FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL meeting - February 11th

Police report: During the month of, December the latest information available, the following crimes and incidents were reported: 5 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 2 incidents of burglary; 1 incident of other theft.

Parishioners are reminded to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour to the Police telephone 101, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

Dog Fouling: The Parish Council has received further complaints concerning dog fouling in the Village. The issue was raised in the last edition of Spectrum but again the Parish Council would remind those owners who do not clean up or allow their dogs to run free that they are committing an offence under the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005.

Electoral Review of Huntingdonshire: The Local Government Boundary Commission for England has formally commenced an electoral review of Huntingdonshire District Council.

The Commission is to carry out the review to deliver electoral equality for voters across the Huntingdonshire District. At present, some District Councillors represent many more, or many fewer, electors than their colleagues elsewhere in the District.

A six week public consultation commenced on 26th January, during which the Commission is inviting proposals for new warding arrangements. The consultation closes on 4th April. The Parish Council will consider the matter at the March meeting and will reply to the consultation thereafter. Full information can be found at <u>www.lgbce.org.uk</u>.

Provision of defibrillators: The Parish Council has agreed to investigate the possibility of providing defibrillators in the Parish. There are a number of aspects that must be considered including the most suitable equipment, costs and suitable locations.

WEATHER WATCH

What a crazy winter it has been so far. I suspect that few of us would have imagined that, when the wind changed to south-westerly for the last week in October, this was to herald the start of ten weeks of virtually unbroken exceptionally mild, and in some parts of the UK exceptionally wet weather. The pattern was interrupted briefly by a three day Arctic blast in late November, which brought the first air frost of the winter on the 21st. In normal years winter is marked by the cessation of growth starting with three consecutive days when the temperature fails to exceed 5C (41F). In fact this almost happened during the short cold snap. However, as was subsequently experienced, the extreme mildness which followed threw natures pattern into confusion with daffodils flowering by Christmas and some trees coming into blossom in December!

The mildness in December was exceptional. There was not a single ground or air frost during that month, with unbroken southerly or south-westerly winds throughout. Overall temperatures were 5C (9F) above normal making it the warmest December on record for well over 100 years, possibly going back to 1659 and easily beating the previous mildest years of 1934 and 1974. The average night time temperature was only a point of a degree lower than that in June 2015, incredible when one remembers one is comparing the two months with the longest and shortest nights! Whilst there were unprecedented floods in some parts of the UK, rainfall in our part of the country was around or even a bit below average!

Some commentators have argued that the mild weather is at least partly due to the El Nino effect on the world's climate. It is worth noting however, that when the previous El Nino occurred, in 2010, Britain experienced its coldest December on record, so it would seem that the impact of this phenomenon on global weather, is still not fully understood.

At the time I sent my last article to Spectrum, autumn had been benign. With the benefit of hindsight this was clearly tempting fate, as both November and December brought a series of fierce storms which the Met. Office decided to give names as they do in the United States.

It was not until the "winter" reached mid-January that we experienced a colder spell which finally brought a period of a week when temperatures kept below 5C (41F), and there were a couple of nights with sharp frosts when the temperature fell to -4C (25F). The mild weather has since returned as I conclude this article at the end of January.

I will finish as usual with a couple of curios, both of which relate to the wind.

As we know, this winter has so far produced seven major storms, the latest being "Gertrude" which produced winds of just over 100mph in Shetland, on 29th January. However this figure pales when compared with the holder of the world's highest wind speed of 230mph at Mount Washington, USA on 20th March 1986. Even more incredible, during a tornado which tracked through Wichita Falls, Texas on 2nd April 1958, its wind strength reached 280mph.

