From this edition you will note that we have commenced our new advertising year. The cost of printing Spectrum is financed by these advertising funds. We try to keep our advertisers as local as we can to support those traders in our local community.

Ladies & Gentlemen,

Last years crime figures have just been released and I have pleasure in announcing that Ramsey/St Ives and the surrounding villages has the lowest recorded crime in the whole of Cambridgeshire for the year 2007-2008.

This Sector had 2466 crimes recorded from April 2007 to March 2008. We have over 300 less recorded crimes, over 300 less victims of crime, than the second lowest Sector. St Neots Sector was the second lowest with 2778, with March third lowest with 3364.

Secondly, last year saw a 4.1% reduction from the previous year in recorded crime, which means in real terms we had 106 less victims of crime last year.

These figures are very encouraging and show you live in one of the areas of Cambridgeshire which is least likely to be affected by crime. However my Team and I will not rest on our laurels: we must not become complacent. We will continue work with all our partner Agencies to reduce this figure next year as well bring more offenders to justice.

If you have any concerns about crime/anti social behaviour, please contact the Neighbourhood Policing Team for your respective area.

Parish Council Report

Fenstanton

Police report.

During the period 12th March 2008 to 8th April 2008 two incidents of criminal damage were reported to the Police:-

The meeting was advised that, following the release of last years crime figures, Ramsey/St Ives and the surrounding villages had the lowest recorded crime in the whole of Cambridgeshire. The sector had some 2466 recorded crimes between April 2007 and March 2008, this, apparently, is a 4.1% reduction on the previous year. (*see also letters page - ed*)

Mr. Chatfield from the Highways Agency and Mr. Wright from Atkins (a joint partner with Costain Skansa) gave an update on the current progress of the scheme. It was stated that it is unlikely work will start on the Fen Drayton to Histon section before 2010 and work on the section south of Huntingdon not commencing before 2011 as it was felt the proposed route would go to a public inquiry. It is expected that draft orders will presented towards the end of the year.

A full and frank question and answer session followed and the Parish Council stressed that full consideration must be given to implementing effective sound reducing measures, reducing the visual impact and other environmental aspects.

Headlands Park play area.

The Parish Council has been unsuccessful in its request for grant funding towards the refurbishment of the Headlands Park play area from the District Council. The decision is, naturally, very disappointing but the Parish Council is committed to modernizing and improving this play area and therefore the shortfall will have to be borne by possibly curtailing other planned projects. Currently work is anticipated to start at the end of May with completion in time for the School summer holidays.

Subway - Hilton Road.

For some time the Parish Council, aided by County Councilor Bates have been pressuring both the Highways Agency and the County Council Highways Department to accept responsibility for the subway and undertake the desperately needed work to bring it up to a 21st century standard. To this end some progress appears to have been made. A site meeting has been held between representatives of the agencies, the Parish Council and Cllr Bates. Whilst at this juncture neither of the agencies accepts responsibility for the maintenance they both appreciate that a severe problem exists and to this end they have agreed to talk to each other and come to an agreement. In the mean time the County Council Highways Department have agreed to clean and repair the lights whilst the Highways Agency will clean and paint the structure. Anti graffiti paint will be provided and it is hoped this will be applied by community service workers.

Village conservation area.

The District Council are currently undertaking a review of the Village conservation area. A member of the District Council Conservation team has visited the Village and met with the Chairman and Clerk. It was agreed that there are some areas currently not in the conservation area that should be included. A draft report on any proposed changes is expected by the late summer.

Next Meeting.The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on Thursday 8th May 7:30pm at Fenstanton and Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. All members of the press and public are welcome.

Parish Council Report

Hilton

A number of repairs and improvements have been carried out in the village including the replacement of the parish notice board at the shop with a fine new oak board constructed by a local craftsman and the repair of the fence beside the cricket pavilion.

