Hello, how are you doing?

At the time of writing the service plan was looking ok but we can't say with any certainty that there won't be changes. For example, due to the current rising number of coronavirus cases, we are thinking that it might be wiser to have the whole of the Remembrance Sunday service outside, probably using the area near where the Church Centre is. If that is the case, then the service will start later than the time we said in Spectrum last month. Please do look out for more details as we will endeavour to let you know of any changes as best we can. But we are planning to have an **Act of Remembrance** at the **Fenstanton War Memorial** in the **Parish Council Cemetery**, beginning around **10.45am/10.50am**, ready to time a silence at 11am. There will be laying of wreaths. (The cemetery is adjacent to St Peter & St Paul's churchyard, separated by a path.)

A few thankyous if I may. Thank you to those who kindly donated so generously at our Harvest services. All the contributions, both food and financial have been safely delivered to St Ives foodbank. Thank you to those who rang a quarter peal of bells for a very special 90th birthday (Happy birthday A). The bells ringing on that particular Saturday caused some confusion as some people thought it might be Sunday!!

And thank you to everyone who helps to keep things organised in a covid responsible way so we can continue to have services in our two churches, at Fen Drayton and Fenstanton. I am excited to say we have several weddings booked for 2022 and 2023. We are trying to catch up with postponed baptisms and in our monthly Worship For All services we pray for those who were baptised in that month, in previous years. Sadly, we have said farewell to those who have died, may they rest in peace and rise in glory. In our prayers we remember those who mourn.

So, as the church's year draws to a close, and we look to the new church year beginning on the first Sunday of Advent on 28th November, we hope and pray that everyone will stay well and keep safe during these challenging times. Please be assured of a warm welcome at either of our churches in the benefice but we respectfully ask that you do not attend any services if you are showing signs/symptoms of covid19 or any other virus or infection that could be transmitted to others. Fenstanton and Bertha Pitfield:1905 - 1986

During the recent lockdown I took to walking on the old Cambridge Road up to the Fen Drayton turn, to do this I had to pass the estate called Pitfield Close. Even in lockdown there were always people walking with or without a dog, jogging or cycling. I got to thinking



how many of these people actually saw the name Pitfield and did it mean anything to them?

It is now thirty-five years since Bertha Pitfield died and in that time the village has expanded in a very big way. There are many people new to the village who have never even heard of Bertha Pitfield.

Bertha lived in the village for forty-seven years, from 1939 to 1986 and was very much part of village life throughout that time. At the end of her life she became a benefactor to the village. So, let me tell you her story.

Being abandoned shortly after her birth on the 18th March 1905, she had a difficult start to life. She was taken in at the foundling hospital in London and never knew who her parents were. The babies were baptised and given a new name. It was thought that a completely new start would give them the best chance of a good life. It was also important for the mothers to be assured of confidentiality so that they could rebuild their lives. Once received, children were sent to be wet-nursed with foster families in the countryside, where they stayed until they were between five and six years old. At the age of sixteen, girls were generally apprenticed for domestic service:

In the 1911 census we find that Bertha was 6-years old and had been fostered out to Eliza Thorn, a 67 year old widow who lived in Dean Park Cottages, Hadlow in Kent and took in lodgers. Bertha was most probably used as a skivvy.

Eleven years later in 1922, when Bertha was 17, the electoral register shows us that Bertha was employed as a servant by Harry Porter Jervis (a bank clerk) and his wife Annie Louisa, who lived in Cheadle Hulme, Manchester. After the death of Annie Louisa Jervis in May 1930, Bertha became housekeeper to Mr Harry Jervis who was by now a bank manager.

In 1939 when Harry Jervis was 64-years old and with WW2 on the horizon, he made the decision to buy a retirement home that was safely in the countryside. Harry Jervis's brother Charles Hill Jervis was 66-years old and a retired coal merchant. His sister Magdalene was 71-years old and a retired school mistress. Both decided to join him and to live out their retirement and the war together. The housekeeper Bertha was treated as an adopted niece, the family leaving her the house and estate in their wills

It would be rather difficult to understand how the two brothers who lived in Manchester could have known about a house for sale in Fenstanton. This is where Magdalene comes into the story. Firstly, in 1911, Magdalene was the head teacher at the St Pancras Foundling Hospital for Children in Grey's Inn Lane, St Pancras in London. It would be reasonable to assume that she was instrumental in sending Bertha to be fostered by Eliza Thorne or at the very least, she would have known about it. So Bertha was someone known to her from a young age and I suspect it was her recommendation that brought Bertha to work for Magdalene's brother Harry.

