Hale Road Allotments in Swavesey

Our 60-plot site lies about 300 metres east of the windmill in Hale Road which leads down to the Fen Drayton Nature Reserve. We have plot holders from Knapwell to Earith, with several from Willingham, Over and Fen Drayton but none from Fenstanton and we would be pleased to improve the balance. Our site has nearly everything such as a large, hard car park, rabbit/deer fencing all the way round the perimeter, 8 large water tanks so nobody walks more than 30 metres to water, an £11,000 waterless toilet (with solar-powered lighting inside) and plenty of AmeyCespa compost (soil improver) plus cattle manure and horse manure regularly hauled in for plot holders to use. We are now considering some nice-to-have improvements, hopefully starting with installing a barn owl nest box later in 2019.

All 60 plots were taken at the start of 2019, but typically 5 or 6 will be available in autumn, same as on any allotment site, so we would welcome some Fenstanton residents to join our waiting list for this autumn. There are plenty of experienced growers on site who are pleased to guide those unsure about their crop production knowledge and skills.

Our plots have dimensions of 22m X 5.7m (24yds X 6¼yds) which is half the size recommended by The National Allotment Society. All plot holders are relieved that we reduced the size and agree this is big enough to grow plenty of fresh food while not being so big that digging in autumn and weed control throughout the season become difficult tasks. Having an allotment plot means very fresh vegetables and fruit harvested when needed and tasting better than produce from the supermarket. It also allows us to keep active in the fresh air and physically fit without having to wear Lycra. A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon: unearthing a rich past and building a bright future

One of the largest archaeological projects ever to take place in UK

Scheme has been uncovering archaeological remains of an entire landscape across 350 hectares of the Cambridgeshire countryside

Six thousand years of occupation uncovered ranging from Neolithic, Bronze and Iron Ages to Roman, Anglo-Saxon and medieval

Finds include an Anglo-Saxon tribal boundary and a Roman trade distribution centre

Artefacts of note include: Roman Medusa jet pendant, Anglo Saxon bone flute and Iron Age timber ladder

The biggest road project currently in construction in the UK is giving people living in Cambridgeshire a new glimpse into their area's rich past.

Some 250 archaeologists, led by archaeology experts MOLA Headland Infrastructure, have uncovered historic and prehistoric site by digging more than 40 separate excavation areas along Highways England's £1.5bn scheme to upgrade the A14 between Cambridge to Huntingdon.

The finds mean experts now have a much better understanding about how the landscape was used over 6,000 years and about the origins of the villages and towns along the A14 in Cambridgeshire today.

Christmas cribs come to Hilton

At the end of November, there seemed to be general agreement from visitors both local and from further afield that displaying cribs from across the world was the perfect way to start advent and a highlight of Christmas 2018.

If you were amongst the 280 people who called in to Hilton Methodist Church that last weekend in November, we'd like to thank you for coming and sharing with us your views of the cribs and telling us your favourite. Overall, it was the crib from rolled up paper from Vietnam which most often caught the attention of our guests. The cheeky little moustaches and slick presentation focussed our eyes on baby Jesus whilst also making us smile. The cribs in tin were very popular and the American Indians with the baby in a papoose as well as the llamas in the Peruvian cribs were much commented upon.

Everybody liked the poem "There's a baby in my dinner and it's just not fair!" and people are still talking about it weeks later. Most younger visitors were taken with the French idea of finding a bean (a "fève") in your slice of Epiphany cake (called a "galette") which makes you king or queen for the day. The thought of having authority over the rest of the family for a day seemed to appeal to children. I can't think why!

Our guests were fascinated to find out who owned all the 116 cribs which were on display. Starting in 2010, Majorie and John Carrier have been collecting cribs now for 8 years. We are most grateful that they were willing to loan us their collection of cribs. We also thank their daughter Heather Chambers who was able to help us lay out the displays.

A special thank you, too, to all who donated money to the charities to which we sent our donations: the "Little Princess Trust" and World Bicycle Relief, each received about £186.



Tree News from Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School

The school is so lucky to have such an amazing outdoor space. We are always seeking new opportunities to improve it for the children now and in the future. In February 2018 we developed our orchard by planting apple, plum and gage trees supplied by 'Orchards for Schools'. Our aim was to assist conservation and create our own heritage fruit orchard by planting local varieties of fruit trees. Orchards for Schools is a Heritage Lottery Funded project delivered by the East of England Apples and Orchards Project, a registered charity.



All the new saplings established themselves and produced a fabulous show of blossom in spring and fruit in the summer.

