

## Parish Council Report

### Fenstanton

**Police report.** During the period 9th September to 8th 2008 the following incidents had been reported to the Police :-1 burglary.; 1 theft of petrol from a motor vehicle.; 1 theft of a motor vehicle.; 1 attempted burglary. 1 theft from a motor vehicle.; 1 attempted theft from a motor vehicle.; 1 reported but unspecified incident.

The meeting expressed concern at the increase in burglary and thefts from motor vehicles and urged parishioners to be vigilant and where possible to park their cars in garages and not leave them on the road overnight.

The police have received a number of complaints relating to dangerous and illegal parking by the school. As a result action will be taken against owners found to be parking in such a manner. With Autumn now upon us the Parish Council request that cars are not parked on grass verges or the green areas within the village.

**A14 Update.** A full and comprehensive report on progress to date was given by Mr. Hall and Mr. Wright of the Highways Agency. Diagrams of the Fen Drayton and Trinity Foot Junctions were displayed for information. The meeting was advised that the Public Consultation was scheduled to commence at the end of the year and the draft orders were expected to be completed by March 2009. At this juncture work on the first section (Fen Drayton to Histon) will start in 2010-2011 with full completion of the route by 2015.

The meeting requested assurance, which was given, that footpaths would not be lost and that safe crossing points would be included in the project.

Reduced Stagecoach Bus Service. The Parish Council has been in correspondence with Mr. Campbell of Stagecoach, who continues to maintain that the bus service is adequate, and the Traffic Commissioners who are powerless to give support. Mr. Campbell has, however, agreed to a face to face meeting with representatives from the Parish Council, which is currently being arranged. Parishioners are, however, urged to keep up the pressure and write to Mr. Campbell at 100 Cowley Road, Cambridge CB4 0DN expressing their views and the problems they are encountering. Appointment of a Parish Tree Warden. The Parish Council is still looking for a volunteer to become the Parish Tree Warden. The principle objective is to promote interest in the environment by tree planting and liaising between county and national groups on projects. If you are iterested please contact the Clerk. Next Meeting. The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on Thursday 13th November 2008 at 7:30pm at Fenstanton and Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. ### **Parish Council Report**

### Hilton

Hilton Parish Council strives to ensure the smooth operation of the village. Our range of duties is quite extensive and includes the maintenance of the play park, ditches, ponds, the Maze, The Green, footpaths and much more. We also give guidance to Huntingdon District Council with planning applications to ensure future development is sympathetic with the village scene.

The Parish Council owns the Maze, the Green and its 27+ acres of land, the cricket pavilion, some of the street lights in the village and several other fixtures and fittings. The Green has 13 Common Rights owners, all of whom have historical grazing rights over the Green.

Each November we prepare a detailed budget and apply through Huntingdon District Council for funding for the next financial year. This income forms part of your council tax. The Parish Council are always mindful of obtaining best value for residents from the Council Tax precept. This financial year our budget was £21,394.

We are permitted to have 9 Parish Councillors, a number based on the 782 electors in our village. The Parish Council employs a Clerk who works 10 hours per week handling all its administrative and business needs. She also liaises with other organisations such as the District Council, County Council Departments e.g. Highways, the Environment Agency etc.

Parish Councillors are voluntary and give up their time each month to debate the issues and make decisions on behalf of the village, attending monthly parish council meetings and Planning meetings when required. They also get involved in much more outside of the meetings. The present councillors have a variety of backgrounds, experience and interests and have put themselves forward as Councillors because they care about where we live.

Local Government Standards define the way Parish Councils must conduct their business. We are required to adhere to these procedures and protocols. Training courses are available for all members on a variety of topics, however we always aim to do our best and within procedures. Decisions are made for the good of the village based on the knowledge and research Parish Councillors have before them.

Recently, a few parishioners have made Parish Council work difficult, with persistent and undermining criticisms. A large proportion of time and emotional energy has been spent dealing with their demands. For this reason the Parish Council has received several resignations from Councillors who felt unable to continue with their role on the council. Several other Parish Councillors have also considered tendering their resignations. None of the present council was prepared to stand as Chairperson, owing to the negative impact on the personal life of the incumbent. As a result the council has not been able to make the progress Hilton deserves.

We currently have two vacancies for Parish Councillors and would like to co-opt new members. We are optimistic that together, a strong and united group of Parish Councillors can progress the excellent work undertaken and hope that one of the existing members will step forward as Chairperson.

The alternative to a Parish Council would be to cede responsibility to Huntingdon District Council. In other villages where this has happened it has been, regrettably, to the detriment of the community.



## Magpas is looking for volunteers to help save lives in Fenstanton!

The new Community First Responder group would be made up of local people who volunteer to be trained, equipped and organised by Magpas so they can attend medical emergencies in the village.

The scheme will cut the time it takes to get medical help to patients in the villages as the ambulances are based quite a distance away.

