Be Safe! Be Seen! On Your Bike

Now is the time to check your lights and replace batteries or even fit new and better lights. Modern bike lights often use LEDs that can be seen from great distances. Many give the option to flash or to be on continuously.



You can also increase your visibility by wearing high-visibility clothing by day and adding reflective items to your clothing or bike at night. Reflectors can be fitted to most types of bike pedals and to the spokes of wheels.

They could save your life!!

You can improve your safety in many ways. Consider wearing an approved bike helmet. Fit and use a bike bell to give a polite warning of your approach.

Cycle thefts are on the increase. The advice from the police is to go to Tesco or Halfords and buy a D Lock. They cost less than £10. Cable locks are easily cut.

Have you ever thought about researching your family history? At the Cambridgeshire Family History Society Fair on 25th October, we can help!

With the eleventh series of *Who Do You Think You Are?* airing on our screens this summer, family history has never been more popular.

Expert advice will be on hand at the Cambridgeshire Family History Society Fair on 25th October. Speakers will teach you how to find your Cambridgeshire ancestors and then show you how you can turn your research into an interesting story for your family and friends. In this very special 100th anniversary year since the start of the First World War and 70th year since D-Day, you will also hear about the Imperial War Museum Duxford's collection of Second World War images as well as learning how to date old photographs from looking at clues given in pictures.

Exhibitors from family and local history societies will be attending, as well as organisations offering everything that you need to help you with your research. Whether your ancestors are from Cambridgeshire, or beyond, experienced Family History Society volunteers will be available for one-to-one sessions to give advice about getting started and what to do if you get stuck. There will also be free access to the main genealogy providers' websites throughout the day. Share ideas and practical tips with your fellow family historians and, for a small charge, there will be soup and a roll for lunch while you chat!

Police report: Chief Inspector Hunt attended the meeting and gave a comprehensive insight into policing within the District. He had reviewed the Parish crime figures for dwelling and non-dwelling burglary for the period March to September. The figures showed an increase in both types of crime and a full explanation of the action taken to identify the culprits and the method used to prioritize the type of crime for investigation. The meeting was advised that the improved road links allow villains to operate over a greater distance than in the past. The meeting was advised that policing priorities are changing with a greater emphasis now being given to human trafficking and with a heightened national security status. It is appreciated that the 101 telephone service is underperforming and that the waiting time is unacceptable, however the problems are being addressed and an improvement is starting to be seen.

During the month of June the following crimes and incidents were reported: 4 incidents of criminal damage; 3 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 1 incident of vehicle crime; 2 incidents of violence; 1 incident of other theft; 1 incident of bicycle theft.

During the month of July the following crimes and incidents were reported: 2 incidents of criminal damage; 2 incidents of vehicle crime; 5 incidents of anti-social behaviour; 1 incident of drugs.

Parishioners are urged to ensure that all doors are locked and windows are closed when properties are unoccupied and to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour to the Police telephone 101, Crimestoppers can be contacted on 0800 55 51 11 or in an emergency 999.

Overgrowing hedges: As autumn approaches and the growing period for trees and hedges comes to an end residents and landowners are asked to ensure that foliage is cut back from footpaths etc.

Speeding: Parishioners may have noticed that the Community Speedwatch signs are now in place on the Low Road. Following comments by residents concerning speeding on the High Street and in Headlands a speed check has been undertaken. The results indicate that the number of vehicles exceeding the speed limit is very low and the problem is that of vehicles being driven at an inappropriate speed for the conditions which gives the perception of speeding. Another speed check will be undertaken in the near future but drivers are requested to be vigilant to actions of other drivers.

Next Meeting: The next meeting of Fenstanton Parish Council will be held on **Thursday 9th October** at 7:30pm at Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School, School Lane, Fenstanton. Members of the public and press are welcome.

The minutes of previous meetings are available on the Village website.