Following the success of this initiative in October 2018 the school applied to The Woodland Trust for a schools' tree pack. We are delighted that our application was successful and are now waiting to hear when the delivery of the 105 medium wildlife saplings will be, but we are expecting it to be in March to coincide with the tree planting season.

Teaching outdoors helps encourage

curiosity and stimulates all the senses in a way that indoor learning simply cannot do. Therefore, it is hoped that our new trees will enhance our science curriculum. Just one oak tree supports a thousand other species so imagine how much difference we'll make planting all these new trees! It will also establish a food source for woodland wildlife and create a living legacy for future generations. If you have green fingers and can offer your time, we would value the school community collaborating with us on this project.

Fenstanton History By John Deeks

Fenstanton and its not so honest villagers:

I thought that you may enjoy reading about the antics of Fenstanton villagers from the past. Some of the sentences handed out would appear extreme by today's

John Tilly, labourer, late of Fenstanton, for spoiling the amenities of Church Lane, Fenstanton by keeping 20 hogs, 20 swine and 20 pigs in two hog sties on the common way and by setting up a slaughter house to the discomfort of neighbouring householders. 1813

William Herbert, Esq., a maltster of Huntingdon was fined £200 (mitigated to £50) for wetting or sprinkling malt with water on the floor in his Malthouse at Fenstanton, previous to its being 12 days on the floor contrary to the Act. 1805

George Schreaton of Fenstanton, labourer, for theft of one wooden box, two gowns, two shifts, three pairs of stockings, three petticoats, four caps, six handkerchiefs, two aprons, and two pieces of linen cloth belonging to Jane Barker. 1806

Examinations of Jane Barker, Samuel Young (ostler at the George Inn at Fenstanton) and Thomas Matthews regarding theft of a box of clothing from Jane Barker at the Swan Inn, Fenstanton by George Screeton. 1806

John Randall Jun., Labourer, of Fenstanton for stealing wheat and his father Samuel for receiving it, received a similar sentence. The Randalls were also convicted of stealing a quantity of beans and peas in the straw, value 6d. 1784

William Ashbolt of Fenstanton, labourer, for swearing 10 or more profane oaths. 1796

one store hog, said he bought them for £6/10/-, 1824

Samuel Cranford of Glasgow, Cotton Spinner, convicted under the 1824 Act (Rogues and Vagabonds) on the oaths of Sarah right and Sarah Stocker of Swavesey spinsters, for playing and betting in the public highway (Fenstanton) at a game or pretended game of chance with three thimbles and a ball. Hard labour for three calendar months. 1825

William Brown, Cambridge, Cooper, trespassing for game on the land of the Revd. Lancelot Brown, Fenstanton, fined £1.14.6. plus 16/6 costs. 1833

John Tibbett (labourer), 81; Stealing at Fenstanton from Ruth the wife of Samuel Jones, 7 sovereigns, 10 half sovereigns, 20 shillings and 20 sixpences. 3 months imprisonment. 1837

Charles Sewell 20, labourer; Stealing an iron shovel from William Theed, Esq., Fenstanton. 1 year's hard labour. 1849

Thomas Mason 24, labourer; Killing a lamb, intending to steal part thereof, belonging to Samuel Whitehead, farmer, of Knapwell, Cambs at Fenstanton. 18 months' hard labour 1849

William Buddle, 37, carpenter; Stealing 4 books, property of Joseph Withern, Fenstanton, proprietor of the Chequers public house. 3 weeks' hard labour 1854

William Long, keeper of the Turnpike Gate at Fenstanton for taking from James Nicholls, driver of the stage coach running from Cambridge to Huntington (owner George Giddings, St. Clement, Cambridge) more than he was entitled to demand (4 convictions for November 19, 20, 21, 23. A 40/-. fine for each offence). 1818

Sarah Ashbolt, Fenstanton spinster, stealing one pair sheets (10d) from the workhouse. Pleaded guilty 1820

James Rolls and William Stephens, Fenstanton, labourers, stealing 2 ducks (worth 2/-) from Thomas Brown, Clerk. Pleaded guilty. 1821.

