

Update on the Fenstanton to Malawi Container



Many of you will remember that, during last summer's lockdown. 40ft а container was lovingly packed (without an inch left with to spare) useful items, donated by kind people in our local community and Malawi. shipped to These items included

over 35,000 items of clothing for the 3,109 orphan children under AquAid Lifeline's umbrella of care, laptops, bicycles, commercial polytunnels, tools galore, medical equipment, a braille machine, school desks and chair, sewing and knitting machines....the list goes on. The good news is that our container has finally arrived after considerable delay, and, no, it wasn't our ship that became wedged in the Suez Canal!

The level of excitement was huge as the items started to be distributed amongst the eager recipients. The children were so proud to show off their 'new' clothes and the sweeties, although not vital cargo, certainly put a smile on their beautiful faces. We are so proud of the contents we shipped, lives will be improved and changed for the better, what a privilege to be able to help people who live in one of the poorest nations in the world. On their behalf, I thank you all.

It would be amazing to repeat the experience and I know that, together, we can.

FENSTANTON and the DAIRY SITE, now THE CROWN ESTATE: Part 2:

The site in the Post-Medieval and Modern Times:

The post medieval and modern period saw the expansion of the village to house a growing population. The High Street had to its northern-side (even numbers) a range of buildings stretching as far as Bell Lane. The buildings on the southern side (odd numbers) ran almost continuously along the road, broken only by irregular routes providing access to the land behind and a larger track-way which was opposite the Bell Lane intersection with the High Street. This track-way led south, providing access to two separate building ranges sited on the western-side of the track, before terminating at a field called 'Morgan's Croft furlong. This covered the five acres that became the dairy site.



This map of 1777 shows the fields called Morgan's Croft on the top right. To the left of the croft you will see the tenements, long gardens and agricultural strips.

The only structure on this trackway that still exists is the 19th century building at 17 High Street, now being converted into three houses. The track-way continued to provide access into the large fields. Much of the rest of the site remained as garden and orchards to the rear of the 18th century tenement buildings which ran between numbers 17 and 19 High Street.

These tenement buildings were demolished in mid-20th century to make way for an enlarged entry and exit to the dairy site from the high street. The long gardens and agricultural land that were associated with the tenements and numbers 17 and 19 High Street, were then incorporated into the diary site as a lorry parking and turning area.

The Victorian buildings at 17 High Street, which once housed the Dairy Crest offices, were converted into three separate houses in 2021.



FENSTANTON and the DAIRY SITE, now THE CROWN ESTATE: Part 2:

A new village bypass was constructed in 1983. This road allowed the dairy to move its entrance from the High Street to a slip-way off the A604 (later the A14 and then the A1307) bypass. The original entry point in the high street was then used to build a canteen and social facility for the dairy workers.



On the left of this picture are the row of cottages that sat between numbers 17 and 19 High Street. One of the cottages had been converted into a beer house called the King's Head. These were demolished and the new Dairy Crest offices and canteen were built on the site. In 2021 as part of the Crown Estate development, these were replaced by a new row of cottages but no pub.

Local Weather Watch

Of all the seasons, Springtime is the most capricious often containing reminders of Winter as it loses its grip and later as daily day light hours increase to the same length as days in July the potential for warm sunny days. The unpredictability can be readily illustrated by comparing Spring 2021 with Spring during the COVID lockdown of 2020.

Having said that, March this year was largely uneventful, with mean temperatures slightly higher than normal, less frost than usual and broadly an average amount of rainfall. The last two days of the month brought a sudden heatwave on light southerly winds within which Sahara dust was embedded. Daytime maxima reached 22C (72F). A complete reversal of wind direction took place on 1st April to a cold north-easterly and a maximum of just 10C (50F), heralding a completely different weather pattern for the rest of the Spring.

April was a cold month with a predominance of northerly winds sourced direct from the Arctic as high pressure sat to the west of the UK blocking any low-pressure systems from the Atlantic. The air was often sparkling crystal clear and bone dry leading to frosty nights. For the first time since records began frost occurred somewhere in the UK on every night in the month. In my relatively sheltered garden I recorded frost on 21 nights. Total precipitation for April amounted to 2.5mm (0.10 inch) including light snow showers on the 5th and 11th. The highest temperature in the month was 18C (64.4F). On 20 days the maximum temperature was 13C (55.4F) or below. Compare that with April 2020 when 20 days reached 20C (68F) or above!

