Step into the Past

Early days of Fen Drayton LSA

On 1 November 1935, 10 men from County Durham, who had been selected to be smallholder tenants on the newly formed Land Settlement Association estate, arrived in Fen Drayton. Among them was Tom Collier from Perkinsville, a small mining village about 10 miles from Durham City. They were billeted in Fen Drayton House and looked after by Mrs McDermot who had been housekeeper to the previous owner, Mr Iveson. A further 10 men joined them after Christmas.

The men's first task was to build new roads and trackways. They surfaced the tracks of Daintrees Lane and Springhill Road, created Middleton Way and Oaktree Road and cleared





the land of orchards in Cootes Lane.

The holdings then began to be allocated; Tom Collier was given number 26 in Springhill Road. While the houses were being built, the men worked on the land learning the growing trade under the supervision of Mr Piper, the estate manager. The holdings then began to produce crops of lettuce, tomatoes and potatoes.

As the houses were completed families started to join the men, including Tom's wife Mary and his son and daughter, who arrived from Perkinsville. The holding was flourishing: as well as crops, he began rearing pigs and poultry. As soon as he was old enough, Tom's son John Thomas (also known as Tom) was employed by the builder erecting the estate houses, subsequently becoming an LSA employee working with horses, carting and ploughing, alongside Charlie Giddings.

Charlie Giddings lived with his wife Hannah in a cottage at the bottom of Cootes Lane and was known locally to be a real character – and a "Fen Tiger" skater. During the winter water was let out of the dykes to flood the

fields, leaving silt on the ground to act as fertiliser. When the waterlogged fields froze over, Fen men, known as Fen Tigers, put on their special skates and held speed skating competitions. Charlie was also a folk singer who sang mainly in the Three Tuns, which he visited most nights. He had his own seat – and woe betide anyone who dared sit on it! In the late 1950s Sam Steel started collecting and recording songs of the area. A CD entitled Heel & Toe, which includes some of Charlie's songs, is still available from www.veteran.

With the outbreak of the Second World War in 1939, the concern of the government changed from overcoming unemployment to meeting the need to increase food production rapidly. Preferred applicants for LSA holdings were those with previous horticultural experience. Holding 22 in Oaktree Road became vacant in 1942 when the tenant returned to Durham and was allocated to Mr Edward Madder. He was one of the new category of tenant, having come from Harrow Weald where he had been head gardener and chauffeur at a large house.

All spare land was now brought into production and the field next to Fen Drayton House was ploughed to grow vegetables. All the growers were working flat out seven days a week, meaning that the estate was producing huge amounts of food as part

of the war effort. Produce was delivered to the NAAFIS, sometimes twice per day, to Bassingbourn, Caxton, Kettering, Oakington and Wyton, to name few.

The growers were assisted by Women's Land Army and POWs from Elsworth camp. In 1943 Mr Madder successfully applied for his daughter, Alice, who was still living in Harrow Weald, to be allocated to work on his holding as a land girl.

One afternoon, while Alice was out for a walk, she met a

young man walking his dog. They exchanged a few words, "Are you coming to the Land Army dance on Saturday?" They did go to the dance, which was held in the village hall at the bottom of Cootes Lane. The man was

young Tom Collier: a romance followed and Tom and Alice were married in St Mary's church in Fen Drayton on 15 February 1945. Tom continued to work for the LSA, retiring in 1980 after 43 years' service.

Paws for thought



Thinking of getting a rabbit? A vet's advice!

Rabbits have long been considered an easy, low-maintenance pet, perfect for children. However, as a veterinary surgeon, I often see cases where well-intentioned owners have underestimated the level of care these animals require. Before bringing a rabbit into your home, it's important to consider whether this pet is truly the right fit for your family.

Rabbits are not 'starter pets'

There is a common misconception that rabbits are simple pets, similar to hamsters or guinea pigs. In reality, rabbits have complex needs and require daily care, interaction, and a proper environment to thrive. Unlike rodents, rabbits can live 8-12 years (sometimes even longer), making them a long-term commitment.

Not always suitable for children

Many parents choose a rabbit as a pet for their children, assuming they will be easy to handle and care for. However, rabbits are delicate creatures that do not always enjoy being picked up or cuddled. Their fragile spines can be injured if they are held incorrectly, and they can scratch or bite if frightened.

