Conservation, Farming, Flooding: Our Natural Landscape? Ouse Washes Landscape Partnership Annual Conference Wednesday 19 November 2014

The Ouse Washes landscape area has a multitude of different uses. It has an important role in flood risk prevention; it is made up of quality agricultural land; internationally-renowned nature reserves provide a vital home for wildlife. This conference will look at whether competing uses can reconciled and be balanced whilst making the area a great place to live and work. Anyone interested in the Ouse Washes area is invited to attend the firstever Ouse Washes Landscape Partnership Conference which is taking place Wednesday 19th November from 9am -2pm at The Corn Exchange in St Ives, Cambridgeshire.

This conference - the first in a series of three, taking place annually - will explore the natural landscape of the Ouse Washes Landscape

Partnership area. The conference aims to provide attendees with an overview of future management challenges including issues around landscape-scale conservation, biodiversity value, agricultural importance and flood relief. A background to wetland creation schemes in the area will be given through presentations with discussion facilitated in small groups regarding the future importance of the natural landscape.

The Heritage Lottery Fund awarded a major grant to the Ouse Washes Landscape Partnership, Heart of the Fens scheme in March 2014. This OWLP scheme is funded till March 2017.

The OWLP area covers two counties, five districts and 29 parishes, and stretches for nearly 50 km from Downham Market in Norfolk to St. Ives in Cambridgeshire.

Police report: During the month of August the following crimes and incidents were reported: 7 incidents of anti-social behaviour.

Annual Pond Clean: The annual pond Clean was successfully undertaken on 27th September. The Parish Council's thanks are extended to those who took the time to assist in the task.

A14: Fenstanton Parish Council's Position on the proposed route: Following recent correspondence in the Hunts Post the meeting felt the balance should be re-addressed from the negative comments being promoted, concerning the proposed route. As Parishioners are aware Fenstanton has suffered from air and noise pollution since the current road was completed.

Fenstanton Parish Council fully supports the new proposed route as it will improve the quality of life to our community, although it will not totally remove the problems of pollution due to the prevailing direction of the wind. The meeting resolved to promote its support for the proposed route in a more vigorous manner to allow the wider community to understand that not all Parishes will be disadvantaged but that the new proposed route will bring benefits to some Parishes.

Dog Walking: It has been brought to the Parish Councils notice that some owners are not keeping their dogs on a lead when being exercised in the Village. Whilst the majority of dog owners are responsible in ensuring that their dogs are kept on a lead we would remind those who do allow their pets to run free that it is an offence under the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005. The conditions of the Act apply to, amongst other places, the following: roads, highways, footpaths and other rights of way, village greens, playing fields.

NOVEMBER BULLETIN FROM CAMBRIDGESHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE

FIREWORKS and bonfires can be plenty of fun for all the family to enjoy. The fire service recommends going to an organised firework display instead of holding one at home, however, if you do use fireworks or light a bonfire at home, we would ask residents to take on board our safety advice to ensure it is just their fireworks that go off with a bang:

- Keep fireworks in a closed box and always follow the instructions.
- Light them at arms length using a taper and stand well back.
- Never go back to a lit firework.
- Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them.
- Don't light bonfires in unsuitable weather, particularly in windy conditions.
- Don't leave bonfires unattended.
- Build bonfires well clear of buildings, fences and hedges.
- Never use flammable liquids to start the fire, and never burn dangerous rubbish such as aerosols, paint, foam furniture, rubber tyres, and batteries.
- Before you light the bonfire, check that children and animals are not hiding inside and are a safe distance away.

A14: The Parish Council would like to thank everyone who took the time to visit the recent exhibition and the open meeting held in the Village Hall. We set out to interpret the latest information issued to us by The Highways Agency and give some impression of what the new road will mean to Hilton residents. It is possible our exhibition and the strength of feeling shown at the open meeting have provoked a reaction from The Highways Agency. Hilton Parish Councillors have been invited to meet with representatives of the Highways Agency. Having taken on board the issues and concerns raised at the open meeting by parishioners' councillors will be looking to press these home to The Highways Agency and hopefully elicit some form of commitment to mitigate against the significant impact this road will have on Hilton. This meeting will take place shortly and of course any progress from this will be relayed back to Hilton residents as soon as possible.

