WHAT TO DO:

Obtain a Charlotte seed potato and chit it by standing it in an egg box in a cool bright area. The "eyes" of the potato will begin to grow.

Potatoes can be obtained from Hilton Community Garden on Saturdays in March between 10 and noon. When the shoots are short and stubby, plant the potato in a 10 litre pot (approx. 28cms wide at top and 23cms high) using any compost or garden soil. Note: larger pots will be disqualified!

Only half fill the container with compost and top up as the potato shoots grow.

Place pot outside but protect it from frosts. Remember to water it if the weather is dry.

Bring your potato plant, growing in its pot, to the Hilton Produce

Show on Saturday 29th July. The judges will empty each pot and weigh the yield.

The winner will be the person whose potatoes weigh the heaviest.

An update from RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes

Lapwings are wading birds that can be found in grasslands, farmland and wetlands. They are well known for their distinctive calls, giving them the alternative name 'peewit', their complex courtship displays and their striking plumage, in particular their head crests. Sadly, lapwing populations in the UK have declined significantly over the past few decades, predominantly due to changes in agricultural practices and the loss of suitable nesting habitats, meaning that they are now a red-listed species in the UK and are deemed a conservation priority. Here at Fen Drayton Lakes, we have seen a steady decrease in breeding numbers so are working to provide suitable habitats and to implement effective habitat management measures with

the aim of helping the species recover.

Lapwings are ground-nesting birds that lay their eggs in shallow scrapes, often in grassy fields. The chicks are born precocial, meaning they leave the nest after hatching and feed themselves with the help of their parents who care for them until they fledge. Nesting lapwings require suitable grass sward and vegetation conditions in order to build their nests and rear their young. The ideal habitat is an area of short, grazed grass with some scattered tussocky vegetation and bare patches with nearby shallow water margins. This type of habitat provides cover for the birds, feeding areas for adults and chicks, and reduces the risk of predation.

The grasslands of Ferry Mere along the northern edge of the lake are the best area for nesting lapwings at the reserve and we carry out management work in order to maintain it as a suitable habitat. The area is grazed by cattle in the summer and autumn to ensure suitable grass conditions the following spring when lapwings are looking to nest with a majority low, even height. This enables the birds to see around them and watch out for predators, thus making them feel more secure and more likely to nest.

Having nearby tall trees and shrubs can deter lapwing from nesting as they provide cover for ground predators, such as foxes, and perching points for avian predators, such as crows, that can take eggs and chicks. In previous years we have worked to fell trees from around the ditches on Ferry Mere and this past winter we have spent time with our volunteer work group removing a dense area of tall trees from the lake edge very near to our shallow pools where lapwings are often seen and have nested in the past. Not only will this improve the area for the birds, but it also has the added benefit of opening up views of the lake from the footpath and view shelter along the north of Ferry Lake.

As we head into spring the large wintering lapwing flocks will start to disperse, but we hope that some will stay and choose to nest out on Ferry Mere or elsewhere at the reserve. We will be carefully monitoring lapwing numbers as part of our annual breeding bird surveying to see the effects of our management work and determine if there is more we can do. In fact, we are already working on plans for another project to try to ensure the continued presence of shallow pools that remain wet throughout the breeding season. Watch this space for more details in the future.

St Ives Voluntary Car Scheme

Life in a rural community can be very isolating if you don't have access to a car, particularly if you are elderly or can't use public transport.

St Ives Community Car Scheme seeks to address this problem by matching passengers with volunteer drivers who use their own cars to take them to their hospital appointments, shopping or even to visit friends and relations. Passengers pay the driver 45p a mile for the drivers' mileage, plus a £1 booking fee which is payable to the office to cover administration costs. Paul and I have been voluntary drivers for a few years now and have met many lovely and interesting people, all of whom are very grateful for the existence of the car scheme. There is very good guidance and support from the volunteer office based in the Town Hall, St Ives, and nobody minds if you have to say 'no' to a drive.

