



# The Hilton Produce Show of 2023, The Potato Challenge and The Community Garden



#### **Good Taste**

This picture by William Macgregor in the collection of The National Gallery of Scotland shows a plentiful vegetable stall. The attraction of the image is in the abundance of the produce which is almost falling off the packed stall. The composition is cleverly arranged so the eye ranges over all the different ingredients and then is drawn upwards to take in the hanging strings of onions giving a vertical line to an otherwise horizontal image.

The painting by William Macgregor dates from 1884 at a time when 'The Glasgow Boys' were altering artistic taste away from the exotic and ideal to celebrate values of simplicity, directness and honesty. These vegetables are humble ones which anyone can grow. A trip to St.Ives' market provides us with similarly cheerful heaps of healthy-looking vegetables, some locally grown, cheering and reassuring us that we will not go hungry. By contrast, some Still Life images from the Dutch Golden era of the seventeenth century present rare and exotic fruits from overseas, painted in decorative dishes which emphasise the wealth of the patron.

#### Taste buds

McGregor's Vegetable Stall is a good image for Hilton's Community Garden. We cannot compete with the sheer numbers and variety of produce, but we shall learn by trial and error what best suits our soil and situation and aim for a full stall. Our intention is to make the surplus produce available to all. We plan a vegetable stall on Saturday mornings at the entrance to the garden with seasonal vegetables ready to eat and enjoy.

In the growing season of 2022, The Community Garden succeeded with leeks, butternut squash, Swiss chard, radishes, potatoes, tomatoes, carrots and mini cucumbers. Unhappily, our Pak Choi was eaten by pigeons and the squirrels made off with the sweetcorn. So this year we are avoiding exotic greens and preparing netting to keep off the squirrels and birds. We have also planted two new fruit trees a greengage and an apple which we hope will produce a pleasing surplus in years to come.

A freshly dug new potato comes out of the soil with a distinctive and appetising smell of damp earth. The sugars in the potato have not yet turned to starch; the vegetable is taut and plump with an unwrinkled skin. Fancy your own? So why not enter the Hilton Produce Show Potato Challenge? Each entrant will receive a seed potato to plant in a pot which will be emptied and weighed at the end of Feast Week.

Feast Week will end as usual with the displays of creative cooking, artwork, floristry, and home-grown vegetables that make up our VILLAGE PRODUCE SHOW, scheduled for Saturday, 29th July 2023.

I hope we'll have a bumper crop of potatoes this year, a stall full of vegetables fit for a Glasgow Boy Please come and join us on Saturday mornings to work in the community garden: all are welcome. Claire Sarkies



When Queen Elizabeth I Visited Fenstanton in 1564

Queen Elizabeth I

Queen Elizabeth I was fond of escaping from London and visiting different parts of the country. Wealthy friends and relations were just told to expect a visit from the queen. Every summer, the queen would leave her great palaces, which were all in or around London, and embark on a tour of her country. These tours were called 'progresses' and the queen enjoyed them very much. Who wouldn't when the hosts would feel 'obliged' to lavish small fortunes on providing, accommodation, banquets and entertainment!

These tours were a kind of fun holiday for her, a refreshing change from all the tensions of court life and a wonderful way for her to meet her ordinary subjects. The official line at the time was that people outside of court did not know what the queen looked like. She wanted to impress them with her wealth and to reassure the people that she was still alive and that the country was not at war.

The Queen would leave in procession from one of her palaces, seated on a horse or in a litter or coach, and her courtiers would accompany her, followed by hundreds of carts carrying their goods. It also allowed for the palaces to be cleaned. At court there would normally be over 1,000 people, courtiers and servants etc. By the summer, when progresses took place, the moats and nearby rivers would stink. About a dozen royal palaces along the Thames were in use most of the year.

Although Bishop Richard Cox had palaces in Ely, Holborn Place in London, also a park and chase palace at Somersham, for some reason he leased a very large house in Fenstanton. This was a substantial manor house with formal gardens dating back to the 12th century and possibly even earlier. Bishop Cox leased the manor house from Mary, the widow of George Symcote who held the head lease from the College of St Stephen, Westminster. In its early years the manor house was considered equal to a palace, but by the time of her majesty's visit it was known as an episcopal palace. The mansion house or rectory was seated at the east end of the Fenstanton village church yard and was classed as a Messuage (an area of land that contained a house) and consisted of 10 acres of gardens and land, a dwelling house together with its outbuildings and the adjacent land appropriated to its use.

Bishop Richard Cox (Bishop of Ely from 1559 to 1581) attended the queen on her visit to Cambridge University in 1564. The queen remained for four days and prepared to leave the university with a sense of pleasure which she experienced in the ecclesiastical administration. Elizabeth had been asked to remain one more night to witness a play which the students had prepared for her pleasure. Having a long journey the next day and considering that it was ten miles to Fenstanton where she was to dine at the Bishop of Ely's palace that evening, she declined the request. The students would not give up and pursued the queen to Fenstanton. She was tired but gave in and the play commenced.