The volunteers receive lifesaving training to provide basic treatment to patients suffering from life threatening emergencies such as breathing problems, chest pains, diabetic emergencies, and cardiac arrest. Magpas has received the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service in recognition of the work all their volunteers undertake, and also the Investors in Volunteers Award.

Magpas provides all the training, so you don't even need to have a medical background! The defibrillator is automatic, you just attach it to the patient and it does the rest by itself!

The scheme can be the difference between life and death. In other areas there are patients who have benefited from the care of a Community First Responder and are now back home with their families.

## **Fenstanton WI**

On Thursday October 2nd the business part of our evening was soon dealt with. Pauline Driver was elected to the committee because Becky Cumbers had to stand down after the birth of baby David. Claire Barrett was unanimously elected again as President.

'Get everyones' attention right from the start'. That is exactly what Mary Cox did when she opened her talk on Fair Trade and Fair Trade Products. She produced a huge inflated banana which was named Happy Banana and a deflated one of the same size which was named Sad Banana. With the aid of some W.I. helpers Mary explained how the money is distributed along the line from the farm workers to the supermarket. The Sad Banana farm workers receive a minimal amount and so are unable to improve their living standards. The aeroplanes spray the large fields or plantations with insecticides which cause illness and result in the birth of deformed babies. The Happy Banana farm workers joined with the owners of the land to form co-operatives and these receive more money for their crops. The Fair Trade Premium allows the co-operatives to decide how to improve their local amenities like schooling or a new well. The plots of land are now smaller and do not need insecticides. The International Fair Trade Agreement ensures a fixed price for their crops which is independent of the International Commodity prices. Fair Trade also extends to hand-made craft products.

There was an enticing display of craft products together with Fair Trade food which we could purchase. Rosamund Mc Nair gave the vote of thanks.

Our Tea party on September 27th hosted by our President, Claire, at her home was enjoyed by all and was very successful; Indian Summer weather, delicious cakes, good company and a profit of £151.

## **Fen Drayton Lakes**

As the weather gets colder and the days get shorter, we put on extra layers and do outdoor jobs that will keep us warm, then go indoors to our heated homes, switching on lights so that we can continue doing whatever we do until it is time for bed. What do wild creatures do?

Reptiles, amphibians and some insects and mammals hibernate or sleep through the cold, lean times. Others move closer to people, finding food and shelter near (or even in) our homes and other buildings. Many insects have completed their life cycle and die, having produced eggs or larvae that will survive the winter, and emerge as adults next spring – butterflies are just one example.

Many birds migrate to warmer climates, where they will be able to find plenty of food. Birds that spent the summer eating our insects – such as swallows – have moved to Africa. Many water birds breed close to the Arctic Circle, feeding in the long daylight hours of the northern summer on plants or insects, but they must move south before the ground freezes or is covered in deep snow. These include many of the ducks and wading birds that you can see now at Fen Drayton Lakes.

Although the days are short, our winter climate usually has very few periods when the ground or lakes freeze for several days at a time, so most birds will feed throughout the day, storing enough calories to keep them warm through the night. If the weather changes for the worse – or we get deep floods – then the birds will move on, looking for a local place first, before using up their stored energy on a longer journey.

Wigeons are grazing ducks, and they are often joined on the fields at night by other ducks. So long as there is some moonlight, or starlight, they can see well enough to spot foxes trying to creep up on them. Lapwings and golden plovers also forage at night (for worms and beetles) in the large fields with bare soil or very short crops, keeping well away from the hedges that may conceal predators.

The birds that visit our gardens face similar challenges in finding enough food to survive. Each time they are disturbed, whether it is by a fox, a dog, a cat, a person or a vehicle, they must use up valuable energy to escape. We can all help our garden birds, by providing them with food. A range of food will attract a wider variety of bird species – starlings will clean up scraps on the lawn, finches love sunflower hearts, and mixed seeds will be popular with house sparrows. Dried fruit, bruised apples and grated suet will encourage robins, blackbirds and song thrushes to your garden. Clean, fresh water is also important, both for drinking and for bathing. Clean feathers are much more efficient for flight and insulation.



## Hilton Action on Traffic Group (HAT)

We have learned through our recent discussions and correspondence with the Police that they are unable to prioritise the resources necessary to enforce drivers' compliance with our village speed limits. Their occasional roadside speed checks do not provide lasting deterrent effect and Hilton's personal injury accident record does not at present meet the Authorities' criteria for justifying a Safety Camera. The local Police have told HAT that provision of "effective road calming is the best course of action to provide a permanent and significant reduction in speed".

While continuing to press the Police to enforce the law, we are looking at what options might be available for traffic calming, that is road engineering such as pinch point give way chicanes and speed humps. We are seeking support from the local authorities, mindful that 2009 budgets will shortly be agreed.

Meanwhile, we invite Hilton residents, particularly those living alongside B1040 (Potton Road) and Graveley Way, to let us have your own views on what type(s) of traffic calming you believe would be both effective and acceptable to villagers. Please email and/or phone – see contact details below.