Finally, around the world some winds are given unusual names. For example there is a wind called the "Loo" which is a hot dry wind which precedes the monsoon in Pakistan and North India. Then there is the Willy-willy which is a tropical cyclone of hurricane force in Australia, and lastly in Britain how about the Cats Nose - a cool north-westerly wind. *Patrick Landucci*

OAKLANDS HOUSE - PART - TWO:

Extracts from the life and times of Oaklands House and the Coote family



In 1840 Thomas Coote came to live in Oaklands House and immediately took an interest in Fenstanton village life. In particular he took a great interest in the village school. At that time a Miss Munns was a pupil teacher and showed exceptional ability, indeed so much so that Tomas encouraged

her to go on to a larger school in London and he obtained a position for her there. She turned out to be a great success and educated herself in modern languages becoming singularly proficient in French. Ultimately, the celebrated Russian Minister Count Vladimir, asked the Russian Ambassador in London to obtain a suitable lady to teach his young daughters English and generally overlook their education. French was the chosen language of the Russian Aristocracy.

The Ambassador applied to the London School Authority and they recommended Miss Munns. Accordingly she went to Russia. The Vladimirs became greatly attached to her and several of the young Grand Dukes were sent to her for English lessons. For some reason or other she did not return to England when the Crimean War started, but remained in Russia, finally retiring about 1880 on an ample pension.

She would come to Fenstanton from time to time and stay a few days at Oaklands and look round the old village. She always spoke in the highest terms of her Russian patrons and pupils. She would say, such was their consideration and politeness, that they never mentioned the war in her presence, either to her personally or among themselves when she was there.

Although a nonconformist, Thomas Coote was, by virtue of the property that he owned, the Lay Rector and was always on good terms with the Vicar. The only duty connected with his office consisted of insuring the chancel and seeing that it was kept in proper repair. He succeeded, in getting the Vicar to deal with the question of the village school.

There were two schools in the village at that time, the church school, which had the building but few children and the nonconformist school, which had the majority of the children but a very poor building. The Vicar and Thomas Coote came to an understanding and the two schools amalgamated, the stipulation being that the schoolmaster must be a churchman but there was to be no sectarian teaching.

Mrs Orage, the widow of a Yorkshire nonconformist minister lived in Fenstanton with her three children. She earned a tough living by taking in washing. All three children attended the school and the eldest named Alfred was particularly gifted. One day Mrs Orage came to see Thomas Coote and asked for a job for Alfred as she could no longer afford to keep him at school. Thomas and his son Howard Coote and the schoolmaster all agreed it would be a pity to try to make a ploughboy of Alfred, so it was arranged to pay Mrs Orage a small weekly sum to keep the boy at school.

Alfred was a frequent visitor to Oaklands House where he was given the run of the library and here he was introduced to Ruskin, Matthew Arnold, Carlyle and Herbert Spencer. He became a most successful pupil teacher and later Thomas Coote obtained for him a good job under the Leeds School Board.

FENSTANTON FOOTPATHS

I confess I've been putting this article off. The prospect of walking the parish footpaths during the winter we've been having did not appeal. However I ventured out on a bright afternoon just before St Valentine's Day and walked a good cross-section of our paths. I was pleasantly surprised to find that they were not as bad as might be expected. Even the riverside path was fairly easy going although a bit sticky in places. The worst area I came across was on Fen Lane not far beyond the last houses where water was standing in large puddles. It was not too difficult to pick a way through and the going gets better as you continue on down the Fen to the guided busway.

There did not seem to be much birdlife around apart from geese which were numerous, particularly on the south side of the A14 where I saw a huge flock of a hundred or more greylag geese grazing in the field adjacent to FP 7*. I was also amused by an incident on the river where a small group of Canada geese was swimming in tight formation around two interlopers which I think were Egyptian geese. These two finally beat a retreat to the far bank and it seemed this was definitely a case of unwelcome visitors being firmly but politely escorted off the premises. By another lucky chance I had a good sighting of a barn owl hunting alongside the busway not far from the end of Fen Lane. I watched it for several minutes as it went about its business oblivious of passing buses. It's nice to know that there are a few around still and it certainly made my walk worthwhile.

Fenstanton Capability Brown 300 Festival

How the Manor of Fenstanton & Hilton was exchanged for taste!

Lancelot's appointment as Master Gardener at Hampton Court was announced in the summer of 1764. He was 48, increasingly successful, and his gross annual income was about £6,000 from fees, though as much as half may have been disbursed to his foremen, who employed local labour. He now found himself with an additional annual pension of £2,000, which was paid quarterly by the Treasury without fail until the end of his life.

