Fenstanton after the Romans left:



Roman rule in England began to collapse towards the end of the 4th century. Anglo-Saxon warriors from northern Europe were hired from the end of the 3rd century by the Roman military, as mercenaries to help man the Roman forts dotted around the eastern and southern coasts of England. Hiring barbarian mercenaries was a common Roman imperial practice, as was paying them with land grants. These coastal Roman forts were constructed to provide some protection against attacks by sea-going marauders. It was these raiders that are believed to have been responsible for the sacking of Godmanchester

during this period. If this is correct then their ships would have passed Fenstanton on their way upstream. It is more than likely that they would have paid a very sudden and unpleasant visit to our village! In reality the Romans never really left us. Many retired legionaries had been awarded land in Britain as part of their pension; many of them would have married local Celtic women and been assimilated into the local population. In the majority of cases the occupying troops weren't originally Roman citizens or even from Rome itself, but auxiliaries recruited from all over the Roman world. With three permanent Roman military forts so close to Fenstanton, there can be little doubt that there would have been some of these 'Roman pensioners' living within what later became the parish of Fenstanton.

The official withdrawal of Roman protection did not mean that Fenstanton immediately succumbed to the invaders, nor did the local economy collapse totally. Life in Post-Roman Britain couldn't have been easy and carefree, but for a while the Romano-British way of life survived, and the Fenstanton village folk would have survived with it.

It has to be appreciated that the British tribal leaders had become Romanised, liking and appreciating the Roman way of life, the villas and baths etc. So in terms of the way people lived, nothing much would have changed. As well as this, many tribal leaders were used by the Romans to administrate and provide law in their local areas, so again this government would have continued as it had before, but on a regional basis rather than centralised. It has been written by some historians that the majority of Britons hadn't even realised that the Romans had left until they were invaded by the Anglo Saxons.

As discussed in a previous paper, the local economy was probably driven by grain production, of which a large proportion was sold to the Roman military and exported to Gaul. With the departure of the Roman army this outlet was no longer available to the local farmers. Home-grown farming products would have been for local consumption only with very little being required by nearby towns and villages. Consequently much of the rich agricultural land that had been developed by the Roman agricultural system over the past four hundred years was allowed to revert back to woodland and forest. This decline in the economy would have impoverished the two (assumed) Fenstanton Romano-British villa complexes and it was probably at this time that they were abandoned as uneconomical to run.

The thriving Romano-British economy would have allowed various non-farming activities to grow and skilled artisans to develop. Skills such as carpentry, stone masonry, leather production, scribes, mosaic makers, etc would all have been needed when the going was good. Most probably these artisans would have been living in the 'Vicus' (a civilian town outside a military fort) at Godmanchester and Cambridge, although some would have made their homes in local villages such as Fenstanton.

With the collapse of local farming and the national economy these artisans would have found it hard if not impossible to make a living, so there would have been a mass exodus to the larger cities where they believed work could be available. Ultimately I suspect that many of these people would have left the country following the Imperial army and administrators all the way back to Rome. In doing so the skills of working in stone and tiles were lost to the English, until reintroduced during the Norman period, hundreds of years later. The east of England was settled by the Germanic tribe of Angles as opposed to the Saxons. What is now known as Huntingdonshire was incorporated into the territory of the Middle Angles, which in turn became absorbed by the Mercians before the middle of the 7th century. The Angles settled on the coastal silt lands around the Wash but did not successfully penetrate the Great Fen immediately, Therefore the people of Fenstanton were not completely separated from their post-Roman, Romano-British neighbours inland, until other Angle settlers had spread southwards from the Humber through the land bordering the Great Fen on their western side. With the easy access from the Wash via the river Great Ouse, it is likely that Fenstanton was one of these invaders earliest settlements.

By the end of the fifth century, Fenstanton had become completely under the control of these Germanic people, and the few Fenstanton Celtic Britons who did not choose to immigrate to Brittany in France or to take refuge in the mountains of Wales and Cornwall had to settle into their lives under Germanic rulers. We can be reasonably certain that Celtic life as it had been known for thousands of years ceased around this time.

When the Romans left Fenstanton and the Angles arrived, a new era began in Fenland life. However Fenstanton, like other towns and villages, was a place of ruin, the ruins of the buildings the Romans left when they abandoned Britain. The incoming Anglo Saxons never liked the old Roman buildings, fearing ghosts and so they made their own homes well away from their ruins. However it appears from archaeological finds, that the Angles were quite happy to use the old villa complexes to stable their animals. Beautiful mosaic rooms would have been used as cow and pig sheds.

The Angles built their wooden hut homes, first destroying existing buildings or allowing them to decay. They absorbed or destroyed the original Celtic Britons' way of life and gave the area much of the character and, form of speech that it retained until just a few years ago. Historians say that there is practically no trace of the early British ancestry among the old Fenland families, they are most distinctively Anglo-Saxon. It was here in Anglian territory, later on, that the English language took its present shape.

FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL - 9th January 2014

Police report:

During the months of October and November, the latest months for which official information is available, the following crimes and incidents were reported:

8 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 2 incidents of vehicle crime; 2 incidents of criminal damage; 5 incidents of burglary; 1 incident of violence.

The meeting expressed concern at the increase in the number of burglaries within the Village and also in the surrounding area. Parishioners are reminded to ensure that when properties are unattended all doors are locked and windows closed, including garages and out buildings.

The Parish Council urges Parishioners to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour to the Police. Telephone 101, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

Wiser Re-cycling scheme:

A representative of Wiser Recycling attended the meeting and appraised Members of the benefits of the Parish Council partaking in the recycling scheme.

Wiser operate a kerbside collection of all unwanted electrical items including refrigerators and freezers for recycling. The Parish Council receives a sum of £40 per ton collected. Several Parish Councils locally work with Wiser and have found it profitable in these times of austerity in providing additional income which can benefit the Parish. The meeting resolved to accept the offer made. Wiser will publicise the dates when collections will take place, which are expected to be twice yearly, with posters and within Spectrum. (see p 27)

Precept:

The Parish Council resolved to accept the Finance & Constitution Committee's recommendation to increase the precept by 5.5%. The recommendation was not made lightly and only after completely reviewing the draft budget and reducing expenditure in certain areas. It has been necessary to increase the precept by this amount following the District Council's decision not to pass on a grant to Parish and Town Councils from Central Government.

The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on **Thursday 13th February 2014 at 7:30pm** at Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton.




DISCOVER YOUR FAMILY HISTORY






The 2013 rainfall record for Hilton

Following the note in the February issue of *Spectrum* last year on the rainfall figures for 37 years in Hilton, the recorded rainfall total for 2013 was 608.7mms. This figure is in excess of the average rainfall total for the past years which is 550mms per annum, but is not unduly high, as the graph below shows. While the monthly rainfall for June was low, the amount recorded in July was very high, but this was due mainly to exceptional rainfall on 23rd July (as indicated in a short note in the September issue of *Spectrum*).

Readers may be interested to hear that this daily reading was mentioned in the annual letter to rainfall recorders from the Environment Agency. Referring to the thunderstorms and intense rain of July 23rd it notes:

"Some downpours were particularly intense, with the highest recorded daily total made by the rainfall observer in Hilton of 73mms, the equivalent of 6 weeks of rain falling within one day."

So Hilton really did top all other Met Office and Environment Agency recording sites in the Anglian region on that day!