That Joseph Mole and John Blackwell, Fenstanton, labourers, had assaulted William Allen a Fenstanton Constable 1822

Ann Moles (aged 11) Fenstanton accused William Rolls, son of Charles Rolls, of assault and attempted rape. 1823

Complaint by Charlotte Tebbutt of Fenstanton against her husband Thomas Tebbutt, stating that they have been married upwards of two years and in this time she has been treated cruelly and was knocked down by her husband with great violence. She now fears for her safety. 1823

Mary Randal (aged 13) accusing William Tilly of Fenstanton, labourer, of indecency. 1823

David Lawson, Fenstanton, charged with the theft from Thomas and John Woolfinden of two feeding hogs and Moses Norman, 23, Waterman (Instruction unable to read nor write); Stealing, at Fenstanton, 5 st. 8 lbs. weight of rope from Potto Brown, Miller, Houghton. 4 months' hard labour 1854

Bastardy: Lydia Lenton of Fenstanton, John White of Hilton is the father of her illegitimate child 1823

Bastardy order securing the appearance of Goodes Woodward at the next Quarter Sessions charged with fathering the illegitimate child of Anne Worley, single woman of Fenstanton. 1814

Bond of John Kennedy of Conington, Cambs, gardener, and Robert Day of Conington, husbandman, indemnifying the parish of Fenstanton from all cost concerning the birth and maintenance of the bastard child of Sarah Moule of Fenstanton, of which John Kennedy is the father. 1787

Bastardy affiliation certificate: John Munns Jnr of Fenstanton, alleged father of the child of Mary Kirby of Fenstanton. 1818

Bastardy: George James, butcher of Fenstanton, alleged father of the child of Elizabeth Baxter, St. Ives. 1819

Bastardy: William Giddins, alleged father of the child of Elizabeth Bull, widow of Fenstanton. 1819

Bastardy affiliation certificate: William Ball, alleged father of the child of Jane Stokes of Fenstanton.

Your Parish Council was delighted to welcome Roy McGee and Christine Morris on board at its December 2018 meeting.

CIIr Roy McGee

Roy began a career in the leisure industry in Great Yarmouth, which is where he originates, and subsequently went on to live and work in Leeds and then Bristol.

He moved to Fenstanton in 2000 together with his wife Heather and worked, until his retirement in 2007, in outside catering.

Since his retirement Roy has spent his time on his hobbies, these include: indoor lawn bowls and gardening; his keen interest in gardening has led him to some involvement in Fenstanton Open Gardens.

Roy is disabled and a wheelchair user and, as such, is particularly interested in accessibility.

Cllr Christine Morris

Christine moved from her home town of Twickenham to Cambridgeshire in 1989 and settled in Fenstanton in April 2002. Christine has two grown up daughters and four grandchildren. A keen sports women, she can often be found at the side of local football pitches cheering on her teenage granddaughters.

Upon returning to paid employment after having her children she took up the position of Health and Safety Manager at a large automotive manufacturing company in Huntingdon. She spent eleven happy years ensuring the safety of a very large workforce working on automated.

Following redundancy, the position of Buildings, Quality and Health & Safety Manager was offered to her at Nokia UK in Godmanchester. She was instrumental in setting up and managing the Nokia ISO9001 quality accreditation along with auditing Nokia sites throughout Europe and Scandinavia

Christine is currently working at Cambridge University Press as the Rights and Permissions Controller for worldwide book rights.

FUNDING YOUR PARISH COUNCIL - 2019/20

Your Parish Council is paid for as part of your overall Council Tax payment. This is collected by Huntingdon District Council and then distributed to the Parish Council to cover much of the direct upkeep of the Parish, including public places and buildings, grass cutting, litter collection, upkeep of paths and footways, upkeep of the Church Cemetery, as well as financial support for local community groups and various activities around the village.

In the current Financial Year 2018/19 an average property* in the village contributed just over £1.00 per week toward the work of your Parish Council. This equates to £53.43 per year and compares very favourably with all Parish and Town Councils in the immediate vicinity. It represents the lowest average contribution for a Parish with over 1,000 households across Huntingdonshire.

Over the years your Parish Council has come under increasing pressure to provide additional services previously covered by the District and County Councils, as both have faced significant financial pressure.

In order to maintain the excellent level of service provided and achieve a balanced budget in the coming financial year 2019/20, the Parish Council has unanimously voted to increase the Parish Council contribution per household by just 10 pence per week. This equates to an **annual increase of £5.34** for an average property* in the village.

INCREASING ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR (ASB) IN THE PARISH

We have received a worrying amount of emails about ASB in the parish. We have taken these reports and concerns very seriously and we have been in contact with to our local police force and written to the Chief Constable; this letter has been signed by the Chairman (Cllr Kent), Cambridgeshire County Councillor lan Bates and Huntingdon District Councillor David Mead. We hope you will be reassured by this update from our new Police Sergeant Alice Draper; please make sure you make independent reports of any incidents and if you suffer from repeated incidents you do need to keep a full log for reporting please.

From Alice Draper -

"As requested, we have conducted high visibility patrols in the following areas of FENSTANTON on 11/01/2019.

