### CAMBRIDGE BOTANIC GARDENS

### The Power of Pollination

When you hear the word 'pollination' – the act of transferring pollen from one flower to another to enable fertilisation to take place and fruits and seeds to be produced – you probably think of bees. But bees are not the only creatures to fill this role. Around the world, about 87% of flowering plants are pollinated by animals. Plants and animals have been co-evolving for millions of years and across the plant kingdom there are a whole host of plant species which rely on a diverse range of different pollinators. Many other insects – flies, wasps, moths and butterflies are vital for pollination but there are also some more unusual pollinators out there from bats to beetles and hummingbirds to honey possums! You may not have any of these plants in your garden, but we grow many of them at the Botanic Garden.

One such plant is the cactus. In the wild, many columnar cacti are pollinated by bats. As bats travel considerable distances each night they make effective pollinators for these desert plants that can grow far away from one another. Though the flowers are not brightly coloured (bats are colour blind), they attract bats by giving off a strong smell and producing high volumes of nectar. They are also large, strong and stick out from the plant to help bats visit without being prickled by spines.

Pollination is critical for food production and human livelihoods, and directly links wild ecosystems with agricultural production systems. At least one third of the world's agricultural crops depend on pollination provided by insects and other animals which is why understanding plant-pollinator interactions is important.

To learn more about pollination follow our new **Flower Power** trail at the Botanic Garden. The trail will lead you to some fabulous flowers and provide information about the groovy creatures that pollinate them.

The Flower Power Trail runs from 22 July 2017 to 03 September 2017 and is suitable for ages 5+. The trail if free and normal Garden admission applies for adults. There is no need to book, just drop in.

### The part Fenstanton played in the Spanish Armada.

As researched by Miss Gertrude Peet in 1922 at Cambridge University Library and updated by John Deeks 2017

In 1588 the men of Fenstanton went to fight for England and save the country from being conquered by the Spanish. In this period there were only sailing vessels and the use of gunpowder had only recently been developed. Men had flintlocks to fire the guns, tinder boxes were in use to obtain a light; matches were yet to be invented.

There were no railroads, no telephones and no internet. Yet in a few hours, news was carried from end to end of England. Fenstanton forwarded the news by lighting the beacon on top of the tower in the market place.

In the 31<sup>st</sup> year of Queen Elizabeth's reign, Phillip II of Spain, the surviving husband of Queen Mary, prepared to invade England, hoping to conquer it and become king and establish the Roman Catholic faith in the country. For four years Phillip had been secretly and quietly preparing a fleet of ships for this invasion, This Spanish fleet consisted of 130 ships, 30,655 officers and men, 2,080 galley slaves, 90 hangmen and executioners.

Our English Royal Navy that had to meet the Spanish fleet consisted of 34 ships, but privateers were willingly supplied by towns and individuals. London sent 30 ships, double the number required. The nobility and gentry supplied 43 more ships. So England got together 191 vessels in order to prevent the Spanish landing. They were much smaller vessels than those of the Spanish navy.

The first warning of the storm to come was on April 6<sup>th</sup> 1588 and from Fenstanton ten men went and a smaller number from Hilton. Picture the Fenstanton men going along the road to join the main army, joining with the seven men from Hilton, and on the way other villages adding their few men, all hastening to the main camp at St Neots, eight miles away. After all the soldiers from different villages had assembled at St Neots, and their names and arms had been listed, they marched to London via Cambridge.

On the 17<sup>th</sup> June matters intensified. Fenstanton together with other villages had the order, "all captains are to be ready to start at an hours warning". On the 22<sup>nd</sup> June, again a special order to Fenstanton and all villages "the beacons to be watched by men of good discretion and substance". This order meant it would not do to give the care of the beacon into the charge of any Roman Catholics, who could not be trusted to be loyal to this country.

On the 19<sup>th</sup> July the Spanish fleet entered the English Channel and on the 20<sup>th</sup> it appeared in the sight of the English, who let it roll up the channel so that our navy was behind it. Keeping at a distance the little English ships poured their shots into the great Spanish ships. The Spanish replied with their heavy guns, but from the height of their decks their shots passed clean over the English ships.

On the 27<sup>th</sup> July the Spanish anchored off Calais. During the night of the 27<sup>th</sup> the English sent eight fire ships in amongst the anchored Spanish fleet. This so alarmed the Spanish admiral that he ordered the anchor cables to be cut, a panic seized the Spanish, some ships caught fire and others drifted against each other. The English admiral, was not a man to lose his opportunity, he fell on the disabled fleet and destroyed 12 ships. The great armada was now in full flight. It could not get through the English fleet and run home down the channel, the way it had come, so the Spanish decided not to attempt to conquer the English fleet by giving battle, but to sail home the best way it could by going round Scotland.

High winds and a storm arose, seventeen Spanish ships were wrecked on the west coast of Ireland and many were never heard of again. Fifty-two battered hulks were all that returned to three Spanish ports. So the magnificent armada which was boastfully called "the invincible armada" and took four years to build, was defeated in a week.

