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Barnack Hills and Holes



Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs & Northants

The Huntingdonshire Local Group of the Wildlife Trust invites you to come along for an evening walk on Tuesday 04 June at Barnack Hills and Holes, near Stamford.


Barnack was once a medieval limestone quarry, but now supports a profusion of wild flowers and butterflies. This site is managed by the Langdyke Trust and is currently designated as a Special Area for Conservation to protect its orchid rich limestone grassland. Eight species of orchid have been reported here, some of which we will see, along with many other flowers such as rockrose, wild thyme, quaking grass and ox eye daisy. We can also look forward to seeing many butterflies, such as small heath, skippers and blues. Being an old quarry, the paths are very uneven and

often steep. The walk will be led by Ross Edgar and/or Catherine Weightman of Natural England and we hope to have a wonderful evening there.

One million pound village hall approved

A new village hall for Fenstanton will be built on Crest Drive, on land that was handed to the village as part of Morris Homes' development of the former Dairy Crest Site. Outline planning for the hall was granted in 2016, with the land being handed over by Morris Homes in 2022, thus paving the way for detailed plans to be drawn and presented to HDC planning department; HDC approved those plans on Friday 16 February, granting permission to build.

The cost of the one million pound project will be covered by

£350,000 Fenstanton Village Hall funds.

£500,000 Cambridgeshire County Council grant.

£95,000 Fenstanton Parish Council grant.

£75,000 Huntingdonshire District Council grant.

This ambitious project would not have been possible without the dedication of the Village

Hall Trust, who built on funds raised by the sale of the old hall and a large donation from the sale of the Literary Institute, by many years of fund raising, nor would it have been possible without the generous grants from our three local councils. We are certain our village would like to take this opportunity to express sincere gratitude to: the Village Hall Trust, for their dedication and hard work, Cambridgeshire County Council, for their generous half million pounds grant, Huntingdonshire District Council, for their grant and support throughout the planning process, and Fenstanton Parish Council, for their generous grant, support, and continued encouragement.



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


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Updates from Clare Tevlin, your District Councillor

In Focus: Bus Service Routes to be invested in for Fenstanton Ward

Following the announcement of Cambridgeshire and



Peterborough Combined Authority's Mayoral Annual Precept increase to £36 – equating to the annual sum of £3 per month per household. Thirty bus route improvements are to be invested in, including new routes as well as route improvements across the region.

I am pleased to announce Fenstanton was tabled top for new service provision in Huntingdonshire, as part of the Combined Authority's Bus Strategy. The Strategy has stated for the provision of a **link between Fenstanton and Huntingdon Railway Station.** Fenstanton could be incorporated into express service options, linking Cambridge to Huntingdon. Further information will be published in due course by the Combined Authority as they develop a draft route and timetable.

The 1A and 5A services between Bar Hill, Swavesey and St Ives and enhanced frequencies are also to be developed into a draft route and timetable.

Whilst Stagecoach's withdrawal of the Route F between Fenstanton and St Ives, was said to be withdrawn on the basis of low passenger footfall; public transport remains challenging for many in the ward. I will continue to push for the ward to be represented and considered towards the Mayor's improvement in local bus services, connectivity and infrastructure.

Council Tax Scheme approved to improve lives of most vulnerable

Huntingdonshire District Council's budget for 2024/2025 has been approved, following our most recent Full Council, for the forthcoming financial year.

Huntingdonshire Band D Council Tax is set to go up by £5 a year to £160.86 from the new financial year starting on 1 April 2024. The rise, which amounts to less than 10p a week, or 3.21%, means that the average household will pay around £3 a week for all the services provided by Huntingdonshire District Council.

The new financial plan sets out a balanced Council budget and identifies how the Council will continue to protect vital frontline statutory services despite decreasing government funding, along with rising costs and inflation.

'Go Whippet' the Hilton years by Gillian Sheaill



In October, Hilton villagers witnessed the demolition of the bungalow at the junction of Potton Road and Church Lane. This bungalow, with the land between it and the Prince of Wales, and the land on the opposite side of Potton Road, had been central to a business that once flourished in Hilton. It was built as a home for the Lee family who founded and managed Whippet Coaches.