Hilton Fireworks 2014: 1st November 2014, Hilton will hold its firework night on Saturday 1st November with the fireworks being set off as usual at 7pm. Full details of the event will be posted on the Council's website, www.hilton-pc.co.uk nearer the time. Please do come and support the event if you can.

A14: By time Spectrum will be published the Parish Council working group will have run a three day exhibition between 21st and 23rd September. The Parish Council will be taking forward feedback received from Parishioners and will update the Council's website as the next stages of the project come around.

Weee Recycling: The first Weee (Wiser) recycling event happened in Hilton on July 17th, just under half a tonne of small appliances were collected. Not a bad start and of course this has stopped these items ending up in a landfill site. The collection also earned the Parish Council £65.52 which is welcomed. The next collection date is set for Wednesday February 18th. Please contact Jo Perez, our Clerk if you would like any other details on this scheme.

Ditches: It was agreed whilst water levels are low that vital work be carried out on two of the Villages ditches. Work will be carried at The Ware and Reeves Ditch. The work will be carried out by JSC Services .

Cambridge Future Transport: It looks increasingly likely the Number 3 bus currently running on a Saturday will be withdrawn, as it is currently a subsidised service.

Royal British Legion: The Parish Council has made a donation of £60.00 to the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal.

Next Meeting: The next full meeting of the Parish Council will take place at 7:30 pm on **Monday 6th October** at Hilton Village Hall.

A tale of two ex-hurricanes and how they changed the course of this years summer and influenced the start of autumn has been the main weather event during the last four months.

However, before that, when I concluded my last article it was early May and the question was following March and April's much warmer than normal conditions, would this pattern continue through May and on into the summer? Well yes it did, making Spring this year the third warmest since 1910. In terms of the amount of rainfall and sunshine, the three Spring months were, however, unexceptional.

Warm weather continued for most of June and throughout July resulting in a sequence of eight consecutive months with above average temperatures. Rainfall tended to be thundery in nature with half of June's rain falling on the 27th/28th and most of July's rain falling on the 10th. In July, half the days reached 25C (77F) or above, the hottest day of the summer occurring on the 18th when the temperature reached 32.3C (90.2F), courtesy of Spanish Plume.

The warm weather continued during the first nine days of August, when a dramatic change was heralded by violent storms caused by warm humid air ahead of ex-hurricane Bertha crossing the UK. This brought torrential rain to parts of East Anglia, though as is often the case with thundery rain there were marked differences in the amounts which fell within short distances. Flash flooding occurred in Bar Hill and along the A428 from Cambridge towards Cambourne. This contributed to Cambridge ending up as the wettest official recording station in East Anglia with over 5" (132mm.) compared with less than 3" (74mm.) in Hilton for the month of August.

Bertha crossed the UK on the 10th/11th of August introducing much cooler and unsettled weather conditions for the rest of the month. As a result, the average temperature was below average making it the coolest August since 1993. The much cooler nights made for more comfortable conditions for sleeping, a pleasant relief after many warm humid nights in July.

Lastly, with fog more likely in the days to come, did you know that the tiny droplets of water that make up fog are so small that it would take 7000,000,000 of them to produce a tablespoonful of water? Towards the end of August a second ex-hurricane, Cristobal headed towards the UK but this time its track was to the north of Britain, drawing in high pressure in its wake. This produced two weeks of quiet settled weather at the start of autumn, so the two ex-hurricanes produced radically different outcomes weather wise, their paths were dictated by the changing position of the Jet Stream.

I will end as usual with a couple of thoughts. As we know, the weather is always a ready topic of discussion but it has also inspired song writers through the ages.

Take rain for example as an element to express feelings and emotions. From the optimistic "Just singing in the rain" by Gene Kelly to "Why does it always rain on me" by Travis. Ella Fitzgerald sang philosophically "Into each life some rain must fall" and Buddy Holly sang "Raining in my heart", and "Purple rain" by Prince plus many other references to rain to reflect ones mood.