Young children, especially those under ten, often struggle to handle rabbits appropriately. A frightened rabbit may kick out or jump from their arms, leading to injury for both the animal and the child. Rabbits require a gentle, patient approach and are better suited to older children or adults who can understand their needs.

Space and exercise eeeds

Many people still associate rabbits with small hutches, but keeping a rabbit confined in a tiny space is neither humane nor healthy. Rabbits need plenty of space to move, stretch, and exercise. A hutch should only serve as a shelter, not a primary living space. Ideally, rabbits should have a large run or even be free-roaming in a rabbit-proofed room or secure garden area.

Lack of exercise can lead to obesity, muscle weakness, and behavioural issues. A rabbit that is confined in a small space for long periods may become depressed, aggressive, or develop health problems.

Diet and health considerations

A rabbit's diet is another aspect of care that is often misunderstood. Many people assume that rabbits can live on a diet of commercial pellets alone. In reality, a healthy rabbit should have constant access to fresh hay, which provides the necessary fibre to maintain their digestive health. Fresh leafy greens and a small portion of high-quality pellets should supplement their diet.

Rabbits are also prone to dental issues due to their continuously growing teeth. If their diet lacks enough roughage, their teeth can become overgrown, leading to pain and difficulty eating. Regular check-ups with a vet are essential to monitor their dental health.

Companionship and mental stimulation

Rabbits are social animals and should not be kept alone. A single rabbit is likely to become lonely, leading to stress and behavioural problems. It's best to keep rabbits in compatible pairs or groups. Additionally, they need toys, tunnels, and enrichment activities to keep them mentally stimulated. A bored rabbit may become destructive or develop repetitive behaviours like excessive chewing.

Final thoughts

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Trains, Boats and Planes

Cheese and Wine by Train

If, like me, you are fond of cheese, wine and travelling by train, these two train journeys should appeal to you. The "Cheese Train" starts in the picturesque town of Montreux at the eastern end of Lake Geneva and winds its way through some spectacular scenery into Switzerland. The "Wine Train" could hardly be more different - but more of that later.

The MOB (Montreux Oberland Bernois) company runs two special excursions from Montreux, the Cheese Train and the Chocolate Train. Both use part of the panoramic Golden Pass Line, which runs from Montreux to Luzern via Interlaken. The Cheese Train goes deeper into Switzerland than the Chocolate Train and that was the excursion we chose. Maybe we'll try the Chocolate Train on another holiday!





The journey on the Cheese Train takes just over one hour; in the first few minutes, the track climbs steeply out of Montreux, providing passengers with superb panoramic views over the town and Lake Geneva before heading into the mountains where it crosses deep gorges and passes through dense woodland and alpine pastures with breathtaking mountain scenery.

The destination is a small town called Chateau-d'Oex where, at the restaurant called Le Chalet, you can see mountain cheese being made in the traditional way while you enjoy a hot fondue of local cheese. (Even on a hot day in August!) The town's museum houses a fine collection of cowbells and it also serves as the Swiss Centre for the art of paper-cutting, or découpage, with many examples of the art on display.



We had reserved seats for the outward journey, so we could arrive in time for lunch, but we had free choice of which train to use for the return journey. That gave us time to look around the museum and appreciate something of what life had been like before 1906, when the railway reached the town.

On arriving back in Montreux, we found the town bustling with tourists but we just had time to see the statue of Freddie Mercury and the Queen Studio Experience before we had to leave. A great day out.



The "Wine Train" was a completely different experience. This train runs through the cellars of the Mercier vineyard at Epernay, which is about a three hour drive from Calais.



The vineyard is one of several on the "Avenue de Champagne" which is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

Mercier's cellars are vast, holding millions of bottles of champagne, and they occupy 18km of tunnels that were excavated from the chalk 30m below ground level. In the 19th century, horse-



drawn carriages would take visitors through the tunnels but nowadays visitors travel on a laser-guided train which is reached by a lift from the Visitors Centre.

The business was the brainchild of Eugene Mercier, the "Showman of Champagne", who was only 20 when he started the Mercier Champagne House. He was an enterprising







and innovative businessman, who was ahead of his time not only by "thinking big" but also in the ways he promoted his business.

As well as encouraging visitors to his cellars, another of his innovations was to use film for advertising and as a consequence of his marketing film of 1906, he is considered to be the inventor of that technique.


However, he is probably better known for constructing the world's largest barrel, which has a capacity of 160,000 litres. The barrel took 16 years to make and was probably second only to the Eiffel Tower as an attraction at the "Exposition Universelle" in Paris in 1889.