We will, as promised, be advising each household when the next stage of the process is announced. This should include the period when individuals can register as interested parties. This will be the last period of public consultation and therefore the last time we as residents have an opportunity to express concerns and influence the outcome of the scheme. It is extremely important that we respond on mass if we want to achieve the highest quality design and the least amount of impact to Hilton. Some good news; the case of Ash Dieback reported earlier this year was a false alarm. Although this disease has reached the UK it has not yet found us here in Hilton.

Winter Volunteer Gritting: We have been advised that the winter gritting scheme has changed slightly this year. If you are currently a volunteer and would like to continue or if you would like to join the scheme please contact our Clerk who will be able to advise you of the new requirements.

Fenstanton in the 14th Century of The years before the Black Death of 1349:

The 14th century was an era of misfortunes for England and accordingly the village of Fenstanton. There were two immense natural disasters either of which would have been

sufficient to throw medieval Fenstanton back into the Dark Ages: The Great Famine and the Black Death. Both caused death and misery for our ancestral villagers.

The Great Famine of 1315

Throughout time there had always been local food shortages in which many people died of starvation. But by the beginning of the 14th century, the population of Fenstanton and the surrounding towns and villages had grown to such an extent that the land could provide enough resources to support it but only under the best of growing conditions. There was no longer any margin for crop failures or even harvest shortfalls. At the same time, the climate was undergoing a change, with cooler and wetter summers and earlier autumn storms.

A wet spring in the year 1315 made it impossible to plough all of the fields that were ready for cultivation and heavy rains rotted some of the seed grain before it could germinate. The resulting harvest was far smaller than usual and the food reserves of many families were quickly depleted. People gathered what food they could from the forests: edible roots, plants, grasses, nuts, and bark. Many people were badly weakened by the resulting malnutrition although the historical evidence suggests that relatively few died.

The spring and summer of 1316 were cold and wet again and peasant families now had less energy with which to till the land needed for a harvest to make up for the previous shortfall. They also possessed a much smaller amount of local food in reserve to sustain them until the next harvest.

By the spring of 1317 all classes of society were suffering; although, as might be expected, the lower classes suffered the most. Draft animals were slaughtered, seed grain was eaten, infants and the younger children were abandoned. Many of the elderly voluntarily starved themselves to death so that the younger members of the family might live to work the fields again. There were numerous reports of cannibalism.

The weather had returned to its normal pattern by the summer of 1317. The surviving people and animals were simply too weak to work effectively. Based on national figures, about ten to fifteen percent of the village population would have died from pneumonia, bronchitis, tuberculosis, and other sicknesses that the starving sufferers' weakness had made fatal. Consequently there were fewer mouths to feed so Fenstanton was able to recover, although only slowly.

It was not until about 1325 that the national food supply returned to a relatively normal state and the population began to increase again. The death rate had been high, and even nobles and clergy had perished from hunger. The world now seemed a less stable and "gentle" place than it had before the Great Famine. After 1328, the population of Fenstanton again began to rise and peaked in 1348, on the eve of the Black Death.

Next month we will take a look at the devastation that the Black Death caused Fenstanton in 1349.

the Church of England and it really is down to us, as villagers, to preserve our heritage for future generations whether through donations or joining in the various fund raising events through the year.


The September collection this year raised £1995.20 and GiftAid increases donations by 20% when reclaimed from Inland Revenue. A huge thank you again, to all who made this possible.

Plants of war and remembrance

Plant knowledge can sometimes seem a luxury of those with too much spare time, but as we contemplate Remembrance Sunday this month, it is perhaps timely to remind ourselves that plants are fundamental to life: providing the air that we breathe, the energy that we consume and the uplifting landscape of our lives. Under the sharpening effect of wartime, plants also came into focus for both practical and poetic motivations.

During both world wars, mass community collections of sphagnum moss were sent to the front to help staunch wounds: its absorbent and acidic properties helping to prevent infections. During World War Two, medical drug supplies were so severely disrupted by German occupation of mainland Europe and U-boat action in the shipping lanes that by the early 1940s there were critical shortages of essential medicines in British homes and hospitals. In 1941, the Ministry of Health established a Vegetable Drugs Committee at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew to publish guides for county herb collectors enlisted to make good the supply deficit. These provided specific instructions about what to collect and how to safely and effectively dry, bundle, and deliver the collections for the war effort. Girl guides, boy scouts, women's groups, primary school pupils were all mobilised to scour the countryside for foxglove, used to regulate heartbeat, deadly nightshade, valerian for use as a sedative, wild thyme, an antiseptic, burdock, colt's-foot, which provides a demulcent for soothing inflamed tissue, black horehound, a treatment for spasms and worm infections, and much more.