Henry Lee was born in Hastings in 1888, and by 1911 was living with his parents in Islington, where he was described as a 'Carman'. He was gassed while serving in World War I, and was recommended to move away from the smoke-laden atmosphere of central London. He moved to Graveley in 1919, where he was living with his wife Mabel and their sons, Henry and Arthur, at the time of the 1921 Census (their third son, Joseph was born later that year). By this time he was a 'Motor Engineer' and he quickly realised that the people of Graveley and surrounding villages needed a bus service to get to the nearby market towns. He acquired a Model T Ford Ambulance and, with the help of the Graveley wheelwright, turned it into a 14 seater bus, with bench seats along each side. It carried villagers to the markets in St Ives on Mondays and St Neots on Thursdays. The name 'The Whippet' was introduced soon afterwards. A Sunbeam coach was added in 1920 and shortly afterward a Vulcan coach was acquired.

The number of vehicles and routes increased, so by 1926 the original premises in Graveley



were too small and the business moved to Hilton, where Henry Lee acquired a plot of land north of the Prince of Wales. The family home, called Ashlea, and the garage were built facing the Potton Road. The huge garage had a large forecourt on which the buses could be parked and washed, before being accommodated inside. Opposite the garage, parking space was available on land between the White Horse and Milestone Cottages.

To prevent unnecessary competition, the

1930 Road Traffic Act required companies to acquire licences to operate regular bus routes. In the same year the first brandnew 20 seat Whippet coach was purchased, followed in 1931 by the first of many Bedford coaches. By this time Whippet had extended services to Bedford, Cambridge and London, with day trips available to attractions such as Wicksteed Park and Whipsnade Zoo. The 1939 Register confirms that Henry Lee, known to everyone as Harry, a Motor Mechanic and Garage Proprietor, lived in the bungalow on the Potton Road, with his second wife, Annie, and his youngest son Joseph, who was a Motor Driver. His second son, Arthur, a Coach Traffic Manager, was living on the opposite side of the Potton Road. The outbreak of war in 1939 limited any further extension of routes, but the coaches were in great demand to carry construction workers to the airfields being built on the flat lands of East Anglia, and later to transport the RAF personnel to the airfields

of Graveley, Upwood, Wyton and Warboys. The post-war period saw a great increase in bus and coach transport. The Company increased both the number of routes, and its contractual services, providing buses and coaches for daily school, college and business runs. A daily service to London featured, while on Saturdays a fleet of coaches set out for Brighton, Eastbourne, Margate, Clacton and other seaside holiday destinations. The expansion of Pye's wireless services in Cambridge, and the factories of Papworth Industries provided more opportunities for daily contracts, while the contracts with the RAF increased in both number and distance.

Henry Lee retired to Herne Bay in 1948, leaving his 3 sons, Henry, Arthur and Joseph to run the family business. 'Go Whippet' as it was then called had a large fleet of buses and coaches. Hilton was exceptionally well-served with buses, and the company provided work for a number of villagers. The name 'Go Whippet' was well-known throughout Huntingdonshire, always linked with Hilton and the Lee family. By the nineteen fifties, The White Horse opposite Ashlea was no longer a public house; it had been subdivided into three dwellings. Eventually sold by auction in 1955, Arthur Lee acquired the building and the adjacent land between the Methodist Chapel and Milestone Cottages. The White Horse was demolished in 1967. Part of the land became the building plot for Chapel Close, while a bungalow was built on the site of the pub (10 Chapel Close) and Arthur Lee and his wife, moved across the road from Ashlea. Two further houses were built along the Potton Road, Sunnyside and Fairview.

By 1974 the Whippet Fleet consisted of 23 coaches and 13 double-decker buses. More room was needed, and in 1977 operations moved to the new Fenstanton depot on the Cambridge to Huntingdon Road, where there was space for maintaining and housing the vehicles, and the company's administrative offices.

The Hilton garage stood empty for some time, until taken over as a soft furnishing warehouse. It had a dramatic end when fire broke out in the middle of the night of 8-9 June 1981 which destroyed the building. A terrace of 4 houses is now situated on the garage site, while more terraced houses fronting on Church Lane were built on the remaining land originally owned by the Lee family.

