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


Festive Greetings

Henry Tabony's family visit Fenstanton

I've lived in the house next to the fish shop in Fenstanton for 32 years and was always aware of a brick in my garden on the side wall of the fish and chip shop etched with R Tabony on it. Over the years I've heard many people talk of their fond memories of Henry Tabony, who owned the shop many years ago. One such tale was that he'd let children who came off the last bus jump the queue, as they'd school next day.



On 18 August 2023 my door knocked and there was a gentleman called Guy, who turned out to be Henry's grandson, asking if it was possible to see the brick. I invited him to come through the house and was pleasantly surprised to welcome an entourage of Henry's family. There was Irene Tabony, the wife of Roy (Henry's son) who etched the brick when he was 7 years old. Sadly Roy passed away aged 84 in April 2023. This meant the engraving was done in 1946!

Henry would have been very proud of his descendants - great-grandchildren Ellie, Charley, Max, Gus and Ozzy. In the photograph where they are enjoying fish and





chips from Barry's Plaice, the children are joined by Irene (Henry's daughter-in-law), Guy (grandson) and his wife Janet and Rhona (granddaughter) and her husband Jon.

Sadly time was too short, but maybe they'll visit again and share their memories of Henry and my house where he lived.

Take charge of your batteries

At this time of year when many new appliances come into our homes, it is important to buy and dispose of batteries carefully. There has been a lot in the news recently about Lithium batteries catching fire. Whilst these batteries are generally safe and are found in many things we own such as phones, laptops, notepads, cameras and gaming equipment, they do need careful treatment. When charging the larger versions commonly used in e-bikes and scooters, try to avoid charging them in your home or if you have no other alternative follow the steps below:

- Avoid charging overnight when you are asleep
- 2. Do not carry out charging in an exit from your house, such as a hallway
- Shut the door to the room when you are charging and ensure the room has a smoke detector

- Check your battery to ensure it is not getting too hot, smoking, leaking or bulging as these are all signs that it could catch on fire
- 5. Unplug your charger after use

If your Lithium battery catches on fire call 999 immediately!

If you need to replace a Lithium battery only buy ones marked with a CE mark, which signifies it has been tested and meets UK standards. Unfortunately, unscrupulous online retailers are stamping batteries with a CE mark when they have not been tested. So, stick to recognised manufacturers. Cheapest is not always the best when it comes to Lithium batteries.

Lithium batteries like ordinary batteries, should not be disposed of in your regular household waste. Doing so can cause a fire. Take them to a recycling centre or to a local shop that has a battery bank.

Fen Drayton Speedwatch

Did you know? Our village has its own Speedwatch group! Currently we're a small team and every fortnight three of the volunteers conduct a speed monitoring session along one of our busy village roads.

In the past, regular monitoring along Mill Road demonstrated the need to reduce the speed limit from 60mph to 40mph and so keep our children and other road users safer. Recently we monitored along Cootes Lane (30mph). Of the 50 vehicles recorded, five were driving in excess of 35mph, with one motorist travelling at 47mph!

The next stage is for the plans to go before Huntingdonshire District Council Development Management Committee, for their consideration. As our outline planning permission has already been granted, we are confident that the detailed plans will be considered favourably and, all being well, have the plans approved by early 2024, with building commencing soon after.

Remembrance in Hilton

In Focus: Huntingdonshire Futures Place Strategy making strides

It is an exciting time for Huntingdonshire whilst we go through the Local Plan refresh and the approval of the Huntingdonshire Futures Place Strategy.



The Place Strategy, approved by Councillors earlier this year, sets out a shared vision for the future of Huntingdonshire for the next 30 years. It has been co-developed with partners (including Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority), organisations and Huntingdonshire residents following an extensive period of engagement across the district over the last year. The strategy maps out plans for place, people, economy, and the environment. Executive Leader of HDC, Cllr Sarah Conboy, said: "Great communities don't happen by chance, they happen because stakeholders, residents and businesses share a clear vision of how they want them to be and have bold, well thought out plans and priorities to achieve these."

