The Royal Navy are coming to visit both Brownies and Guides in January and will be running a special evening for us.





Hello, how are you doing?

"It's beginning to look like Christmas" a Christmas song written by Meredith Wilson in 1951. A hit for Perry Como, The Fontane Sisters with Mitchell Ayres & his orchestra. But I remember best, the version sung by Bing Crosby, released in October 1951, titled "It's beginning to look **a lot** like Christmas...." And I remember it not because I was around in 1951, because I hadn't been born then, but because I rather liked Bing Crosby. I especially liked the Bob Hope and Bing Crosby films; do you remember the road films? "The Road to ..." ones were a favourite with co-star Dorothy Lamar. The humour, over-acting and comedic plots were good fun, viewed with a childhood innocence. A child knows what is funny and what isn't. It probably won't surprise you to know that I was, and still am, a great fan of Morecambe Wise and The Two Ronnies. Is it just nostalgia, or the simple comedy? I don't know.

Christmas and getting ready for Christmas, as a child growing up in the 1950's, brings its own nostalgic thoughts and memories. The smell of Christmas cake cooking, the fresh pine aroma filling the house with the scent of a real tree and mum moaning about clearing up all the dropping needles. The year we bought my nearly bald dad a comb and removed most of the teeth. My brother and I were in hysterics but my dad not so, when he opened it on Christmas morning.

What are your memories of getting ready for Christmas? What do you miss? What do you still do as a family tradition? The time for the church to get ready for Christmas is called Advent and this year Advent begins on Sunday 28th November. We are holding an Advent Carol Service (with choir) on that Sunday, at 5pm in the Parish Church here in Fenstanton. You are very welcome to join us.

Do have a look at the list of services in Spectrum and look out for the Christmas card, for more details. This year we are planning services where some will require pre-booking of seats so we can manage things well with anticipated larger numbers, bearing in mind the pandemic. The Christingle and Crib services may well be such services where pre-booking seats will help us. You can always take your chance in coming along, and if there is space on the day that's great, but it will really help us if you book beforehand. Fenstanton and a Victorian Christmas:

This essay first appeared in the Spectrum Christmas 2019

We have to be careful when talking about the Victorian period as this covered the 63 years that Queen Victoria reigned. The final years of her reign bore no resemblance to the early years. England and her people had changed from an agrarian society to one that had embraced the new industrial age. It would be true to say that people's idea of Christmas and their financial means to pay for it would have changed dramatically over those 63 years.



From the 17th century, the Puritan church disapproved of this pagan winter festival and so it fell out of favour. Christmas became of only minor interest. The big winter holiday was Twelfth Night, the Feast of Epiphany, on 6th January. It wasn't until the early 19th century that Christmas began to regain its popularity with the general public. It's hard to imagine now, but at the beginning of the 19th century Christmas was hardly celebrated. Many businesses did not even consider it a holiday. However by the end of the century it had become the biggest annual celebration and took on the form that we recognise today.



Whilst preparing this essay I researched to see what information there was available on a Victorian Christmas. Almost all the available material is middle class and based on Dicken's ideas of Christmas. What I wanted to write about was a working family's Christmas especially an agricultural worker's Christmas. Most of the things that we believe make up a 'traditional' English Christmas were actually invented or imported into England from other countries in the Victorian era. That includes Christmas

trees, Christmas cards, Christmas crackers, paper decorations and, of course, Father Christmas or Santa Claus with his white beard and red costume.

While Charles Dickens did not invent the Victorian Christmas, his book *A Christmas Carol* is credited with helping to popularise and spread the traditions of the festival. Its themes of family, charity, goodwill, peace and happiness encapsulate the spirit of the late Victorian Christmas and are very much a part of the Christmas we celebrate today. The problem is that, during Dickens's lifetime, most of these traditions were barely traditions at all. The 'traditional' British Christmas we know today is not found in the mists of history, but is entirely a product of industrialisation.

In a story written in 1837, Dickens ticked off the essentials; the day was about family, about mistletoe and holly, church-going and charity, also food, turkey, plum pudding and mince pies. Yet so many things we take for granted were not yet part of the holiday. He did not mention trees, carols, cards, stockings, crackers. There was no Father Christmas, nor were there presents, apart from those given to the servants, and tokens to the children.