Sharing autumn's bounty

The word *harvest in fact* comes from the Anglo-Saxon word *haerfest* meaning autumn, but today the word has come to mean the gathering in of the farmer's crops and the final picking and storing of our allotment and orchard fruit, and even, occasionally, the offering of tins of baked beans or tomato soup to the school harvest collection!

But the real autumn harvest for the wildlife in our gardens is not restricted to the perfect specimens of the supermarket shelves but includes all shed seed heads, cones, nuts, flower heads, berries, drupes, fruits, rotting wood and deciduous leaves raining down from the tree canopies. It is time for a pre-winter feast to stock up on reserves. Red admiral butterflies are starting to congregate in the south of the country after summer sojourns up north and love feasting on fallen rotting apples and pears – in fact gathering a tray of windfalls in a sunny spot is great for watching butterflies such as red admirals, but also commas and second brood small tortoiseshells close up. Long-tailed tits become more active again in private gardens, picking off soft fruit and hedge berries. 2014 is predicted to be a 'mast year', a complex, little-understood natural phenomenon which sees some tree species produce very large crops of seeds - good news for small mammals and larger birds like jays. Many plant species like poppies play a numbers game, producing enormous amounts of seed knowing that the vast majority will not find the perfect growing conditions, but will become protein-rich nuggets for smaller birds and mammals. The carpet of autumn leaves is not only a pleasure to kick through but provides a permanently damp, dark and cool habitat for invertebrates such as slugs, snails, worms, millipedes, woodlice, spiders and other toad and frog delicacies which, together with fungi, are essential for breaking down this nutrient rich bounty so that it can re-invigorate the life cycle. Gathering up some leaf litter into a large glass jar and allowing it to settle is a great way to observe the invertebrate army at work.

Busy lives have led to many making their gardens as low maintenance as possible with large areas of paving, decking and planting restricted to exotics in pots. Our increasing reliance on cars for transport has increased the amount of land put down to sterile hard landscaping. As we see more intense development, our private gardens will have a more and more important role to play in helping to maintain the richness of wildlife in the ecosystem, so resist the urge to tidy the garden too manically this *haerfest*, and let the wildlife share in the harvest.

Celebrate this year's bumper harvest at the region's biggest **Apple Day** at Cambridge University Botanic Garden, 10.00am- 4.00pm on **Sunday 26th October**, where the Main Lawn tent will house local apple juice and cider producers, bakers and cheese makers together with the apple tasting stations, which will offer a wide range of apples grown in the East of England to try before you buy.

Experts from the East of England Apples and Orchards Project (EEAOP) will offer a pruning advice service and will be bringing their comprehensive display of Cambridgeshire apple varieties, so bring in your unidentified apples from the garden or community orchard and see if the EEAOP experts can name them for you. Plus find out about the Cambridge Community Collection, an apple orchard installation for the city.

Normal Garden admission applies, plus £3 Apple Day ticket for everyone 17+, available in advance from the Garden ticket offices for fast track entry on the day

The Botanic Garden is open October 10am-5pm, November & December 10am-4pm. Admission is £4.50, Giftaid admission £4.95 or join the Friends, get free admission and help the Garden grow! The Royal British Legion in Hilton

Thank you all for all your support for our Hilton Remembers 1914-1918 exhibition and our commemorative evening on 4th August.



This being the 100th Anniversary of the start of the First World War, in July, the 70th Anniversary of D Day and in September the 70th Anniversary of the battle of Arnhem. We hope that folk living in Hilton will feel able to support the Royal British Legion, during Remembrance fortnight, 25th October to 8th November by buying a poppy and/or volunteering to collect on the Legion's behalf.