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My Travels with Flying Scotsman

I have been involved with mainline steam engines since 2014, when I was invited to become part of the support crew on a B1 type locomotive named Mayflower. Having acquired the necessary certification needed to be allowed on the footplate and to go lineside, I was able to be involved with many journeys and locomotives to all parts of the United Kingdom. The year 2023 was the centenary of possibly the most famous steam locomotive in the world, Flying Scotsman.

You may have seen the locomotive on news bulletins or in the newspapers as the event was widely publicised. Or even have been one of the in excess of 6000 passengers that undertook Flying Scotsman hauled excursions.

Normally the places for support crew are considerably over-subscribed as everyone wants to partake in the locomotive's celebrations.

You can perhaps appreciate my surprise therefore when I received a telephone call in the Summer of 2023 asking if I was free to be a support crew member on an excursion from London Euston to Chester and back.

Being a life-long London and North Eastern Railway fan and a fan of A3 locomotives in particular (A3 is the class of locomotive that Flying Scotsman belongs to) I immediately said yes. So I set off for Southall in West London two days before the date of the trip. This enabled me to help in preparing the locomotive, including lighting the fire, oiling around in excess of 80 oiling points and generally cleaning the locomotive such that it could be seen in its best light for the adoring public.

A very early start was made from Southall on the day of the trip due to how busy the Great Western main line is out of Paddington these days.

An on-time departure from London Euston was achieved and we picked up further passengers on the way to Chester. The passengers were disembarked, we moved to sidings where the work of the support crew really begins. Sometimes with little over an hour it is necessary to oil the engine, carry out visual inspections and clean the fire. The latter on occasions can require that the existing fire is removed and a new fire lit due to the presence of large amounts of clinker. Clinker forms a hard slab-like covering on the top of the fire which prevents adequate primary air being able to penetrate through the firebed - the result of which is a lack of heat and steam.

The locomotive also requires its tender to be refilled with water and coal. Having achieved all of the above, we took the locomotive and train back to the platform and the passengers boarded. I was lucky enough to be on the foot plate from Chester to London Euston and to Southall where, having checked the locomotive over, I retired to bed in the support coach for a well-earned rest.

I must have done something right as I was invited back a few weeks later for another trip on Flying Scotsman from London Kings Cross to Great Yarmouth and return. As before, I returned to Southall and prepared the engine for the trip. To my absolute delight I was asked if I wanted to go on the footplate from King's Cross to Ely.

It is difficult to express my feelings at coming out of Kings Cross on Flying Scotsman's footplate; if you had told me as a young teenage trainspotter in the early 1960s that in 2023 I would be able to achieve this it would have seemed total fiction.

Whilst waiting for the signal to depart I could not help reminiscing on all the famous locomotives, drivers and trains that had been on the same tracks that I was now sitting on, including Mallard.

I in no way wish to diminish the wonderful hard working volunteers who keep our preserved railways operating. The speed on these is restricted to 25 mph. Flying Scotsman is not! At its line speed of 75 mph all your senses are stimulated, the heat from the fire is intense as the firehole doors are opened and closed to put coal on. The noise is very loud as you rattle over points and junctions although the famous clickety-clack has long disappeared on most routes with the advent of continuously welded track. Your eyes are constantly flicking between the various gauges, to ensure everything is performing correctly.

We get the green flag and we are away pulling out through the gas works tunnel where in at least one incident a train of in excess of 20 coaches was despatched during the second world war. We turn right at Hitchin through Royston, Cambridge and to Ely to take water. Onward through Thetford forest and eventually arriving at Great Yarmouth to be received by a massive crowd. Incidentally, the stations and lineside all the way had been filled with large amounts of well-wishers smiling and waving.

As on the Chester trip we serviced the engine and set off on the return trip. This time I went through the corridor tender just before Ely and rode on the footplate to Cambridge. As we pulled into Ely to my surprise and delight



were my daughter Jennie and granddaughter Abi - truly a special moment. All went well and we arrived back to Kings Cross and then on to Southall.