We know that seasonal carols were sung as early as the 13th century, but carols had faded away with the Puritan rejection of Christmas. When they were revived, they were generally about feasting, not religion. Two of the few religious carols that postdate the Puritans were 'While Shepherds watched their Flocks' (1698) and 'Hark the Herald' (1782).

The mistletoe, holly and ivy were considered magical plants because of their winter berries. Mistletoe, with its pagan origin, was not allowed inside churches. The English custom of kissing under the mistletoe had the restriction that there could only be as many kisses as berries. Every time a couple kissed beneath the mistletoe, a berry was to be removed from the sprig. Holly was used as a decoration but also to decorate the Christmas pudding. The red "male" berry was meant to protect the household from witchcraft and could only be brought into the home by a male. The "female" ivy, with its leaves that remained green throughout the winter, was a symbol of immortality.

So it is now Christmas day in late Victorian Fenstanton. What do we see in the homes of the average farm servant or as they are more commonly known, the agricultural labourer? For those who had a faith, Christmas Day was celebrated with a special Mass in the parish church and heralded by the peal of Church bells. The traditional Christmas Church service consisted of carol-singing and scripture readings. Then home to whatever Christmas meal they could afford.

Even in the humblest farm labourer's household, Christmas dinner was a very special occasion, perhaps with a fowl of some sort, apple sauce and mashed potatoes followed by Christmas pudding. As few agricultural workers cottages had an oven, it was common for a poor family to carry their Christmas dinners to the baker's shops to be cooked. Dickens mentions this custom in one of his books. I know that my maternal grandparents did this in London on Sundays and on Christmas day, at the start of the 20th century.

For the very, very poor, local charities would provide a simple meal, there would be plum porridge, a beef broth thickened with bread and flavoured with dried fruit, wine and spices. A farm servant with a large family could barely feed themselves throughout the year and there would not have been an opportunity to save money for a Christmas feast. Unfortunately all our village Victorian ancestors died out many years ago and their children have also passed on. I have spoken with some of the grandchildren and asked for their grandparent's stories but there are very few memories to share.

One story gives us a flavour of a working man's Christmas meal at that time. "Our Dad, was born in 1908, he was the eighth of ten children born in a small farm in Fenstanton. He always said they had rabbit for Christmas dinner with vegetables and bread pudding. The bread pudding had holly on the top! They put their socks out Christmas night and enjoyed the nuts and apples and a sweet wrapped in paper in them in the morning, he remembered the girls having ribbon in their stockings. From what he said, Christmas Day lasted for three days with people visiting and being visited, I get the impression families were out in the street more. There were lots of games and sing songs with a fair amount of drinking for the menfolk. He seemed to enjoy Christmas although it was very different to what we enjoy today".

From other comments that I have received it would appear the above story was not at all unusual. One person said to me that all the time they were growing up and all the stories they were told, their parent's Christmas was never mentioned. It would indicate that Christmas did not rate very high with working people. My own mother (born 1915) said that their family never had any Christmas presents or special meals; they were just too poor to pay for them.

After Christmas dinner, most families would settle down around their fire hearth, enjoying together some fruit and chestnuts roasted on the fire. In more prosperous families, Christmas dinner usually ended with gift-giving and pulling of Christmas Crackers (an invention in 1847 by the Londoner Tom Smith). The day would be rounded off with music, carol-singing and parlour games such as Forfeits and Blind Man's Bluff. December 2021

During the Morning Service the subject of Remembrance continued with the reading of the poem 'The Last Inspection' by Sergeant Joshua Hetterbran and a beautiful tapestry which Ken Attwood had designed and created before the pandemic was at last on display.

A birding annual review

The closing of the year presents a good time to summarise the wildlife goings-on that have taken place over the past 12 months. Overall, it has been an exciting year; however varied water levels posed a challenge for some species to overcome.

