

Fenstanton History By John Deeks Fenstanton in WW2, Part 1: The Village

Recently whilst researching in the Huntingdon archives I came across the minute book for the Fenstanton parish council WW2 victory celebrations committee. This intrigued me so I took a copy and decided that an essay on the victory celebrations may be of interest to today's residents. Whilst thinking about what to write it morphed into something bigger. I will start with Fenstanton village in WW2. Where I write about local people in this period, I have left out actual names as many of their descendants still live in the village.

As we are now 74-years away from the end of WW2, there are no longer any people alive who lived through that conflict as an adult. There are a few indigenous villagers who were



children through WW2, but by their very nature their memories are through the eyes of a child. Fortunately over the years I have made notes of comments by these people of their childhood in WW2 and these have been incorporated in this essay. The village has been described to me as a very small place with only three important roads, Chequer Street, Bell Lane and the High Street.

In 1939 the government carried out a national census to enable identification cards and ration cards to be issued. Working through this census for Fenstanton it is apparent that the vast majority of men worked the land in one way or another. As the country had to be fed many of these men were awarded reserved occupation status, meaning that they were too valuable to be sent to the military.

I have been unable to find any reference to our village in WW2 in the archives of the British Newspapers Online, the Norris Museum or the Huntingdon archives. So, unless there are written memories or diaries still being held by family, I have to conclude that there are no records, recollections or diaries for me to refer to. Even Jack Dady in his book Beyond Yesterday makes no mention of either of the world wars.

Until the first bypass was built in 1965, Fenstanton high street was the main road from Cambridge to Huntingdon and the military bases beyond; it was always full of traffic. This was especially so when in 1942 the USA joined in the war and built so many airbases in Huntingdonshire. Everything that was needed at these American bases and also the British bases had to pass through Fenstanton high street. The one common memory that all the village children have is of the American troops driving through the high street throwing sweets and gum to the children. No sweet rationing for them!

Effectively there was little war time rationing in Fenstanton. Sugar, coffee and other essentials were always available from the US Air Force servicemen who were billeted around the village. Our village Ministry of Supply food officer, obviously took his work very seriously as a local man was sent to prison for killing a bullock without the food officers permission! Meat was never in short supply especially rabbits which men would go out into the fens to trap. One villager told me that his father was never without his shotgun.

In WW2 Fenstanton was a very busy place. The village hall and the church hall (which at that time was in Talls Lane) were taken over for military use. The Constitutional Club was taken over by the government and was used as an assembly plant making armatures for military vehicles. The Congregational chapel, manse, and the manor house in Chequer Street were taken over for use by the women's land army.

The Tudor Hotel was used to accommodate military officers as were many of the houses including Swan cottage. And of course Fenstanton had its share of evacuees. These children were dotted about the village including Fenstanton Manor, the Lindens and most of the local farms. I will write more about these evacuees in a later essay.

The home guard made use of a wooden hut that used to be beside the George pub (now the entrance to the car park). This was also used by the army cadets and various war time committees including the invasion committee. The invasion committee consisted of people from the parish council, police, ARP, first aiders, schoolmaster, food officer, home guard and military representative.

The home guard was made up of local farmers and their employees who were in reserved occupation, also those too old or too young to be called up for military service. One particular village resident who was in a reserved occupation joined the Home Guard and served throughout the war. When the Home Guard was disbanded in 1944, he was invited to take part in the passing out parade in London in front of King George VI.

Apparently part of the 3rd division of the Australian army (around eight hundred men) was based in the village in readiness for the D-day landings. Nissan huts were built on the paddock between Chequer Street and Talls Lane and the division was self-contained with its own cookhouse. Today this is where the houses in Chequer's Close were built. The Australian soldiers would pass tins of fruit to the local children which helped out with rationing.

A local story is of tanks being driven down the High Street, along Huntingdon Road to the old bridge in St Ives, on their way to St Ives railway station. One of these tanks damaged the bridge and the town fathers' banned any further use of the bridge. The army being the army, they drove the tanks down Low Road to the bend by the waterworks. Then across the field to the river and simply drove the tanks through the river and on to the railway station!

In WW2 horses were an important part of agricultural life. I have been told that there were at least 150 large working horses in the village throughout the war. There were a couple of horse dealers in the village and their work continued despite the war. During this time, all sold horses were transported by rail from St lves railway station. The police would close all the local roads and the horses would be driven along London Road, over the chapel bridge and then to Station Road. After the war many local horses were deemed to be of no further use so were slaughtered for food by two local families.

Although the parish church has a roll of honour listing the names of men from the village who served in WW1, there does not appear to be such a register for WW2. We did lose three of our young men, Leslie Galbally, REME, died 1944, Ronald Knights, RA, died 1941 and Frank Lander, RA, died 1943. Their stories can be found in my book 'The Fallen Soldiers of Fenstanton'. Their names appear on the village war memorial and are remembered every November.

Local Weather Watch

Are you wondering when the drought will end? Since it started at the beginning of June last year, during the last eleven months there has only been 13.5 inches (342 mm) of measurable rain in Hilton. This compares with an average annual total of 22 inches (558 mm). It has certainly been a trying time for farmers and gardeners.