Arriving in FENSTANTON at approximately 20.30hrs, we have made our way to the CHURCH and SCHOOL where we have conducted foot patrol through the church yard, past the entrance to the school and then around the roads immediately by the church.

We then continued to patrol FENSTANTON in our vehicle and covered the following roads:

We have also parked up at various locations on High Street and monitored passing traffic.

We have repeated the above several times over the course of the evening and completed our final patrol at around 00.30 hours."

Please also note that the police would to build up an intelligence picture of who the youths are, and if any names emerge please ensure they are noted and passed on, and if any specific intelligence or unreported offences are mentioned please guide attendees towards our online reporting facilities:

We can also report that we have been offered a site meeting and audit of problem locations. Please take not of this additional advice below from Paul Rogers at Cambs Police:

- Residents are to please continue to report concerns. I would advocate online reporting as a quick and simple method to report non urgent information or community intelligence:
- Be specific when calling, calls thus far don't really indicate why people believe it is drug dealing. If there are young people under 16 and dealers who are adult be clear with the call taker so they prioritise the call:
- We will use callers' information to inform patrol work and target offenders so please include vehicle indexes:
- You should not expect an immediate increase in patrol cars or necessarily an immediate response if they call unless there is an emergency. Our approach will be to try and design out/ solve the issue rather than risk moving the crowd to the next street. This sometimes rubs the wrong way, but it's far more effective and realistic.

In addition we have had reports of food baited with poison being left around the village which has been eaten by some dogs who have consequently been ill. Please be very careful and aware of this whilst out with your dogs.

CRICKET PAVILION

You will be aware by now that sadly the cricket pavilion has burnt down. The clerk received call from the police on the morning this happened.

CHEQUER STREET PLAY AREA UPGRADE

There is one more item to be installed.

ADULT OUTDOOR GYM BY THE HEADLANDS FOOTBALL PITCH

This is now complete and again we hope you are enjoying the facilities – although the weather is not necessarily at its best.

VILLAGE POND AND CLOCK TOWER AREA RESTORATION

Plans progress for this and the final contract will be submitted soon to the Mick George Community Fund.

CYCLEWAY ALONG THE FEN

This is now in its feasibility stage following confirmation of funding and all comments and concerns from the residents of The Fen have been taken on board following a meeting between residents and Cllrs Kent (Chairman) and Henderson. Updates will be issued in March.

IMPROVED KERBS FOR VILLAGE GREEN AREAS

A start date is awaited for this work to begin but it is hoped disruption will be kept to a minimum.

VILLAGE MEETING FACILITATED BY YOUR PARISH COUNCIL

Plans progress for this meeting and we are looking at a date towards the end of March. Parish groups and outside service providers will be invited to attend and we will include a full update on the work that your Parish Council is undertaking along with updates on matters impacting on Fenstanton from other organisations. We hope to see many of you there. The date will be confirmed as soon as possible.

BUS SURVEY

We have had 1,234 responses from across the region, of which over 20% were from Fenstanton. We're at the final stages of analyzing the results and preparing a paper to take to CAPCA (Cambridge and Peterborough Combined Authority with strong recommendations on the current and future needs of Fenstanton around the continuation and improvement of the service including: availability and frequency (especially at peak times), ticketing and pricing, reliability, increasing demand in line with population growth and demographic have. A big thank you to all who took the time to reply on line and also send the forms into the office.



The rainfall record for Hilton 2018 - a very dry summer

At the end of each calendar year I look forward to comparing rainfall figures for the year that has just passed with the records for the previous years. I record the rainfall at 09.00 hours GMT daily, and I now have 43 years of records. The rain gauge in my garden is a standard 5-inch rain gauge supplied by the Meteorological Office, and every month the daily figures are sent to the Meteorological Office and the Environment Agency to be incorporated in their official rainfall data.



As the graph shows, this year has been the driest since 2011 with 500.7mms of rain. The average annual rainfall for Hilton for the time span of 43 years is 557.3mms, so 2018 was a drier than average year. There have been great variations between the monthly totals during 2018. March and April were the two wettest months with 72.1 mms and 64.4 mms respectively, June and July were the driest, June with 3.9 mms and July with 14.7mms. They were exceptionally dry, the driest June and July in the 43 years of recording in Hilton.

The Meteorological Office reported that Southern England had an exceptional prolonged spell of dry weather with little or no rain through June extending into late July. Rainfall in June was less than 5% of the June average, and in some places less than 2%. Overall Southern England recorded its driest June since 1925.

Hilton was among the driest places in England this summer, so it is no wonder that the lawns in our gardens are still in a rather sorry state.