Although the views from the train

are understandably rather limited, it was surprising to see a number of examples of bas-relief art carved into the walls and a statue of Miss Mercier that was considered to be too daring at the time to be shown above ground!

The trip was a fascinating experience and the cool (10C) temperature of the cellars was also a very refreshing and welcome change from the heat we had experienced a few days earlier.


Freya - Year 6

As our country seeks to rebuild robust foundations in order to secure peace, may each of us consider the need to build on rocks, not sand, remembering the values that most faiths share of equality, justice, and a large dollop of grace, not grossosity.

Dear Friends,

'April is the cruellest month, breeding lilacs out of the dead land,' wrote T.S. Eliot in the first words of The Wasteland. We probably do not think of April as cruel. Most of the time, it is the very essence of Spring, and as often as not the month in which Easter falls as well. Most people enjoy April in this country, and we are more likely to respond to Chaucer at the opening of the Canterbury Tales, who speaks of April piercing to the root the drought of March with fragrant showers, so that they bathe the veins of the plants in a flower-engendering liquor, of Zephyrus (the deity of the west wind) inspiring in every wood and heath the tender crops with his sweet breath, of small fowls making melody and sleeping all night with open eye.

But it is possible to imagine what Eliot might be getting at. New life is costly, and cannot come about without great effort. Staying frozen and unchanging can seem the easier option. On April 20th this year we celebrate Easter, the greatest Christian festival, named after a pagan goddess of fertility, Eostre, whose feast was held at the spring equinox. It feels entirely natural, whether we are Christian or not, to celebrate the annual return of warmth and light and growth and beauty. But Christians celebrate these good things as the gift of God, and recognise that warmth and light and growth and beauty, however much we might rejoice to see them around us each spring, can only take root in our own lives through sacrifice – the sacrifice of Christ on the cross, and then our sacrifice of ourselves in His service. Our rejoicing at Easter is made deeper and more solemn because it comes to us through Good Friday.

The other great difference between what Christians celebrate at Easter and what all people could find to celebrate each spring, is that the Easter story is of something entirely unexpected. Spring is no less a miracle for taking place every year, but ancient people devised spring celebrations precisely because they anticipated its annual arrival so eagerly. The disciples of Jesus, despite being told several times what would happen, thought that the cross was the end of Him, and were not waiting for any good news in the two days following His death.

If we celebrate Easter with something more than chocolate eggs, then we are really celebrating this great truth: there is no situation so hopeless, no place or time so dreadful, that the renewing power of God cannot break through. We live in great cycles of life and death and rebirth, summer and winter and spring, but over and beyond all that is the everlasting Life, which is God. When it comes, a truly happy Easter to you.

A view from the Old Manse

Eagle-eyed and avid readers may have wondered why there has been nothing from 'The Manse' over the last eight months or so. With the retirement of the Minister at the end of June last year, both the Fenstanton United Reformed Church (URC) and our sister church, the Free Church in St. Ives, have been without a minister to guide us. St. Neots URC has been without a minister for a number of years. That said, we all continue with our daily activities, and Sunday services. We were told, last year, that it would be unlikely for us to be offered a minister for at least two years, and we would not be placed on the vacancy list unless we signed up, and agreed to, forming a Mission Partnership. A new minister would be expected to look after the three URC churches.

Mission Partnerships are networks of churches that work together to share resources and support each other's mission. The Eastern Synod of the URC has sought agreement from seven churches to form a partnership, known as the Mid Cambridgeshire Mission Partnership. The churches involved are St. Ives Free Church, Fenstanton URC, and St. Neots URC, three Local Ecumenical Partnership churches; Bar Hill, Cambourne and Northstowe, and also Love's Farm Community Church. The churches have worked well together, and we are well on the way to signing up to the partnership, and could have a minister in place by Spring 2026.

In this day and age, it is important for the church to change, not in its teachings or beliefs, but to embrace the way society sees itself. It is a sad fact that church attendance has fallen so much over the recent years, at a time when we all need an anchor in life, something to believe in, and help us to cope with life. It is hoped that by showing that different churches can work together, and continue to serve the community, we will be there when you need comfort and reassurance.

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
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From seeds sown in Fen Drayton

Tim Robinson moved to Mill Road in Fen Drayton in 1961 when he was three, with his brother Paul and parents Roger and Mary.

