













The Joseph Ellis Foundation Trust

Fenstanton in WW2 Part 3: The Evacuees

The evacuation of Britain's cities at the start of World War Two was the biggest and most concentrated mass movement of people in Britain's history. In the first four days of September 1939, nearly 3 million people were transported from towns and cities in danger from enemy bombers, to places of safety in the countryside. Most were schoolchildren, who had been labeled like pieces of luggage, separated from their parents and accompanied instead by a small army of guardians and 100,000 teachers.

For most it was like going on an adventure; a phrase that is still uppermost in the minds of evacuees more than 80 years on. Parents gave instructions to their children: 'Don't complain,' 'Grin and bear it,' 'Look after your sister,' 'Write home as soon as you can.' Broadly speaking the four-day official exodus worked surprisingly well.

The real problems came in the reception areas where the Government had left arrangements for the children's arrival and care to local authorities, with little more than an injunction to do their best. Billeting officers none the less made heroic efforts to place the new arrivals in the appropriate homes, though the process for doing so was likened to a Roman slave auction or a cattle market.

Twelve months earlier, the Government had surveyed available housing, but what they had not taken into account was the extent to which middle-class and well-to-do families would be making their own private arrangements. Consequently, those households who had previously offered to take in evacuees were now full. As a result of the mismatches, selection was made according to rudimentary principles. Billeting officers simply lined the children up against a wall or on a stage in the village hall, and invited potential hosts to take their pick. Thus the phrase 'I'll take that one' became etched on the memory of our evacuees.

Evacuation took place in three phases, September 1939 when war was declared, September 1940 when the bombings commenced and September 1944 when the V1 flying bombs and later the V2 rockets started to arrive. It would appear that the first arrivals in Fenstanton were in early September 1939. By all accounts the village was crowded with evacuees, consisting mostly of pregnant woman, mothers with babies and school children. They came by rail from their home towns to St Ives station and from there they were bussed out to the villages, including Fenstanton. They were met at the clock tower by the evacuation committee who commenced walking the children around the village.

They were literally handed out to each home owner; no one was allowed to refuse to take a child. When people objected they were told that they would be referred to the local magistrate and that they would be given a heavy fine. Each house was checked and the owners told to make use of any bedroom space even if it meant three people sharing one small room.

The small village school, (that's the old school building now the church centre), had to accommodate at least three hundred and fifty extra children. The village children were taught in the mornings and the evacuee children in the afternoon. The evacuees had brought their own teachers with them.

All the larger houses were forced to take multiple children including; the Lindens, (at that time a children's home) the old vicarage and Petersfield House. The Manor House and the Manse, both on Chapel Green Chequer Street, were being used by the Land Army. The Tudor Hotel and Swan cottage were being used by the army. The pregnant women and mothers with babies were accommodated in the Manor on the Huntingdon Road. A native to the village can remember as a child seeing the mothers from the manor congregating around the clock tower, chatting and feeding their babies and children. In those days there was a lean-to shelter attached to the clock tower. Some of the mothers worked on the local farms alongside the girls from the Women's Land Army.

Fenstanton in WW2 Part 3: The Evacuees

By spring 1940 the phoney war ensured that many of the children had gone home as there was no bombings. When the Blitz started in September 1940 the children started to arrive back although there were never as many as in 1939. Finally the third wave of evacuations started in September 1941 when the V1 flying bombs began dropping on London and its suburbs. The rate of evacuations increased in November that year when the V2 rockets started to rain down. By March 1945 all bombing had finished and it was considered safe for the children to return home.

One evacuee still alive today said she came to Fenstanton at Easter 1942 when she was three years old. She was evacuated from South London where her father was engaged in munitions work. They came to St Ives railway station and were then taken to the Fenstanton Vicarage, Church Road (now Fen Manor), where they were fed. She came with her pregnant mother and brother who was three years older. They were finally allocated a large room in the Manor on the Huntingdon Road. She started school life at the Fenstanton School in December 1942. Her new sister was born in the manor and the family returned to London just before Christmas 1942.

A native villager I spoke to recalls the evacuees as being rude and had the attitude that they were allowed to take anything that they wanted. He felt that the evacuees were not welcome in the village. Other local people have the opposite memory as the following villager's childhood memory will illustrate.

"When I was at Fenstanton School I can remember two girls who were evacuees about my age during WW2. One lived in Bell Lane and the other lived at The Lindens with her sister. We can remember the following at school with us. Joan Ellis, Ellen Walker who lived in Chequer Street, Marion Tate who lived with Mrs Collier in Church Street, Ben and Sylvia Palmer, Bell Lane and Betty Burns from the manor. I don't know if any of them are still live in the village or are alive still, they would be well into their eighties now.

We had two evacuees living with us at the Farm; they were Sheila and Teddy (Edward) Wallman. They were about 8 and 6 years old. Having come from London they found life on the farm very difficult especially the little boy.

They weren't used to milk straight from the cow (they refused to drink it initially), eggs collected from the straw in the barns and fresh fruit and vegetables were a real novelty! It was tough for my mum and dad too as they already had three children. They did settle eventually and we enjoyed their company.

