

Latest news from Fenstanton Parish Council

Fenstanton Parish Council — New Councillors

Simon King



Simon and his family live in The Fen, they have 3 dogs, 2 ponies and numerous chickens.

Simon was born in the Village and his family associations with Fenstanton date back over 5 generations, his Great Grandfathers were a farmer in Chequer Street and the village postmaster, his Great Uncle was George Burgess, one of Fenstanton's very first Parish Councillors, His Grandfather owned the village shop (now Ash's), his father the fish and chip shop. His uncle taught at Fenstanton school, his aunty is the famous 'Mrs Collison' of school secretary fame. Recently, whilst serving on the Residents Association, Simon worked closely with both Fenstanton Parish Council and CCC in delivering The Fen bridleway. Simon says "I believe that a living village such as Fenstanton, one of the few villages that still has industry and commerce at the heart of its High Street, isn't just about the here and now; it's also a nod to those that came before, that created our community, and respecting the children of today who will create our community of tomorrow. I'm relishing serving on Fenstanton Parish Council, working with, and delivering to the people of Fenstanton."

Tina Yates



Tina served as a Parish Councillor in the early 2000's for some 8 years. She stepped down due to time pressures from work and looking after her mother-in-law, as this meant that she was no longer able to contribute as she thought she should. Tina is now better able to contribute her time again. Tina has been a resident in the village for nearly 40 years, and realised at the last PC meeting, when she attended as a member of the public, that she thought there seemed to be a shortage of "old" experience of the village, which can sometimes be useful. Tina has experience of dealing with Cambs County Council as Chair of the Swavesey and District Bridleways Association, and has a good working knowledge of rights of way legislation. In her working life Tina carried out environmental research (based at Monks Wood) for 24 years, and then was a government advisor on environmental issues and research needs, for a further 9. Tina feels that being a Councillor at any level is about what the person can contribute, and she can contribute an active brain, a questioning mind, and her knowledge and experience.

Traffic—High Street

Your Parish Council has been approached by some residents concerned over safety and traffic issues on the High Street.

Your Parish Council is working towards introducing a 20mph speed limit throughout the village, which we hope will be implemented in the coming months.

Your Parish Council will be speaking

to local business owners and residents that park along the High Street and in the lay-by for long periods of time to ask that they seek alternative parking to help avoid the bottle neck along the High Street.

If improvements are not seen then your Parish Council may have to consider other measures.

Please consider others when parking on the High Street.

Underpass—A1307

Your Parish Council has been working with Highways England to try to address the problem with flooding of the Underpass.
Highways England cleared the drain in November 2021 but it seems to have become blocked again.

Highways England attended on the 2nd of June to clear the drain, however it was not entirely successful and further investigation will need to be carried out.

Your Parish Council will continue to work with Highways England to resolve the issue.

Footpath Working Party—Volunteers wanted

Your Parish Council is still looking for one or two volunteers to join its Footpath working party.

The working party meet virtually on an ad hoc basis to discuss any issues regarding the Footpaths in and around the Village that require the attention of the Parish Council.

Pond—update

Work on the Pond continues, your Parish Council recently arranged for the large Tree at the back of the Pond to be removed as it was compromising the lining of the pond and drawing water from the pond. Your Parish Council will continue to

monitor the water levels.

Further work is planned to tidy the area, spraying of weeds will be carried out before introducing a wild flower area and the installation of a new bench.

The Fen Bridleway—update

A new gate is due to be installed on the bridleway in the coming weeks to replace the bollards that are currently in place. bridleway are the responsibility of Cambridge County Council. The hedges are maintained by your Parish Council.

Would You Qualify as a Witch?

In the seventeenth and eighteenth century most people were uneducated and were not able to explain what went on about them. In fact, knowledge was a scarce commodity. It is difficult for us to comprehend just how ignorant people were. Most English people knew nothing about geography and didn't know or care what happened on the other side of the horizon. The majority of people never travelled more than five miles from their place of birth. As a matter of fact, almost everyone thought the world was flat.

Only a small number of people could read or write or even count beyond one hundred. Most common citizens could not tell the time of day, and few could read a calendar. Most of our ancestors of those times did not know what year it was, much less when their own birthdays occurred. The reason is that nobody knew his or her exact age. Birthdays went unnoticed by a population that could not read a calendar.

The Witch Trials of the late 17th and early 18th century accused many people of practising witchcraft, almost all of them on evidence we would consider to be "shaky" today. If you were around in say 1711, what are the odds that YOU would be so accused? And, if found guilty, hanged? Would you have been accused of practising witchcraft according to the laws and evidence used during the witch trials?

1. YOU ARE FEMALE

Are you a woman of any kind? If so, you are probably one of the devil's many hellbrides. For thousands of years, people have believed women to be more susceptible to sins than men, and sinning is a clear indication of devil worship.

2. YOU ARE POOR AND CANNOT SUPPORT YOURSELF FINANCIALLY

The poor, homeless, and those forced to rely on the community for support were among the most vulnerable and often accused of witchcraft. Sarah Good, hanged in 1692, was extremely disliked and distrusted by neighbours because she wandered from house to house begging for food.

3. YOU ARE RICH AND FINANCIALLY INDEPENDENT

If you're a grown woman living this life without any additional support, you probably also have a jar of eye of newt in your pantry. Any indication that a woman could live without the help of, or supervision of a man would raise an alarm. She would likely have been isolated from the community, until, of course, she was arrested and put on trial. Between 1620 and 1725, women without brothers or sons to share their inheritance comprised 89 percent of the women executed for witchcraft.

4. YOU HAVE MORE THAN ONE FRIEND

A note to all women's meetings and the cast of Sex and the City: A group of women congregating without a male chaperone was deemed a coven, meeting to worship the Devil.

