

### Hello, how are you doing?

We are still regularly reviewing what we do and making decisions as best we can, given the guidance at the time. We are still publishing service details with the caveat that things might need to change at short notice.

We are trying to plan ahead but cautiously. We continue to check the restrictions and follow the guidance as set out by the government and Church of England.

For September, we hope that Sunday Club will restart on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> September, meeting in church for 10am and then going across to the Church Centre for their own activities, returning to the church towards the end of the service. # nature An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

With the rising mercury, long summer days encourage an ancient group of insects, as old as the dinosaurs, to take to the air. Dragonflies and damselflies, collectively known as odonata, emerge out of the water following several years as a nymph, climb up stems and emerge as an adult. At this time, smaller insects better watch out as odonata are experts at hunting, partly due to the 30,000 facets that make up their eyes so they can see in incredible detail. They also power each wing individually (unlike most insects) which gives them great dexterity in flight, being able to hover and even to fly backwards. Thankfully, they pose absolutely no risk to us, and indeed they appear wonderfully colourful, patterned and even graceful.

There is an easy way to tell if the individual you are looking at is a dragonfly or a damselfly. If it holds its wings open, away from the body, it is a dragonfly. If they are held closed, in line with the body, then it is a damselfly. This sounds like a pleasingly simple rule; however, nature loves exceptions and there are a few, but they are thankfully uncommon. The other general rule is that dragonflies are bigger, being quite chunky, whereas damselflies are much smaller and slender.

Hawkers, chasers and darters are all groups of dragonflies and are well-named after their hunting habits. The damselflies on the other hand are named more after their colours and beauty; emeralds, blues, reds and demoiselles. At RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes there have been a total of 25 species recorded, making it one of the best places in the east of England to look for them. This includes a few species which are nationally rare or localised but thankfully can be seen with patience at the reserve. One such species is the Norfolk hawker (Aeshna isosceles). As the name suggests, it shouldn't necessarily be seen in Cambridgeshire, but the species is undergoing an expansion of range and has colonised the reserve in just the last few years. It is a large dragonfly with a uniform brown body and large green eyes. Perhaps the alternative name of green-eved hawker offers a more practical and appropriate solution.

The best places to look for many of these aerial predators are wetland margins, ideally around ponds, small lakes, slow-flowing rivers and streams. RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes provides a profusion of suitable places to see various species. Two of the best areas to concentrate your efforts

include Covell's Drain, running north from the entrance bridge up to the River Great Ouse and Oxholme Drain, further to the west, alongside Elney and Drayton Lakes. The water in these drains moves very slowly and there are many rushes, irises and other plants for them to perch on. Species to look out for around here include: variable damselfly (Coenagrion pulchellum), a blue and black specialist of the fens; red-eyed damselfly (Erythromma najas), well named as it indeed has large red eyes; and the emperor dragonfly (Anax imperator) with the largest wingspan of any dragonfly in the UK. Along the margins of the River Great Ouse you will very likely be stopped in your tracks by the gorgeous banded demoiselles (Calopteryx splendens) when they rise up in the air. These are a type of damselfly, and unusually have colour on their wings; in this case a black band running across the wing of the males. In flight the effect is mesmerising. The females, not to be outdone, have a hint of shimmering reddish-gold throughout their wing. If you find a good spot along the river where there is activity, try putting out a finger and one may well land on it providing a close-up view of these fascinating insects.

# Fenstanton and the Bees of Honey Hill:

The name Honey Hill is derived from the bees that were once kept there. In all probability about here was once the bee garden of the great medieval mansion that stood on what is now the school playing field. Honey Hill is the oldest part of Fenstanton and it is believed that once it had an annual honey market on the green.

For centuries bees were a very valuable commodity so their hives were given the sunniest places possible. Only rich people



were allowed to keep bees and permission had to be obtained from the lord of the manor.

In early days before yesterday, sugar was unknown so the people depended on the honey from bees to sweeten their food and drink. They drank mead (fermented honey) long before tea was used or known anywhere in this country. But there was one other thing besides honey that bees made so important. It was nice to sweeten the food with honey but the bees wax was really more important.

The Roman Catholic Church once required the exclusive use of beeswax candles. Bees wax was needed to take the dead to heaven. They could not get to heaven without the prayers of the priest and he could not pray without the light of a candle or rather a candle burning whilst he prayed them to heaven. Many a man or woman of Fenstanton when they died left a certain weight of wax, or so many pure bees wax candles, to be burnt in the parish church and the priest would say 'masses' and prayers for their soul. The dead person was then cleansed of their sins and went straight to heaven.

Many old wills show that not only the men, but their wives, children and friends went to heaven for a set number of candles. If a poor person did not want to go to Purgatory (limbo between heaven and hell), a well-meaning relative could give some wax or perhaps money to the church and the priest would pray him out of purgatory and into heaven. It was not uncommon for people to pay their rents and court fines by an amount of bees wax.

