## Joan, Queen of Scotland and Lord of the Manor of Fenstanton cum Hilton

Joan was the wife of Alexander II of Scotland, and sister of Henry III of England, she was also known as Joanna. She was born 22<sup>nd</sup> July 1210 and died 4<sup>th</sup> March 1238. She was the Queen consort of Scotland until her death. Joan was the eldest legitimate daughter and third child of King John of England and Countess Isabella of Angouleme. She was the sister of King Henry III and Lord of the manor of Fenstanton cum Hilton.



In 1209, before Joan was even born, there was a verbal agreement between her father, King John of England, and William the King of Scotland, that William's son Alexander would marry one of John's daughters. In 1212, when Joan was just two, a formal marriage treaty was drawn up agreeing the match with Alexander. Given the young age of the prospective bride and groom, there can have been no thought that the marriage would take place in the near future.

After King John's death in December 1217, Alexander II came to terms with the new king, Henry III. Alexander was allowed to keep the earldom of Huntingdon. It was agreed that the marriage of Alexander and Joan would take place and Alexander would be given 5,000 marks and Fotheringhay Castle. The wedding finally took place in York Minster on 19<sup>th</sup> June 1221. At that time Joan was not quite twelve years old and Alexander was twenty one. King Henry III attended the wedding and the royal dynasties of Scotland and England were united in the person of the queen, and a queen who had been born to a reigning king.

By October 1234 King Henry III had granted to Joan for life the manor of Fenstanton which included Hilton. Fenstanton was not a particularly valuable manor, but Henry granted Joan privileges (income from local taxes and tolls) that made it more lucrative, including provision to build a house here. The queen evidently did build herself a house, as in 1235 the king gave her twenty oaks and other timber from the Forests of Weybridge and Sapley (Huntingdon) for the purpose. The site of this house is possibly marked by the filled-in-moat at Grove House, Huntingdon Road. Although Miss Gerty Peet said that her research led her to think that the site was actually where Hall Green House now stands. Fenstanton would have been a convenient staging post on the Royal couple's regular journeys between Scotland and London.

Lords of the manor of Fenstanton did not live here in the village and the Manor House in Chequer Street would not have been the permanent home of any of the lords. Rather it would have been a 'nice' place for their steward to live but with luxury apartments just in case the Lord came by. Most of the aristocracy had numerous manors and the rents and taxes from them was their only form of income. They would have lived in their ancestral homes and rarely if ever visited all of their manors. In September 1236 the King also granted Queen Joan the much more valuable manor of Driffield in East Yorkshire for life, worth at least £72 annually.

Early in 1238 Joan was taken ill at Havering Atte Bower (Romford), a favourite royal residence, and on 4<sup>th</sup> March she died, still childless, cradled in her brother's arms (King Henry III). It is recorded that 'her death was grievous'. In her will, she requested that her final resting place. should be Tarrant Abbey, a Cistercian nunnery in Dorset, to which she left much land in Fenstanton and Hilton. Nothing now remains of this church; the last mention of it was before the Reformation. It is said that she is buried in a golden coffin in the graveyard. Joan left little mark for her passing through life, not even a tomb survives.

The estate Queen Joan granted to the abbey of Tarent, included lands in Fenstanton and Hilton. Shortly after the queen's death the abbess of Tarent, transferred these lands to the succeeding lord of the manor Stephen de Segrave.



Hilton Parish Council met on Monday 9th May at the Methodist Chapel, the first meeting of the new term and elected Peter Balicki as Chair and Graham Barradell as Vice Chair.

**HGV's through the Village**: Mick George and Joe Gossage of Mick George Transport gave a presentation regarding an initiative they have been launching across Cambridgeshire introducing a voluntary 20mph speed limit for their vehicles in small villages such as ours. While this is not a compulsory limit for all heavy goods vehicle operators, Mr George and Mr Gossage gave details of how they monitor their drivers and ensure that the reduced limit is respected. They do feel that other operators are taking notice of the signs in other villages this scheme is operating in.

It was discussed that the majority of villagers in Hilton would like to see a total HGV ban in the village and Mr George advised that he would completely support and fund such a proposal but commercially it had to be agreed by all the main operators using the B1040.

Hilton Parish Council will take this matter forward with the other main operators and Cambridgeshire County Council to establish if the other companies will join Mick George Transport in agreeing that there should be a total HGV ban in Hilton and then getting it approved. In the meantime the Parish Council will support the voluntary speed reduction initiative offered by Mr George and Mr Gossage in Hilton by applying to Cambridgeshire County Council for permission to erect blue 20mph speed limit signs.

#### **WEATHER WATCH**

For the third winter in succession mild weather prevailed and apart from a couple of days when light flurries occurred, there was no snow. Although temperatures in February were only slightly above normal, provisional figures suggest that the winter was the warmest on record in England and Wales, largely due to the extraordinary warmth throughout December.

February was a wet month across most of the UK, but our region was favoured with only around 0.75ins of rain. Our region was also one of the sunniest. Britain was not alone in experiencing mild conditions especially during February when, apart from Iceland, the whole of Europe and Western Russia was warmer than average, no more so than in Moscow which was 7C (12.6F) above normal. Apart from a couple of days at the end of February, east winds were again absent throughout the winter.

