spb a home An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

Close your eyes and picture a lake under a clear, blue sky. Ducks, geese and swans are out on the water, many of which have paired up and may even have a brood of ducklings, goslings or cygnets with them. Great-crested grebes are performing courtship dances or disappearing from sight under the surface as they dive for a meal and along the lake-edges a heron stalks through the shallows.

Turn your vision now to the north where an expanse of wet grassland habitat, containing ditches and shallow depressions, spans the northern side of the lake with a peninsula extending down towards the central island. The soft lowing of cattle can be heard as they graze this area to maintain the vegetation for breeding waders. Overhead, displaying lapwing can be seen with their wavering, upand-down flight and characteristic 'peewit' call as they lay claim to the best nesting habitat whilst redshank, the 'sentinels of the marsh' watch on, ever vigilant for danger. In the north-west corner a reed fringe to a smaller water body provides cover. Reed, sedge and Cetti's warblers can be heard singing from within the reed as water rail and coot call from the base. Look closely and you may be lucky enough to see a bittern skulking along as it blends into the background. Dragon and damselflies are in abundance as they dart around on the hunt and perch on the reed and other vegetation.

Back out on the water are the tern rafts. Constructed and deployed to imitate small shingle islands, these provide the perfect conditions for nesting common tern and black-headed gull. Watch as they build nests, incubate eggs and then bring small fish in to their chicks.

All around are the sights and sounds of nature, offering a chance to forget for a time the stresses of life and to connect with the great outdoors. However, this tranquillity

can be quickly shattered as wild creatures are easily disturbed and can be put off from using areas where people and dogs regularly go. This reduces the habitat available for them to use and the amount of wildlife for us all to enjoy. You can help wildlife flourish at Fen Drayton Lakes by not entering areas that are reserved for nature and by keeping dogs on a lead or under close control on the public footpaths. Please help us help nature thrive. Thank you.

Fenstanton and its Windmills: Part 1:.Continued from last month

Mill Number 4:

This mill stood a few hundred yards further along the Low Road. We only know this as it appears on the Lancelot Brown map of Fenstanton made in 1777. There do not seem to be any further records of this mill and it was most probably dismantled long before the start of the twentieth century.

Mill Number 5:

Mill number five stood on the only sharp bend on Low Road. I am unable to



identify any of its owners, or when it was demolished. I believe the following photographs are correct, based on the image on the right of the picture shown last month.

From the The Ipswich Journal 4th May 1799

"On Monday, the wife of William Fuller of Fenstanton, on her way to St Ives market, went into a windmill for shelter from a violent shower of rain and on leaving the mill the sails unfortunately struck her over the head and killed her on the spot. She left five children to lament her loss".

From Fenstanton Parish Buriel Records;

1st May 1799, Elizabeth Fuller wife of William Fuller, killed by a mill-sail in Stanton field.

Finally, Mill Number 6:

This mill was on the other side of Fenstanton village bordering on Fen Drayton at Mill Road.

Fenstanton and its Windmills: Part 1:.Continued from last month

From the Cambridge Independent Press - Friday 16 May 1919:

FENSTANTON: Another Landmark Gone.

"The ancient post-mill built of wood and with a thatched roof, between Fen Drayton and Fenstanton is now being demolished. It lost its sails some years ago and has not been used for some time. Of late years it has not been in use. It lost its sails in a storm one year ago and has sustained other damage from wind and weather at various times. In days long past it belonged to the late Mr. Hardy, of Fenstanton. Its present owner is Mr. J. Evison. Within the last century all of its tenants had little success".

Robert Hardy lived in Fenstanton High Street and owned the mill for at least thirty years. John Evison was born in 1845 in Enderby in Lincolnshire. At the time of the 1901 census he was living in Lincolnshire, so he must have purchased the Fen Drayton farm shortly before demolishing the mill.

This was the last of the eight windmills that once stood in Fenstanton village for over eight hundred years. Maps of various dates show this mill to be sited in different positions on Mill Road. There is nothing to be seen today although it is possible that it was opposite the house known as Mill House, where there is a driveway into an empty field.

'Double the trees in Fenstanton'

An ambitious plan to 'double the trees in Fenstanton' is taking shape.

We are not alone as groups throughout Cambridgeshire are signing up to the '**Double Nature Campaign**'.



We are currently counting trees in our parish. To date we have identified 6,100 trees North of the A1037.

When completed this will give us a planting target, probably of about 50,000 new trees!

It sounds huge, but there are over 2,500 acres in Fenstanton. Planting 1 acre of woodland would need about 2,000 trees. Planting 25 acres with trees is less than 1% of the parish. Later this year we will carry out a detailed survey of trees and green spaces. We will be using GPS location and mapping software to help manage the green environment in the village.

Working with the Parish Council we will identify potentially suitable community spaces for planting.

We would also like to work with local landowners/ stakeholders/ householders to explore additional planting opportunities.

We are keen for individuals and groups from across Fenstanton to get involved: helping us survey; identifying possible planting sites; planting trees; after care and maintenance.

Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Monday 12th April 2021

His Royal Highness Prince Philip The Duke of Edinburgh



The Chair opened the meeting with a statement regarding the death of HRH Prince Philip and there was a period of silence. Due to the current national guidelines, the Council will not be providing a physical book of condolence. Instead, an online book of condolence was made available on the Parish Council website and the Clerk has put notices up to this effect. In accordance with the wishes of the Duke of Edinburgh, the laying of flowers is discouraged and parishioners who wish to do something are encouraged to donate to charity instead.

Ivy Cutting

Cllr Ian Stott organised remote working ivy cutting where he assigned different areas to volunteers to ensure there was social distancing. A thank you message has been sent to the volunteers that took part.

Pavilion Street Light (PC26)

The remedial work to this lamppost which is leaning and unstable has been authorised using the Clerk/Chair authority and will cost £120 +VAT. Post meeting note: This work has now been carried out.

Council Tax

Whilst the Parish Council have resolved to keep the precept amount the same at £30,600, the tax base has reduced from 455 to 450 so this equates to a 1.1% increase in the amount paid by homeowners. The tax base is calculated by looking at the equivalent number of band D properties in the Parish, adding the number of houses due to be built and taking away those properties in receipt of council tax support or single person supplement. In the case of Hilton, the tax base has been reduced due to the increase of properties in receipt of council tax support.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee presented the end of year accounts to the Council and also proposed the levels of earmarked reserves, which the Council agreed. These documents can be found with the supporting documents on the Council website.

Policies

The Council resolved to adopt a Grant Making Policy, Expenses Policy, Sickness Absence Policy, Finance Committee Terms of Reference and an Asset Management Plan. These polices, together with all of the Council policies, can be found on the Council website.

Remote Meetings

The Council are still monitoring the situation regarding the legislation that permits remote meetings. The Council has asked the Clerk and Chair to respond to the Ministry for Housing, Communities, and Local Government's current call for evidence regarding remote meetings.

LHI Bid 2021/22

Hilton Parish Council has received the first draft of the LHI panel scorecard which shows that their bid for a Traffic Regulation Order application to prohibit HGVs on the B1040 24 hours a day was likely to be unsuccessful as there was not sufficient funding. The Parish Council originally agreed to contribute £9,000 towards this project, but the reduced cost in the feasibility study from Cambridgeshire County Council also reduced the Parish Council contribution to £5,299.67. Hilton Parish Council have resolved to contact Cambridgeshire County Council and advise that Hilton Parish Council will contribute £9,000 to this project to ensure its viability.

Oxford to Cambridge Railway Consultation

Hilton Parish Council have resolved to respond to this consultation to state that whilst they are in favour of the development of this railway line, they want to ensure that the construction traffic does not come through Hilton. Community Library

The Council has resolved to enter into a conversation with the Parochial Church Council with regards to putting the Community Library in the Church.

Moles

Hilton Parish Council have resolved to employ a mole catcher to deal with the moles on the Green around the churchyard at a cost of £80.

Horse Riding on the Green

The Council discussed the issue regarding horses being ridden across the Green inappropriately and thanked the Clerk for the letters that have been distributed to the horse owners and the signs on the Green.

Fences

The Council have agreed to purchase oak timber to repair the fences across the Green at a cost of £365.69.

Litter Pickers

The Council has resolved to purchase 8 more litter pickers and advertise that they are available to parishioners. If you would like to borrow a litter picker, please contact the Clerk – clerk@hiltonparishcouncil.com

Annual Parish Meeting Minute Book

The Council has resolved to purchase a minute book for the minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting at a cost of £81.

WI Bench

The Council has agreed to site the new bench in replacement of the old WI memorial bench in the original position where it was previously near the Maze.

Clerk Matters

The Council has agreed to increase the Clerk's working from home allowance to £6 per week in accordance with HMRC guidelines and also form a NEST pension scheme for the Clerk. The Council received the results of the Clerk's appraisal and approved the objectives set and also resolved to increase the Clerk's salary by an increment on the salary scale at a cost of £23.92 per month. Further to the Clerk's appraisal the Council also agreed to add the phrase "To act as the Website Administrator in accordance with the Media Policy and be responsible for the maintenance and management of the Council website, Facebook page and email distribution list." to the Clerk's job description. The Council has agreed that the Chair can authorise overtime up to the limit in the financial regulations each month.

Post Meeting Note

Cllr Ann Goodridge has resigned from Hilton Parish Council and the appropriate notice of vacancy has been issued.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Tuesday 4th May 2021 via Zoom. Agendas will be issued in advance on the village notice boards and the Council's website <u>www.hiltonparishcouncil.com</u>. Parishioners are welcome to speak at council meetings on agenda items.

