This involved them giving up their beds overnight (in October) to sleep on the chilly floor of Fenstanton Parish Church in order to raise money for refugees. Those who took part ranged in age from 8 to 80. After soup and prayers (to which wider church friends came to offer support) the group settled down to a less than ideal night and soon realised how much we have to be thankful for. Generous support means the event has so far raised an amazing £800.

**Police report:** During the month of August, the latest information available, the following crimes and incidents were reported: 7 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 2 incidents of criminal damage; 2 incident of other theft.

<u>Local Highway Initiative grant</u>: The Parish Council resolved to apply for grant funding for the application of double yellow lines on the A14 east bound slip road to prevent lorry parking which is creating a disturbance and nuisance to the residents of Oaklands.

<u>Whippet Coaches timetable changes</u>: The Parish Council has been notified that minor changes are to be made to some Saturday and Sunday evening departure times. The change becomes effective from 26th October.

**Wyton Airfield future development**: A public exhibition is being held on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> and Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> October between 10.00am and 4.00pm at Huntingdon Library.

## NOVEMBER BULLETIN FROM CAMBRIDGESHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE

FIREWORKS and bonfires can be plenty of fun for all the family to enjoy. The fire service recommends going to an organised firework display instead of holding one at home, however, if you do use fireworks or light a bonfire at home, we would ask residents to take on board our safety advice to ensure it is just their fireworks that go off with a bang:

- Keep fireworks in a closed box and always follow the instructions.
- Light them at arms length using a taper and stand well back.
- Never go back to a lit firework.
- Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them.
- Don't light bonfires in unsuitable weather, particularly in windy conditions.
- Don't leave bonfires unattended.
- Build bonfires well clear of buildings, fences and hedge.
- Never use flammable liquids to start the fire, and never burn dangerous rubbish such as aerosols, paint, foam furniture, rubber tyres, and batteries.

  Before you light the bonfire, check that children and animals are not hiding inside and are a safe distance away.

<u>A14:</u> The examination period ends on the 13th November 2015. The examiners then have a period of three months to prepare their report for submission following which the Secretary of State will have three months in which to make a decision.

The Parish Council has continued to attend the relevant meetings held by the examiners to press the case for the maximum mitigation possible for Hilton should the scheme be approved. <u>Rural Housing Exception Scheme:</u> The Parish Council will take forward a survey in the village to gain Parishioners views on this matter.

**Beacon:** The Parish Council is considering two options for the beacon. The first would be to make alterations to the existing beacon on a cost neutral basis to make it easier to use on a temporary basis. The other option is to obtain a gas powered beacon similar to that used in Huntingdon town centre recently and to dispose of the existing beacon in order to fund its purchase. This will be discussed at the next meeting.

The Queen's 90<sup>th</sup> Birthday: It was resolved that the Parish Council would register for more information on the national 'Clean for the Queen' campaign which is proposed to take place over the 4th/5th/6th/ March 2016. Further updates will be made available once that information is forthcoming.

<u>Defibrillator:</u> It was resolved to investigate the possible purchase and installation of a defibrillator at a suitable location in the village. One of the schemes being looked at has just been launched by The British Heart Foundation and the Parish Council will obtain more details of this scheme as well as alternative quotes.

<u>Parish Council Owned Street Lighting:</u> The Parish Council agreed to award the contract to maintain the street lights owned by the Parish Council to K&M Lighting Services Ltd on a 3 year contract on the basis of their more competitive quote.

<u>Next Meeting:</u> The next full meeting of the Parish Council will take place on Monday 2nd November at 7.30pm at Hilton Village Hall. We would like to remind parishioners who intend to speak at any Parish Council meeting that it must be related to an agenda item published in advance.

### Medieval Life in Fenstanton - Hygiene

The villagers of Medieval Fenstanton would have smelled pretty ripe. Even the top people would have struck modern nostrils as noticeably aromatic. It's safe to assume that we would have found the entire village afflicted with B.O. and since everyone stank, no one noticed it or recorded it for history. Sensitive souls might bury their faces in nosegays or scented handkerchief when a long, unwashed regiment of soldiers or well-travelled people tramped past on the old Roman Road, but most of our forebearers remained blissfully unaware of their stench.



### To bath or not to bath?

Ablutions were skimpy in those days. A little dab here and there with a damp cloth would do you, even in the most fashionable of places. If you insisted on thoroughly washing, a wooden tub would do a fine job. But it required hard work. It had to be lugged from the laundry house, or wherever it was stored, and filled with water, hoisted from the well, then that had to be warmed. Something had to be found to use as a towel. And where in the world did the homemade soap get to?

With all this ado, a semblance of privacy had to be preserved during the adventure. So a good, soaking bath was a luxury that only the well-off could afford and few of them tackled the job more than a couple of times a year. Anyway, everyone knew that too much bathing would destroy your natural oils and leave you wide open to the ravages of various diseases!

### <u>Soap</u>

They did have soap in the medieval period. A simple soap that was available to most people was a mixture of tallow (sheep fat) so it was relatively cheap, to which was added stale urine to give ammonia which had a bleaching effect. Even cheaper to make at home was soap made of pig fat. Cold water never hot water was used. The soap was rubbed into the cloth and then beaten with a wooden paddle called a 'beetle' which forced the dirt through the fibres. People soaps cost more to produce and contained a variety of perfumes depending on personal likes. The best personal soap was called Castile soap and was reserved for people of wealth.