The next day some unusual events occurred. People I had never seen before closely examining the engine and coach, the engine getting an extra special clean. I obviously asked what was going on and was told that I couldn't be told but would I clean and repaint four headlamps. Now the railwaymen reading this will know the only time a locomotive carries four headlamps is on the royal train. That is exactly what happened a couple of days later when Flying Scotsman took King Charles from York to the North Yorkshire Moors Railway.

Rev Rosie writes: Hello – how are you doing?

News this month includes a new service time for Sunday Services in the **Parish Church**, **Fenstanton**. For a number of reasons we need to move the time from **10am to 10.30am**, every week.

With the arrival of spring and the clocks moving to BST, our monthly Evensong service will move from **5pm to 6pm**. Evensong is a very traditional service using Book of Common Prayer, and often our choir outnumbers our congregants. If a more traditional service is more your 'thing' then why not come along and join us, you will be very welcome.

Perhaps you have children? Why not come along to a Sunday service where we have Sunday Club, which meets in the church first before going to the Church Centre. Or try Worship for All – a short service where all ages learn about the Christian faith together. On the second and fourth Sundays we usually have a small band of musicians, which may include a combination of piano, trombone, trumpet, French horn, saxophone, flute, cello and violin. We have

On the 2nd Friday of each month, at 5.30 pm in Hilton we have Friday Feast – beautiful craft activities prepared for children but anyone young at heart is welcome. Located in the Anglian Church, adults get to enjoy an end of week glass of wine. It's lovely. Last month was my turn to deliver a short children's address - I was asked to explain the meaning of the words of the Grace. 'Dear God!', I thought. Libraries have been written on this and you want a fun, two minute talk!!!.... I reached for the wine!

Most of us remember the words.... or near enough: - 'May the Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the Love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us now, and for evermore'. The apostle Paul (you remember him the one who used to keep busy by killing Christ's followers) goes on at great length about 'Grace' but basically says it's God freely accepting us because his son, Jesus, died for our sins. Hmm ... I remembered what I thought about this when I was small.

I didn't feel I had sinned really. Ok, I was no goody two shoes by a long way; but I didn't see whatever I had done wrong required Jesus to die on a cross on my behalf. Far be it for me to take issue with St Paul but.... really? Perhaps he should stick to speaking for himself. After all it was him doing all the persecuting, not me!

As an adult, having now managed some decent sinning, I see this slightly differently. But more because I realise how it's nigh impossible for anyone of us to live well without having a negative impact on someone else (think climate change, capitalism, wars etc).

Sin is ingrained in the human experience and it's impossible for any of us to totally avoid it – just think where your pension funds are invested for example....



But I also remembered what farmers

do when they need to get an orphaned lamb adopted. They wipe the orphan with the scent of another lamb and its mother, and this results in her not noticing the extra mouth to feed, the extra body to look after, is not one of her own.





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Life on a Plate

Asparagus Season! Asparagus and cheese tart

A favourite vegetable in the Spring is asparagus. Ron's Farm shop in Fenstanton will soon have the indoor grown variety (April) and hopefully outdoor grown spears in May.

Classically chargrilled and served with butter, lemon and pepper, or with a poached egg and hollandaise sauce. But here's a recipe for those wanting a good meal using asparagus as the main show; serve with new potatoes and grilled beef tomatoes.

Ingredients

- 1 sheet frozen puff pastry, thaw according to package instructions
- Flour, for the work surface
- 1 small tub of cream cheese or ricotta cheese
- 1 large egg
- 3 Tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1 Tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- Pinch cayenne pepper
- 300g gruyere cheese
- Salt and pepper
- 12 Small Asparagus spears or 6 large (Cut in half lengthways to make 12)
- 1 Tablespoon olive oil

Method

Preheat oven to 200C or gas mark 7

- 1. Sprinkle the counter with flour.
- 2. Roll out the thawed puff pastry into a 16by-10 inch rectangle. It does not have to be perfect!
- 3. Cover a baking sheet with parchment paper and place the puff pastry on it. If using a sheet of puff pastry, use the sheet it was wrapped in.
- With a sharp knife, lightly score the pastry dough 1 inch in from the edges. Do not cut all the way through the dough.
- 5. Pierce the dough inside the border with a fork about every inch.
- 6. Bake until light golden brown, about 10 minutes.