The Council agreed to contribute the Scotts Close Section 106 funds that were earmarked for leisure to a joint scheme with the County Council to lay a footpath from the north end of the village to the Five Arches Bridge, creating a circular walk.

The Council had asked the District Council for their guidance on the likely impact of the proposed aircraft holding patterns and their reply had given some clarity regarding the expected noise profile. In addition, a letter from Mr. Djanogly MP stated that he had taken a keen interest in the proposals and he believed that the impact on Hilton would be minimal with the greater impact being felt in areas south of the village. It was agreed that a better way of judging the likely noise profile would be for a number of Cllrs to view an existing stack and report their findings to the Council. Cllr Halford agreed to organize such a visit and to report to the May meeting of the Council which would still give time to meet the consultation deadline

The Council discussed the future of the posts and ropes that were erected along Wraggs Row in November 06 as a temporary measure to discourage parking and allow the verges to recover. The Council noted that a number of residents had objected to the posts and ropes as unsightly, whilst the Cricket Club had raised concerns about the removal of the posts and ropes in terms of increasing the potential risk to the Club of claims for damage to parked vehicles. The Club felt that if the Council did remove them, and could not commit to the erection of more permanent barriers to prevent parking in that area, it might have to reconsider the viability of continuing to play on the Green. The Council expressed a wish to see cricket retained in the village if at all possible but felt unable to discuss the insurance and liability issues for activities undertaken on the Green at this meeting and agreed to do so at later date. The Council agreed to the removal of the post and ropes as soon as the new grass had fully taken.

The Council had previously agreed to cut half the football pitch throughout the year to make it more available for village youngsters, with the half to be cut rotated on subsequent years. This practice had drawn some criticism on aesthetic grounds and because of the potential impact on flora. After discussion, the Council felt satisfied that the alternating cutting regime would protect the flora adequately and agreed that their earlier decision should be upheld.

The Council accepted quotations for the repair of the Lych Gate roof and the Cricket pavilion roof and asked that this work be started as soon as possible.

The Annual Village Meeting is to be held in the Chapel on Wednesday 30 April with the next Parish Council meeting delayed to 12 May to avoid the Bank holiday.

Fenstanton WI

On Thursday 3rd April we had a wonderful surprise when Becky and David Cumbers proudly showed off their baby son who was born on 30th March. We send them our sincere congratulations.

Gillian Ashwell gave a fascinating talk on Beads and Beadwork Jewellery together with a large display of beautiful handmade pieces. Samples of the earliest forms of jewellery were passed round. Stones with holes threaded together were thought to have magical power because early man had no way of drilling into such a hard substance. Shells, the vertebrae of animals and seeds were also used. It wasn't until the invention of the Bow drill that pearls and some precious stones could have holes drilled through them. Most of us had never heard of a Bow drill but Jane Blunt has one! The discovery of glass in 3,500 B.C. in the near east was at first a closely guarded secret. When it spread to ancient Egypt it was so highly valued that only the Pharaoh was allowed to wear glass beads. Beads are often dismissed as purely decorative but they have been used in the Abacus and in Rosaries. Beads were used as currency in some islands in the S. Pacific.

They were also used in the 13th Century in the slave trade. Men were exchanged for glass beads and later the N. American Indians exchanged land for beads. We handled many different types of beads from some made from rolled wrapping paper to some very exquisite ones covered with enamel designs from China. There were eye beads from Turkey to ward off the evil eye, beads made from Venetian glass and beads made from amber. There are amber fakes around made of plastic. Real amber will generate static electricity and a small shaving of amber will curl while plastic will splinter. The various techniques to make jewellery were amazing. We learnt about ladder stitch, spiral staircase and brick stitch which is a method of weaving beads with fingers. We were also shown a Bead loom on which bookmarks are made. Rosamund gave the vote of thanks saying that we had no idea of the intricacy, variety and skill that went into beadwork.