The actors entered on the stage dressed as a group of imprisoned Catholic bishops. Each of them was dressed with a symbol of the bishop's persecution. The student dressed as Bishop Bonner carried a lamb in his arms at which he rolled his eyes and gnashed his teeth. The bishops had refused to undertake the Oath of Royal Supremacy and were already imprisoned in London. Elizabeth was insulted and with a few indignant words left the room. All the lights were extinguished and the student players had to find their way out of the house in the dark and blunder back to Cambridge.

Elizabeth left Fenstanton the following day and Sir Henry Cromwell had the honour of receiving the queen at Hinchingbrooke House.

#### Local Weather Watch by Patrick Landucci

What a record breaking year 2022 turned out to be, the warmest ever experienced across the UK since records began. Nor only warmth but also lengthy periods of drought. My last article was written in early August and the long, hot, dry summer continued for the rest of the month, in East Anglia beating records going back 150 years. The warmth and below average rainfall continued through September and October until the 20th of the latter month when, within the space of 3 days around 2.25 inches of rain fell in Hilton marking the start of 5 weeks of wet weather, the rains delivering a total of 6.75 inches (171mm) in that time. A remarkable turnaround since up to that point the total rainfall for the year had amounted to 10.3 inches (262mm). The rains then ceased and a 3 week dry spell ensued.

The autumn brought well above normal temperatures up to the middle of November, notable warm days being 29th October when 20.2C (68.4F) and 11th and 12th November when 17.2C (63F) was recorded accompanied by night-time minima which would normally be experienced in mid summer. There was not a single air frost during the autumn months and it was not until 7th December that the mercury fell to 0C (32F). It marked the start of another dramatic change as northerly winds bought Arctic air and a cold spell lasting eleven days with hard frosts, some freezing fog and daily maxima only a little above freezing. Snow started to fall on the 11th (4-5cm) which continued to lie until a general thaw on the 19th. The lowest temperature I recorded during the cold spell was -8.2C (17F). Interestingly, the amount of snow in our area was very unevenly distributed. For example in Whittlesford, near Cambridge, a depth of 15cm (6 inches) was measured.

Since the thaw, our weather has seen a sustained spell of mild south-westerly winds driven by a much invigorated jet stream as a consequence of the extreme cold polar surge which hit north America over Christmas, clashing with much warmer Atlantic waters. The result here has been no frosts and some periodic rain, mostly in small amounts although much larger amounts and flooding have occurred elsewhere in the UK. Many parts to Europe have also been experiencing record breaking high temperatures as high as 20C (68F) in Poland and causing snow in Alpine ski resorts to melt.

Ending with a few examples of global climate changes:-

- 1. Extreme heat and drought in China. During their 2022 summer in a large swathe of the country from Shanghai in the east to Sichuan in the west temperatures reached or exceeded 40C (104F) on 70 consecutive days affecting more than 900 million million people.
- 2. Exceptional monsoon rains in Pakistan. The country received around 2.5 times its normal rainfall. In August the town of Padidam in Sindh Province received 355 mm in a single day and 1228.5mm (just under 5 feet) in the month, obliterating the previous record of 300mm!
- Record breaking rainfall in south-east Australia. After just 10 months of 2022 this area of the country had already experienced its wettest year on record. At the end of October Sydney's total had reached 2396.2mm (94.5 inches), beating the previous annual record of 2194mm (86.4 inches)

Finally, spare a thought for would be weather forecasters. In Hungary, as a result of the national weather office predicting "likely" heavy rain on St. Stephens Day causing the public fireworks display to be cancelled, in the event it remained dry. The two top forecasters were fired with immediate effect!

#### Warm Space—Church Centre

The Fenstanton warm space has been operating since early December, on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays from 10am to 4 pm. It is a free facility organised by your Parish Council, the Church Centre, and Huntingdonshire District Council; it is generously supported by local businesses: Ash's Shop, Mo's Motors, and Ken Booth & co.

Based in the Church Centre, which has Free Wi-Fi throughout, we have the use of three rooms:

**The Main Hall** – Here residents can enjoy free beverages, snacks and biscuits, or even toast! A place you can sit and chat, do a jigsaw, read a book, catch up with your mail, or just relax.

**The Bertha Pitfield Room** – just off the main hall, is where we hold our Parent and Toddler group (Wednesdays 10am) and our Chair and Standing Exercise sessions (Mondays 10am), with other activities coming soon.

**The Saunders Room** — Quietly situated upstairs, away from the hustle and bustle, an ideal space to work from home, but not too far from the tea and biscuits! Everyone is welcome and we look forward to seeing you in the coming weeks.



#### Planning Development—10 Honey Hill

15 Parishioners turned out for the Planning Meeting held on 5th January where the Planning Committee discussed the proposed development at 10 Honey Hill. Parishioners shared their concerns about the proposal, some of their concerns were addressed by the developers representative present, but he advised he would feed back the concerns raised.