- Stir together the cream cheese or ricotta, egg, parsley, lemon juice, cayenne, salt and pepper.
- 8. Spread the cheese mixture on the inside of the border of the pastry.
- 9. Sprinkle the Gruyere on top of the ricotta.
- 10. Trim the ends of the asparagus so that they are all about the same size and fit inside the pastry. Place the asparagus spears inside the tart shell. Alternate the tips and bottoms so that they fit better.
- 11. Brush the asparagus with olive oil and season with salt and pepper.
- 12. Bake until the spears are tender, about 20 minutes. Enjoy warm or at room temperature.



provide the best outcome for them ranging from simple solar roof systems to fully blown integrated solutions. Today free energy is not a dream but a reality. It is not just about the cash incentive, it's about harnessing natural resources without damaging the environment." Ross concludes.

A great achievement for someone who only few years ago was learning the basics of plumbing!

Easter Bunny Headband

Happy Easter! I know this come a little late, but with the Easter Holidays stretching between March and April, I thought this craft would be a good way to extend the Easter cheer. My three year old daughter absolutely loved making this headband recently, it was really easy to put together and it's the perfect activity for kids of all ages, so I thought we'd share it with you. Follow the steps below to make this yourself. Check out our Instagram page for more detailed instructions.

Step 1

With your black pen, draw a pair of ears on a piece of card, these can be any shape and size you want. Then also draw what will become your front piece, I drew Easter eggs, but you could draw chicks, or flowers etc. I let my daughter colour these in before cutting them out.

Tip: Draw your designs out with a pencil first to make sure you're happy with it then go over it with the black pen (I used a sharpie).

Step 2

Cut out two strips along the length of a piece of card approx 2 inches in width. Cut out your ears and front pieces, stick the ears to the back of one of the strips facing forwards. Next, stick your Easter eggs or other front pieces you've designed on the front of the strip in front of the ears.

Step 3

Glue or staple the two strips together forming a circle, cutting any excess off when you measure over your child's head.

Message from the chair

As I write this, the days are getting appreciably longer and all around the yellow of daffodils indicates warm weather and spring are almost here.

However, for the third time this winter, Fen Drayton High Street and the junction with Daintrees Road were flooded in February. It affected around 80 village households, mostly preventing access by car. In addition, the sewage system was overwhelmed by floodwater resulting in contaminated water bubbling up through High Street manholes.

Vehicles, predominantly larger vans and lorries, driving through the floodwater at speed, causing a wash to run across the pavement to the properties, exacerbated the problem. The nursery school had to close after water caused by vehicle wash entered the building. Despite the road closed signs put up by Highways, some people still ignored ignored them and drove through the water, often at excess speed. Please respect all road closed signs and, if you must drive through the floodwater, please do so extremely slowly to prevent causing a wash. The flooding was caused by exceptional rainfall in January and February (three times the usual monthly levels). It was also reported that some of the sluice gates on the River Ouse may not have been fully operational, which led to higher water levels in the Ouse which in turn impacts how quickly the water in Oxholme Brook can drain away.

When the River Ouse is high, the water in Oxholme Brook, which runs along the High Street, is unable to drain away and, as more water comes into the village from Conington and beyond, the High Street and Daintrees Road flood.

Since the flood in the winter of 2020/21, Oxholme Brook and the ditches around the football field have been dredged. Anglian Water installed larger-capacity sewage pumps and the parish council set up a village Flood Group to provide residents with sandbags, practical assistance and information to help deal with potential flooding. The Flood Bus that provides flood prevention advice will be in the village on 11 May from 10am to 4pm. However, these measures do not address the fundamental issue of preventing water from upstream

entering the village when the River Ouse water levels are high. The Daintrees Road residents are seeking a meeting with the Environment Agency and the parish council is due to have a meeting with the local MP, CCC, SCDC, Anglian Water and Highways to discuss potential solutions and agree an action plan.