- Sow dwarf beans, marrows, cucumbers, runner beans or buy a few tomato plants.
- Buy small fuchsia, geranium, begonia or even a busy lizzy to grow on for the pot plant

Drinks for the Produce Show

The following recipes are very simple to make, and you do not need to make your own wine. The orange wine and Sangria are excellent for use at garden parties. Children will love the raspberry lemonade!

Orange Wine (for class 69)

2 Navel oranges, halved 1 Navel orange, whole 4 oz sugar 12 whole cloves 1 bottle white wine.

Squeeze the orange halves into a saucepan, add the remains of the oranges, and the sugar. Bring to the boil, and simmer for 5 minutes. Remove from the heat and allow to cool. Strain into a 2 pint jug or jar, pressing the oranges with the back of a spoon to release all the juice. Stir in the wine. Stick the cloves into the whole orange, cut in half and add to the jar. Secure the lid tightly, (or use cling film) and allow to stand in a cool dark place for at least 2 weeks. To serve, strain over ice into a glass.

Sangria (for class 70)

1 bottle red wine 1 measure (50ml) brandy Juice of 2 oranges Juice of 2 lemons 2-3 slices orange Caster sugar to taste 1 bottle soda water 6 ice cubes

Use a tall glass jug large enough to hold all the ingredients - about 2½ pints capacity.

Pour the wine into the jug and add the brandy, lemon and orange juice. Stir well, and still stirring, add the sugar, 1 teaspoon at a time, to taste. Keep the jug in a cool place and, just before serving, add the soda water and the ice cubes. Float the orange slices on top of the jug.

Raspberry Lemonade (for class 65)

7oz caster sugar Juice of 3-4 lemons Fine peel of 2 lemons 5oz raspberries 2 tablespoons sifted icing sugar Put the caster sugar in a pan with 7oz water and the lemon peel. Stir over a low heat until the sugar has dissolved, then bring to the boil vigorously for 2 minutes without stirring. Set aside to cool. Mix in the lemon juice and strain into a large jug. Whiz the raspberries with the icing sugar in a blender and strain into the lemon mixture, discarding the seeds. Stir together and chill. To serve, dilute to taste with still or sparkling water.

Fen Drayton Lakes

Work on the replacement viewing screens and path surfaces was held up by wet conditions in late March, but by the time you are reading this, we hope that the work will have been completed without further delays.

Contractors who are creating wet patches in the areas between Ferry Lagoon and the River Great Ouse were also held up by the wet weather, but their project is expected to take much longer. These wet patches will help birds that breed in wet grassland, such as redshanks and yellow wagtails, to rear chicks in years to come. Our warden and volunteers will be kept busy installing directional signs, to help people find their way around.



Wading birds were quick to show interest in the recently bared islands on

Elney and Moore Lakes: ringed and little ringed plovers, lapwings and oystercatchers. At the time of writing, it is too early to say if they will settle down and nest, but you can visit at any time and try to spot some, or join a guided walk. The roller-coaster flight of displaying lapwings, accompanied by their whooping calls, is a joy to watch.

April and May are exciting times, as migrant birds arrive to breed here, or just stop off for a break on their journey further north. Each day seems to be different – newly arrived birds singing and trying to establish territories amongst the established ones; flowers coming into bloom, butterflies, bees and dragonflies flying on warm days, the first of the year's baby birds leaving their nests.

As we go through May, the last of the migrant birds arrive – spotted flycatchers, turtle doves

and swifts are typically the last species, and resident birds will have chicks already leaving their nests. Look out for robins and blackbirds feeding begging offspring with worms and caterpillars, while swans, geese and ducks escort their downy youngsters. Cygnets, goslings and ducklings must feed themselves, instinctively pecking at anything that might be edible, but they depend on their parents to guard them from potential predators and to brood them in cold weather.

You can help the birds nesting in your garden by making sure that food and water are always available. This means the adult birds can quickly get their own food, giving them more time to search for the caterpillars and other small creatures that the growing chicks need. Regularly watering a small patch of lawn or soil will encourage worms, and the blackbirds and thrushes that feed on them.