We recently met a paratrooper, Michael Lewis, who was badly injured in Afghanistan in 2008 during Operation Eagle Summit, in which their aim was to escort the new turbine for the Kajaki Dam to provide more electricity, water and better agriculture to the people of Helmand Province. During this time Corporal Lewis and the seven men under his command came under heavy enemy fire. Corporal Lewis was severely injured to be told, once he was admitted to the Field Hospital at Camp Bastion, that he would lose his left arm and right leg. He was then flown to Selly Oak hospital in the UK. His first memory on his return to UK, was being visited by a man and a woman in Royal British Legion uniform, who gave him essential toiletries, clothes, a mobile phone and a laptop to enable him to contact his family. Michael has undergone many visits to the operating theatre over the last six years, but neither his arm or leg have been amputated and he is now seeking employment in "civvy street". Since receiving his terrible injuries the Royal British Legion have supported him and his wife by being there and helping them adapt to Michael's new situation.

We hope that you can spare sometime to support the Royal British Legion to help all the other servicemen and servicewomen and their families, like Michael.

The environment benefits too as every time a tanker comes out to make a delivery, it is using a lot of diesel – a full tanker can get as little as a horrifying 8 miles per gallon. If deliveries are organised so that one tanker delivers to several customers in a village, instead of making lots of individual deliveries, the fuel consumption is reduced and so is traffic in the village.

There are five easy steps to cheaper heating oil:

Commissioner urges drivers to “belt-up”



Cambridgeshire's Police and Crime Commissioner Sir Graham Bright is backing a campaign to encourage car users to wear seatbelts.

The campaign is part of a Europe-wide blitz on seatbelts. European research suggests that about 50% of all car occupants that die in fatal accidents in the EU could have survived if they had been wearing their seat belt.

Sir Graham said: “Road safety is one of the biggest concerns the public raises with me. The chance of serious injury is greatly increased if you are not wearing a seat belt and can have long term consequences for both the injured as well as their families. So please belt-up and make sure those in the car with you do likewise.”

Throughout September Cambridgeshire Constabulary will be targeting those who don't wear seatbelts on the county's roads and raising awareness of the dangers of not belting up.

Roads Policing Sergeant Chris Huggins said: "Over the coming weeks officers from our roads policing unit will be carrying out regular patrols targeting those flouting the law in relation to wearing a seatbelt. This campaign is not just about fining people for breaking the law, it's also about giving them valuable advice which could save their life."

Those caught not using the life-saving device can be fined up to £500.

OCTOBER BULLETIN FROM CAMBRIDGESHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE

WINTER is coming and after seeing a rise in chimney fires last year, Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is encouraging all residents to get their chimney professionally swept before the cold sets in.

Top tips to enjoy an open fire safely:

- Sweep your chimney at least once a year and get brickwork inspected, especially the chimney breast and roof space.
- Do not bank fires too high or overload the grate, and remember to let them burn down well and check the hearth before going to bed.
- Use a fire or spark guard to prevent accidental fires.
- Do not place objects on or over the mantle-piece which may cause you to stand too close to the fire to reach or use them.
- Burn only suitable fuels and avoid burning resinous woods as soot builds up quickly.

Above all, ensure you have a working smoke alarm fitted on each floor or your home. To find out if you are eligible for a free home fire safety check, call 0800 917 99 94.

Seasonal Vaccinations are now available:

Flu: Annual flu vaccinations are recommended for all patients 65 years and over, and those at any age in at-risk groups (pregnant women, people with chronic respiratory, heart, kidney, liver, spleen, neurological disease, diabetes, cancer and people with a weakened immune system).

Pneumonia: The once-only pneumonia vaccination (protecting against 23 strains of pneumonia) is also available during the autumn and winter for all over 65's – if you are unsure whether you have received this before please check with us to ensure you don't miss out!

Shingles: The shingles vaccination is now also available for all people aged 70, 78 and 79 years to protect you against this debilitating disease and vaccination is advised even if you have had shingles in the past.

Independent Living Fund (ILF) closure, June 2015

The Independent Living Fund (ILF) aims to support long term, independent living for severely disabled people by helping them to live at home instead of in residential care. In March 2014, the Government announced that it will be closing on 30th June 2015 when the County Council will take over responsibility for meeting the eligible care and support needs of ILF users. The County Council and ILF are working closely together to make sure the transfer of responsibility for funding arrangements takes place as smoothly as possible.