Could you become a volunteer driver and help your neighbours in this way? There is currently a great need for more drivers, especially in Fenstanton and Hilton. We understand that as a volunteer you may be concerned about how much time you can commit. Even if you can only offer one drive per fortnight, this would be a help, and there is no obligation to accept a drive. No experience is necessary, just common sense and a sympathetic attitude.

All applicants will be subject to a DBS check and satisfactory references will be required.

On an early November morning, the school, and our field in particular, was energised by the prospect of planting our Tiny Forest. Having been contacted by Earthwatch several months earlier, it was time for our 'Planting Day' and for our children to be involved in creating a space that we hope will benefit their own children and grandchildren in years to come.

Cambridgeshire County Council have been working with Earthwatch at different sites across the county and we were contacted because of the outside space we are blessed with. After choosing an 'L-shape' layout for our Tiny Forest, which in total is about the area of a tennis court, members of the Earthwatch Team were on site in October to prepare the ground and mark the area. On the big day itself, children arrived at school with wellies in hand and plenty of energy, and the Earthwatch Team provided the expertise, guidance, 600 or so seedling and saplings to plant, and all the tools and resources we needed for planting.

The children loved it! It was a thrill to see them collaborating outside of the classroom, to see different skills in use, and to see children who sometimes lack confidence in the classroom really grow into leaders in the outside space. The morning was spent planting and, in the afternoon, our younger children donned their boots and completed the mulching of the area.

Although the space currently appears to be a fenced-off area of mud, we are very excited about watching it develop into a forest over the coming years. Eventually, we hope that it will join with our existing forest area and children will be able to use the benches and learning space as part of outdoor lessons, whether for science, maths, geography, or for the blessed opportunity to be outside in the fresh air with a good book to read.

Maybe some of our current 'planters' will be able to tell future generations about the day they planted a forest.

Fenstanton and a Crucifixion: By John Deeks



Crucifixion nail in heel bone

For those of you who were living in the village in 2018 and read my two essays on the archaeology discoveries found on the site of the Park Development, hopefully you will remember something of the results of that dig.

The archaeologists from Albion Archaeology published a full report on their finds and this is available on line. What they did not know at that time was that they had in fact discovered a very rare item. This only came to light some time later when one of the skeletons was being examined in detail.

The archaeologists discovered a large and previously unknown Roman roadside (our High Street) settlement in 2017 while carrying out their excavation. Finding Roman burials on such a site is common and this was no exception. What WAS unusual is that it included five small cemeteries and discovered in one grave were the remains of a man with a nail through his heel. After extensive examination it was determined that he had been crucified. The skeleton was that of a man aged around twenty five to thirty five years of age.

Only one previous example of a crucifixion has been found, in Israel, but the Fenstanton example is the best preserved. A human bone specialist from Cambridge University said: "The lucky combination of good preservation and the nail being left in the bone has allowed me to examine this almost unique example when so many thousands have been lost. "This shows that the inhabitants of even this small settlement at the edge of empire could not avoid Rome's most barbaric punishment."

The extraordinary fact about this skeleton is not only that the man was crucified, but that his body was reclaimed after death and given a formal burial alongside other people, leaving us with this extremely rare evidence of what had happened to him. An iron nail penetrated his right heel bone horizontally, consistent with crucifixion. His feet would have been nailed to the sides of an upright timber. In life he had suffered from poor health and injury, and his ankles may have been shackled. The victim most probably was a slave. In common with all Roman Mansio, (an official stopping place on a Roman road, the Travel Lodge of the age) the Fenstanton Mansio would have been staffed by slaves, who carried out all the physical and tedious tasks required for the smooth running of the operation.

Crucifixion was relatively commonplace in Roman times, but the victims were often tied to the cross rather than nailed, and if nails were used then it was routine to remove them afterwards. Constantine, acclaimed emperor in York (306–337), is thought to have banned crucifixion, so the man likely died between 130 and 337.