His close childhood friends were Neil Robinson (no relation – the families were good friends) and Colin Lockwood from round the corner in Cootes Lane. Tim and Paul spent a carefree childhood in the village, building soapboxes to race around the disused Mill Road gravel pits, playing table tennis with their friends in their father's packing shed, fishing in the river and riding their bikes (later graduating to motorbikes). Tim also played for the Fen Drayton under 16s football team.

Tim went to the village school next to the Three Tuns (now the Montessori school), then, along with his friends, to Swavesey Village College, where he met his future wife, Karin.

Inspired by his greenhouse tomato-growing father's work ethic and technical expertise, Tim enrolled at the Hertfordshire College of Agriculture and Horticulture in St Albans (now Oaklands College), where he completed a four-year diploma in glasshouse production.

His first job after college was with a large tomato grower, Van Heyningen Brothers, in Kent, where he became senior supervisor. He then joined Tangmere Nurseries, expanding into peppers as well as tomatoes.

Meanwhile, Wil Van Heyningen had moved to Arizona and was a main player in setting up Eurofresh Farms in Willcox, Arizona. He asked Tim to join him, so Tim and his family moved to Arizona in 1997. The company grew into a successful enterprise, with over 300 acres of tomatoes

Ten years later, Village Farms, a company with nurseries in the US and Canada, headhunted Tim as its vice president of production. He was responsible for developing large-scale greenhouse management, pioneering automated labour and pest control systems and implementing innovative cropping techniques.

In 2020 Tim joined AppHarvest in Morehead, Kentucky as vice president of production. He said, "I joined AppHarvest because the team's vision and enthusiasm are taking our industry to a new level." AppHarvest is resource and energy efficient, climate resilient, and locally grown. and Tim believed that this was the direction the industry needed to follow.

As retirement approaches, Tim works as an independent consultant to companies in America and Ontario. He is enjoying life in his Kentucky log cabin with six acres of land, with Karin, dogs and horses and is close to his son and daughter and five grandchildren. He still has fond memories of Fen Drayton, where the seeds of his career in tomatoes were first sown.

Easter Egg Wreath

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Afoot in the Garden

Men and metal

I regularly work in collaboration with Ariane who owns Cambridge Border Design. I concentrate on the overall layout and hard landscaping, while Ariane looks after the planting. Ariane with her Dutch/French heritage often has expat European clients. They are always amused that our English customers regularly specify 'No yellows!' We ask 'What no daffs?' Oh! they reply, daffodils are ok! We also find that men like straight lines, especially if they mow the lawn and trim their hedges. While ladies are made of fragrance and flowers, boys are made of metal and grease, thistles and thorns. Men appreciate trees and giants like cardoons, onopordum giganteum and the large campanulas, especially the 4' 1.2m tall c. Kent Belle with its large hanging bells of copper blue? I should 'Give a man a plant day might be an idea for future Palm Sundays?

April is just about the best month for sowing seeds. Half-hardy annuals and first season flowering perennials are great value and can fill the spaces between shrubs with summer colour. April is also an excellent time to plant trees, shrubs, perennials, roses and summer flowering bulbs like lilies and gladioli. Introducing lots of organic matter into the soil when planting, along with a good mulch afterwards, will reduce the amount of summer watering needed.

Don't forget to firm the soil and water well after planting. With watering in mind most of us use quick-fit hose connectors. If they leek replacing the washers it's much cheaper than buying new connectors!

Feeding your plants, especially roses and shrubs will ensure they stay fit and healthy. If black spot is a problem on your roses, April is the time to start spraying them!

Edging your lawns will make your garden look so much crisper. Lawn treatments can be used if rain is forecast. The soil level in your borders should be 3-4" 75/100mm below lawn level to avoid the creeping rye grasses that bind your lawn together from running into your borders!

Loosen tree ties a tad so they don't throttle your tree's trunk!

Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Monday 03 March

20mph

Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) has submitted the agreed proposal for formal consultation as of November 19th. However, we were 24th in line for publication and consultation, so they cannot provide an exact date at this stage. We will update you as soon as more information becomes available.

Graveley Way Trees

Hilton Parish Council discussed all of the information presented by both residents and CCC regarding the ownership and maintenance of these trees. The Council has agreed on the following resolutions regarding the trees on Graveley Way:

- The Council will not maintain these trees, as they are considered the responsibility of the homeowners, based on advice from
- Homeowners are advised to clarify ownership with the Highways Searches Department of CCC or seek legal advice.
- The trees will be included in the annual tree survey, and homeowners will be informed of any recommended safety work.
- The Council is willing to assist where possible, including incorporating Graveley Way tree work into the main annual tree work program if agreed, with costs recharged accordingly.