Early winter flooding meant the reserve effectively became one giant lake. The ducks were having a great time with large numbers of wigeon, tufted duck, pintail, shoveler and goldeneye counted. Wading birds that like shallow water struggled to find higher ground, but the few areas that were suitable resulted in large counts of black-tailed godwits and lapwing, amongst others.

Fluctuating water levels are not good for species which nest close to the water, as proved to be the case when spring flooding in April resulted in many of the nesting islands for gulls, waders and terns being washed out. It was really fraught to watch the birds trying to build up their nests with twigs so that their eggs remained out of the water. Most couldn't do it in time, but a few managed to build up their nests over a foot higher. Once the water receded somewhat, these birds were sat proud on towering nests.

Our reedbeds are managed with the hope of scarce breeding birds using them. This year, a pair of bittern were observed to be likely breeding on site. Although we often hear a territorial male in the spring, this is the first time we recorded nesting evidence. Bearded tits are also likely to have nested on site for the first time after sightings of a family group with youngsters were reported. These are both good signs that the work we carry out in the reedbed is working and that it is in the right condition with habitat and food availability for our target birds.

Nightingales hadn't been heard on the reserve for a few years, but following habitat work that we have carried out over the past two winters, we were overjoyed to hear two males singing their wonderful lyrical song from deep within an area of scrub in the spring. A female was later seen with one of the males, suggesting breeding may have taken place.

Our other headline species is the turtle dove and surveys revealed up to five singing birds around the reserve. They went quiet after a while, but we confirmed breeding for at least one pair with a family group seen in August.

Following the breeding season, the reserve sees an annual build-up of mute swans which come here to moult their wing feathers. During this time, they are flightless and need large waterbodies to feel safe on. The counts achieved by our volunteers were huge with 233 counted in June.

Going into the winter months a murmuration began. Black silhouettes appeared en-masse in the sky before the setting sun. They wheel around and create wonderous shapes. These are made by starlings which fly into the reedbed to roost. We are lucky that most years they visit, but their presence is never guaranteed. A fitting finale to the year.







Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Monday 1st November 20/00164/OUT – Planning Permission for 16 houses on Church End, land west of Wychwood

This planning application was discussed again at the Huntingdonshire District Council Development Management Committee meeting on Monday 18th October and outline planning permission was granted. The Clerk will organise a meeting with County Councillor Doug Dew and Councillor Peter Balicki to discuss this application and advise on any actions that the Parish Council could take.

Green Open Spaces

Cllr Ian Stott advised the Council that the first draft of the Tree Register is now complete and that the Maintenance Contract has been advertised.

Dredging of Ponds

The Council has asked the Clerk to obtain quotes for dredging both the ponds in Graveley Way and the Park Farm Pond and also Reeve Ditch. There is a Community Flood Group grant scheme to which the Council has asked the Clerk to apply for funding.

Path between Church Lane and the Church

The Council discussed various options for resurfacing this path. The Clerk will obtain quotes for gravel, resin-bound gravel and self-binding gravel.

Hilton Wildlife and Conservation Group has generously offered the Parish Council a donation to replace this bench, which has been missing for several years. Hilton Parish Council have approved the design of a teak bench and authorised the Clerk to purchase it.

Volunteer Work in the Village

Upcoming volunteer work will include planting the trees in the Jubilee Copse, planting two memorial trees, the easier tree work from the inspection and an ivy cut. The Parish Council agreed the location of the two memorial trees.



Annual Tree Work

Following the annual tree inspection, the Council discussed the tree report and authorised the annual tree work, at a cost of £2800.

Water run-off pipe for Manor Farm

Hilton Parish Council has authorised the replacement of this water pipe, which will involve excavating a shallow trench across the Green. This will be done at the cost of the property owner and the turf will be lifted and then replaced to minimise the damage to the Green.

Stop the Arc Group

The Council discussed the correspondence from the Stop the Arc Group with regards to the proposed Oxford to Cambridge Arc project. They resolved to invite both the Stop the Arc Group and the organisers of the Ox-Cam Arc project to an open meeting to discuss the issue.