Playpark

The Parish Council's working group held an open meeting to discuss ideas and proposals for renovating the existing playpark and would like to thank all those who attended. Costs vary from approximately £15,000 for basic work up to £56,000 for a full renovation. Applications for grants to assist with funding have been submitted and further discussion will be held once the outcome of those applications is known.

Green Open Spaces

Quotes for work in connection with the annual tree survey are being obtained. Some of the more accessible tree work has and will be undertaken by the Parish Council in an effort to reduce costs. Ditch clearance work will be undertaken in January. It is planned to rope the section of the Green in front of the pavilion in a bid to protect it.

Speeding Vehicles and Night-time HCVs

The Parish Council agreed to donate £50 to the local Roadwatch scheme to assist with the administration costs in sending letters to offending motorists. This will be reviewed in 6 months.

Cycle Path

A flying start to the new year on January 14th with David Taylor telling us about women's roles in aviation.

He began with explaining how AVRO the main aircraft manufacturer got its name. Edwin Alliot Verdon Roe decided to use the letters AVR and added the O. He made many models and then went on to design and build proper aircraft. The most notable ones being the Lancaster, the Vulcan and the Shackleton. At first only men were allowed to be pilots but when the wars came the women were given more freedom and many of them did amazing things not only in England but in many other countries as well.

The first Lady in England to fly and have a pilot's licence was Hilda Hewlett who set up a flying school in Luton which is now an important and busy international airport.

Amy Johnson CBE was the first female pilot to fly alone from Britain to Australia.

She also flew with her husband Jim Mollison on many long distance flights.

Amelia Earhart was an American aviator and author. She flew solo across the Atlantic and received the American DFC .She also flew nonstop across the USA.

By the time WW2 started women were much more liberated and as most of the eligible men were fighting the women were expanding their horizons in many different and also inspiring ways.

Some became plotters for the RAF, some were answering the phones, others made ammunition, some working in factories making bombs after a day's work making shoes. Austin the car manufacturers made parts for Lancaster and Stirling bombers and 40% of their workers were women.

The Air Transport Auxiliary was a civilian organisation set up to repair and ferry aircraft between factories and airfields and this made more pilots available. They employed anyone who could fly including girls. They came from all over the world and delivered almost any type or size of plane just given a small ringed notebook called Ferry Pilot Notes to study before they took off!

There were many more ladies who "did their bit" but this is just a short write up and Mr Taylor has much more to tell if we had time.

He mentioned Barbara Hartman who flew Concorde, Valentina Tereshkova the Russian cosmonaut the first woman in space and Helen Sherman the first British astronaut in space to visit the Mir station.

He also mentioned some famous men but as he said 'this is all about our brave and deserving ladies'.

Craft club on February 7th has many interesting things going on so give it a try.

Our next meeting will be on February 11th in the Village Hall at 7 30 when we shall hear more about Boccia training and may get to have a try ourselves.

HILTON PRODUCE SHOW

January 5th: Winter Blooms

The top recommendation for a stunning combination of colour, scent, blooms and berries is the Winter Walk at Anglesey Abbey. There is a surprise round every bend of the meandering path, which is flanked on either side by thick bushes of dogwoods, viburnums, witchhazels, hollies, cotoneasters, euonymous, garrya elliptica and more...under planted with hellebores, iris, and early flowering bulbs. The path passes through a glade of silver birches, their bark washed annually to make it gleam in the winter sun. Walking under the leafless, arching branches is like walking under the fan vaulted ceiling of a cathedral.. Bergenias are planted underneath, their magenta flowers offering warmth against the stark white of the trees.

My own winter wonder is iris unguicilaris which belies its awkward and ugly name, by being a thing of beauty. It always takes me by surprise, appearing suddenly in the coldest months. It is flowering now and I can see its blooms from the kitchen window. The flowers are the most beautiful shade of lavender-blue and emerge from the base of the plant amongst its untidy, grassy, greyish leaves like "little low heavens."

Although the vegetable plot is mostly bare brown earth, there are spots of bright green from a highly productive patch of parsley which still yields leaves aplenty for sauces and garnish. Parsley seed is hard to germinate, but one supermarket pot planted outside casts enough seed to take you through the winter. The only snag is the tendency for the seed to move and I have found parsley in various other locations where it is less appropriate.

There are six months to go before the next Produce Show. Forced indoors, it is a great time to make marmalade and even jam, if you have a stock of fruit in the freezer. It will not be long before we buy seed potatoes to "chit out" and it is a great time for browsing seed merchants on line or on paper, dreaming of spring planting, summer blooms and a bumper vegetable crop.