Finally, a big thank you to Bannolds for delivering sand for filling sandbags to the village hall car park so quickly!

Cost of living grants

The Town Lands charity has started a new round of grants for villagers who are in serious financial difficulties. Leaflets with application details were delivered to all households at the beginning of March.

Village hall car park closure

The village hall car park will be partially closed on Wednesday 17 April for the felling of dead elm trees in woodland on the west side of the village hall.

Fen Drayton has had more than its fair share of flooding this winter and I have been working with the parish council to get all parties with influence, together with Anthony Browne MP, to find a way forward and improve the unacceptable situation. The authorities need to work together to look at the whole catchment area and make proposals for improvement. Cambridge and Peterborough Age UK is experiencing financial problems which may affect the Community Warden services for Fen Drayton. South Cambridgeshire District Council is currently undertaking an independent assessment of the service and the value it provides. I'm sure SCDC will continue to support the service, as the whole strategy for care of the elderly is that they should remain at home where they want to be.

At our February meeting Paul Shelford, the husband of our member, Sue, talked to us about his time as a London cab driver. Paul was a Civil Servant for 25 years until he developed a dislike for the struggles of commuting and decided to study The Knowledge.



It needed over 5 years of study, in his private free time, mainly at weekends travelling firstly through the 6 mile inner ring then on to the outer 12 mile radius on a moped - a distance of 25,000 roads, even to know the presence of every Blue Plaque house.

The first taxi licence was issued in1652 when the size of the horse was specified and in his famous diary Samuel Pepys wrote of horse and carriage drivers taking people away from the Great Fire. Hansom cabs came in the 19th century and were motorised from 1908. Cabs now cost £63,000, must be MOT checked every 6 months, be adapted for disabled passengers and drivers are obliged to have regular medical checks.

There are traditions: the first fare on passing is free, also all passengers in military uniform and Remembrance Sunday veterans after the Cenotaph parade.

The green building in the photograph shows a charity provided shelter and food for cab



drivers, and are now listed buildings.

Several times during his talk Paul halted



to praise Sue for her patience and support before and since he earned the treasured badge and his special cab finally 'died' recently - hence his retirement after 15 years on the road.


It is very possible that Margaret and Charles

Afoot in the Garden

April - Spring in all it glory

On Monday 05 April 1982 I joined a Garden Centre in Cologne, (the Falklands war had just started). Returning home 18 months later was a revelation. So many plants grow here that wouldn't survive a German winter (and mums roast lamb was a real treat). For gardeners, Easter has now become the start of the planting season and many of those less hardy plants are available in garden centres from now. Plants are six degrees less hardy in a pot, most plant roots start to grow when the soil temperature reaches six degrees.

Beginners planting tips

Choose plants for you soil type and the sun/shade levels you are planting them in. Decide on a colour scheme for each border and season. Plants with large green/ yellow leaves work best in shade, small grey/silver leaves in sun (blue bells for shade, snowdrops semi- shade, crocus for sun). Tallest plants at the back of your borders, lowest at the front, look for colour combinations of flower and foliage. Train climbers on trellis or use vine-eyes, wire and buckle tie strainers.

Before planting turn your plant around and see if it has a good/ bad side. When planting add plenty of compost (dig your planting hole the size of the pot. Fill the hole with planting compost, double the size of the hole, mixing the compost with your soil as you increase the size of the hole. Use the compost/soil mixture around your plant roots. Firm, water and mulch.

For summer colour on a budget sow hardy annuals like cornflower, godetia, sweet rocket, calendula, poppies, clarkia, antirrhinum, Californian poppies, larkspur, malva, nigella and phlox love-in-the-mist (not in my wife's garden) for example as they are so easy and rewarding. Summer bulbs like gladioli and lilies are in shops and garden centres for planting now April is also the time for allotmenteers and veggies to get sowing and planting. Hoe/ weed and feed your shrubs and roses before mulching. One last think! Nothing makes a garden look so neat and tidy as edging your lawn.

