
#### Cambridge Open Studios is back in Hilton this July!



#### Strawberry Hill - June 2023

It has become a brilliant place for wildlife with birds such as nightingale, willow warbler, garden warbler and turtle dove.

#### Kings Dyke - July 2023

The Huntingdonshire Local Group of the Wildlife Trust invites you to join our guided walk at Kings Dyke Nature Reserve on Sunday 16th July at 10.30 am. This walk will be led by Sarah Lambert, who is a freelance ecologist based in the Peterborough area. She has a particular interest in botany and photography.

This 'brownfield' site is an old clay pit, which closed in the 1970s and was finally restored in 1995. It demonstrates how industrial land can be transformed to benefit both wildlife and the community. At this time of year we hope to see many invertebrates such as butterflies and dragonflies and also some of the 263 plant species, including 10 species of stonewort for which this site is nationally important.



## Lancelot 'Capability' Brown 1716-1783: Lord of the manor of Fenstanton cum Hilton 1767 – 1783. By John Deeks

Lancelot Brown was arguably Britain's foremost landscape designer with over 200 commissions to his name, many still in evidence today. The name 'Capability' Brown came about because he was apt to inform clients of the 'capability' of their land for landscaping and agriculture, although no one would have used the word Capability to his face. In this essay we are not going to look at Brown, the landscape gardener, but Brown the lord of the manor and his daughter. In the summer of 1767, the Earl of Northampton sold him the Manor of Fenstanton, at the favorable price of £13,000 (about £750,000 today). So, why did Lancelot Brown buy the manor of Fenstanton, what was the attraction?

Brown was very good at building advantageous relationships with his clients and he was always welcomed to stay in their big houses throughout his visits. We have to consider Brown's self-confessed twenty-five years' of happiness at Burghley House, where he spent his time working on the estate and the house. Burley House was just the kind of great-house community where he was welcomed whether he was working there or just passing by! And he knew that everything that could happen would be treated with discretion! In 1756 whilst on one of his many visits to Burley House, he fathered a girl child who was named Mary Elizabeth. There are no records of the mother of the child, be she a servant or one of the family or a house guest. He was in Cambridgeshire a great deal and the existence of Mary Elizabeth as a sturdy and appealing child in need of a secure future surely becomes a powerful reason for his purchase of the Fenstanton estate which has always seemed an illogical enterprise considering his countrywide travels.

Fenstanton, conveniently placed between Cambridge and Burghley House, was well away from his home at Hampton Court and the London gossips. Also it was well away from his wife and children, whom he would not have wanted to hurt for the world. And, yes, Fenstanton was always his secret; it seems more likely that his wife never visited Fenstanton until she was brought here in her coffin.

Mary Elizabeth married Peter Cowling junior but there is no record of this marriage in the United Kingdom marriage registers. It is possible that they married abroad. Mary Elizabeth lived to be 90; she died in December 1846. Her husband Peter Cowling died in 1824. Mary Elizabeth Cowling was a widow for twenty-one years living with her son the Rev. Peter Lancelot Cowling, MA.

Even though Brown owned the manor of Fenstanton cum Hilton he did not make his home here, after all, his wife knew nothing of his life away from their home. Indeed none of the Brown family ever lived in the Manor House. However, it is more than likely that when Brown was visiting his estate and enjoyed time with his daughter he would have stayed in the manor house! So we can say with some certainty that the present owners of the manor house are sleeping where Lancelot Brown slept. As Lord of the Manor he was brought here to be buried in his churchyard. His funeral took place on Sunday February 16<sup>th</sup> 1783. But where is he buried? No one seems to know for sure. Just below the memorial to the Brown family there is a slab with the words "Mr Cowling vault door". It is just possible that the Brown and Cowling families shared the same vault in the church. The only way that we will know for sure is if the Brown memorial is moved for renovation, and we open the vault door and have a look!

Mr Inskip Ladds was the church architect for Fenstanton in or around 1910 and he was much in tune with local life, the Cowlings' niece, Mary Ann Cowling had only died twenty five or so years before, well within living memory and local memory informed him that Mary Elizabeth Cowling was Lancelot Brown's natural daughter. Thus the connection between the Cowlings and Browns, who were possibly buried together in their vault beneath Fenstanton chancel, is explained.