Romans reserved crucifixion for condemned slaves, rebels and lower classes. Crucifixion nails are thought to be so rare because crucified people would not often have received a proper burial also crucifixion was often done with rope. When nails were used they would have been recycled for their metal value and may also have been collected for perceived magical properties.

The exact location of the crucified man's grace has not being disclosed out of respect for the privacy of the current homeowner!

Watercourse Management Grant

Your Parish Council will shortly be submiting an application to Cambridge County Council for funding, if successful this will enable your Parish Council to carry out work to clear some of the ditches around the village which have been neglected over a number of years. The areas identified as the most in need are, Swan Road, Chequer Street, Hall Green Lane, Huntingdon Road, Moore Brook spur, The Fen (north and south), Lake Brook and 3 areas along Cambridge Road.

If successful your Parish Council hopes that this work will help alleviate problems with potential flooding.

Coronation King Charles III

Your Parish Council has formed a working group to put their heads together to generate some ideas as to how the Village can celebrate together the Coronation of King Charles III. The working group consists of Councillors Nigel Ferrier, Anne Mustill and Callum Pitt and Parishioner Jean Ding has been invited to work along with them.

Your Parish Council will keep you updated with the plans.

Warm Space

The Warm Space has been running since the beginning of December 2022 and over time has evolved to become a real community hub. Numbers have increased with the introduction of a stand/chair exercise session on a Monday, this is organised by a Nurse Practitioner whom specialises in exercise and a Parent & Toddler group running on a Wednesday.

If your Parish Council is able to secure further funding it hopes to be able to continue beyond March as a community hub.

Conington Road— Flooding and Sewage issues

In December 2022 two Parish Councillors, along with District Councillor Clare Tevlin met with the Head of Planning at HDC to discuss a number of issues, including problems with flooding on Conington Road and the Morris Homes estate.

Some of the properties on Conington Road experience water logged gardens all year round, leaving parts of their gardens unable to be used. This problem seems to have occurred since the construction of the Morris Homes development. The Head of Planning has advised County Councillor D Dew that she would be happy to visit the site to see first hand the issues that have been highlighted to her. Surface water flooding has also been a problem and Morris Homes met with the flood lead authority at CCC and have agreed that a drainage system could be installed, as there are manholes in close proximity.

Whilst there has not been a recent incident of sewage overflowing, it still remains a concern and our County Councillor has agreed to speak with Anglia Water to discuss the possibility of re-routing the sewage.

Your Parish Council will keep you updated with any progress.


Hilton Parish Council has resolved to appoint a mole catcher to remove the moles from around the church.

Dredging

Following feedback from parishioners, the Parish Council has agreed to seek the advice of the Environment Agency regarding the disposal of the dredged materials.

30mph Limit on the Green

The application to amend the speed limit on the Green to 30mph has been successful. Cambridgeshire County Council has provided a plan of the changes to the signage across the Green, which should be installed by April.



Pavilion

Quotes have been received for the renovations of the pavilion and the Council has asked their pavilion working group to review the quotes and make a recommendation to Council of a preferred supplier.

Health Project

Hilton Parish Council has been offered £7,500 for their Health Project, which will include cricket and cookery courses plus equipment such as giant Jenga and outdoor chess.

Bus Shelter

The survey for the asset register advised the Council that the roof beams of the bus shelter are deteriorating. The Council has asked the Clerk to obtain quotes for repair of the bus shelter and also for removal and a glass replacement.

Easter Cross

The Council has granted permission for the erection of the Easter Cross on the Green from Thursday 6th April to Tuesday 11th April.

Consultations

Hilton Parish Council has resolved to respond to both the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority Draft Bus Strategy consultation and the consultation regarding the proposed changes to the National Planning Policy Framework.

Coronation

Hilton Parish Council has resolved to support village groups to commemorate the upcoming coronation, including the Hilton Feast Week band evening and the Hilton Community Garden floral crown. The advice from Buckingham Palace is that there will not be beacons lit in celebration, as this would be too similar to the recent Jubilee celebrations. 
Community Garden Grant
