SPEEDING THROUGH OUR VILLAGES.

Some motorists and truck drivers seem to take little notice of speed limits. Speeds of up to 50mph have been recorded in Hilton!

If a group of villages could agree to co-operate in a scheme in order to reduce the risks associated with excessive speeding, with one shared official camera, then they could help to keep our villages safer.

Suppose a group of, say, 6 villages in an area would purchase, and arrange to place, a yellow camera stand in each village (say on the existing speeding advice poles), then arrange with the police to allocate one camera to this group, the police could arrange to place the single camera in a different village each week,

Placing this camera say every week in different villages would not take up a lot of police time and speeding could be dealt with effectively.

Drivers would quickly learn to control their speed, as they adjust to the scheme, as a result of the random nature of the camera placements, so saving potential casualties.

UNDERSTANDING THE APPOINTMENT SYSTEM FOR SEEING A DOCTOR

In order to ensure that the doctors can see patients in a timely manner and appropriately we would like to take this opportunity of explaining our appointment system

Routine – non urgent appointments:

We are very lucky to usually be able to see patients within a few days 'routinely', these are pre-bookable appointments and are available for up to 6-8 weeks ahead if required.

You can request a routine telephone appointment if you think your problem can be dealt with without seeing the doctor.

You can also register to book routine appointments through our **online system** – you will need to ask at reception and provide 2 forms of ID - photo and address.

Urgent - on the day appointments:

A small amount of appointments are held which are released 'on the day' – these are for patients that need to be seen 'urgently' i.e. for something that cannot wait a few days for a routine appointment.

If there are no appointments left on the day for urgent problems you will be offered a phone call from the doctor. He will discuss the problem with you and advise when he would like to see you or give advice as necessary.

Reviews and results:

Please note that if the doctor asks to see you for a review or to discuss results then this will be a 'routine' appointment that can wait a few days, if the doctor considers it more urgent he will contact you, or ask a receptionist to contact you.

Please call the surgery to check for your results after 10am where possible:

Allow 3-4 days for blood results Allow 5-6 days for urine, swabs and stool results Allow 7-10 days for xray and ultrasound results

Local Weather Watch

When I ended my last article in early February, the prospect of a period of easterly winds, the first in the last four winters, ushering in an icy and potentially snowy spell, was in prospect. It turned out to be a very tame and short lived affair without even a frost. In fact, February produced only two air frosts as winter meandered to its close.

The only events of note in February were an exceptionally mild day on the 20th when the temperature reached 15.6C (60F) followed three days later by Storm "Doris" which crossed East Anglia bringing winds gusting to 60 mph. February brought to an end another mild winter. Apart from a few flakes of snow which did not settle, it was the fourth winter running devoid of snow. Frosts have also become much reduced in number and less severe than was previously the norm. According to the Met. Office last winter was the driest for 20 years, a consequence of high pressure systems dominating our weather during the past few months.

By the end of February, Spring had already started and continued through March to be at least 3 weeks early by the end of the month as it turned out to be the warmest March on record, equal with the one in 1910. On March 30th the temperature reached 21.5C (70.7F). The first half of April brought unprecedented warmth, peaking on the 9th with a temperature of 25.5C (78F) which was also recorded in Cambridge making it the warmest place in Britain and the warmest day of the year so far. However, by the Easter holiday temperatures had returned to normal and the last week of the month was cool with night frosts and some hail showers. The month was also very dry with less than half an inch of rain, making it the driest April for 10 years. The cool and dry conditions continued through the first week of May and there are no signs of any rain in prospect for several days making it a frustrating time for gardeners.

Part of my interest in the weather stems from the fact that it can change dramatically from day to day. This is often the case in May which arguably is the most fickle and unpredictable of all the months. Early heat waves ended by ferocious thunderstorms with hail and flash flooding, late frosts, the "Fen Blow" and even snow and tornadoes.

By way of examples, in mid May 1935, up to 15cm (6") of snow fell and temperatures dropped widely to -3C to -6C and even as low as -8.3C (17F) at Rickmansworth, Herts. In 1961 from 27-31 May damaging air frosts occurred with -6.7C (20F) recorded at Santon Downham in Norfolk. On 21 May1950 Britain's longest lasting tornado (2 1/2 hours) occurred as it tracked from Wendover in Buckinghamshire to Ely in Cambridgeshire, causing much damage in Linslade near Bedford, while a double-decker bus was overturned in Ely. It was accompanied by violent thunderstorms and hailstones 5cm (2") in size. In 1955, 4th to 5th possibly the most severe "Fen Blow" of the 20th century occurred with winds gusting to 65 mph widely eroding the soil across the fields of East Anglia., destroying crops and reducing visibility to 200 metres or less.

To finish on a light-hearted note, why not try the weather named cocktail "Lovely Rainbow". It comprises drambuie, orange juice, lemon juice, grenadine, a slice of orange and a slice of lemon. For a real rainbow to occur the angle of light refraction needs to be 42 degrees from the eye of the observer.