Secondly, why Fenstanton? At one time Magdalene worked as a school mistress in Fen Ditton, Cambridgeshire, so it is more than possible that she continued to have contact within the area and when Vernon House came up for sale she would have seen that it would be ideal for the three siblings and their housekeeper Bertha Pitfield. And so, the four of them arrived in Fenstanton sometime in 1939 and settled into their new home. The household increased when three evacuees were allocated to the house; even more work for Bertha.

We have no way of knowing how long the evacuees stayed at Vernon House but Bertha quickly threw herself into village life. She served in the VAD (Voluntary Aid Detachment) & WVS (Woman's Voluntary Service). In addition she kept geese and pigs and gave each one a name! She also worked in the munitions factory in the village hall. She was the village national savings collector and ran the 'potato club' buying seed pots in bulk and selling them cheaply to local gardeners.

For the WW2 victory celebrations in 1945, Bertha had a pig killed and provided two hams for the party. During the war when she had a pig killed she would share out sausages and pies in the village on the basis that people had given scraps to feed the pigs.

A keen bowler she agreed to have the village bowling green and club house built at the bottom of her garden. This was on the understanding that she would be allowed access to the green whenever she wanted. In 1965 the first village bypass (A604/A14/A1307) was built and this cut Bertha's garden in half. No longer was she able to walk to the end of her garden to have a game of bowls. At the end of her life the bowls club and land was donated to the village.

Later in her life when Vernon House became too big for her to manage, she built a bungalow in her side garden now called 'The Slipway'. Bertha Pitfield died 11th October 1986 in 'The Slipway'. She was cremated and her ashes interred in the parish churchyard 16th October 1986. Her will was probated 8th January 1987 and after three personal bequests, she left money to the Fenstanton bowls club, with the remainder of her estate being shared out between the parish council (for the upkeep of the village clock tower). The United Reformed Church, the Literary Institute and the parochial church council for the upkeep of the church centre. Outside of the village she left money to The Huntingdon & Peterborough Chess Association, the Huntingdon Woman's Bowling Federation Benevolent Fund and the Cambridge County Woman's Bowling Benevolent Fund.

Three silver Birch trees were planted in the cemetery in tribute to her, a plaque was put up in the United Reformed Church chapel and another in the church centre. A room in the refurbished church centre has been named after her and now a small housing estate bares her name.





Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Monday 4th October

Green Open Spaces

Cllr Ian Stott, in his capacity as Tree Warden, has completed the tree survey with one tree surgeon and is organising to do so with two other contractors. He reported that the trees that were down in Tithe Lane were cleared by a volunteer group. Concerns have been raised by a parishioner with regards to the silt levels in the ponds in Graveley Way, but this is expected to wash away once the water levels rise. The Green Open Spaces working group has drafted a new maintenance tender document which was agreed by the Council with some minor amendments. This will now be advertised on both the PC website and the Government's contracts finder website and companies invited to quote.

A14 Legacy Project

The Council has agreed the design of the works to improve the banks of the Ware in Graveley Way. Steel posts will be driven into the bed of the Ware approximately 1.5m from the road and concrete gravel boards installed. These gravel boards will be capped with timber and then infilled with soil and seeded upon completion. The Clerk will contact the Highways Department at the County Council to obtain permission for these works.

Works to the Ware

The Council has received complaints from parishioners with regards to the state of the far bank of the Ware in Graveley Way. Technically, this bank is the responsibility of the Riparian owners whose properties back onto the Ware. As a one-off, the Council has authorised an expenditure of up to £270 to appoint a contractor to improve the condition of this bank.

Diffusion Tubes

As the Council now has three years' worth of data regarding the levels of nitrogen dioxide on Potton Road, they have decided to discontinue the diffusion tubes at this time.

Zoom Account

Unfortunately, due to the current legislation, the Council and its committees are unable to meet remotely so the Council has resolved to cancel its Zoom account.

