# Local Weather Watch by Patrick Landucci

In terms of temperature Winter 2022/23 worked out close to average, in reality both December and January comprised two lengthy spells of cold or very cold weather with extended mild spells in between. Both the cold spells were brought by northerly winds from the Arctic. February was a generally benign month helped by the fact it was unusually mild across most of Europe. It was also an extremely dry month, being the third driest since records began more than 150 years ago. Only 5.5 mm (0.22of an inch) was recorded. During a period of 38 days from 15 January to 21 February, measurable rain fell on just one day (2mm).

For the second year running there was not a single "easterly" spell during the three winter months.

Snow fell on just one day in Hilton, December 11, though it did lie unmelted on the ground for a week.

A dramatic change in weather type occurred in March initially with some wet snow and sleet and a very wet day on March 9 when 32.1 mm (1.30 inches) was recorded. Frequent rain, strong winds and with 15 days in the month sunless, it was a rather depressing month with few days to enjoy the start of Spring. Hilton resident Gilliam Sheail, who takes rainfall readings for the Met. office and whose records go back to 1976 reports that March 2023 was the wettest she has recorded for that month by some distance with a total of 116.8 mm (4.60 inches). The previous highest she had recorded was 90.1 mm (3.70 inches) in 2001. In fact more rain/melted snow fell in March this year than in the whole of the three winter months combined.

With concerns about climate change very much in people's minds, extreme events seem to occur monthly around the world. To conclude with a few I have spotted since my last article.

- (1) f you thought it was cold here last December, spare a thought for the hardy folk of Oymakan in Siberia where on 12 December 2022 the temperature plummeted to -61C (-78F). The town is thought to be the coldest permanently inhabited settlement on Earth.
- (2) In Auckland, New Zealand, rainfall in January 2023 totaled 539 mm (21 I inches). (Equivalent to 45% of the annual average), beating the previous record for any month of 420 mm (16.5 inches) in 1869. One of the storms delivered 280 mm (11 inches) in 24 hours at Albert Park. A number of tropical storms continued into February bringing extensive flooding and destruction of properties. A record wet summer in North Island.
- (3) Meanwhile, Somalia continues to suffer its worst drought for 40 years.
- (4) Finally, during a cold spell afflicting California, in February, in a dusting of snow fell on the Hollywood sign, Los Angeles, a very rate event.



# **Fenstanton Places and Street Names:** By John Deeks

To understand the names of our streets and lanes you have to use your imagination and turn your mind to an earlier time. The original village was situated half a mile from the high street and centred on Honey Hill, the church and Church Leys areas. What is now the High Street was just a road running from Cambridge to Godmanchester. Originally built up by the Romans it would have been constructed on earlier Celtic tribal pathways. Most of all we have to imagine the High Street without its buildings with fields and marsh coming right up to the roadside. But that would be about it, all village life would have been away from the Roman Road.

The village was surrounded by water, marsh and fen. There was a large marsh between Fenstanton and Hilton and travel between the villages would have been very hazardous especially in the winter months. This would have been the same for the Hemingfords hence the road to these villages is still called Marsh Lane. St Ives was the other side of the Great Fen and river and was only accessible via the causeway, now known as the New Bridges.

The Great Marsh (or Moor) came right up to the Roman Road opposite what is now the Shell service area. On the other side of the road, it was known as Little Moor. There was a large forested area to the south west of the village, running to the west of the Roman Road. So, if you have been using your imagination you will now see in your mind's eye, Fenstanton village as an isolated place surrounded by water, fen and forest, but close to the motorway of the era the old Roman Road. So how did the isolation and location effect local names?

Bell lane: A lane leading from the High Street to the parish church. Gertrude Peet described this lane by painting a picture with words. "One can picture the church bells being heard by the devout Roman Catholics in the High Street and this was the quickest way to obey the summons to get from the busy part (road) of the village to the church. Bell Lane is continued by Church Street and a beautiful picture can be imagined of the Crusaders, Pilgrims and travellers on the Old Roman Road hearing the church bells and turning down the lane to attend devout service". Church Lane, a lane from the lower end of the village and as the name denotes, leading to the church. Tall's Lane, the saying is, it is tall if it is not short. In other words it is not a short lane! Swan Lane (now Swan Road), a lane used by the Swans as they travel from one marshy place to another. Scorney: Scorney Meadows, meaning doubtful, low land that is liable to flood and is therefore disappointing. The 'ey' denotes an island, hence a swampy meadow, unreliable land.

Honey Hill: Bounding the top village green and a high part of the village. It is recorded that it is named after the honey from Bees, which for many centuries supplied the only means of sweetening the people's food and making Mead. Being situated by the church, the field once called 'Dove-Cot Field' (now the cemetery) probably joined the 'Bee-Garden field' and formed part of the church property.

Lands' End: A lane leading from Honey Hill to the village, it once denoted the end of the enclosed land of the village, now known as 'ancient enclosures' the land beyond Land's End was open common. Hall Green Farm: The name of the farmhouse, once known as 'The Hall'. Headlands: The large area at the top of a field left clear to enable the 8-Oxen-driven plough to turn around. Little Moor: Probably named after the Great Moor by which it stands. Sallows: A field of Willows.

The New Vicarage: Built on the site of the old vicarage and farm yard at the corner of Church Lane. After the old vicarage was pulled down it became a group of small holdings called 'Small Holdings Yard'. Low Road: A road rightly named as it is in the low marshy land near to the river and it is flooded in wet weather. What is now the London Road was originally called the Top Road and ran parallel with Low Road leading to the St Ives causeway and was not subject to any serious flooding. Galley Hill: The name Galley denotes a gallows and it was the hanging place used by the people of St Ives in whose parish it is. West End Farm: As the name denotes 'beyond the village' a Weston or wash land a wilderness.

# Your Parish Council—A Few Achievements 2022

- Replaced and upgraded the church and cemetery footpaths with a contribution from the church.
- Replaced and upgraded a section of footpath between Apple Orchard and Chequer close.

• Introduced the privately funded 20 mph speed limit on the High street and all roads accessed from the High street.

• Submitted a successful LHI to upgrade parking and landscaping between 10 and 30 Chequer Street. This work is due to be started May 2023.

• Submitted a partially successful LHI, together with Hemingford Grey PC, to implement a 50mph limit from Galley Hill to the 40mph limit and a speed indication device.

Introduced a warm space in response to the cost of living crisis.

Introduced a Community Hub after identifying a need through the warm space.

• Continued to maintain more than 10km of rights of way. Cut back The Fen hedging under the maintenance programme.

- Planted 40 saplings on Cambridge Road.
- Made grants to the bowls club, the friendship club, the community café and the Sportsday committee
- Set in motion the legal process to enable FPC to transfer the old orchard to the scouts.

• Saved the allotments from closure secured an FPC 99 year lease with The Diocese of Ely adding extra plots and a water supply.

- Installed three new litter bins at various key locations throughout the village.
- Drawn up plans for Hampton pocket park development ready for public consultation.