Jubilee Event including Beacon lighting

The Parish Council resolved that it would like to run an event on Thursday 2nd June to coincide with the National Beacon Lighting. It appointed a working group of ClIr S. Walker, ClIr K. Dunk, ClIr S. Suckling and ClIr R. Collard to look into and plan this event.

Feast Week

Hilton Parish Council granted permission to the Hilton Feast Week Committee to hold Feast Week from Sunday 24th July to Saturday 30th July 2022.

Summer Ball

Hilton Parish Council granted permission to the Hilton Summer Ball Committee to hold the Summer Ball on Friday 22nd July 2022.

Events on Parish Council Land

Hilton Parish Council reminded all community groups that they must seek the Parish Council's permission in writing to hold an event on the Green, which is owned by the Parish Council. Consideration should be given to the schedule of Parish Council meetings and sufficiently notice given to allow the Parish Council to discuss the request and decide upon permission.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 6th December 2021 in Hilton Village Hall. Agendas will be issued in advance on the village notice boards and the Council's website <u>www.hiltonparishcouncil.com</u>. Parishioners are welcome to speak at council meetings on agenda items.

Tulips from Amsterdam...?

Famously Holland grows, exhibits and exports many tulips but the countries of origin are much further east. Wild tulips are found in eastern Turkey, the Crimea and Central Asia. They like well-drained soil and sun which is why gardeners in the UK plant them with plenty of grit in the compost. Planted in pots in the darkening days of November we look forward to the eye-catching flowers opening in the spring. Come to Hilton's Community Garden and see them from April to May.

On the plate below there are two tulips, not in natural colours but in the characteristic blue and red of **Iznic** pottery from Turkey examples of which you can find in the Fitzwilliam Museum in Cambridge. What is striking about the tulips on the plate is the shape of the petals as they two come to a point. These 'dagger shape' tulips, some even more eccentric and elongated, are illustrated in books on tulips from the two centuries of Ottoman rule 15C-17C The Sultans of this era



prized tulip bulbs, employed collectors to find rare plants and devoted whole gardens to them. Artists from the town of Iznic in Anatolia also incorporated them into designs on the beautiful tiles from the can be seen in many Islamic palaces and places of worship.

The Fitzwilliam also has a notable collection of seventeenth century flower paintings from the Netherlands. The vases of flowers are painted with great attention to detail. Artists often chose a dark background to make the lustrous colours of the flowers stand out in contrast. In the painting below by Jan Bruegel the tulips are much more recognisable than their Turkish relatives having rounded petals and vertical stripes familiar to contemporary growers. The flowers gathered together in the vase would not all flower at the same time. The point is to display their beauty and rarity. For Dutch merchants in the 17C became so wealthy from trade they could indulge themselves in acquiring exotic possessions including plants. However, the butterfly searching for nectar and the wilted flowers beneath the vase are reminders of the transience of life, beauty, power and glory.

With hindsight we could also see these references to short flowering seasons and seasons of success as applicable to the commercial world, especially to the mad Tulipomania which gripped Holland in the early 17thC. It was almost the equivalent of the present day 'bit coin' fever. Prices fluctuated and fortunes were made and lost in dramatic fashion. When the average income was 150 florins a single bulb of the sought-after tulip called 'Semper Augustus' sold for 1,000 florins. The most prized specimen tulips had 'breaks' in the petals which appeared as mottled, striped or veined in different colours. How these marks were made was not understood at the time, but they gave the flower its significance, each line looking as if painted on by a fine brush. However, the bulbs did not come 'true' in successive generations. In gardens of the period fruit trees pruned in ornamental fashion were planted with flowers. It is now known that a virus introduced to tulips by a fruit-fly interrupted the full development of 'laid-on' colour (anthocyanin) leaving the underlying colour of white or yellow to show through. Vast sums of money were spent in the hope of achieving flowers with these exotic marks only to find they had reverted to a single colour. Thus, Tulipomania ended catastrophically for some buyers. Further sums of money were spent on lawsuits to recoup the losses!

Today we can choose from a wide variety of plants whether lily flowered, parrot flowered, dwarf or tall. The ones which flower reliably every year are the Darwin Hybrids. Others are not so keen to reappear. But short or long-lived they are a feast for the eye in art and in life.