I remember our mum and dad were provided with two camp beds and some blankets for the children to sleep on. Oh and they had nits in their hair. I have no recollection of them ever talking about the bombing in London.

Just down the road at what is now Fieldsview Cattery and Dogs Holiday Centre, two evacuees stayed there with their mum. They were very well spoken. They went to a private school somewhere, not the Fenstanton School, but they were allowed to play with us on the farm. Some of their clothes were passed on to us for which my mum was very pleased about.

My recollection is of very frightened children. They missed their families and country life was very strange to them. As time went by some of their 'cockney' humour came to light and they found their feet. I would say they were liked and we learnt an awful lot from them as they did us. I hope we made them welcome.

Another local source said that the evacuee boys joined the local lads in their games and adventure. But there were problems and fights did break out. One story was of a boy who had upset the local lads and he was dumped in the brook and left hanging from a tree, boys!

Local Weather Watch

After posing the question in my last article "when will the drought end?" which covered our weather up to early May, the rest of May produced a rainfall total close to average and an annual total of 15.85 inches (401 mm) from 1 June 2018 to 31 May 2019, representing a 30% deficit and which is around the amount of rain areas fringing the Sahara Desert can expect. However, after a largely dry first week in June, the heavens then opened producing a monthly total of about 100 mm (4 inches), most of it falling over a period of 9 days. July was largely dry until the 25th with any rain falling in small amounts which soon evaporated in the strong July sun, once again making it a trying time for farmers and gardeners. For the rest of the month and the first part of August, rainfall totals were quite variable due to the thundery nature of the rain resulting in wide differences over quite small areas. Our region has however, been spared the almost biblical amounts of rain which have fallen across the north Midlands northwards up to central Scotland with dramatic consequences, e.g. the evacuation of Whaley Bridge in Derbyshire.

Overall Spring 2019 brought temperatures slightly higher than normal, balanced by a slightly cooler than usual May. Unlike much of Europe which had its warmest June on record with the highest daily temperature records smashed in several countries, there were 12 cool days in our region and only 6 warm days, including one hot day (29th) when the heat from southern Europe was pulled in on a south-easterly wind. Here, the 10th to the 14th were particularly cool, when the temperature failed to exceed 12 C (54F) on two days when heavy rain and strong north-east winds prevailed. Unusually for June, given the long hours of daylight, there were 6 completely sunless days. Compare this with February this year when the sun shone on every day of the month despite the appreciably shorter daylight hours at that time of the year.

Looking now at July, temperatures were well up to, or above average with a heatwave occurring during the second half of the month, when, for the second time in four weeks very hot air from the near Continent blew across the UK and especially so over south-east England and East Anglia, which resulted in Cambridge recording a new all time highest temperature for any month of 38.7C (101F) in the Botanical Gardens on the 25th. This beat the previous record of 38.5C (100.6) recorded in Faversham, Kent in 2003. During this time many records were broken across central and southern Europe with several countries recording 40C (104F) and above. Paris recorded 42.6C (108.5F) on 25 July. Just three days later the maximum temperature was just 16C (61.2F) with rain and no sun which sadly coincided with the start of Feast Week in Hilton.

If you are wondering whether the hot weather could return during August, it is worth noting that of the 10 warmest days recorded in the UK, 7 have occurred in August.

Elsewhere in the world, severe heat waves have occurred over the Eastern States of the USA and in Japan, and 32C (90F) was recorded over parts of Alaska. Meanwhile snow has fallen in parts of Australia even up to the Gold Coast (Queensland) a quite unusual occurrence, not only for humans but also for the kangaroos, and near Sydney roads became impassable because of the snow. Another freak weather event took place in Mexico, where the town Guadalajara was buried in up to 2 metres depth of hail. In China, over a million people were forced to evacuate as Typhoon Lekima caused extensive flooding and landslides in areas around Shanghai. These extreme weather events are almost becoming the "norm" but fortunately the UK generally escapes them most of the time.

Let's Bag and Bin it

Your Parish Council is aware of a growing issue in Fenstanton - uncleared dog poo - and is launching the 'Bag and Bin it' campaign to combat this.

Many people are unaware of the dangers and impact.

Uncleared dog faeces can impact for up to **THREE YEARS**, potentially effecting the **LIVER** and the **EYES**, and in severe cases leading to **blindness**.



Rain washing over dog poo flows into the drainage system, contaminating local waterways. Faecal coliform bacteria, a measure of water health and quality, is mostly from dogs.

Farmers are impacted, financially and health-wise;

- a crop contaminated with dog faeces cannot be used and is rejected from sale;
- farm machinery can crosscontaminate other crops;
- farmers face a significant health risk



CHILDREN ARE MOST AT RISK

Your Parish Council has installed new bins around busy dog walking areas of the village: by the outdoor gym and on Michael Behagg Way. If you have any suggestions for additional sites, please let us know.

As a dog owner and walker, it is your responsibility to keep your dog away from areas where children play, including football pitches and playgrounds, and off farmers' fields.

Always 'Bag and Bin' your dog's poo hygienically.