In the inter-war period much research had also been done into newly discovered set of metabolic compounds – vitamins. With home front shipments of citrus suspended during World War Two, plant research centred on rosehips as a rich source of vitamin C. Again half day holidays from school allowed children to gather native rosehips by the pound. Kew botanists discovered that rosehips from northern counties contained appreciably more vitamin C than those from the south, and so collection sites were adjusted accordingly. Rosehips were made into Vitamin C rich syrup, administered primarily as a scurvy preventative.

But plants do not only provide medical healing, as witnessed by the unique wartime industry of silk embroidered postcards. It is estimated that some 10 million silk embroidered postcards were created by French and Belgian women to sell as souvenirs to soldiers posted on the Western Front during World War One. The embroidered images found on the cards often include forget-me-nots, pansy flowers, rosebuds and bluebirds alongside patriotic messages, allied flags and regimental crests. These beautiful greetings would have been sent home giving no indication of what the soldiers were experiencing, sparing loved ones the true horrors of war. (**You can see an example on this month's front cover**)

So as you walk the Botanic Garden in Cambridge this month or through the Cambridgeshire countryside, ponder a minute the rich repository - not only of medicines and foodstuffs but of spiritual salve that is the plant kingdom. Perhaps include a red rose hip for remembrance this November in a flower arrangement, flick that pepper pot to distribute the poppy seeds and leave that seedling forget-me-not to flower next summer, so that the scarlet and blue may remind us to give thanks once more.

Royal British Legion in Hilton

The ceremony to remember and honour Stoker First Class, Lenham Yates from the Old Post Office, Hilton, was held at the Lychgate on Monday September 22nd, 100 years to the day since he was killed. Lenham's ship, HMS Aboukir was attacked off the coast of Holland, whilst patrolling the North Sea with two other Royal Navy ships,

HMS Cressy and HMS Hogue. Although 800 sailors were rescued,1400 tragically perished, including Lenham and Stoker First Class William Sadler from Tottenham, whose family are now living in Godmanchester. The deaths of all the sailors are recorded on the Naval Memorial in Chatham. Following the incident it was reported that all ranks and ratings displayed discipline, cheerful courage and ready self sacrifice.

Among those attending the ceremony were Royal British Legion members Colonel Derek Bristow, OBE, DL President, Huntingdonshire and District; Alan Scott, District Chairman; Grace Mclaren, Chairman Ladies Branch of St Ives and District; Rosemary Barber and Liz Lawrenson. Standard Bearers were Barry Pattison and Jane Crowe, Ladies Branch and Bugler was Kevin Charter. Also present were two Standard Bearers for the Royal Naval Association, Keith Ridley from St.Neots Branch and Karl Webb of the Huntingdon Branch.

We were also delighted to be able to welcome Lenham's two great nieces Jenny Cornwall and Pat Simonds from Fenstanton and William's granddaughter Barbara Warrior, great granddaughter Meg Stanford and great, great granddaughter Emma Kent, all from Godmanchester.

Mike Robinson, Poppy Appeal Organiser, St Ives and District Branch Royal British Legion welcomed the people present, explained the reason for the remembrance and described the incident which took place so long ago. After the Exhortation, Kevin Charter played the Last Post before the minute's silence and then the Reveille, our Vicar Reverend David Busk, led a short prayer after which Alan Scott recited a moving poem appropriate for the loss of ships crews at sea.

Emma then presented Margaret Shardlow, on behalf of Hilton Royal British Legion with a framed citation for Lenham Yates and a dried flower posy of poppies and cornflowers, both of which will be displayed in the church.

The large group of people from Hilton, St Ives, St Neots, Fenstanton, Godmanchester and the Stukeleys who attended the memorial then moved to the Church for refreshments, to exchange memories, renew friendships and to make new ones. They also reflected that the next such ceremony here will be that of Lenham's brother, Bertram in March.




