










Christian Aid Week 15th - 21st May



Parish of Fen Drayton with Fenstanton News and Services for May 2022

The Rector writes:

Hello, how are you doing?

"The world's favourite season is the spring. All things seem possible in May." — Edwin Way Teale

I am not sure if all things are possible in May 2022 but things are certainly looking more hopeful than in May 2020 and 2021. Looking back, to inform the future, while being in the present, might help to remind us of people and events. But dwelling on the past and remaining in it isn't always good for our mental well-being. Perhaps May 2022 will be a good time to reflect and plan and make some good choices. Our circumstances might not have changed much, if at all, but our approach to them can change. If you consider the disciples after the events of Good Friday – they thought all was hopeless – and yet on that first Easter morning, their world was changed. During this season of Easter, which continues up to Pentecost on 5 June, may we all be filled with the Easter hope of the risen Christ. Alleluia, Christ is risen. He is risen indeed, alleluia!

On 5th June, we not only have our Sunday morning service, at 10am in the Parish Church, Fenstanton, we also have a service in the afternoon at

6pm, followed by a light tea. It will be a Songs of Praise style service, especially remembering, of course the Platinum Jubilee

for Her Majesty the Queen. Please do join us, in fact why not suggest your favourite hymn? We would love to know! (let either Rev Rosie or a churchwarden know).

Funerals, churchyard, cemetery – and so here we are at the last of the three items we have been looking at in a little more detail. See March issue for weddings and

April for baptisms.

Any resident of Fenstanton is permitted to ask for a funeral service in the parish church, if that is what they would like to have for their loved one, or has been detailed in a will or funeral plan. The service in church needs to be arranged via a funeral director of your choice. You (or your loved one) do not have to be a regular attender of the church to have a service in the church, despite what some funeral directors

will tell you.

You don't have to have hymns, although most people do; you can have other music if you provide it on CD and the music is appropriate to play in church. You can have suitable poems etc included in the service too. Lots of families like to write their own family tributes (aka eulogies) or the minister taking the service can help you with that. One thing you are required to have is a bible reading. If you do not know any, then the minister can help you choose one.

Having talked about the funeral service, we move on to what happens next. It may be that a decision is made for a burial or a cremation. A burial usually follows straight after the funeral service itself. Here in Fenstanton there are several choices. The burial might take place in the Parish Council cemetery, which is adjacent to the churchyard*, providing you have previously organised this through the funeral director and with the Parish Council. Or there may be other alternatives which you will need to discuss with your funeral director.

The churchyard has been closed for burials since 1958, but it is still open for the interment of ashes. The confusion is between the churchyard location and the cemetery location. There is a path that separates them, which is north of the church, not far from where the Church Centre and school are. People often think it is the same place. The cemetery has the war memorial, the churchyard doesn't. I hope that helps.

Any resident of Fenstanton can have their cremated remains interred in the churchyard area for that purpose. Please be aware there is always a Christian Minister present for the interment. Please also note that interments, and a ledger stone (flat tablet) to mark the plot, must adhere to the Diocese of Ely churchyard regulations. Ashes cannot be scattered and must be placed in a container that will perish or straight into the interment plot.

It's not really appropriate to share here a funny moment from a funeral....... a memorable moment during a service, though, was from a couple of years ago. A funeral for an elderly lady was taking place in a church, and a beautiful peacock butterfly was seen gently exploring the church, taking rest here and there. The peacock is a symbol of eternal life, quite pertinent to a Christian funeral service and our message of hope, and the lady was indeed a Christian all her life.

Even More Ghost Stories

By John Deeks

The Ghosts of Hall Green Lane:

As told by Mrs J Allen in April 1922

"Oh yes, I have seen them, so I can vouch for the truth of what I say. I will tell you about it so that you will know yourself.

When I was first married I lived in the end thatched cottage (place now unknown), where Mrs Hopkins now lives. In there are good rooms, they joined close to another house that stood between the house we lived in and where Mrs Bedford now lives and there was another house behind the one, now pulled down, used as a lodging house.

I was ironing, after they had all gone to bed, walked into the back yard to the pump for water to make their drinks for the next day. I took some men in to lodge at that time, we used in those days to have lots of men come to the village in summer, some of them Irishmen, they came to work in the onion fields.

I had four lodging with me that summer, in the house there is a big bedroom at the top. Well, I went out into the back yard to fetch the water and right in front of the pump just where I wanted to go, was something standing there. Something, I did not know what you would call it, ghost or phantom. Some would say it was like a man, so I just said "I want to come to the pump for some water, if you please. Well it never offered to move. I was a bit shaken and hardly knew what to do; I knew all the others had gone to bed. Naturally my head turned towards the door into the house. I was but a second giving the glance at the house, but in that instant it disappeared.

Well I will tell you of the next time I saw it. The next evening I said to my old man, no, you are not going to bed tonight till I go and I was going to make the drinks after supper. The door stood open, my husband was in the front room for something, I looked out of the door and there stood the same ghost or whatever you like to call it. I called my husband and said, "There's that there again" and in that instant it disappeared.

Well, the next time, it was my boy who saw it. He came home from school and said "mother, "I want to go" "We'll go" I said and he went running into the yard, the 'place' was in the barn. I then heard him call out "mother there's someone sitting on the seat", I went to look but there was nobody to be seen anywhere.

