



Fenstanton History By John Deeks

Fenstanton and a Curious Gravestone Inscription:

Whilst researching some old newspapers recently I came across this report dated September 1803. "In the Churchyard of Fenstanton, in Huntingdonshire, is an upright gravestone, on the right hand of the walk leading from church-yard gate to the front door of the church, which excites the curiosity of a very extensive neighbourhood. It has been there about six years; and, from its size and the inscription, attracts the attention of strangers, who are frequently seen taking a copy of it. 'The stone is quite plain, and the inscription is follows";

The headstone was worded as follows.

John Curwen was descended from the ancient family of that name in Cumberland and was born at Weldon, Northamptonshire, on April 3rd, 1746. He was appointed Minister of the (Baptist) Congregation in Fenstanton; in June 1774 He opened a place for the worship of 'One God in One person' in the year 1789 and died on March 10, 1797. In him a disconsolate widow and four children lost a kind husband and tender father, the village a useful schoolmaster, the Christians of his persuasion, a pious and exemplary teacher and his friends of every persuasion a man whom they esteemed and loved for his zeal, for truth, for his resignation, under very trying circumstances, to the will of God, for his cheerful disposition, for his goodness to every person in need of his advice assistance. From the year 1789 his faith was derived entirely from the Bible and he bowed to no human authority but that of Christ. Dying in full hope to be in due time, called again into being by his saviour and to be partake of his glory in the life to come.

As the deceased was generally cherished in the village, no exception was made to this record of his life and opinions. The gravestone was worked and erected by the stonemason Sidney of Godmanchester. This happened whilst John Cook was vicar (1770-1801) and he had no objections to the wording on the stone. But when he was succeeded by Thomas Bourdillon (1801-1853) things changed.

The new vicar was offended by the inscription and ordered that it be removed. Church regulations stated that to remove the stone the vicar had to be accompanied by the churchwarden but he (Peter Cowling) would not co-operate. It has to be remembered that in 1803 the Church of England was dominant in this country and the Baptists minister would have been viewed by the church as a non-conformist.

Rev Bourdillon called upon the widow and requested her to remove the gravestone out of the churchyard, threatening in case of non-compliance to present the inscription in form to the bishop. The widow was greatly distressed by both the request and the threat, but absolutely refused to remove the headstone. For a year nothing happened, but when churchwarden Peter Cowling was replaced by William Allin, the stone was finally removed.

John Hammond of Grove House offered to help the distressed Ann Curwen and eventually the stone was found in stonemason Sidney's yard in Godmanchester. But it was too late; the old inscription had been removed and replaced with a new one. With bitterness John Hammond wrote; "They (meaning the vicar and the Church of England) had recourse therefore to the usual practice of priest of all ages by which they have never failed to accomplish their selfish and sinister views, namely intrigue, cunning and address". An alternative gravestone was never erected.

An update from **Fen Drayton Lakes**

What has been happening?

It has been a hot, dry summer. This hasn't been ideal for the reserve with water levels in the lakes dropping and plants withering so it has been necessary for us to routinely water the hundred or so young fruit trees in the orchard to prevent them from dvina.

We have also been undertaking some revamping of several of the viewing screens around Elney Lake to tidy them up and replace dilapidated woven willow panels with nice new ones.

Wildlife

It suddenly feels a bit more peaceful on the reserve now that the raucous black-headed gull colony has dispersed and moved on after the fledging of their chicks. Young common terns are still present for the moment. They can be seen flying around the lakes, whilst their parents feed them and as they learn to fish for themselves. Waders are starting to turn up with both common and green sandpipers seen almost daily on Ferry Mere and Moore Lake.

It seems to have been a good summer for invertebrates on the reserve. Our butterfly surveyors have recorded 22 species to date. including the first marbled white butterflies since 2011. We have also had reserve firsts with a Norfolk hawker dragonfly being seen flying over one of the ditches and a colony of wasp spiders on the island in Ferry Lagoon.

There is also good botanical news with grass-poly. a species of flowering plant that is endangered in the UK, once again being present on the dry around of Ferry Mere.

The Parish Council discussed the Playpark following a recent inspection and report. Some medium to low risk areas were highlighted and quotes will be obtained for a new surface to replace the existing rubber tiles. The PC will also assemble a group of volunteers to clean the equipment.

Speeding Vehicles and Night-time HCVs

Following a meeting with the local Constabulary, the chairman advised that two initiatives had been proposed. To address speeding vehicles a two-week Speedwatch survey was requested to be undertaken to collect additional data. Once the equipment has been provided volunteers will be sought to operate it. To address night-time violations a trainee police officer will monitor the situation and provide feedback.

On September 10th we were pleased to have Lucy Lewis talk to us in a very light-hearted but quite informative way about her life in the Army. She described it as being part of a very large family with not many sisters but loads of brothers.

She started her training at Sandhurst on January 2nd 1989. She left after 10 years having visited lots of countries done many different courses, acquired lots of injuries and was the first woman in 1990 to become a bomb disposal officer a job which had many serious but often quite amusing sides to it. An example being having some basic training crossing a minefield in the dark on her hands and knees trying to locate the bombs and deciding how to diffuse them when she discovered that one so called bomb was actually a cow pat!

She also learned how to ski and scuba dive and also to shoot which was not her favourite thing but when the team had to booby trap specially built houses and put loads of devices in them they had to fire at the key hole in the door to enter the house which as she said was easier said than done then find all the devices hidden by the previous devious team.

The regimental dinners were a rite of passage but were very entertaining with everyone from Generals at the top table to the newbies at the bottom all together getting to know each other. She had to sit at the top table as she was usually the only woman officer present quite daunting when she was first commissioned.

She said the Army has many different career options and she ended up in the Military Police department which can be serious or quite the opposite if attending a party or celebration as they sometimes get out of hand when the participants have a Plan A which goes wrong and then Plan B doesn't work either then the M P's are called into sort it all out.

This training has proved useful in her new career as Marshall at Cambridge University.

She has to wear a top hat made in 1859, a long gown and carry a mace for special occasions. The role of these officers is to keep the students under control and also visitors to the colleges. She thinks that one day Kate and Wills will both receive honorary degrees and hopefully she will be the one to present them.

HILTON PRODUCE SHOW

News from the vegetable patch: growing pains and pleasures...

Courgettes seem to survive in any conditions. We have two plants and that is quite enough. Fail to inspect for a day, and monsters appear. These overgrowns have gone straight to the compost heap at times, but now I have a recipe for a delicious courgette soup which uses 2 Kg of courgettes. Tastily combined with an onion, 500g potato and 100g cheese it is perfect for the cooler days and 1 batch gives left-overs to freeze.



The other great survivor of the drought is purple climbing bean. а recommended by Monty Don. A row has provided meals every other day for weeks and I never tire of them, they are as tender and juicy and string-less as it says on the packet. Many growers have commented on the poor performance of runner beans this season. Blauhilde, a German heritage variety, is much more drought resistant, having come from a southern zone, whereas our runners thrive in the damper English summers. The name Blauhilde is puzzling, since the flowers and the beans are in shades

of purple, not blue. Perhaps the growers wanted us to think of the powerful legendary character Brunhilde, evoking strong growth and noble bearing.... (hm doubtful!) Although the seeds are more expensive than some varieties, they have certainly repaid our investment this year.
