was a national shortage of root crops, especially affected was the potato crop. Devastating wildfires were widespread in the summer of 1976, with up to 40 times the number of fires than in 1974. Fortunately for all the winter of 1976/77 was very wet and water supplies soon returned to normal.

Compared to the major urban areas of the country the people of Fenstanton village were not unduly affected by the water shortage. Unfortunately, most of the local farmers lost a significant part of their crops. Fenstanton then as now received its water supply from the water pumping station on the Low Road. Some of the surrounding counties were impacted to a greater degree. The then Drought Minister, Mr. Denis Howell, announced government approval for 'Operation Rodeo', a plan to reverse the flow of the River Great Ouse in St Ives. This move by the Anglian Water Authority was planned so as to avoid the need for water standpipes to be used in Northamptonshire and Bedfordshire. These counties received their water from the reservoir at Grafham Water.

During the long dry summer of 1976, these large diesel pumps were used to pump the water from the river Great Ouse back to the Grafham Water. The river flowed backwards for about a month.



This picture was taken below St Ives Lock Fenstanton. The mirror effect will never be seen again, because the water normally flows through at least one sluice gate and agitates the surface.

An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

Looking back

As we approach the end of the year, it's a good time to look back over the past months of a year unlike any we've had before.

2020 started with flooding. Water levels across the reserve were very high throughout January and into February, submerging many trails and joining the different lakes into more or less one single waterbody. All this water meant that we had high numbers of ducks, gulls and other water-birds. As the flooding went down and the land started to re-emerge, a spectacular flock of over 1500 black-tailed godwits descended onto the site, likely displaced from their usual feeding grounds still flooded further downstream. Many of these birds had been colourringed, allowing individuals to be identified with binoculars. One individual was at least 25 years old.

As we headed into spring and what would usually be a busy time as we prepared for the breeding season, we entered what was to be a year like no other. Over the next few months, Fen Drayton Lakes served as a perfect way for people to escape the confinement of their homes to enjoy a walk in the countryside for a little while. The car park was regularly full as visitors walked, cycled, bird watched, dog walked or simply sat and enjoyed the weather.

Sadly, we were unable to carry out any formal breeding bird surveys this year. However, from our own site visits and reports from the increased number of visitors, we can be somewhat confident that it was a good year for many species. At least one bittern was again present and could be heard 'booming' from the Holywell Lake area in March and April. After just a couple of sporadic sightings last year, there were

apparently three turtle doves on site, regularly heard purring from different locations in June and July. Although the tern rafts never made it into position, common terns nested on two of the Moore Lake islands with around 35 nests. There was a good number of black headed gull nests too, at around 200. Other species of note included at least 35 singing garden warblers across the reserve and lapwings nesting on Ferry Mere. Dragonflies also had a good year with two reserve firsts: lesser emperor and southern migrant hawker - both colonising species from mainland Europe that are making their way north through the UK.

Heading into autumn we were able to tentatively begin our annual habitat management jobs around the reserve. This is the vital work that ensures habitats remain suitable for the species we aim to attract. Despite the working restrictions, we made good progress and will continue with these jobs throughout the winter to prepare for what will hopefully be another good breeding year in 2021.



Local walks: A 9 mile Circular Walk or cycle ride using the new Bridleway in Fenstanton.


Leave Hilton on the Hilton Road, towards the Chicken Farm and the Strawberry Farm. Use the new cycle path to cross over the new A14 and continue straight past Pear Tree Close with Connington Road on your right. At the end of the road, a stone step enables riders to dismount from their horses. Just to the right is the "secret underpass" under the A1307 leading to Fenstanton -by the post office and the chip shop. Head to the mini roundabout and take Chequer Street.



At Ron's Farm Shop the road name changes to Honey Hill. Continue until you reach School Lane. At this junction, go along The Fen. Part way along, there is a sign indicating no motor vehicles can proceed, Fenstanton Parish Council and Cambridgeshire County Council have been instrumental in turning this path into a very pleasant bridle way on which it is very easy to cycle. Continue to the very



end noting the lake on your right which is part of the RSPB reserve. On meeting the Guided Bus Way turn left, crossing the River Ouse (picture 1) and follow the cycle path into St Ives. Use the pedestrian crossing to cross Harrison Way, (A1096) and enjoy a cake in St Ives!





Hemmingford Grey. There is a pavement on the right-hand side, but the cycle path on the left stops after a short distance. Continue on the Hemmingford Road and turn left onto Pound Road. As the road turns to the right, take Long Lane straight ahead (picture 3). The road turns into a track, (picture 4) passing Liquid Skillz, Lake Ashmore. Turn right following the marked footpath and this meets Gore



Tree Road. Turn left and just before the A1307, take the road on the right, up a

steep slope (picture 5) and over the A1307. Descend carefully as there can be a gate across the road. There is a path round the side of the gate. Turn right on a paved route towards Topfield Farm.