When I concluded my last article in early February there were few signs that we were about to experience a period of exceptionally mild conditions making it the mildest February on record. The unprecedented mildness was clue to a prolonged period of very gentle southerly winds flowing around an almost stationary area of high pressure sitting over central and southern Europe. New highest winter temperature records were established across the U.K. the highest being 20.2C (70.2F) at Kew. The highest I recorded was 17.2C (63F). Most unusually for a winter month the sun shone every day and there were 11 days when there was unbroken sunshine from dawn to dusk. The combination of warmth and copious sunshine prompted the onset of Spring 5 to 6 weeks early.

After a winter of largely benign conditions, March certainly came in like a lion as a very stormy spell of weather occurred during the first half of the month as storms Freya and Gareth crossed the U.K. The resultant rains produced a total close to average for the month. Thereafter the second half of March was settled and dry and generally mild with a few warm days at the months end, on one of which the temperature reached 17C (62.8F). With high pressure having reasserted itself March drew to a close like a lamb. There were no air frosts during the month.

As April started, Spring's advance was slowed somewhat as easterly winds flowing round a high-pressure system over Scandinavia brought two weeks of rather cold dry weather with some sharp night frosts which nipped trees in blossom and tender plants. The month produced 5 air frosts and a further 4 ground frosts. With an average minimum temperature for the month of 3.2C (37.8C) this was almost 2C lower than that which occurred in March. As the highpressure area shifted, the supply of cold air was cut off and the second half of April was mostly warm, dry and sunny, the warmth reaching its peak over Easter when the temperature on Easter Monday reached 24.3C (75.8F). A change occurred on the 27th as storm Hannah crossed Britain, the strength of wind being its main feature with only a small amount of rain in our region. The month as a whole was very dry with only 0.36 of an inch (9.4 mm) being recorded.

A pleasantly warm day marked the start of May, but this was quickly replaced by a surge of polar air which brought cold conditions over the May Day Bank Holiday weekend with stinging showers of rain and hail. Last year a new record for the warmest May Day Bank Holiday was set, when 29.2 C (84.5F) was recorded at Northolt, London. Records commenced in 1978. This year provisionally a new coldest record was set, 11C (52F) being the highest temperature recorded over the three days. Such is the capricious nature of our Springtime.

Fenstanton and Hilton Primary School

It has been an extremely busy and important year for us at Fenstanton and Hilton Primary School. We are still, very much a school on a journey. Since our Ofsted judgement of Requires Improvement in October 2017 there has been lots of, much needed change.



As a school we have focused on making every minute count in school, we use every second possible to embed the learning that the children need. We have introduced phrases such as 'Expect the Best' and 'Try, don't cry'. These encourage the children to become more resilient towards their learning and to create a culture of perseverance and high self-esteem.

We have listened to our stakeholders. They wanted better communication so now receive a weekly newsletter from me, plus weekly learning updates from their teachers. They wanted to be more involved in their children's learning so this year we have introduced 'Meet the Teacher' evenings in September and 'Family Learning Cafes' where families are invited to come into school and partake in an activity with

their child.

As a school we have worked hard on the leadership of the curriculum, which we continue to improve and make as meaningful as possible for our children. University Afternoons on a Friday encourage children to try a new skill and learn something in a practical and fun way. This year we have had University Sessions ranging from Gardening to Sculpture, Learning an instrument to Yoga. These sessions have been designed to involve the community too so if you would like to come into school and talk to the children about your trade then please contact the office.

Our Values continue to be embedded; they are Respect, Honesty, Kindness and Collaboration. If you ask any child in school, they will be able to tell you how they are living their lives by them.

Our grounds have had an overhaul with a new outdoor classroom which is used as an outdoor library. 105 saplings were planted in March and are thriving. We now have a designated Forest Area that the children use for Forest School learning; Two bright murals that display our school values; a pond that is nurturing lots of wildlife and is used for Science learning; two brand new gates that have improved our safeguarding; and a beautiful



sculpture at the front of school that was made by the children from plastic bottles.

May is assessment time in school, everyone has worked extremely hard to get the children to where they need to be in order for our data to reflect the excellent practice that is now happening in school. Our fate will be sealed with the Key Stage 2 SATS which take place mid May. Whatever happens going forward, I am now confident that we provide an excellent springboard for our children. We are creating kind individuals who are tolerant of others and embrace learning. Surely, that is what primary school is all about.


Latest news from Fenstanton Parish Council

Fen cycleway - the results are in!

Thank you to everyone who completed the Fen Cycleway Survey. We have had a total of 163 responses (at the time of writing).

Of these:

- 76% approve
- 16% disapprove



We also looked at whether Fenstanton residents would use the cycleway, if built, and whether there would be an increase in the numbers using the Fen:

80% of those who responded would use a new cycleway— at the moment 57% have cycled on the Fen during the last 6 months.

Overall, 66% of respondents expect their usage of the Fen to increase if the cycleway is built.

Whilst the majority are supportive, there were concerns around the potential dangers to other users around speeding cyclists and losing the integrity of the Fen, in particular. These will be considered seriously in any subsequent feasibility and planning stages - with further consultation with village residents.

What a difference a year makes

The last financial year, up to 31st March was a busy year for your Parish Council.

In addition to the 'business as usual' activities, your Parish Council has also made significant improvements around the village.

Main achievements included:

- Created and built the Pitfield Play area
- Improved the Chequer Street Play area



- Installed additional bins and seating (with more to come)
- Created additional space in the church graveyard for up to 17 new plots.

Meet your Parish Council Chairman - Paul Kent