Wildlife in Borrow Pit 3 (east of B1040)

Borrow Pit 3 is actually a large expanse of water between the B1040 (Potton Road) and Hilton Road, north of the new A14 and south of the A1307. The plan is to develop it into an ecological area supporting water voles, Great Crested Newts, Cetti's and Grasshopper Warblers. The marginal planting and grassland is intended to be a reminder of the Capability Brown's landscapes found in other parts of the county. However, it is recognised that the site is not comparable to Capability Brown's designed landscapes! Although there is no public access, a footpath does run along the northern side, and public access to the borrow pits will be reviewed once final ownership is established. (Source: A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon Improvement Scheme Borrow Pit 3

Restoration and Aftercare Plan. 5th June 2020.)

The design includes steeper slopes for water vole habitat which will provide burrowing opportunities for them, and pre-planted coir matting, as well as habitats for warblers and Great Crested Newts, with dragonflies and otters a secondary consideration. However, an otter holt has not been included in the design due to the proximity of the fisheries. There are a number of smaller ponds which benefit a range of mammals and reptiles across the site. Reed beds on the perimeter of the ponds will also provide nesting opportunities for the warblers. Mound areas which form hibernacula (winter quarters) have been created for amphibians and reptiles.

"Hop over planting" has been established which along with the fencing means that bats, especially barbastelle bats will be able to elevate their flight paths at night. There are large diameter culverts with ledges, or separate dry underpasses built into the roads on both Potton Road and Hilton Road for otters and badgers, north and south of the A14 bridge.

Did you know?

Along the A14 between Cambridge and Huntingdon are 22 Barn Owl boxes, and at least 5 of them are already in use. 2 boxes had chicks in them in 2019. There are also 360 bat boxes, 90 bird boxes for smaller species, 24 swift boxes and 24 kestrel boxes.

Great crested newts grow up to 17cm long and live for up to 15 years.

Female water voles can have three to four litters a year of up to five young.

The barbastelle is a scarce bat that lives in woodland and forages over a wide area. It has a distinctive "pug like" appearance because of its upturned nose.

Over 40 different native species of trees have been planted, replacing the trees removed at a ratio of approximately two to one, but it will take 15 years before the planting matures sufficiently to look like the images shown on the A14 fly through (available on YouTube).

"Broad beans sleeping in a blankety-bed"

With a week of sharp frosts and snow on the ground this morning, gardeners will have been rushing to cover tender plants with protective fleece. So anxious have I been to defend hydrangeas and a persicaria from the cold, I have given them a nocturnal drape of old curtains, even, dear readers, leaving my own 'blankety-bed' to rush to their aid in pitch-dark. Broad beans are in their infancy in the garden,

some sown in the autumn (aquadulce varieties) and others in February. Plug plants are still



available on the market and in garden centres. They may need staking and all the manuals advise pinching out the flower tips to prevent aphid attacks. However, with these small ministrations you can look forward to a wonderful crop of beans.

Fresh broad beans are hard to come by unless home grown. Supermarkets rarely seem to have them.

Even if you can find them, they tend to have lost their first freshness and become large and starchy.

I once watched with awe as a friend took the outer skin off each bean for a salad. Life, I feel, is too short for such an activity and the young beans are so delicious they don't need their outer coats removed.

Soil Improvers?

Besides the culinary delights of the broad bean, bean plants have been regarded as of great benefit to the soil, as nitrogen fixers. Traditionally, gardeners have cut the top off the plant after harvesting, leaving the roots in the ground. This is because nodules grow inside the roots with the help of naturally occurring bacteria. The nodules swell and once established the bacteria works with the plant, taking some of the carbohydrates produced through photosynthesis, in return releasing nitrogen. However, a recent study has questioned the benefit of leaving the plant in the ground.

Plots where the plants were removed were similar in fertility to plots where roots were left until the autumn. Only commercial fertilisers made a difference to yields in subsequent plantings.

Interesting historical fact: Favism

In 510, the Greek mathematician, Pythagoras, (he of the triangle) spotted a connection between broad beans and a blood disorder, known as haemolytic anaemia. So sure was he of the danger, he forbade his followers from eating them. It is said that he met his death when he faced a bean field before him and enemy pursuers behind. The hesitation to cross the field cost him his life.

It was not until that 1956 ...please do the maths...that this was found to be true. Medical researchers established a link between the faa bean and anaemia in patients with a hereditary abnormality of the red cell enzyme. This condition is rare and usually confined to people from Mediterranean countries.

Scent

A field of broad beans in summer is recognisable from the road not only because of the attractive flower, but also the sweet scent which makes a welcome addition to any vegetable plot.

Recipe

A delicious and speedy lunch or supper dish can be made with the following ingredients:

bacon/lardons 100g, 1 clove garlic, leeks 100g broad beans 100g, zest of 1 lemon, tagliatelle or other enough for 4, salt and pepper, parmesan 50g

Cook the bacon or pancetta in a little olive oil, then add garlic and leeks. Soften for a few mins then add the broad beans and barely enough water to cover. If using young broad beans the cooking time is about 5 mins. Grate in the lemon. Meanwhile boil the pasta. When cooked take a cup of the pasta liquid and add to the bacon and leeks. Drain the pasta then mix it in thoroughly with the bacon and leeks and parmesan. Add more parmesan if liked. The recipe works just as well with frozen beans.