Pass Topfield Farm along Mere Way. A new gate allows bikes and horses through, whilst preventing vehicles from using the road (picture 5). Proceed over the A14 again, past a sign indicating the Bridle Path to The Offords. Further on, the track is signposted showing a left turn at the bend, (don't



go into Lattenbury Farm).- Walk along the track, through a copse and then turn left. Turn right at a small concrete bridge and follow the path to Graveley Way in Hilton. *Heather Chambers*

External Audit

Ford Signs

Cambridgeshire County Council have advised that the warning signs for cyclists should be installed in November. (Post-meeting note: These signs have now been installed.)

Budget

Hilton Parish Council have agreed their budget for the financial year 2021/22. A copy of the budget can be found on the Council's website.

Precept

Due to the financial pressure to parishioners caused by COVID-19, Hilton Parish Council have resolved not to increase their precept for the year 2021/22. The precept will remain the same at £30,600.

Christmas Lights

A parishioner has volunteered to source and install Christmas lights on the pavilion within the Council's budget of £200. The Parish Council have gratefully accepted this offer.

Bus Stop Library

The Council's insurers have confirmed that there is no issue with the Council installing a library cupboard in the village bus stop. London Luton Arrival Routes - NATS Consultation


A public consultation has been launched as part of a proposal to change the arrival routes into London Luton Airport. This proposal is jointly sponsored by London Luton Airport and NATS (Air Traffic Control).

Currently, Stansted and Luton airports share arrival holds and routes. It is unique for two major airports of this size to share arrival routes, and the two airports are now handling much more traffic than the airspace was designed for.

The 'AD6 arrivals change' proposal will separate the arrival flows for the two airports and establish a new hold for Luton traffic. Both Stansted and Luton currently suffer from knock-on delays where any delay at one airport, either in the air or on the ground, impacts the other and can cause further delay, noise, and emissions. Separating the routes will maintain a safe and predictable path into each airport and reduce these knock-on delays.

Despite the current crisis this airspace is some of the busiest and most congested in Europe, and the proposed change will ensure Luton airspace operates effectively and efficiently into the future. This consultation is an opportunity for residents to help shape that proposal.

As the proposed flight paths are to the south, there is likely to be little impact in Huntingdonshire. However, the plans also include a new holding pattern for the airport which is intended to be over the south-western corner of Huntingdonshire (broadly circling round the line of the A1 from St Neots to Alconbury). The intention is that aircraft in the holding zone will be flying at a height of over 8,000 feet and the consultation document sets out a position that this will not present a nuisance, either in terms of noise or pollution.



NATS stakeholder mapping indicates that Hilton may be affected by this proposal.

This consultation will run until 5th February 2021. The formal consultation website can be accessed at https://consultations.airspacechange.co.uk/london-luton-airport/ad6 luton_arrivals/

Further information can be found within the Virtual Exhibition, in which there are videos, banners, downloadable materials, and a postcode look up tool. Individuals can also sign up to live webinars through the virtual exhibition.

Cllr Peter Balicki of Hilton Parish Council will be attending a NATS consultation meeting and will provide a report to the December meeting of Hilton Parish Council to allow the Council to formulate their response to this consultation.

Rotary Club Santa

Hilton Parish Council have approved a request from the Rotary Club of St Ives for their Santa Sleigh to visit Hilton, lockdown permitting. The Council have thanked the Rotary Club for their hard work in formulating their COVID-secure plans.

Royal British Legion

Regretfully, the Chair of the Parish Council was unable to lay the customary wreath at the Remembrance Service this year, but the Parish Council have donated £60 to the Royal British Legion.

Policies

Hilton Parish Council have adopted a Training and Development Policy and a Lone Working Policy. Copies of the up to date policies can be found on the Parish Council website

Green Open Spaces

Hilton Parish Council have accepted the offer from the current Maintenance Contractor to extend his contract for one year. The Council have approved the principle of establishing a small copse of trees north of Wraggs Row at the entrance to the Wilderness. The Green Open Spaces Working Group have been looking into the repairs required to the village hall car park and hope to present quotes to the next meeting. The Council have agreed to purchase 10 lavender plants to rejuvenate the village garden.

Hilton Summer Ball

Hilton Parish Council have granted permission to the Hilton Ball Committee to hold the Hilton Summer Ball on the Green on 23rd July 2021.

Bonfire Service

Unfortunately, due to the lockdown regulations Hilton Parish Council have had to postpone their bonfire service to parishioners until such time as the regulations allow them to proceed.

Website Domain

The website domain transfer is now complete, and the domain is now owned by Hilton Parish Council.

Local Highways Initiatives

In 2020/21, Cambridgeshire County Council approved a feasibility study to remove the B1040 from the Advisory Freight Map. However, since then, Cambridgeshire County Council is reviewing whether they should keep the Advisory Freight Map, and so work on this project continues. The Parish Council has access to the money for the study but is waiting for the outcome of the decision on the Freight map.