Celebrating 20 years of the Farmland at Denny at Denny



This year marks the 20th anniversary of the Farmland Museum opening to the public at Denny and taking over the day to day management of Denny Abbey on behalf of English Heritage.

To mark the occasion the staff and volunteers at the Farmland Museum have refurbished one of the display rooms that was previously part of the Pig Shed complex.

The new display tells the remarkable story of the founders of the museum, the Delanoy family, and how the museum originated in the village of Haddenham, Cambridgeshire in 1969.

The family led by son Craig collected craft tools and agricultural machinery at a time when such items were being thrown away or broken up for scrap.

The museum eventually became a registered charity and is now run by a board of trustees. The Delanoys retired in 1992 and eventually this significant museum found a new home at Denny.

The Farmland Museum is now a lively place to visit, ideal for families and groups of friends but equally great for people visiting alone.

The museum opens for 2017 on Saturday 1st April and will be open daily until Sunday29th October.



How do plants recognise seasons?

June is the height of the summer when we enjoy our gardens in full bloom. But how do plants know when it's their turn to perform? Work from plant scientists around the world is starting to decipher the code that plants use to sense the season. They have discovered how plants use day-length as an indicator to tell them what the season is. Impending spring is marked by two major changes: increasing day-

length and warmer temperatures. It turns out that plants have elaborate mechanisms to sense both of these. Longer days in many plants cause the expression of genes that accelerate budburst and flowering. In this way, plants use day-length as an indicator that summer is coming.

In recent decades, many plants have also started to flower earlier in the year. While day-length has not changed, it is getting warmer. For example, globally 16 of the 17 warmest years have occurred since 2001. Plants have detected this, and many plants have flowered weeks or even months in advance. This is because plants have an intricate mechanism for sensing temperature.

Plant scientists at the Sainsbury Laboratory Cambridge University (SLCU), based in the Botanic Garden, have been working with international collaborators to show that the molecule plants use to respond to light during the day, also senses temperature at night. In this way, the light sensor, called a phytochrome, moonlights during the night playing a separate role. By changing the activity of the phytochromes, the scientists have been able to change how a plant responds to temperature. This research will help them understand a long-standing question

in biology, how do plants know the calendar and in time, may help them breed climate change resilient crop plants.

In his talk, *How do plants recognise seasons*, plant scientist Phil Wigge, from SLCU will be explaining more about this research as part of the Botanic Garden's 'Science on Sundays' series. This is a 'drop-in' talk, 23 July at 11am and repeated at 2pm at Cambridge University Botanic Garden.

Death of Mr Arthur Coote: Extracted from the Hunts Post 30th September 1906:

It is with profound regret that Huntingdonshire people

heard of the death of Mr Arthur Coote, eldest surviving son of the late Mr Thomas Coote of Oaklands, Fenstanton, in the accident to the Scottish express train at midnight on Friday. Mr Coote was travelling to Glasgow to be present at the launching of the battleship 'Agamemnon', for which his firm had supplied the engines.

He was the only first-class passenger on the train and was sitting in what is known as a coupe compartment at the end of the composite couch which provided all the accommodation for passengers on the train. He appears to have been sitting in the corner of the compartment and a fish van which came next to the train becoming derailed, came into contact with the bridge and was hurled back on to the passenger coach, completely demolishing the corner in which Mr Coote sat.

He was practically forced through into the next compartment, receiving terrible injuries and there is not the slightest doubt that death was absolutely instantaneous. His son Mr Arthur Coote Jun, was staying at the Central Hotel, Glasgow and was waiting for his father's arrival when the accident happened. Mr Coote was the fourth son of the late Mr Thomas Coote and was 64 years of age.

As related to Miss Peet on the 17th March 1922

Mrs Perry lived in one of the Alms Houses that once were town property and were inhabited by widows of the village. They stood facing the clock tower. When trains first commenced running from St Ives to London, she was taken with a friend to London to see her daughter. After sitting in the train some time, she said to her companion "Oh dear, it's a long time before we start, (from St Ives station) let's get out and walk on, they can overtake us and we will get in again". To her surprise she was told the train had travelled some distance.

The Cambridge Independent Press; Friday October 13th 1899. On Thursday the 5th October at midday an accident occurred at the St Ives station. It appears that Mr A Behagg of Fenstanton, with his wife and family were in a saloon *en route* for Hastings and through some means the saloon came into contact with the buffers, which threw all the occupants on the floor and injured Mrs Behagg on the hand and face. None of the others received injury, but all were much shaken. The party, after a short stay, proceeded on their journey, first telegraphing for a doctor to attend Mrs Behagg at Cambridge station.

The death of Mr Alfred Behagg: The Cambridge Independent Press; Friday 17th December 1915. We regret to record the somewhat sudden death of Mr Alfred Behagg, of Hall Green, Fenstanton on Thursday afternoon. Mr Behagg was a London Merchant and went to town by the 8.15 train as normal on Tuesday, morning. When he returned at night he complained of not feeling well and was unable to make his usual journey on Wednesday morning. Mr Behagg was a hale and hearty gentleman and the news of his death came as a shock to the village.


