CAMBRIDGE BOTANIC GARDENS

Trapping the light fantastic

The mind-boggling ability of plants to capture the energy of the sun through photosynthesis has fuelled human development and growth from the first campfire to the power plants of the industrialised world today which rerelease the sun's energy stored in the ancient fossilised forests as coal.

At the individual level, all the food we eat to gain energy is either directly or indirectly plant, or, if you like, sun-derived. Scientists today continue to be inspired by plants to develop new ways to harness energy.

At the Botanic Garden, we are hosting a new low-impact experimental hub, the P2P, which has been developed by a collaboration of University of Cambridge researchers and eco-companies to generate electrical current from pure plant power. The prototype structure combines green wall technology and semi-transparent solar panels to generate electricity. The vertical green walls have further been adapted to utilise the naturallyoccurring electrons produced in the soil through bacterial metabolic activity. It is the brainchild of Professor Christopher Howe and Dr Paolo Bombelli of the Department of Biochemistry at Cambridge. Their previous experiments resulted in a device able to power a radio using the current generated by moss. When a plant photosynthesises, energy from the sun is used to convert carbon dioxide into organic compounds that the plant needs to grow. Some of the compounds, such as carbohydrates, proteins and lipids, are leached into the soil where they are broken down by bacteria, which in turn release by-products, including electrons which can be harvested and recombined to generate electricity.

The long-term aim of the P2P solar hub research is to develop a range of self-powered sustainable buildings for multi-purpose use all over the world, from bus stops to refugee shelters.

You can explore this living experiment into sustainable solutions at the Garden's Festival of Plants in May, a day dedicated to bringing plants into focus with: pop-up plant science; talking plants with the experts; specialist tours of the Garden; and a Plant Prom of plant nurseries making sure your garden will be full of plant power this summer!

Festival of Plants runs from 10.00am-5.00pm on Saturday 16th May.

FENSTANTON PARISH COUNCIL meetings, April 9th

<u>Police report</u>: During the months of February, the latest information available, the following crimes and incidents were reported:1 incident of anti-social behaviour; 2 incidents of violence; 6 incidents of burglary; 1 incident of vehicle crime;1 incident of other theft. The meeting expressed concern at the number of burglaries reported.

Whippet Coaches revised timetable: It has come to the Parish Council's notice that Whippet Coaches propose to reduce the service through the Village to one bus an hour (off peak) but to increase the frequency of the service during the peak commuter travelling periods from Monday 25th May. **Full details of the changes are available on the Whippet Coaches website. The meeting discussed the possible effects the revised timetable will have on Parishioners and those using the service from the Village. It was appreciated that the off peak services operate with very low passenger numbers and in the circumstances an hourly service is not unreasonable, although the increase in peak time and evening services was welcomed. The meeting was reminded that in the past the Parish Council had fought for a feeder service from the Village to St Ives to access the Guided Bus but Parishioners did not take advantage of the service and it was subsequently withdrawn.

The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council which will be the AGM will be held on Thursday 14th May 2015 at 7:30 at Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. Members of the public and press are welcome. The minutes of previous meetings are available on the Village website or via the Clerk.

KERBING AROUND CHAPEL GREEN

The old part of Fenstanton grew up in the days of the horse and cart and roads reflect this. Unfortunately we now live in an era of motor vehicles which have increased in size and this has led to both inappropriate and often inconsiderate parking together with vehicles overrunning verges and greens such as Chapel Green next to the United Reformed Church. This has now become so damaged that action is required. We have been advised that kerbing around the green in conjunction with an adjacent strip of rebuilt roadway should dramatically diminish the need for ongoing maintenance.

Informal discussions with residents have often raised the question of a one way system round the green but large vehicles like the school buses would find this difficult if not impossible. We expect the contractor to start in April 2015 so everyone will need to take extra care while the work is in progress.

Medieval Life in Fenstanton - Food

In Medieval times very little meat was eaten but fish was an important source of protein. Here in Fenstanton it would have been fresh water fish. Most local villages and towns had access to the river and from these the water would be diverted to feed fish storage ponds. The records show that there were at least seven such fisheries in Fenstanton.



Hunting in the woods and forests to the south and west of the village, was restricted to the rich, the poor people were excluded from hunting for meat by some very draconian forest laws. So what could they eat, where would they obtain the protein that was vital to sustain life? Meat was relatively scarce for ordinary folk and even those with a bit of money. After all, you can't just kill a cow just because you feel like a steak or a roast. Where would the milk come from, there was no refrigeration, the meat would soon go off.