Candlemas Day is February 2<sup>nd</sup> and up to the time of King Edward VI (1547-1653) in Fenstanton parish church, before a mass, the priest in the church would bless the candles that he would use for the coming year.

In 1986 Mr Hobbs who owned the village post office also owned 18 bee hives. He got a quarter of a ton of honey from these hives. Most of Mr Hobbs honey was made from rape seed plants. Bees can fill a frame in one day. In winter bees stay in the brood chamber to keep warm. All the workers are female and in a hive the average amount is 4,000 to 6,000. In her lifetime the queen bee will lay her own weight in eggs.

Very regrettably our Fenstanton and Hilton Standard Bearer, Julie Briggs, has has to stand down for health reasons.



# Hilton Parish Council

### Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Thursday 22nd July 2021

### Face-to-face meeting

This was the first full Council meeting to be held face-to-face in the Village Hall since the expiry of the remote meeting legislation. The meeting was held socially distanced with the windows open in the hall for ventilation. Attendees were encouraged to wear masks and utilise the hand sanitiser provided.

### New Councillor



Sarah Suckling has been co-opted as a Councillor. Sarah and her husband moved to Fen Drayton in 2000 and then took the leap across the A14 to Hilton in 2009 when they bought a derelict property on Graveley Way. They spent 12 months renovating before moving in and have lived there ever since.

She started her career in the Health and Fitness industry managing corporate health clubs in London. She then stopped to raise her two children who are now teenagers. She was heavily involved in their primary school in Fen Drayton and was on the board of governors for several years with the last two years as Chair. She is now a project manager for a small development company.

She says, "I am pleased to join the Parish Council to preserve the uniqueness of the village but to also bring about change where it is needed for the future."

### Certificate in Local Council Administration (CiLCA)

The Clerk has passed her CiLCA course and is now qualified.

### **Delegated Decisions**

Several decisions were made under the Emergency Scheme of Delegation during the period when the Council was unable to resume face-to-face meetings and these decisions were ratified by the Council, including:

- Hilton Parish Council has been registered as an interested party in the A428 Development Consent Order consultation
- Rachel Lawton's tenure as a PC representative to the Town Trust has been extended for 2 years
- The PC insurance has been renewed as a cost of £703.77

- A temporary easement was granted to the Community Garden Group to prepare for their Grand Opening, for which permission was also granted
- A response was submitted to the "Your St Ives" consultation, with reference to the need for a 24hr HCV ban on the B1040
- A new playground sign was commissioned and installed
- Terms were agreed to grant an easement for utilities only to Dunadry, formerly Plot 1 Pecks Coppice.

### Local Highways Initiative Bid Success

Hilton Parish Council were successful in the bid for a Traffic Regulation Order application to prohibit HCVs on the B1040 for 24hrs per day. This application is now in preliminary design and has to go through various stages, as follows:

- Consultation Following the completion of the design, consultation must be undertaken. This
  will require obtaining the views of the appropriate county councillor and district / parish
  councils (where appropriate), the police and the emergency services. The proposal may be
  amended following consultation.
- Advertisement This includes the publishing of at least one notice in the local press. The County Council will usually display notices in any roads that are affected and, if it is deemed appropriate, may deliver notices to premises likely to be affected. For at least 21 days from the start of the statutory notice period, the proposal can be viewed at the appropriate district, city or county council office during normal office hours. The notices invite the public to comment on the proposals which must be made in writing to the address specified in the notice during this period. Substantial objections and contentious issues are reported to county councillors.
- Making the Order Once approved, the Traffic Regulation Order can be formally sealed, and an operational date published. Should substantial changes to the TRO be required following consultation, this may necessitate a new advertisement process. This procedure can take some time to complete, and the advertising and legal fees may be substantial. Once made, it remains in force until superseded or revoked.

### Local Highways Initiative Bid 2022/23

Applications can now be submitted for the next round of LHI bids, and the deadline is Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> September. Hilton Parish Council will discuss and decide upon their bid at the meeting on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> September.

### NATS Consultation regarding the arrival routes into London Luton Airport update

Hilton Parish Council has received correspondence from NATS to state that they have decided to progress Option One, which means minimal changes from today's flight paths below 5,000ft, and greater dispersion of flights above 5,000ft. The location and orientation of the new holding area near the A1-A14 junction has been adjusted and the lowest standard altitude of the hold raised by 1,000ft, reducing potential noise impacts on the residents of St Neots and Huntingdon.

### New Town Trust Representative

Malcolm Lynn has been appointed to represent Hilton Parish Council on the Town Trust.

### General Power of Competence

As it now has a qualified Clerk, Hilton Parish Council has resolved that it meets the eligibility requirements in accordance with the Localism Act 2011 and the Parish Councils (General Power of Competence)(Prescribed Conditions) Order 2012. This allows Hilton Parish Council to act in any manner as an individual may act, without the need to identify a specific legal power.