Maintenance Contracts

The Council discussed the renewal of their open spaces maintenance contracts and resolved that:

- The Council has decided not to renew the contract with TP Garden Maintenance.
- The Clerk has been requested to present a new maintenance proposal for the garden, playground, and ditches at the April Council meeting.
- The 1.7% contractual price increase (CPI) for JSC services has been noted.

Streetlight in The Grove

The Council has approved the installation of

a new lantern for the streetlight in The Grove, near the playground. The new lantern will provide illumination for both the road and the path, at a cost of £275 + VAT.

Website Domain

The Council has agreed to renew the website domain for nine years at a cost of £154.64.

All Stars and Dynamos Cricket Courses The Council has agreed to run the cricket courses again this year, subject to volunteer availability. Further details will be shared once arrangements are confirmed.

Annual Parish Meeting

Hilton Parish Council has scheduled the Annual Parish Meeting for Thursday 15th May at 7:30pm, subject to venue availability. The Annual Parish Meeting is a yearly gathering where residents can engage with the Parish Council, discuss local issues, and hear updates on community projects. Unlike regular council meetings, this meeting provides an opportunity for parishioners to raise concerns, suggest ideas, and learn about the Council's activities over the past year. - ◆ Collecting prescriptions
- ◆ Reading post
- Making phone calls on your behalf, if requested
- ◆ Ensuring your safety and wellbeing

Who can the Warden help?

This service is for people aged 60yrs and above living in certain areas in Cambridgeshire or Peterborough. It is important to note that the warden is not a domestic, home help or a carer providing physical care.

The Community Warden is employed and paid by Age UK Cambridgeshire and Peterborough and must not undertake tasks for you on a private basis.

Courtesy of your Parish Council, residents of Fenstanton can try out the Community Warden service, to promote both physical and mental wellbeing, for free, for the first three months. The current charge is £15 per week for a single user or £18 for a couple.

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Navigating Parental Disputes: School Holiday Arrangements

It is that time of year where two parents are separated, disagreement can arise in regard to their child's living arrangements throughout the school holidays and often revolve around conflicting holiday plans, travel arrangements, and concerns about childcare during breaks. These issues can escalate quickly, leading to heightened stress and strained relationships between parents and for the children involved.

If, after exhausting all dispute resolution avenues, an agreement cannot be reached, an application to the court for a Child Arrangements Order (CAO) may be necessary. CAOs offer a structured approach to resolving such conflicts, providing clarity and stability in determining where children will spend their holidays both short and long term.

Understanding Child Arrangement Orders

Obtaining a CAO for school holiday arrangements involves considering various legal factors, the priority being the children's welfare and the ability of parents to cooperate. Whilst some parents may be able to reach agreements through negotiation or mediation, others may require court intervention to formalise arrangements.

CAOs are legally binding court orders that outline where children will live and how much time they will spend with each parent. They come in various forms, including Specific issue orders (addressing particular matters like schooling or healthcare) and Prohibited steps orders (restricting certain actions by one or both parents).

CAOs can provide a clear framework for parents to follow. These orders can specify holiday schedules, allocate holiday time between parents and establish communication protocols. By outlining expectations and responsibilities, CAOs can help reduce conflict and promote cooperative co-parenting.

Benefit for the Children

CAOs are granted in the child's best interest and as described above, their welfare is paramount. CAOs aim to promote stability and consistency for the children, ensuring they have a structured routine during breaks. A CAO leaves no room for debate, these orders are legally enforceable and compel the parties to adhere, minimising disagreement and the emotional stress often experienced by the children themselves.

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Life on a Plate



Auntie Bella's Yorkshire Yeast Loaf

Being a war time recipe it is given in Imperial weights! It is not as complicated as it might seem. Best cooked in a one pound sized bread tin to slice and serve buttered and with cheese the Yorkshire way

Ingredients:

3 oz butter or margarine

3 oz sugar

1 egg

8 oz plain flour

1 teaspoon syrup or treacle

Three quarters of a cup of milk

A pinch of salt

Half a teaspoon of yeast (they used fresh then, usually dried nowadays)

8oz dried fruit

Half an ounce of bicarbonate of soda

1 teaspoons spices (optional)



Method:

Prepare the baking tin by lining it with greaseproof paper or a layer of grease

Cream sugar and fat

Beat the syrup and egg into the mixture

Warm the milk, pour some of it onto the yeast and keep warm, save a little for the bicarb

Stir the dried fruit and flour to the mixture alternately

Add the yeast mixture then the bicarb one likewise

The old recipe says to bake in a slow oven for two hours, but it's best to check if the knife comes out cleanly in our modern way.