The Planning Committees decision at this time is to recommend the application for refusal due to the issues raised, including access safety, privacy concerns, concerns plot 6 driveway is too far from property to be used, no visitor parking, no evidence of comprehensive ecological or environmental surveys (no mention of the pond on site and possibility of Snake's-head fritillary flowers being found on site). No evidence of a Bat survey. Concerns over Tree survey and varieties of Apple Trees found. Flood risk report has omissions and inaccuracies and general lack of detail.

#### Local Highway Initiative—(LHI) explained

Your Parish Council often comes under fire over road safety issues and we wanted to help our Parish understand the responsibilities. Highways are the responsibility of Cambridge County Council. In order to make any improvements to our Highways your Parish Council must submit an LHI application to CCC for consideration. The Local Highways Improvement (LHI) programme covers all districts in Cambridgeshire and invites any groups or organisations that represent the local community to apply for funding. The schemes are community driven and give local people the opportunity to put foward proposals for highway improvements in their area.

The schemes are delivered by the County Council on a joint funded basis and applicants can apply for funding of up to either £25,000 for complex projects or £10,000 for non-complex projects, as a contribution to their scheme. The applicant is expected to provide a minimum contribution of 10% towards the total scheme cost.

Due to the popularity of this initiative, applications are limited as follows:

- Parish councils one bid per parish per year
- Community groups one additional application, per respective parish. This
  application should be applied for in the same way and needs to evidence the
  support of the locally elected member/s before submiting

#### Local Highway Initiative—(LHI) explained cont...

#### **Preparing an Application**

Your Parish Council must be able to clearly identify the objective of an application, describing in detail the location and the highway issue it is trying to solve or why an improvement is needed.

# Is your application Complex or Non Complex? Complex

- Raised features, speed cushions, road humps or speed table
- Central islands
- Priority build outs
- Pedestrian crossings such as zebra crossings
- Footpaths and Cycle paths

#### **Non Complex**

- Parking restrictions, for example double or single yellow lines
- Street lighting
- Speed limits, for example 40mph buffer zones
- Passive calming measures such as village gateways, signs and road markings
- Mobile Vehicle Activated Signs, (MVAS)

Once it has been decided what type of scheme to apply for, an application form needs to be completed online. The form asks for your Parish Council to provide information specific to its application, confirm it has the support of our local elected member and that it has informally consulted with those who will be directly affected should the submission be successful.

Your Parish Council will be asked to demonstrate how the scheme fulfils the criteria below and has to provide as much relevant information as possible.

- 1) Does your application address a known safety issue?
- 2) Could the suggested scheme increase safety for highway users?
- 3)Could the suggested scheme contribute positively to public health?
- 4) Does the application have demonstrable local support?
- 5) Could the scheme potentially lead to any localised environmental improvements?

The map below provides information that will also need to be include in the application, including current accident data.

# Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Monday 5<sup>th</sup> December Dredging

The dredging is now complete, and the following ponds have been dredged: Reeves Ditch (High Street), Park Farm pond (The Green), Cross Farm pond (Potton Road), The Ware (Graveley Way) and Kidmans Farm pond (Graveley Way). A silt trap has also been dug in Kidmans Farm pond which should reduce the amount of silt that enters this watercourse. The silt has been placed in a heap on the Wilderness and will be spread over the Wilderness when appropriate, which will be temporarily unpleasant but have no lasting effects.

#### **B1040 Surface Dressing**

Notification has been received from Cambridgeshire County Council that they will be carrying out surface dressing works to the B1040 both south and north of the village, which is due in February 2023.

#### LHI Bid 2023/24

Hilton Parish Council has decided to apply for a sign warning of the prohibition of HGVs through Hilton, to be located on the approach to the Shilpa roundabout on the A1198.



#### Health Project

The Council has appointed a working group to propose an application for moveable equipment and/or classes. The Clerk will submit the bid.



#### Graveley Way Bollards

Hilton Parish Council considered the correspondence received regarding the accident on Graveley Way and the resulting damage to the bollards. The Council supports the replacement of the bollards with a more visible design and has asked the Clerk to contact Cambridgeshire County Council and request that the road markings are repainted.

#### Surveyor

The Council has appointed a local surveyor to provide up to date valuations for the Pavilion, Lych Gate and Bus Shelter in order to update the Council's Asset Register, at a cost of £250.

#### Car Park at the Village Hall

The Council has authorised expenditure up to £580 for equipment and materials to restore

the gravel surface of this car park.

#### Table Tennis

The grant for a table tennis table and associated equipment was successful and the Council has authorised the Clerk to make the purchases, up to the value of the grant.



#### Bonfire Night takings

The gate takings from the Bonfire Night were £2,632.60, which is the highest on record. Councillors thanked the organisers of the event, including the Fireworks Committee who put on a fabulous show.