We hope that the men of Fenstanton and Hilton returned home feeling like most Englishmen did, 'thankful for the victory'. On the 24<sup>th</sup> August a public thanksgiving service was ordered by Queen Elizabeth and no doubt all in Fenstanton (and Hilton) attended the service in their parish churches. Queen Elizabeth publically attended the Thanksgiving service that day at St Pauls Cathedral in London.

### Parish Council Meeting, 5th June 2017

### A14 Update

Following on from the Annual Parish Meeting, the A14 team have supplied additional detail to some of the questions asked at the meeting. Their responses can be seen on the parish council's website. The Parish Council is also pleased to note that contrary to earlier discussions, the local bridges will now have a central pier which should reduce the size of the structures. An HE run Information Bus is also available to visit local events. Councillors will discuss this possibility at a later meeting.

### Parish Plan

After the recent open meetings on the parish plan, the Working Group will collate their findings in a similar format to the 2005 plan to allow the Plan's progress to be noted. Council will review and decide a future action plan.

### The Ware, Graveley Way

Following comments from concerned parishioners, the Parish Council agreed to remove the fallen tree and complete other works on the adjacent vegetation. A full survey of all trees in the village has taken place including these trees along the side of The Ware. A proposal for dealing with unstable trees will be presented to the council shortly.

### Bench by the Home Oak

This bench had become loose and was removed for safe keeping. It will be returned as soon as possible to the same location.

### **Football Nets**

The parish council owns two goalposts and has received an offer to fund the purchase of two new nets. However the outline policy of alternating the goal posts to ease localised wear and the size of the new pitch for local football group increased the discussion. The Green Management group will review the goal post policy for the Council to suggest the quantity of nets to be purchased.

### **Car Parking Policy**

The car park by the Village Hall is intended for temporary use for those enjoying village facilities or events. A request for long term parking associated with a non-village activity had been received but the council agreed to enforce the existing policy. Details are contained within The Green management policy on the Council's website

The rail of vintage and even earlier dresses and as she called them underpinnings were quite different to start with corsets, padding and bustles needed to obtain the desired outlines. Crinolines with big hoops and petticoats gave way to softer more flowing shapes. She made her own wedding dress on the lines of a crinoline in a soft golden colour it was really beautiful.

Moving forward to the Edwardian era the were more relaxed and easier to wear.then in the 1920's all the ladies wanted to be slim and not so restricted ,dresses were shorter and waistlines were lower. Embroidery became popular as the colours were mainly white or dark but into the 30'sclothes became more feminine and the clever invention of the zip fastener brought a great change to dress design and comfort. The 40'S brought austerity and the fashions were modified to whatever materials were available, clothes were recycled and modified and ladies had to be ingenious with what they could do to make their wardrobe practical but fashionable. Cloche hats were popular and different trimmings could change a plain one into a quite different look. Peplums became fashionable and lead into the 50' with full skirts and huge petticoats. More colour came into the materials and longer skirts and dresses of prettier and interesting fabric like silk and taffeta .

Nowadays fashion designers 'borrow' rails of these clothes to modify them and present them as new fashion which only goes to show that if you keep something long enough it will one come back into fashion!

Our two Hilton men, Private Ernest James Cook, of the 9<sup>th</sup> Battalion East Surry Regiment and Private James Roslyn of the 23<sup>rd</sup> Battalion London Regiment were remembered by the members of St Ives and district Royal British Legion led by Mike Robinson.

During the tribute Mike gave a short address to explain both men's military and family backgrounds together with details of the Battle of Arras in 1917 in which they were fighting at the time of their deaths.

Not only was the battle so fiercely fought, but also in the most atrocious conditions of rain, sleet, snow and knee deep in mud, all so very different from the warm sunshine streaming into the church, that Sunday.

Also present at the service were representatives of Hilton, Guide, Brownie, Rainbows and, Fenstanton and Hilton Scout groups.

At a special point in the service Reverend David Busk dedicated the three new standards, for the Hilton Guides, Brownie and Rainbows. The young standard bearers were: Union bearer - Rachel Walker, Guide bearer - Maisie Blackwell, Brownie bearer - Charlotte Payne, Rainbow bearer - Rose Warboys and Memorial bearers - Lily Blackwell & Abigail Capes.

Barry Pattison was the St Ives Royal British Legion Standard Bearer and in her first ceremony since her appointment Julie Briggs carried the Fenstanton and Hilton RBL Standard.

The next and final Everyman Remembered ceremony this year will be for Private Harry Jennings of the Suffolk Regiment, on Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> August, at the Parish church at 11.15am. Harry was a 34 year old labourer and married to Ellen Louisa Jessie. His name is recorded at the Thiepval Memorial which bears the names of 72,000 men and women with no known graves.

This will be the tenth tribute in Hilton since September 2014 for us to acknowledge the sacrifice of yet another man and their families 100 years ago.

The next edition of Spectrum will be distributed for the beginning of September therefore after Harry's tribute, but details will be available on the village website (Hilton Village Community website), on the church and three village notice boards and in the shop window. All are welcome to join these services.