Huntingdonshire District Council Climbs Climate Action Rankings

HDC's ongoing efforts for a greener future has seen the council climb up the ranking tables in the latest Climate Emergency UK (CEUK) scorecard results.

As of 2023, HDC has achieved an overall positioning of 96th out of 164 districts. In contrast to the Council's dead last positioning at 0% in 2021. These results reflect the Council's ongoing commitment to mitigating the effects of climate change and contributing to a more sustainable future for our community.

Local Plan update

Following the Call For Sites in the summer, sites submitted are now going through the first phase of assessment using the Land Availability Assessment.

Step into the Past

Fenstanton and Number 22 High Street

This is a photograph of Cedar Close, Number 22, High Street, which is a small estate of newly built houses.



But what was there before these new houses? Older residents will remember the house that once sat on this site. Its last owner was Mr Derek Lamb, who was an engineer with Perkins Engines in Peterborough.

This second photograph is of Number 22 when it was sold to Derek Lamb in the early 1970s.

Unlike most of the large houses in the High Street, number 22 did not have a name, just a number. It was a two storey detached Victorian building that was situated in the middle of a large plot of land between the High Street and Bell Lane. The site had a substantial garden to the rear and front, with stabling and a coach house to the east side.

In 1777 the Lord of the Manor, who was Lancelot Brown, had produced a set of very detailed estate maps. These early maps showed that the land of Number 22 was purely agricultural in nature, i.e. there was no house at that time.

We know that the house was built shortly before 1890 as it appears on the Ordinance Survey maps in 1888. There was a driveway in a horseshoe shape leading from the High Street to the front door of the house. To the rear there was an orchard with gated access to Bell Lane. The length of the front driveway was tree-lined which gave a strong village appeal and this was complemented by various shrubs to the front walls. Of all the buildings in the High Street, only number 22

had a large front garden which allowed space for the building to be only partly viewed and gave a picture of roof lines nestling amongst the trees.

The house was built as family accommodation, with four well sized bedrooms upstairs separated from the ground floor by a split level landing. The ground floor had four main rooms with three spanning the length of the rear and they were all linked to the hallway





with internal doors. The entrance hall was tiled with an open staircase that had twisted balusters linking directly to the front door. Additionally there was a kitchen, pantry and store room and when built there would have been an outdoor toilet. An indoor toilet and bathroom were a latter addition.

There was a stable block with accommodation for a horse and carriage and a loft where the groom resided. A door immediately above the horse entrance allowed the passing down of hay from storage (a hayloft) above There was also a single storey shed attached to the coach house which would probably have been for storage of machinery and equipment for maintenance of the grounds.



Although the property survived in a largely unaltered condition, the decorative state was very poor. Furthermore, whilst its planned layout was still well-defined, it did not render any unique information about the history of private buildings in the second half of the Victorian period. Number 22 would have

needed to have had a stronger quality and an historic association of national significance to warrant its protection.



The significance of Number 22 High Street was lessened by the overall view of a ruined building set back adjacent to an attractive street and fronted by a largely intact surrounding wall. The composition of the front wall was and still is a mix of bricks and has some character yet the overriding sense is that the wall has been altered with bricks added in a piecemeal manner. Although the origin of its construction is contemporary, the building it is not of one period.

Therefore the planners felt that the future character of this site would be enhanced by a development which continued the use of the site for housing. And so, the house was demolished and Cedar Close was built in its place.

So instead of any insights of my own, I'd like to turn to the poems of Siegfried Sassoon, one of the great poets of the 1st World War. Here are some lines from one of his poems, called 'Reconciliation'. It's not

an answer or a solution to anything, but it might just give us a picture of what hope looks like.

I have no special wisdom about the terrible and seemingly

When you are standing at your hero's grave, Or near some homeless village where he died, Remember, through your heart's rekindling pride, The German soldiers who were loyal and brave.

Men fought like brutes; and hideous things were done; And you have nourished hatred, harsh and blind. But in that Golgotha perhaps you'll find The mothers of the men who killed your son.