Cutting edge... the art of topiary

In these villages the name and work of the landscape designer, Lancelot (Capability) Brown is well known. He advocated naturalistic designs with lakes, trees and vistas as key elements of his work with the aim of creating a "pretty landscip".

He swept away the earlier formal, enclosed gardens close to the grand house and using a ha-ha (ditch) to keep out the cattle allowed the garden and parkland to merge, giving a great sense of space and pleasing the eye with delightful 'prospects" or views.

Earlier gardens relied on walls and hedges to separate and contain plants. In formal gardens patterns were achieved by winding paths round geometrically-shaped beds. Clipped hedges defined beds and potted trees were strategically placed. Gravel paths and box hedges were key elements, especially in dryer climates where lawns would shrivel.

The art of topiary originated in those dry gardens and became popular in English gardens from the 16C. Pruning, and clipping trees or shrubs into distinctive shapes made a decorative addition to garden design. Patience, a steady hand and good eye are needed at the outset, but once established topiary is easy to maintain.

Levens Hall in Cumbria has an outstanding example of a topiary garden started in 1694. Behind high limestone walls the garden is filled with witches, peacocks, chess pieces, a jug of ale, a

judge's wig ...even Homer Simpson (a recent addition). The dark yew trees from which they are fashioned contrast with the light grey of the limestone.

Locally, the garden of The Manor, Hemingford Grey offers some delightful examples of more recent artistry. Lucy Boston, its originator, planted eight tiny yews to border her front path and in honour of Queen Elizabeth II's coronation and fashioned them into crowns and orbs. C.S.

What to do

Obtain a seed potato from the Hilton Community garden on **Saturdays between 10 and noon** and chit it by standing it in an egg box in a cool bright area. The "eyes" of the potato will begin to grow. When the shoots are short and stubby, plant the potato in a 10 litre pot (approx. 28cms wide at top and 23cms high) using any compost or garden soil. Note: larger pots will be disqualified! Only half fill the container with compost and top up as the potato shoots grow. Place pot outside but protect it from frosts. Remember to water it if the weather is dry.

Bring your potato plant, growing in its pot, to the **Hilton Produce Show**. The judges will empty each pot and weigh the yield.

The winner will be the person whose potatoes weigh the heaviest.


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

An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

As spring breathes new life into the landscape, the shimmering lakes come alive with a vibrant tapestry of avian wonders, offering a sanctuary for both seasoned birdwatchers and curious adventurers alike. This is one of the best times of the year to connect with nature as birds arrive back from their winter travels, bumblebees emerge from hibernation and blossom lights up the hedgerows.

This year we are putting on a series of events to enable people to explore the reserve in various ways.

Starting in April with what is undoubtably one of the highlights of the season, we will be running a **Dawn Chorus Guided Walk**. The reward for the early start will be the wonderful soundscape that can be heard around the reserve with help identifying the numerous species, both resident and migrant, singing from trees, hedges, and reed.

At the other end of the spectrum, we have an **Evening Guided Walk** scheduled in May. Take advantage of the opportunity to be guided to various parts of the reserve and be expertly shown the animals which are more active later in the day up until dusk.

Wild(ish) Camping is again featuring this year for organised groups at our secluded location on the shores of Ferry Lagoon. You will have a great opportunity to connect with nature, taking photos and only leaving footprints.

Our monthly **Wednesday Wander Guided Walks** have been running successfully for many years, led by knowledgeable volunteers. By joining one of these walks, you will get to explore some of the best parts of the reserve and learn what can be seen throughout the year. Every walk is different so why not try it for yourself?

Ever thought of learning a traditional skill? Our annual **Willow Weaving Workshop** will be back this year during which you will weave your very own garden obelisk for climbing plants. The event is led by a very experienced weaver and uses willow sourced from the reserve.

For the first time this year, we will be running a **Canoe Tour** at the reserve in the autumn. Slink through the reeds on our new waterbased trail to discover one of the harder to view lakes from a new perspective. Guided by experienced staff you will be in good hands.

Whether it's the tranquillity of a leisurely stroll along the lakeshore or the thrill of spotting a rare bird in flight, Fen Drayton Lakes beckons with the promise of inspiring encounters and unforgettable moments.