In contrast to the winter, March and April were colder and wetter than normal, due to winds from a northerly quarter predominating with frequent frosts, although these were not severe. The colder conditions slowed the advance of the growing season so that by the end of April, in terms of timing, Spring was broadly back to normal. The fickle nature of the weather in April was amply demonstrated during the last ten days of the month when northerly winds from the Arctic brought a reminder that winter had not quite departed. Interestingly, the second half of April often produces a cold spell coinciding with the hawthorn trees and hedgerows coming into blossom. Traditional folklore refers to this occurrence as the "blackthorn winter". As I am writing this article. the early days of May have brought a complete reversal of weather type, the northerly winds having been replaced by southerly breezes and a reminder that summer is on its way, with temperatures into the seventies. Some readers may recall that a very similar reversal in weather type occurred in 1975 when, after a generally cold Spring, early June brought snow which stopped play during a cricket match. Only to be followed a week later by heat wave conditions which lasted for much of the summer. Of course it is not unusual for warm conditions to occur in May, but it will be interesting to see what the rest of the month produces.

I will end as usual with some curios.

The winter just past brought severe flooding in parts of Britain. Fortunately no-one was killed. Historically, however, across the world floods have been the deadliest of all natural disasters, often accompanied by outbreaks of disease and famine due to destruction of crops and livestock. Two of the worst floods involved the Yellow River in China, where in 1931 an estimated 1-3 million people lost their lives and 8 years later, in 1939, another 800,000 people were killed. Events such as these do perhaps put Britain's floods into perspective.

On a lighter note, have you noticed how musicians and pop groups are influenced by the weather when naming their music. Examples include "Black Rain" by Ozzy Osborne, "Electrical Storm" by U2, "This is a Low" by Blur and "Blinded by Rainbows" by the Rolling Stones.

Talking of rainbows why not make up the drink "Lovely Rainbow"? It comprises Drambuie, orange juice, lemon juice, grenadine, and slice each of orange and lemon. Happy drinking!

**Spotted Flycatchers** - do you have this increasingly rare bird breeding in your garden?

Spotted Flycatchers are attractive little migrant birds, which are summer visitors to UK village gardens and churchyards. Although they breed with us, they spend ten months of the year travelling between here and their wintering grounds in Southern Africa. This is an increasingly dangerous journey for them, and sadly they are in deep decline. Widespread losses amounted to a 50% decline during 1995-2010, continuing an 88% decline since 1970.



Only some fifty pairs remain breeding in Cambridgeshire. So it's now quite a rare bird, but most rural villages still have a pair or two. The Cambridge Bird Club is running a survey



this year to find and monitor nesting pairs, and it's almost certain that there will be additional pairs in our villages of which they are not aware.

#### **Fen Drayton Lakes**

Less than half an hour from the busy city of Cambridge you can find Fen Drayton Lakes, a peaceful wetland reserve, nestled by the banks of the Great Ouse. Since being taken on by the RSPB in 2007, this old flooded sand and gravel quarry has been transformed into an oasis for wildlife – and for people.



These lakes are home to lots of amazing wildlife throughout the year. During these early summer months, the reserve is teeming with life. On the lakes you will be able to see downy cygnets and stripy-headed grebe chicks hitching a ride on their parents' backs. Look up and you could see marsh harriers soaring above the lakes and peer through the reeds to catch glimpses of stalking bitterns. By the river, you might see flashes of brilliant blue as kingfishers dive for food or even spy an elusive otter! On sunny days, the reserve is the perfect location for a waterside picnic, surrounded by dragonflies and butterflies.

But this reserve is not just for wildlife! We have 19 km (12 miles) of trails and paths for you to explore, some of which are accessible for pushchairs. Over the summer we will be running a variety of family activities including lake dipping, minibeast safaris, family nature trails, nocturnal nature walks and hands on activities. For grown-ups, we also run events such as our popular

dawn chorus walk and willow weaving workshops — using willow harvested here at the reserve! On selected weekends, the Polkadot Teashop will be open on the reserve, serving teas, coffees and delicious cakes! #### **Bountiful roses**

For many, the flower which conjures up summer more than any other is the rose, and it is no surprise that this quintessentially English flower frequently tops the list as the nation's favourite bloom. With a plethora of species and hybrids from which to choose, the gardener is spoilt for choice when selecting the ideal rose for their own garden. Not only are we faced with a range of colours from white and cream through to deep burgundy and shades of blue, but also with a choice of forms, ranging from vigorous bush to carpeting and climbing; scented; species or hybrid; traditional or modern; and fruit bearing or not.

There are many gardens which incorporate roses, all of which act as a source of inspiration for the gardener. While soaking up the spectacle and heady aroma of a

rose garden, how many of us pause to consider the origin of this popular flower? In our own Rose Garden here at the Botanic Garden, the display is arranged to present the complex history of the garden rose.

Much of the history and development of the rose was carried out here in the Garden by Charles Hurst in the 1930's. The Rose Garden was subsequently designed in the 1980's by the renowned horticulturist, Graham Stuart Thomas, to demonstrate Hurst's work. Starting with ancestral European roses, the beds chart the history of extensive hybridisation of European and Chinese species roses. These have given rise to many of the garden roses with which we are now so familiar.

Our Garden includes a diverse range of plants, from the European species such as *Rosa gallica*, through to Chinese introductions such as the impressive, mound-forming *R. soulieana*. R. 'Burgundy Ice' is a selection of a modern floribunda; 'Felicite et Perpetue', among others, represents the climbing roses; and 'Graham Thomas', provides an example of the modern English Rose. The Rose Garden, with its history, diversity of form, colour and season of interest, combined with herbaceous underplantings and heady scent, brings a reminder not only of the typical English country garden, but also of the valuable role of research and hybridisation in our gardens. Whatever your reason for including roses in the garden, now is the time to enjoy them at their best.