Golgotha is where Jesus died, and it seems to me that the only hope for peace in our world is for men and women to use suffering not to drive us further apart but to bring us back to each other, as Christians believe Jesus brings us back to God by his cruel death.

A true Italian porchetta is made from whole suckling pig, stuffed with flavourings such as fennel, herbs, and indeed its own offal, cooked over a pit until perfectly tender. This is, of course, a bit of an ask for the home cook, so we've captured all of the flavours of a porchetta and adapted them into something much more easy to handle using pork belly and loin – the results are stunning! Here at Rosegate Farm in Swavesey, if you ask, we will remove the ribs from the loin and

belly leaving all of the meat on the joint, this helps to make it easier to stuff and also holds the stuffing throughout the joint creating attractive seams as you carve. As ever try to buy local and ensure good provenance for the meat, it will improve the eating experience fathoms! Our pork has a great flavour at this time of the year as the pigs diet is supplemented with apple pulp from Cromwell's Cider, giving the fat a delicious and subtle sweetness.

Ingredients (serves 4)

2.5kg pork belly, boneless 600g of pork loin

2 sprigs of rosemary, leaves picked

3 sprigs of fresh thyme, leaves picked

1 large bulb of garlic

1 tbsp of fennel seeds

1 pinch of chilli flakes

1 lemon, zested

2 tbsp of white wine

1 tsp flaky sea salt

1/2 tsp cracked black pepper

500ml of water

Equipment

Pestle and mortar or chopper Butcher's string



Preperation

To begin, place the fennel seeds and chilli flakes in hot, dry pan and toast for 30 seconds, until fragrant.

Peel the garlic cloves and place in a pestle and mortar, or chopper. Add the herbs, toasted spices, salt, pepper and white wine and grind to a rough paste.

Place the pork belly skin-side down and lay the loin across the width. Trim the loin down to size so it rolls up neatly.


Lightly score the belly flesh in a 2cm diagonal pattern and massage the stuffing paste into the belly and loin. Place the loin back onto the belly.

Roll up tightly, tie up with butcher's string and leave uncovered in the fridge overnight. This will dry out the skin, giving a crispier crackling.

Preheat the oven to 160°C/gas mark 3 Place the pork on a wire rack set over an oven tray. Pour in the 500ml of water and cook in the oven for 3 1/2 to 4 hours. Check at intervals; if the water has evaporated, add a little more.

Leave to rest for 30 minutes before carving. Use as part of a roast or if you're having a party why not serve it in buttered bread rolls. Fabulous!

Afoot in the Garden



Take a walk! Take a walk around your village in the daylight when the weather is clement. Admire the evergreens and berries of winter in the gardens you walk past. See how many plants still have flowers even at this time of year. If you are admiring a neighbour's garden and they see you, give them a merry wave and a thumbs up. Inspiration for your own garden is all around you.

In the deep midwinter

Take time to look up at the conifers, pines, cedars, giant redwoods, yews, fir, spruce and cypress trees gracing our landscape. Our largest broadleaved evergreen is the holm oak probably followed by the bay tree after which we are looking at smaller garden sized trees. Look out for trees with coloured bark like birch, acers, cherry, eucalyptus and plane trees. Evergreens give gardens structure, add focal points and screening.

It always surprises me how many flowers can been seen over the festive period. Roses can often be found while viburnums tinus and camelias should be flowering. Hazel, witch hazel, its relative chimonanthus and mahonia might also be in flower. At ground level snowdrops, hellebores and cyclamen are welcome winter flowers occasionally accompanied by native primroses. Shrubs with coloured bark like the dogwoods in red 'Westonbirt', yellow (flaviramia) and the glowing 'Midwinter fire' glow in the winter sun. In sunnier drier spots heathers and heaths are also often in flower in December.

Midwinter jobs

Pruning and planting are traditional winter jobs especially enjoyable when the sun shines. Prune apples, pears, soft fruit and woody shrubs. Bush roses benefit from hard structural pruning, I always prune out one old stem as low as possible every year. Plant trees, shrubs, winter bedding like bellis, pansy, violets and bulbs in the garden or pots. Plant trees and shrubs, tidy up borders and lawns, weed and mulch your borders. Protect less hardy plants with generous amounts of mulch around the base.



