

Police report.

During the period 12th November 2008 to 5th January 2009 the following incidents had been reported to the Police :- 4 criminal damage; 4 arson attacks; 2 obtaining petrol without paying; 5 burglary; 1 breaking and entry; 2 thefts from motor vehicles; 1 theft of fuel. 1 breaking into vehicle.

Village Bus Services.

Following representations from Parish representatives Stagecoach commenced evening services to Cambridge and Huntingdon from 4th January. The service to Cambridge departs at 2045 and arrives Cambridge at 2114. This service originates from Huntingdon (2000) and operates via St Ives. The new departures from Cambridge are as follows: 2005 and 2205 arriving Fenstanton at 2031 and 2231 respectively. Both services operate onward to Huntingdon via St Ives. Whilst this is an improvement we must not be complacent as the attitude from Stagecoach is one of 'use it or lose it'.

Mr. Lee (Managing Director of Whippet Coaches) attended the meeting and outlined his Company's perception of the future levels of service. The Parish Council was reassured by his comments.

Provision of a litter bin at the east bound Clock Tower bus stop.

It was agreed to request the District Council to install a litter bin at this location. If the District Council is unable to assist the bin will be installed by the Parish.

Power cuts.

A long power cut after Christmas brought considerable inconvenience to some parts of the Village. If you experience a power cut it is important that you contact EDF Energy as soon as possible. Flickering supplies, dim lights and low voltage must also be reported as might constitute a fire hazard. The advice from EDF is do not rely on someone else to do it. Telephone 0800 7 838 838

Dear Editor,

Al-Anon Family Groups is raising awareness of its existence as part of a national campaign starting on January 26, 2009 and it is with this in mind that I am asking if you may include mention of the Groups in your February publication.

When someone in the family has a problem with alcohol, it's not just the drinker who suffers. Anyone in a close relationship with an alcoholic can be adversely affected by the drinker's behaviour, to the point where their own health and well-being deteriorates.

Al-Anon Family Groups offers support to those affected by someone else's drinking.Our organisation is national and international and there are groups meeting weekly across Cambridgeshire (see locations below) offering family and friends of alcoholics somewhere to find comfort, understanding and encouragement. Anyone is welcome to attend if they have been, or still are, affected by someone else's drinking.

Al-Anon Family Groups is a fully self-supporting, registered charity and there are no membership fees. The fellowship is not allied with any sect, denomination, political entity, organisation or institution and has but one purpose: to help families of alcoholics.

Local meetings take place at: Cambridge, Ely, Wisbech, and Peterborough. Full details about the location and times of the above meetings and more information about Al-Anon Family Groups can be found at www.al-anonuk.org.uk and by calling the General Service Office on 020 7403 0888.

Hilton Action on Traffic Group (HAT)

On a freezing Monday morning in December, HAT met with Councillor Ian Bates, Matt Bradney (County Council Cabinet Member for Growth and Infrastructure) and a Highways Engineer. We walked along Potton Road and Graveley Way witnessing the high volume of cars and large trucks rushing through the village. As usual, many drivers were clearly speeding.

Matt listened and appeared receptive to what we were telling him about the scale and impact of Hilton's through traffic problems. Afterwards, Matt acknowledged the serious issues Hilton has with HGVs and speeding. He informed us that he has asked his officers to look for a county wide solution.

Highways has also agreed to ask the police to better enforce the existing night time lorry ban, to try and help with those broken nights of sleep.

However, there do not appear to be any road engineering solutions forthcoming in the foreseeable future. HAT will shortly be meeting again with our Councillor to press for action and support.

Neighbourhood SpeedWatch -

Speedwatch is a new Police initiative, adopted by St Ives Neighbourhood Police Panel and supported by County Council Highways. It was trialled last year in the Ely area.

The objective is to identify speeding drivers for follow up by the Police. At the same time, this will help highlight locations and times of day to prioritise for future Police Enforcement.

A team of trained volunteer observers, drawn from the different communities in this area, is deployed on a rota basis just a few hours each month with roadside speed detector units at speeding hot spots around the St Ives area.

SpeedWatch is not a replacement for law enforcement activity- that remains the responsibility of the Police.

HAT is considering whether to recommend to the Parish Council that Hilton should participate.

It would be very useful to hear what residents think about this and whether they might wish to volunteer as observers.