Kept in an airtight container this will last up to two weeks but it's never had to to wait that long in our house!

Scottish Grandad's Porridge

Method:

Pour about 40 grams of porridge oats into a saucepan with a cup of full cream milk and heat until it's thickening

Put into a bowl

Meanwhile heat a cup of the same milk, and pour into another bowl

Sprinkle with salt. Yes, salt!

Enjoy spoonfuls alternately between the two bowls

In icy winters have whisky available or in your porridge

Apologies In last month's recipe we left out a key ingredient. Please use 9oz/260gms of self raising flour when making the date and walnut cake. Enjoy.

Sue Ellington - South Cambs district councillor's report

As we come to the end of the financial year, South Cambs District Council (SCDC) is in a relatively good financial situation. The income from Ermine Street housing. which is privately owned by the council, helps the administration to carry out its responsibilities and promote their Green to the Core strategy.

SCDC has, however, decided to increase council tax by the maximum permissible and to raise councillors' allowances. On the plus side, I'm pleased that the village has benefited from a number of significant grants, enabling the construction of the pump track and improvements to the village hall.

Over the coming year we will be faced with a significant change in the way local government is organised. The government has decided that district councils should be abolished and all local authority services delivered by a unitary authority. All the current authorities are required to submit a first draft of how this might be established by the end of March 2025.

I'm concerned that SCDC has called an emergency council meeting on 19 March to agree the draft they will submit, without consulting the public.

Even as I write this, on 7 March, I have no idea of the size or configuration of this new authority. You will hear more over the coming months!.

Passing Place: the Fenlands, Flooding, and its Futures

Shannon Best, curator

I grew up in the Fenlands, a landscape shaped by the movement and management of water. Originally marshland, agricultural demand during the 1600s led to its artificial drainage for arable plots, though pockets of wetland persist today. This land has been incrementally changed by sea-level rise, humanmade intervention and flooding; with a dynamic interplay between inundation and drainage, the land lies significantly below sea level, making it some of the lowest land areas in the United Kingdom. This constant push and pull between land and water has long informed my understanding of home.

It is from this awareness that the exhibition Joining Doggerland formed. Held at APT Gallery, London, from 6-16 February 2025, this mixed-media group exhibition took its name from the lost land of Doggerland – a prehistoric plain once connecting Britain to mainland Europe, before warming climates led to its submergence – to raise urgent questions about what it means to hold steady

in the face of environmental uncertainty; to act as committed witnesses to processes of loss and change across the UK.

As part of the exhibition's public programming, I am co-leading a free guided walk with members of the Cambridgeshire Geological Society along the Fen Edge Trail, through the village of Stretham. On Sunday 4 May, from 2 - 5 pm, we will traverse a landscape in flux – one that bears the markers of geological, agricultural, and social histories. Along the walk, we will visit Stretham Old Engine: once used to pump water from fenland marshes into the River Ouse, this historic drainage engine serves as a tangible relic of land management practices and their effects on the region's pasts, presents and futures.

The walk acts as an invitation: to engage directly with the land, and to reflect on the possibilities still embedded within its evolving terrain. The Fenlands, like Doggerland before it, carries the weight of history. But within that history is also a reminder that landscapes, and the communities within them, are always adapting and finding ways to endure.



What you're Missing

Fenstanton Glebe Allotments Association

I can't believe it is March already and the growing season is well underway. It's a busy time preparing beds and most of the allotments are showing signs of new growth.

It is not too late to chit potato seedlings. Place them in a seed tray or egg box with the eyes facing up, keep them in a frost-free place for 4-6 weeks, then when the potatoes have sprouted approx 1inch, plant them out. There are many varieties to choose from, grown at different times of the year. Garden centres usually provide information on when to plant the different varieties and what they can be used for.



Other vegetable seeds to plant now are peas, beans, carrots from mid-March and beetroot.

Fenstanton Parish Council has kindly gifted our social plot two apple trees as part of a wider village initiative. Thank you, Ray, for organising this, and Jan and Paul for planting them.

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


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