5. YOU HAVE HAD AN ARGUMENT WITH ONE OR MORE OF YOUR FEMALE FRIENDS

Infamous witchfinders like Matthew Hopkins inspired such terror in the community that it didn't take long for women to accuse other women of witchcraft as a way of deflecting their own indictments.

6. YOU HAVE HAD AN ARGUMENT OR DISAGREEMENT WITH SOMEONE

The important thing to remember is that anyone could accuse anyone of witchcraft, and they did. If you found yourself accused of practising witchcraft of any kind by any kind of person, you might as well have been seen flying naked over the moon on a broomstick made out of a cursed lover's ears.

7, YOU ARE VERY OLD

Older women, both married and unmarried were extremely susceptible to accusations. Rebecca Nurse was a 70-year-old invalid when she was accused by disputing neighbours. At 71, she became the oldest woman tried, convicted, and put to death for being a witch.

8. YOU ARE VERY YOUNG

Dorothy Goode was only 4 years old when she confessed to being a witch (simultaneously implicating her mother, Sarah, who was hanged in 1692). Dorothy was imprisoned for nine months before her release. The experience left her permanently insane.

9. YOU ARE A MIDWIFE

A midwife's age, social and marital status, autonomy, pagan influences, secret knowledge of herbs and most importantly, the vilification of her profession as unclean and demeaning served to demonize the midwife. In short, the midwife represented everything the Church feared.

10. YOU ARE MARRIED WITH TOO MANY CHILDREN

You have an unnaturally fertile womb that can only be the result of a dark magic. Add to that a young couple nearby having a difficult time conceiving, and you are almost certainly stealing would-be babies from them, because you are a witch.

11. YOU ARE MARRIED WITH TOO FEW (OR NO) CHILDREN

The devil cursed your unholy womb with infertility. Plus, if your neighbours and their six children are suffering in any way, they almost certainly believe the jealous crone living next to them has cursed their home.

12. YOU HAVE EXHIBITED "STUBBORN," "STRANGE," OR "FORWARD BEHAVIOR"

Let loose any kind of sass or backtalk and ye be a witch, probably. In the trial of Rachel Clinton, her accusers solidified the case against her with the following: "Did she not show the character of an embittered, meddlesome, demanding woman, perhaps in short, the character of a witch? Did she not scold. rail, threaten and fight?"

13. YOU HAVE A MOLE. BIRTHMARK. OR THIRD NIPPLE

Any of these found on the body could be interpreted as the Devil's mark. This is also where the witch's familiar, usually a dog, cat, or snake, would attach itself to her to drink her blood. The accused were completely rid of their body hair until some kind of marking was found.

14. YOU HAVE HAD SEX OUT OF WEDLOCK

Throw yourself directly into a blue hellfire if this one applies to you. In 1651, Alice Lake of Dorchester was tried as a witch for having "played the harlot and being with Child." Her guilt was so intense that she eventually confessed to convening with the devil "through the commission of her sin." She was hanged that same year.

15. YOU HAVE ATTEMPTED TO PREDICT THE IDENTITY OF YOUR FUTURE HUSBAND Ever daydreamed about your soul mate? Written his name in your notebook? Then, your activities

16. YOU HAVE BROKEN VIRTUALLY ANY RULE IN THE BIBLE AND THUS ENTERED INTO A PACT WITH THE DEVIL

Here are a handful of rules the Puritans observed, breaking any could lead to a witchcraft accusation:

The strict observance of the Sabbath

No fire, No trading, No travelling, No adultery

No leading people to other Gods by prophecy or dreams

No getting raped

No planting more than one type of seed in a field

No touching a pig carcass

No wearing clothing made of more than one kind of cloth or fabric

No round haircuts

No braided hair

And definitely no suffering a witch to live

Did you do any of these things last Sunday? Then congratulations, you are guilty of practicsng witchcraft. You are hell bound, and will likely be hanged, burned, or left to rot in a filthy prison until you die.

During his previous tenure as Mayor of St Ives four years ago, Philip Pope and St Ives Town Council agreed to grant the Freedom of St Ives to 42 Engineer Regiment (Geographic) based at RAF Wyton. This was in recognition of the support that the regiment had given to St Ives for some time.

Unfortunately, the pandemic prevented the group from exercising the right to march through the town 'with bayonets fixed' until Jubilee Saturday, 4th June, when by appropriate good fortune Philip is serving again as Mayor.

As a member of the Royal British Legion Women's Section, Margaret was privileged to receive an invitation to the ceremony, which was pitch perfect, particularly because a number of the participants had only been in the service for a few weeks.

There was a sweet moment in a brief silence just as the ceremony began when a little girl caught sight of her father in his uniform and called loudly, "There's my daddy!". She was probably the proudest person in St Ives at that moment.

Whilst listening to Jeremy Sallis, Radio Cambridge on 6th June, he made an announcement that Frederick Lancaster, a WWII veteran, born in 1921, was to be cremated at 11.30am the next day, the only attendees were to be his next-door neighbour and the minister, Simon taking the service. I telephoned Alan Scott, Welfare Officer of Royal British Legion, St Ives, who immediately responded with, "We can't let this happen". Alan discovered that Private Lancaster had served in the Royal Army Medical Corps during the war, but Frederick had no surviving relatives in UK. Alan contacted local RBL Standard Bearers and members, and the Cambridge RAMC.

When Alice, Frederick's neighbour, her husband and Mum arrived at Cambridge Crematorium on 7th June, they were very surprised to see three RBL Standard Bearers, a RBL Biker, several RBL members, and members of 254 Medical Regiment, Cambridge waiting for them. Two of Frederick's Carers also joined us for the ceremony.

Unfortunately, one of the Standard Bearers could not stay, he had promised to attend another military funeral in Ely.