BOOK EARLY TO AVOID DISAPOINTMENT AS PLACES ARE LIMITED

Fen Drayton Lakes

The cold weather had quite an impact on the wildlife at Fen Drayton Lakes. Some lakes froze over completely, while others only had open water near the centre. This had serious implications for herons, little egrets, kingfishers and several of the duck species.

The diving ducks apparently had no problem finding food, but the dabbling ducks feed on plants growing in shallow water – just the areas that were frozen over. Some were smart enough to join the swans and coots in the open water areas, as those two species pull aquatic plants up to the surface, where the dabbling duck could steal some.

The herons and little egrets, which wade in shallow water in search of fish, were forced to use the brooks, as enough water was running in them to stop ice forming. There are paths beside the brooks, which is unfortunate for these wary birds, as they were frequently disturbed as they patiently waited for fish to swim into reach.

Kingfishers usually perch on a branch or reed stem at the water's edge, watching for fish to swim below them, so they also found their favourite spots were covered with ice. Such long spells of frozen water forced kingfishers to follow river systems in search of suitable areas, and many of them end up at the coast, where they find fish in rock pools and estuarine channels.

The winter starling roost disintegrated during the cold weather – frozen ground prevented these speckled birds from finding bugs in the soil, so most starlings moved further south and west, in search of warmer conditions. Holywell Lake car park is still worth a visit in the last hour of daylight, to watch wood pigeons, jackdaws and rooks congregating in their roosts, and to watch gulls streaming overhead to their roosts further away. While the lakes were frozen, bitterns were forced to feed in the same way as the herons, but they were easier to see,



especially at their evening roost site in Holywell Lake. Normally, bitterns roost within the reeds, where they are out of sight, but when the water within the reeds was frozen, they chose to roost at the top of some young willows poking up through the reeds. We

think they did this too avoid being found by mammal predators, such as foxes, that could walk on the ice through the reeds.

You have probably heard that the Guided Bus will now not be operating until sometime in the summer, later than previously announced. Contractors started laying the guide-way track on the section between the lakes in January, and we have been told that Holywell Ferry Road may now only be closed for one day, and not a week as previously advised. The one-day closure is likely to be at the end of January. There is access to the car park throughout the construction period (other than the oneday closure) – motorists have a minor diversion to follow.

Please remember to feed your garden birds throughout the winter, and make sure there is some fresh water for them to drink too. Give your birds a treat, perhaps with sunflower hearts, suet or dried fruit, and enjoy watching them while you enjoy a cuppa, perhaps in your favourite chair. **Wetland Walkabouts**

Hilton 14 Action Group

The Action Group held an open meeting on 10th December to gauge residents' responses to the recent Highways Agency exhibitions and for the A14AG to refresh its action mandate from the village. This was well attended – especially given it was a bleak December night. Residents remained concerned:

- That the proposed A14 improvements might not reduce rat running or HGVs through the village and that additional measures were needed to address this.
- That the proposed earth bund for visual screening may not be adequate and should be raised and combined with more tree planting.
- That the noise generated by the new road would greatly affect quality of life in Hilton and more innovative screening, such as many of us had seen on the continent, should be installed.
- That the proposed borrow pits were very large and might be used beyond the A14 construction phase.
- That residents were still nervous about the impact of the road proposals on local drainage.

The next phase will be the issuing of Draft Orders, which are expected in March. At that stage, depending on whether local concerns have been allayed, the Action Group and Parish Council will have six weeks to submit final objections, which could then be considered, along with other objections, at any Public Inquiry.

Finally the Action Group called for additional residents to join the Committee for this next, potentially demanding stage. Three residents came forward and offered their assistance. For further information please contact Lissie Wright 830577.

Slugs and Snails

Slugs and Snails will be the focus of the next meeting of the Wildlife Trust, Huntingdon Area Group, on Wednesday 11th February 2009 at 7.30pm at Brampton Memorial Hall, Thrapston Road, Brampton.

Tonight, Brian Eversham, who is the Conservation Director of the Wildlife Trust, will give our presentation. Brian will discuss the ecology and behaviour of molluscs in a wide range of habitats; why they are of interest to conservations and why they should be protected. He will also touch on molluscs and gardening!

Brian has studied slugs and snails since the 1970s, and has bred all but three species of British slugs. He tells us that they are not all as easy to rear as gardeners might imagine. Apparently some species can live for 7 years or more, can grow to over a foot long and become heavier than the smallest British mammals!