He wrote to Lord Northampton in July 1766 regarding the sale of the Huntingdon estate: "If no other person is in treaty with your Lordship I shall be glad to have refusal of it, your Lordship shall have very little trouble with me upon it. I shall give immediate answer as soon as I know the conditions and have looked it over".

He was as good as his word and paid the earl £13,000 in two instalments, allowing a deduction of some £1500 for work done at Castle Ashby. All was completed in summer 1767, the earl writing on his copy of the deed: "I take the Manor of Fen Stanton to belong to Lawrence Brown Esq. who gave Lord Northampton Taste in exchange for it".

The above is a short extract from a booklet entitled "Lancelot Brown Cambridgeshire Connections" by Jane Brown who has also written a book on Brown entitled "The Omnipotent Magician". Jane lives in the area and has kindly agreed to come and give us a talk on April 14th based around Brown's local connections.

MARCH BULLETIN FROM CAMBRIDGESHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE

Our first match against Hilton Ladies was a complete disaster. We were all out for 11 runs and Hilton, a well practiced, keen side, won easily. We went on to play other teams - eventually beating Hilton Ladies with a bit of luck and help from the umpire!

We stayed together as a team for two seasons and had a lot of fun on the way, eventually other commitments came along and we went our separate ways.

Sadly Fenstanton Cricket Club is no more, the pitch is overgrown and the pavilion neglected and abandoned. In 1963 cricket wasn't just a game – it was a way of life, an interrupted conversation on the field, a social club in the pavilion, a focus for the community, a world full of stories, memories and characters, a reason to travel and meet people. It had a big role in making us what we are. Sad that our grandchildren will never know it.


On February 6th we had a very special workshop when Rosie Hughes came to talk about and demonstrate to us the posies she makes for the ceremony of the Queen presenting Maundy money to nominated people in cathedrals including Ely, Westminster and this year St George's Chapel Windsor. Rosie has a Royal Warrant to make these posies which are approved by the Queen and have to conform to tradition. She used vellow, white and mauve flowers and ivv leaves which must all be the same size and held in place by fifteen doilies glued together to keep the posies in shape. They were originally carried to ward off offensive smells but are now purely decorative. She also brought some Maundy money which is very small and made of silver. A very good workshop given by a very modest lady.

At our meeting on February 8th our President reminded us of the passing of Doreen Prescott. We had a one minute silence and then sang Jerusalem in her memory. After the business was concluded we were given a wonderful digital picture display of birds and animals found in Florida and Wyoming in the USA. CAMBRIDGE BOTANIC GARDENS

Chocolate unwrapped

With Easter fast approaching, so to is the opportunity to indulge in a chocolate egg or two. Chocolate is a such a familiar part of our diets, that it seems surprising to think that its origins lie many thousands of miles away in the tropical forests of Mexico and the Amazon basin. Chocolate is made from the roasted and ground seeds of *Theobroma cacao*, an understorey tree, domesticated by the meso-americans as early as 1900BC. Originally it would have been consumed as a bitter, fermented beverage, rather than the sweet solid we are familiar with today.

At the Garden, *Theobroma cacao* can be found in the Main Tropics, a two metre shrub in the shady understorey of the canopy. If you look carefully you will see tiny flowers, borne directly from its woody stems. These are pollinated by midges. From this they develop into large ribbed pods, which contain many seeds surrounded by a white pulp. The plant in the Garden's Glasshouse is yet to produce a mature pod, having only achieved a number of aborted attempts to date. However, a couple of young specimens have been planted alongside it recently for cross pollination, so look out for chocolate pods in the coming years.

While the University is not actively involved in research on this species at the moment, the Garden continually seeks to expand its collection of crop species and their wild relatives to increase the research potential of the collections for the future. They are also key to our public education programmes, to introduce the source of many foods and commodities. So when reading the ingredients on the back of your chocolate egg, why not explore some of these further with a trip to the Botanic Garden this Easter?

The Cambridge University Botanic Garden is open from 10.00am – 5.00pm, in March;10.00am – 6.00pm, April – September. The Glasshouses and Café close 30 minutes before the Garden and the Botanic Garden Shop at Brookside closes 15 minutes before the Garden.