The cold theme continued through May with winds from a northerly quarter fed around low pressure over Scandanavia and high pressure still blocking Atlantic systems. Unlike April, May was a wet month with frequent rain, on 17 days, accompanied by very chilly conditions. No fewer than 18 days failed to reach 15C (59F) and only 3 reached 21C (70C), two of which were on the 30th and 31st. Compare that with May 2020 when 15 days reached 21C (70C) or above, with all but 7 days exceeding 16C (61F). May 2020 was also the sunniest on record, as well as being a very dry month with only 4.5mm of rain. There were nearly 75mm (3 inches) this year.

As May drew to a close, high pressure from the Azores took over bringing another dramatic change with warm south westerly winds flooding across most of the UK. As I write this article on 12th June, warm conditions continue with every one of the last 14 days having exceeded 22C(71.5F). Also, drought conditions are now looming, such are the vagaries of the British climate.

Local Weather Watch

In concluding this article, I was interested to read in "Weather" magazine about the phenomena of coastal mirages around UK waters where there were several sightings in February this year of ships elevated above the water surface as if they were flying. They occurred during the exceptionally mild spell which I mentioned in my last article and are caused by the refraction of light, in a layer of warmer air immediately above colder air near the water surface thus forming a temperature inversion. They were seen in Cornwall, Lyme Bay, South Shields and Banff, Aberdeenshire. Called superior mirages they are sometimes referred to as Fata Morgana and may be the cause of sightings of ghost ships in mariner's tales, such as the legendary "Flying Dutchman".

Fenstanton Village Hall Trust

The home of Fenstanton's new village hall

We're delighted to show you pictures of what will be the location of Fenstanton's new village hall.

For the past 12 years since the original site in Chequer Street was sold, we've been looking for a suitable site and putting our efforts into fundraising to fund a build.

Around five years ago we started talks with Morris Homes and Huntingdonshire District Council to acquire a space on the old Dairy Crest site.

In March this year we finally exchanged contracts on the acquisition of the new village hall site and completion of the transfer of the land is due to take place in September once Morris Homes fully vacate the site.

We're now working towards submitting our full design to Huntingdonshire District Council for their approval and hope to provide the village of Fenstanton with a brand new village hall in late 2022.

Last year our former Chair, Jane Blunt, successfully applied to the Cambridgeshire Communities Capital Fund for a grant of £500,0000 to assist with the construction of the new building.

The grant was given on the condition that Fenstanton Parish Council would also provide some support which they have with a capital grant of £95,000. We then approached Huntingdon District Council who confirmed they could also support us with a grant of £75,000.

With our own funds, we now have around £890,000 for the build which we expect to exceed £1million so you'll see us continuing our fundraising efforts as soon as we can.

giving nature a home An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

The UK is in a nature crisis with over 40% of all species suffering declines since the 1970s. In fact, many of these species are now threatened with extinction and for some it is already too late. With over 70% of land in the UK being used for agriculture, nature reserves, such as Fen Drayton Lakes, are of vital importance to halt and reverse these declines by offering safe havens for species of all kinds.

The primary purpose of a nature reserve is to provide habitat for wildlife. By a combination of non-intervention and by carrying out targeted management work in different habitats around the reserve, from open water and reedbed to scrub and woodland, we work to ensure that there is space for plants and creatures of all sizes to breed, feed and over-winter. To date, almost 1700 different species of organism have been recorded at Fen Drayton Lakes and there will be many more (particularly invertebrates) that have not been formally identified and recorded.

Of course, nature reserves are not just wonderful for wildlife; nature reserves and the countryside in general are special spaces for us all to get closer to nature, to relax and to forget, for a short time, the troubles affecting us all.

Unfortunately, where there are people there is disturbance to wildlife and so it behoves all visitors to minimise their impact and respect the countryside code when visiting the reserve. Disturbing nesting birds and other breeding wildlife can have significant consequences with nests or young being abandoned.

We know that the water is very inviting, but swimming and boating are not allowed on the lakes as these both cause significant disturbance. Fires and barbecues are also prohibited because of the damage they can cause. Wonderful, open meadows, which often look empty, host numerous nesting birds and other life like deer fawns

hidden away amongst the vegetation. Allowing dogs into these areas can seriously harm the wildlife using them, and in some cases, constitutes a criminal offence under the Wildlife and Countryside Act.


Like elsewhere, we have seen a significant increase in these types of antisocial behaviour over the past year, with the increase in littering that comes with them. We would be really grateful if everybody could help by ensuring that those around you are aware of the harm these activities can cause to our wonderful nature reserve, and, to please discourage such behaviour where you can exert influence in your section of our community.



- New bench looking back over the lake towards Fenstanton from the Guided Busway path.


Multi-use games area (MUGA)

Let us hope that 2022 can return to 'normal' in all our lives.