Well, the next time he saw it was when he went to the barn, we had rabbit hutches down one side. He came running into the house and said "mother, there is someone sitting on the hutches. Well I went to see but there was not the sign of anyone or anything".

Laying a Witch:

Told by Mrs Armon in April 1922

Scene, the bungalow cottages (unable to identify the location of these cottages)

"Yes, she (Mrs Chard) always used to come to have tea with us (Mrs Armon). Always after, Hellie (I assume to be a child but could have been a pet), was bewitched; she used to bring a quarter of a pound of tea. I could never do anything with Hellie when she left.

So Mrs Richards told me how to break the spell and I did it and was never troubled again.

Yes, she told me to lay a knife, blade edge outwards towards the street and under the door mat. I did it when she came, that did her, and Hellie was not bewitched that time and never once cried after she went. That stopped her pranks and no, she never troubled us again".



There is a little further work to be carried out at the Pond with the replacement of the damaged Fencing and top soil and seed to the area left of the Pond.





Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Monday 4th April County Broadband

Hilton Parish Council received a report from Matthew Briggs of County Broadband. He advised that Hilton has been earmarked to get full-fibre broadband built in our community. This is being provided by County Broadband who are funded by Aviva Investors and the Government's' gigabit voucher scheme.

Hilton is one of 21 villages included in the next phase of their rollout. This fibre-to-thepremises technology will allow internet speeds of up to 1000Mbps, with matching download and upload speeds.

The next step is for County Broadband to gauge the level of interest in the installation of this infrastructure. Matthew Briggs of County Broadband will be visiting all of the properties in the village to establish how many people are interested in receiving further information regarding this project. You can also contact him directly on 07538399740 or Matthew.briggs@countybroadband.co.uk. In order for this project to proceed to the next stage, 40% of the village needs to express an interest. There will also be an online meeting for those that have registered interest on 25th May, and there may be an in-person meeting if there is a need.

Following this, 25% of the village (which is approximately 114 properties) need to pre-order the broadband service with County Broadband in order for them to be able to install the infrastructure. Matthew will be able to provide further details, but packages range from 50Mbps to 900 Mbps.

A14 Legacy Works to the Ware

Despite assurances to the contrary, the works to the roadside bank of the Ware have caused an issue with surface water drainage. The Clerk has met with the National Highways engineer who has agreed to install pipes in the wall and dig drainage channels to alleviate this issue.

2021/22 Tree Work

The agreed tree work has been delayed by the process of obtaining permission from the Tree Officer at Huntingdonshire District Council. Cllr Ian Stott is continuing to liaise with HDC, but hopefully this work should commence by the end of April.

Funded Ponds Project



Hilton Parish Council has been advised that funding is now available in certain parts of Cambridgeshire for the restoration and creation of clean water wildlife ponds capable of supporting great crested newts. Hilton qualifies for this funding as some of the land around the village is deemed to be especially suitable habitat for bolstering and connecting existing populations of this endangered species.

The Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group are seeking local farmers, smallholders, large rural garden owners, and land-based businesses to create and restore more such ponds. Clerk's Salary

The Clerk was awarded an additional salary point in line with the contract. The Council also agreed to pay the gross amount of £1,000 in full and final settlement for 100 hours in lieu.





HILTON PRODUCE SHOW

Crown Imperials (Frittilaria Imperialis)

Members of the lily family, these plants are one of the stars of a spring garden. They look extraordinary. In height alone, they top their neighbouring tulips and narcissi, growing to between 70 and 90cms. They manage to stand alone, up straight without any staking, unbowed by any storms because of the strength of their stems. The most striking thing about their appearance is the flowerhead which forms a ring of pendent blooms, above which there rises a green tuft, rather like the crest of a pineapple.

Their origins are in the mountainous regions of eastern Turkey, Kurdistan and Iran. There are stunning photographs of them 'at home' on rocky tors with towering snow-capped peaks in the distance. The distinctive appearance has appealed to artists and writers as well as horticulturists. They appear in Dutch flower painting of the 17th Century in those wonderful but unlikely assortments such as **Ambrosius Bosschaert's**: tulips, irises, roses aquilegia and fritillaria in a vase; pretending that roses and tulips bloomed at the same time was outmoded by the time of Van Gogh who painted a stunning collection of orange hued Crown Imperials in a copper vase. The colour of the vase complements the flowers beautifully set against a dark background.

Particular features of the inflorescence have been the stuff of legend. In Iranian and Western culture, the flowers droop in respect of a holy man's death and the tear-shaped black marks on the base of each of the six flowers (nectaries/sources of nectar) represent the plant weeping for the departed.



Personally, I mourn when they depart from the garden, because they make such a majestic addition to a flowerbed.

One further legend seems to be that they dislike heavy clay soils. We are on clay, yet the plants thrive, possibly because they also like an alkaline base. Some garden manuals recommend planting the bulbs on a handful of grit (to remind them of home and stop any rot). However, the bulbs thrive in Hilton without a stony bed. Although the bulbs are expensive (£4.00 on St. Ives market), they multiply. I bought four orange ones two years ago and they have doubled.

Gods with clay feet? Despite the striking beauty of their appearance and imperial name occasioned by the 'crown of flowers', the bulbs

have an unpleasant smell which is often described as foxy. This however has the great benefit of deterring pests. No rabbit, or muntjac deer has attacked them and so they give pleasure year on year.