Putting to one side the very poor, the average Fenstanton villager who owned or farmed a bit of land would eat what we would consider a very monotonous diet, but for special occasions there would be superior foods. A superior meal would usually consist of fish, a little meat, fruit and vegetables, pretty much as today. Only the homes of the very rich would boast an oven, so all cooking would be done on an open fire. Roasting pots had yet to be invented so bread was used to protect the meat and fish as it was cooked. Pastry crust would cover the fish and meat and herbs from the garden or woods would be stuffed inside the fish. The crust would be decorated to look nice as it would also serve as a serving dish and then be discarded or fed to the dogs.

Ale was drunk at all meals including breakfast. The brewing process killed off the bacteria that were always present in the village water supply. It was also very nutritious. Apples and honey cooked in milk; curdled cheese mixed with eggs a sort of cottage cheese. Although these types of foods were for special occasions most working people managed to have a reasonably balanced diet to help them through their busy day, although not during times of shortages and famine.

In an age before table forks (not introduced for general use in England until the 18th century) there was a strict etiquette in eating and handling your food. At the table only your knife was used and then only to cut the meat or fish. Fingers were used to put the food into the mouth and then only the thumb and middle finger so that you covered you mouth as the food was put in.

Trying to imagine the lives of our village ancestors is always difficult. Typically, we tend to romanticize their lives as a time when life was simpler and moved at a slower pace. Romantic or not, their lives probably were far more difficult than our own. The lack of understanding of simple food sanitation rules and the inability to deal with simple medical issues caused by bad food, made many lives uncomfortable, even painful.





FENSTANTON WI

On Thursday 2nd April the Fenstanton WI welcomed Dr Maureen James who gave us a most interesting talk on A History of Witchcraft.

Going back to Anglo Saxon times women were accepted as being very spiritual believing in spirits. incantations, good luck talismen. medical herbs and leechcraft. In fact some particularly spiritual women became English saints, such as St Elthreda of Ely, an abbess who, by all accounts, was quite a strange lady during her time. Cambridgeshire is famous for having the earliest recorded witch when Hereward the Wake told of the Normans attempts to intimidate the English with a witch back in the 11th century.

Then, the reformation came and all of sudden there should be no belief in saints, folk rituals were condemned as superstitious and 'ghosts' were believed to be delusions of the devil or angels.

The 1542 Witchcraft Act was the first to define witchcraft as a felony, a crime punishable by death and the forfeiture of the convicted felon's goods and chattels. Elizabeth Mortlock (whose crime was trying to cure and protect people & animals with prayer) and Joan Warden (whose crime was to use ointment and herbs to cure many diseases) were two women tried for being witches in the early days of the act. It seemed that if there were no explanation or reason for, say an

illness, that witchcraft would be blamed. Hence, the origins of the famous trial of the Witches of Warboys in 1589-1593. In 1640s things got hysterical and anything that went wrong would be blamed on witchcraft. Around this time Matthew Hopkins became a famous witch finder.

In 1735 came a complete turnabout to the Witchcraft Act. A law was passed which made it a crime for a person to claim that any human being had magical powers or was guilty of practising witchcraft because there was no such thing. The last person to imprisoned under the 1735 Witchcraft Act was a Scottish 'medium' called Helen Duncan, who during the second world war held a séance in Portsmouth and claimed the spirit of a sailor told her HMS Barham had been sunk. This was not public knowledge at the time and she was investigated by the Royal Navy for being a spy. This case eventually lead to the repeal of the Witchcraft Act.

Our next meeting is on **Thursday 7th May**, which is our Resolution's meeting where we will also be holding a quiz with some 'bring and share' goodies.



The Flora of Huntingdon Racecourse

The Huntingdonshire Local Group of the Wildlife Trust invites you to come and visit this little-known Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) at Huntingdon Racecourse, Brampton, on Sunday 31st May starting at 10.30am.

The walk will be led by Pat Doody, who is the Chairman of our local group and has a particular interest in wildflower meadows. Unimproved grasslands of this type are rare, particularly in Cambridgeshire, and we are lucky to have this opportunity to visit this site. The racecourse is renowned for the Green-Winged Orchid, and we hope to see many other meadow flowers as well.