We have two mid-week guided walks this month, and these will begin from the small car park on the south-east corner of Elney Lake, closest to Fen Drayton village, sign-posted for disabled visitors.

Wetland walkabout Wednesday 7 and Thursday 15 10am-12.30pm

We will look for spring wildlife on these walks, hoping to hear cuckoos and seeing butterflies on fine days. Adults £3, children £1, RSPB members half price. Meet at Elney Lake car park

Hilton Cricket Club

Unfortunately, it's a sombre report, this month. Hilton Parish Council (HPC) is placing us in a difficult position as regards future cricket in Hilton and its action is leading us to arrange our "home" matches elsewhere. For the last 17 months, a line of posts and ropes has kept vehicles off the Green in the area behind our short boundary. HPC had put them there in response to representations by some residents and visible evidence that the Green was being damaged by a growing number of visitors driving on to the grass and parking there. Very few of these visitors had come to use the Green itself. Understandably, the visual appearance of these tall posts, linked by thin ropes, has drawn almost universal criticism and will shortly be removed. At the same time, as announced in a recent meeting, HPC will adopt a hands-off approach to parking in this area, citing its understanding that the Law permits parking up to 15 metres from the highway (Wraggs Row). This change of approach contrasts with the Council's acknowledgement hitherto that there is a problem over the control of vehicles on this section of the Green that must be dealt with. Most importantly, HPC has made no undertaking to replace the present, unsightly barrier to vehicles by a less obtrusive one which is more acceptable to everyone – as you would find protecting many other village greens from errant drivers.

Regrettably, this now presents the Cricket Club with the prospect of cars being parked close enough to the field of play to leave us with a serious additional risk of damaging those vehicles. The financial consequences to the Club could be fatal very quickly. Our liability insurance would protect us, except for the first £100 of each claim (the "excess"). It would probably take very few claims for the insurer to decide that we were not a good risk and apply a punitive hike in our premiums or even to refuse to insure us.

We have rather less than £100 in the bank at the start of the season. The Club is self-financing by means of an annual subscription and match fees collected from players, though has to be supplemented by some fundraising and personal donations. We cannot expect the members, donors or fundraisers to watch their hard-earned money go in insurance pay-outs while the Club has nothing left to buy kit or treat the wicket. HPC's suggestion is "to seek funding from village sources and beyond". It might be a tall order to ask a sponsor to hand over money so that we can pay out insurance "excesses".

Our membership is small and it is not reasonable to make additional financial demands on the players, some of whom will have paid up to £100 during the season. Nearly half of our membership is made up of keen youngsters, with a few now occupying regular places in the side.

It is undisputable that the post-and-rope barrier, for all its ugliness, has kept vehicles away from the danger zone. In our opinion, a line of low posts set in the ground, just as you find protecting other village greens from unwanted parking, would solve the problem. In a recent meeting between representatives of the Cricket Club and of HPC, we were told that the Council has had to weigh up pressures from various interest groups and individuals in the village and strike a balance. We were informed that, unsurprisingly, not everyone wants to see posts or bollards, however attractive they might be, but it was not made clear whether those people would rather see a line of cars instead.







On Wednesday evening, 30th April, a Parish Meeting is to be held in the Methodist Chapel. It is a timely opportunity for residents to air their views. Do you think that the Village Green is for cricket and other sport and leisure activities to be practised with minimal risk to property and people? Do you want to see it as a car parking area for the convenience of visitors whose purpose is quite possibly unconnected with any use of the Green? The Parish Council believes that when the barrier is taken away, it will be impracticable to enforce any restriction on parking, even if it damages the Green. See http://www.hilton-village.com/content/view/662/822/. The way things are heading, 150 years of cricket on the Green could be about to make way for 150 years of car parking.

Let's hope that we can make better news next month.