Draft Budget and Precept Request

The Council considered the proposed budget and precept request of £31,550 (increase of £950 or 3.1%) and resolved to defer this until further information is received regarding the cost of the new maintenance contract.

Informal Discussion with Councillors

Two Councillors will be present in the village hall for 30 minutes prior to each full Council meeting, on a rota system. This is to give parishioners the chance to speak informally to a Councillor about any matter. This will initially be for a trial period of 6 months. Parishioners are still welcome to speak on an agenda item during the public participation session of a Council meeting.

Bus Shelter Roof

The supporting beam of the bus shelter roof is deteriorating, and the Council resolved that the Maintenance Person will establish what materials are required and carry out work to secure the roof.

Dog Mess

There are increasing reports that dog mess is being left on the Green and also reports that bagged dog waste is being put into homeowners' private wheelie bins. Hilton Parish Council would like to remind all dog owners and walkers to pick up after their dogs and to utilise the proper bins provided at the entrance to the Wilderness, opposite the Village Hall and opposite the Cricket Pavilion.

Litter

There are also disappointing reports of litter being left on the Green, particularly near the football goal posts. Please act responsibly and take your rubbish home with you or utilise the above-mentioned litter bins.

20s Plenty for Cambridgeshire



Hilton Parish Council has resolved that it supports 20's Plenty for Cambridgeshire's aim for wide-area, default signed 20mph limits with public engagement for this Parish and across Cambridgeshire's urban and village settlements. Hilton Community Garden: To harm and to heal...two interesting plants

Plants have many uses and among them we have found the vital ingredients for cosmetics and medicines. The earliest gardens concentrated only on herbs and medicinal plants as there were no other remedies for illnesses. Such gardens were known as Gardens of Physic and Chelsea, where the annual Flower Show is held, is a good example. Botanical gardens developed from herbal gardens. The first of these was in Oxford on the four acre site it occupies to this day. Botanists were regarded as we regard dispensing chemists..there to give advice and offer pills.

There are some interesting cases of native plants which can be harmful as well helpful.

Foxgloves Digitalis



Foxgloves are native plants or wild flowers. Cultivated forms come in other colours, but the decorative spikes of the native Foxglove are purple. They grow happily in dry shade and we have planted some under the trees where we hope to combine them with other native species particularly ones which encourage insects and birds.

Digitalis its Latin name is a plant with an interesting dual nature. Parts of it are poisonous, but if processed properly it offers a very successful treatment for heart problems. Medicine from this plant helps increase the efficiency of the heart rate. William Withering as long ago as 1785 described how drug preparations of 'digoxin' help to regulate the pulse.

Deadly Nightshade Atropa Belladonna



Though a native plant, this is not one to find room for in a Community Garden. Everything about

the appearance of this plant with its dark purple flowers looks sinister, except for the wonderfully shiny, juicy, black berries. Be warned appearances are deceptive: these are highly toxic; be reassured...none have been seen in Hilton. A few years ago in a village nearer to Cambridge a family out for a Sunday walk picked some of these beautiful berries and made them into a pie. The whole family was ill and had to be treated in Addenbrookes hospital suffering from symptoms which have been described as:


"hot as a hare, blind as a bat, red as a beet and mad as a hen". The colourful language helping the physician to spot the diagnosis!

Whilst the plant's common name **Deadly Nightshade** points out its danger to the public, its Latin name indicates how it is used for medical and cosmetic purposes. **Belladonna** is the Italian word for a beautiful lady. The plant acquired the name because eye drops made from it were used to dilate the pupils, making eyes appear darker and larger. Renaissance portraits certainly featured women whose beauty had been enhanced by this cosmetic. Atropine is used to treat the symptoms of low heart rate.

Sophisticated modern techniques now ensure that the treatments mentioned above are factory made.

The botanist/apothecary/pharmacist no longer has to go out to collect the plants him/herself. However in Romeo and Juliet, Shakespeare provides a good example of an early herbalist. Friar Lawrence, Romeo's mentor, enters carrying a basket of herbs that he has just gathered. He says "For naught so vile that on earth doth live/ Doth to the earth some special good doth give" the point that all plants have some good uses, even though it might not be apparent. Establishing the Friar's knowledge of botany is important in the plot as he later makes the potion that puts Juliet into such a deep sleep her family believe she is dead. The recipe is not given!