### Teeth

Many of our village ancestors did try to look after their teeth and a form of tooth brushes were freely available from passing traders. Sticks of hazel, liquorice or the marshmallow root were chewed to produce a bristle end much as modern teeth brush. Toothpaste could be as simple as salt and sage this was rubbed onto the teeth with a rag then bushed. Sage stopped bleeding gums and the salt removed plaque. Throughout the Middle Ages, most people simply rubbed salt on their teeth. In the Medieval period, barbers pulled teeth as well as cutting hair. The red and white stripes of a barber pole symbolize the blood that normally was lost during tooth extraction by the barber. The poor people of the village simply had their teeth extracted and then went without dentures. One can only imagine the difficulty they had with biting and eating once they became middle aged. By the age of 20, most people had rotten teeth with some teeth already extracted. By the age of 50, many had lost most or even all of their teeth. This must have affected their diets as they were unable to chew their food. Perhaps the "good old days" were not as good as we sometimes imagine.

Each year at this time we hold a service for those who wish to remember their loved ones. This year our **All Souls' Service** – a Service of Commemoration of the Departed – is to be held on Saturday 31st October, starting at 11.00am.

This is a short service where we read out names of loved ones that have been submitted to us. We send out invitations to those bereaved during this last year and to others we know of. We also have an area within the churchyard that is set aside for the ashes of loved ones to be buried. This is called the **Area of Cremated Remains**. We are currently reviewing how best we can make sure that this area remains calm and attractive for all those visiting it. The church has to follow a set of requirements that outline what is allowed to be placed on and around the tablets in this area. Taking as guidance the rules set out by the Diocese of Ely, these requirements have not been enforced for some time and, as a result, the area has become untidy. In starting to follow the requirements, we are sensitive to the wishes of loved ones in their remembering, yet are also mindful of our responsibilities as a church to keep this area in a respectful state.

A copy of these requirements can be found on our website and on the church noticeboard. For those who have items present that fall outside our requirements, we are offering a period of grace until the end of November.

We look forward to welcoming you to our service, and also to receiving enquiries from anyone in the parish who would like to remember their loved one by having their ashes interred in this area of the churchyard.

In fact this photo is **not** of preparations for an unneighbourly act in Hilton. It shows the trial of a piece of equipment designed by a member of the Cambridge branch of national charity REMAP (<a href="www.remap.org.uk">www.remap.org.uk</a>), which tries to pick up where the NHS / Social Services leave off.

Many disabled people need specialised gadgets or equipment which will make life just a bit easier. However, often there is nothing available from statutory or commercial sources. In those circumstances, often following referral from an occupational therapist, REMAP's volunteer engineers get together to devise a solution.

Recent examples include: specially adapted brakes on a bike whose five-year old rider has only one hand; a protective cover for a tablet, so that it doesn't shatter when a disabled child drops it; reducing the height of a 'shooting stick'; modifying a kitchen stool for a youngster who had suffered a stroke and many more. The picture shows two REMAP members testing a rig built for a severely disabled child who wanted to take part in archery, he now can — without 'posting' an arrow through anyone's letterbox!

### **CAMBRIDGE BOTANIC GARDENS**

### **Breathing patterns**

As late autumn strips back the Garden to its bare bones, the season also brings into focus how different to ours are the regulatory systems that govern a plant's development. A plant, in the right growing conditions, can initiate, sustain and deliver its own genetic blueprint from seed to maturity, employing a vast and only partially understood range of hormonal and chemical checks, balances and reactions that can promote, differentiate and halt growth as required, often in response to the environment.

The Garden paths are now a tapestry of gold, scarlet and flame-coloured leaves, the patterns of fallen foliage representing the culmination of the growing season. Photosynthesis, this miraculous ability of a plant to capture the energy of the sun through the



chlorophyll in its green leaves to fuel growth, is being closed down for the winter. In response to shortening day-length, a corky thickening at the base of the leaf stalk has shut off supplies to encourage leaf fall; the leaves themselves are in the throes of chemical decomposition and as the chlorophyll breaks down, the process unmasks autumn's reds and golds. And all this activity and change is regulated and achieved without a brain or central nervous system to deliver and receive messages.

But as this bonfire cools, different patterns are revealed that again show plants doing things differently. Tree barks in late autumn and through the winter, particularly in cherry and birch, are striking for their decorative horizontal stripes, sometimes widening to eye-shaped markings. These are the lenticels, which function as pores, providing a pathway for the direct <u>exchange of gases</u> between the internal tissues of the plant and the atmosphere just as stomata do in leaves (but they are much smaller and harder to see!).

Plant cells respire, just as animal cells do, absorbing oxygen and producing carbon dioxide and respire all the time, day and night, as we do. Plants, however, do not have lungs or a blood stream – their breathing patterns are all their own and best observed in the tree barks of winter or on many of the fruits this harvest time – apples and pears often have a noticeable stippling of lenticels and can serve as an indicator of when to pick. When the lenticels start to darken due to the formation of cork cells, the fruit is ripening.