Sometime in the future when the Brown memorial has to be renovated, then and only then could the vault door be exposed, opened and the contents explored. However, there may be a problem with this. In 1939 the parish church applied for permission to install a new central heating system which was approved. When excavating for the new boiler house a number of coffins were found under the church floor. The coffins were in reasonably good order but the brass name plates were badly corroded. Permission was granted for these to be reburied in the church yard but no one thought to make a note of exactly where. It is more than likely that these coffins were of Lancelot Brown, his wife Bridget, Peter and Mary Elizabeth Cowling

#### Vandalism in the Village

Your Parish Council is disappointed to report that over the past few months there has been a spate of Vandalism within the Village. This includes graffiti, damage to sports equipment, children's play equipment and damage inside the Church. Not only is this upsetting and disappointing to see, but it costs your Parish Council and ultimately the residents of Fenstanton money to clean, repair or replace items that have been damaged in this way.

If you see any suspicious behaviour, please report this to your clerk and the Police via the 101 phone number.

## An update from Fen Drayton Lakes



Bee Orchid in bloom - Henry Cook

The summer is a time of riotous profusions of wildflowers. Various hues ranging from delicate pastels to evecatching vivid colours pepper the landscape. Here at Fen Drayton Lakes, there are lots of flourishing places to observe the spectacle of colour. This article will cover a few of the better places to go searching and what to look out

For a brief window of time, the wetland margins on Ferry Lagoon can be a vision of purple created by Purple Loosestrife. This is a tall plant that likes to grow in damp soil and is a favourite of pollinating insects because the flower stem is a collection of many hundreds of smaller flowers offering lots of nectar. Set against fresh green reeds, this colour combination really is something to be seen in person.

The busway through the reserve creates a connection not just for people but for flowers. The banks of the busway were seeded when completed and June and July are peak times for the Ox-eye Daisies and Hedge Bedstraw which grow here in abundance. Both have white flowers but look out for the yellow centres to the daisies. Many other wildflowers also grow here such as the yellow Lady's Bedstraw and lilac Field Scabious. The long continuous banks allow seeds to spread over time, helping to maintain the diversity of species.

Perhaps the pinnacle of plants at the reserve is the rare sight of a Bee Orchid. They seem to pop up in different places every year and are rather small, so seeing them in amongst other flowers and grasses is a real botanical challenge. The Bee Orchid is a mimic, whereby the flower impersonates a female bee. This lures male bees to fly in and pollinate the flower. However, there's a twist in this story. The specific bee that does this behaviour is not present in the UK and the orchid must self-pollinate instead. Nature is often more complicated than it first appears!

Why not come to the reserve and take in the seasonal display put on by the wildflowers.

## Report from the Annual Meeting of the Council dated Monday 15<sup>th</sup> May

#### Chairman and Vice-Chairman

Cllr Peter Balicki was elected as Chairman and Cllr Ett McCarthy was elected as Vice-Chairman for the forthcoming year.

#### Dredging

The Council has authorised expenditure to remove the dredged material from the Wilderness. This will not be able to take place until the ground is drier.

#### Policies and Procedures

As this was the annual meeting of the Council, it reviewed all of its policies and procedures.

#### Bench

The Council resolved to place the spare Barton bench to replace the bench to the right of the Pavilion.





#### Croquet

The Council reviewed the expenditure for the mowing of the cricket pitch to make it suitable for Croquet. The Council is looking for a volunteer to carry out this work.

#### Town Trust Representative

Rachel Lawton was reappointed as the Council's representative to the Town Trust.

#### **AGAR**

The Council approved the Annual Governance and Accountability Review, which will be published on the website.

#### Pavilion

The Council resolved to instruct the Clerk to apply for the FCC Communities Grant using the specification 1 quote.

#### Health Grant

The proposal is to run Cricket East's All Stars (5-8yrs) and Dynamo's (8-11yrs) for 8 weeks in June and July. This is dependent on coach availability. Advice has been received about cricket nets and roll on cricket nets (cost approx. £1000) are not the best solution for Hilton as there is nowhere to store them between uses or over winter and they would deteriorate or become damaged. The recommendation is for Feed Buddy pop up nets which could be stored inside the pavilion. These are £250 each and the recommendation is to purchase two, which will allow additional budget for other parts of the grant.

A cookery workshop is being planned for Saturday 24th June. It will focus on plant-based cookery on a budget and will suit both families and individuals. Depending on the uptake and success, a series of workshops is possible.