The Parish Council has submitted a further application for Local Highways Bid money for 2021/22 to apply for a 24 hour ban on Heavy Good Vehicles on the B1040. The bid is initially assessed in February and if it passes the initial review it is submitted to the Highways and Transport Committee at Cambridgeshire County Council later in the year.

The road had become very slippery and cyclists were falling off their bikes when they cycled through the water. The Parish Council put some temporary signs up and we are advised that new, permanent signs are arriving and will be erected by CCC shortly.

With Lockdown continuing, our November meeting was again by zoom with 26 members joining in.

Our demonstrator, a long - time member and filming from her kitchen, was Noreen Plows who runs courses on floristry and creates displays for special events such as weddings or parties. Noreen created a beautiful oasis Christmas wreath to hang at the front door using a vast variety of foliage which she had picked from her garden or foraged from around her village whilst not buying anything at all. She showed us that any type of greenery can be used - fir cones, teazels, dried chilli or apple slices (in a very low oven!), even a pheasant feather, and gave us a strict reminder to keep spraying the oasis when the display is hanging. Noreen even had a wreath from last year that she had decorated with hydrangea heads and which had faded to soft greys and lilacs. After all, why waste such long lasting beauty? Noreen also decorated a metal wreath wrapped first in wet sphagnum moss for which she emphasised that it is illegal to forage so should be legally obtained. Similar wreath hoops can be made with clematis or grapevine strands.

Until our December meeting we will be keeping in touch with our usual activities by zoom. We are also keeping gloom at bay by supporting the United Services gift scheme, knitting sheep and lambs for the village visiting Nativity scene and beginning a weekly Tea Time chat.

Our December meeting will be a Christmas Party, no doubt by zoom once more, with the usual surprises. Resourcefulness is the new buzz word!

Weather Watch

When I wrote my last article in early August we were experiencing the warmest weather of summer 2020. The heatwave had started suddenly on 31st July

and continued up to 12th August growing increasingly hot and humid with night-time minima 16C (61F) or above. A thunderstorm on the 13th brought a drop in temperature of 11.6C (19F) from 32.8C (91F) on the 12th but the pattern of warm humid conditions continued up to the 15th despite gales on 21st/22nd courtesy of Storm Ellen which brought tropical air from a former hurricane. On the 25th Storm Francis brought gales and rain, heralding a cool conclusion to August with a further northerly gale on the 28th and 29th, an early reminder of autumn to come. August was a wet month with just over 75mm (3 inches) of rain bringing the total for June, July and August to 216mm (8.5 inches)

The first 3 weeks of September were generally fine with a spell of 14 days of almost unbroken sunshine and including a "Spanish plume" which brought a surge of hot air between the 13th and 15th. A change to autumnal conditions occurred on the 23rd, marking the end of summery days. The last week of the month was decidedly chilly when, during a northerly gale the temperature fell to 6C (42.8F). Overall September was drier than normal.

October was a wet, chilly and often dull month with frequent rain and almost half the days of the month virtually sunless. Whilst the days were cooler than normal, persistent cloud kept night-time temperatures from falling too far averaging around 8C (46.6F). As a consequence there were no frosts. Somewhat perversely the warmest day of the month was the 30th when 17.8C (64F) was recorded despite it being a cloudy day. Storm Aidan brought gales on the 31st, reinforced over the next 2 days by a storm containing the remnants of hurricane Zeta. Thereafter, high pressure brought calmer days and the first ground frost occurred on the 4th. As I finish this article, southerly winds are bringing mild conditions.

According to the Met. office, the UK as a totality experienced the wettest day since records began in 1846 for any month on 3rd October. The heaviest of the rain largely missed East Anglia although it was a wet day here as well.

During the course of this year, La Nina (which is the cold side of the El Nino - Southern Oscillation) has developed. So why am I mentioning this? Two reasons. Firstly it is believed to facilitate the formation of hurricanes and so far this season the USA have named 26, which equals the highest ever. Because they only use 21 letters of our alphabet (due to 5 letters generating too few names) they are using the Greek alphabet and have currently got to Eta. The second reason is that while it lasts, it produces a trend towards stormier and colder winters in the Northern Hemisphere, so looking ahead are we in for a colder than normal winter in 2020/2021?

A couple of things to conclude with: First whilst in the UK we consider 35C (95F) to be exceptional, on 16th August 2020, the temperature reached 54.4C (130F) at the aptly named Furnace Creek in Death Valley, California, USA, a new provisional record global surface temperature. The previous record also at the same location is noted as 56.7C on 10 July 1913 but the accuracy of this historical record has since been called into question. Second on a lighter note what about trying the following cocktails over Christmas:

White Snow: Galliano, passion fruit juice, light cream, white creme de cacao, ground cinnamon and star fruit Moonlight Cup: Apple juice, Calvados, sugar, ginger ale and a slice of lemon

Bay trees grow well in Hilton. Rulers, too, are shown on early coins with a circlet of leaves (not crowns) to show their importance, so it's not surprising that the Latin name for a bay tree is Laurel **nobilis**.