The Highs and Lows



As we basked in summer like temperatures during the first 10 days of October following the warmest September since records began, in 1884 in East Anglia, the warm period had extended to 50 days.

When I concluded my last article in early August, the rather cool changeable pattern of weather which had dominated July, was continuing. Storm Anthoni (named by the Western European Group), gave us an exceptionally cool, wet and sunless day on the 5th with the temperature hovering around 13C (55F), some 10C (18F) below normal. Conditions then improved and the month ended with a 10 day warm spell, a forerunner to a record breaking September which became the warmest month of the year, an occurrence which has only happened on four occasions since 1895. The month

also contained the warmest day of 2023 which occurred during a spell containing 7 consecutive days with the temperature reaching or exceeding 30C (86F), also a new record. The warmth brought by gentle southerly winds containing dust from the Sahara in the upper atmosphere generated vivid sunrises and sunsets. Although September rainfall total was close to average, this belies the fact that most days were dry, with most of the total falling on one day, the 20th (35.5mm. or 1.45inches).

Apart from a thundery day on 2 October the following 8 days brought a continuation of the summery conditions with temperatures rising into the low 20's (70-74F). A wet evening on the 11th marked the start of a dramatic change with spells of heavy rain on the following two days. In its wake Arctic



air brought a sharp reminder of the chill that autumn can bring with day and night temperatures dropping by 9C (16F). The first ground frosts occurred on 15 and 16 October. On the 18th barometric pressure dropped by an incredible amount from 30 to 29 inches (a fall of 35 millibars) heralding the arrival of Storm Babet, from the warm waters from the Bay of Biscay. Over the next five days it delivered huge amounts of rain across parts of the Midlands and most of eastern Britain accompanied by easterly gales along the coasts. Widespread flooding and damage occurred. Actual rainfall totals have yet to be verified but some parts of East Anglia particularly Suffolk reported up to 100mm (4inches). As I finish this article Storm Claran is on its way.

Raging wildfires, heavy rainfall and intense storms marked summer 2023 in the northern hemisphere. Here are a few by way of illustration:

 Hong Kong. 150mm (6inches) of rain fell in one hour in early September beating all previous records, started 140 years ago. A week later Super Typhoon Saola

- delivered 600mm (2 feet) of rain in 24 hours paralysing most of the territory with extensive flooding.
- Greece, Bulgaria, Turkey and Libya. Storm Daniel caused devastating flooding with the heaviest rains for more than 100 years, firstly in central Greece where the city of Volos and the island of Skiathos were very badly hit, before moving south over the Mediterranean to Libya. There the rains led to the collapse of two dams causing much of the city of Derna to be washed away killing at least 11,000 people.
- 3. Extreme heat in Italy and Greece in July. A heatwave with temperatures 40C and above (104F) caused famous attractions like the Acropolis in Athens to be closed because of risk to life. North African countries Tunisia and Algeria recorded up to 48C (118F).
- 4. Hawaii. The United States' deadliest wildfire in more than a century on the island of Maui destroyed numerous neighbourhoods including the historic town on Lahaina, a popular tourist spot.

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Business Spotlight

It's a family affair

Jack Wilderspin, now 95, set up an engineering workshop in the early 1950s that later expanded into repairing motor vehicles. The business moved to its current location in the 1980s with the new buildings opening in 2002 providing five service bays and two MOT bays. Jack retired in the late 1990s and the Ray family are now maintaining his legacy and his name.



Wilderspin today is run by Mark Ray and his two sons Tom and Adam so it is a real family affair. Mark is still in the workshop with Adam, whilst Tom who is a fully qualified mechanic took over the 'front of house' five years ago with his female assistant Narla, the boxer dog.

"We think it is important to have someone who has hands-on experience working directly with our customers," Tom explains. "This means I can clearly describe what is going on and give our customers an honest assessment of their vehicle."

The Ray family all originate and still live in Warboys and as well as being passionate about the garage, they are all avid Arsenal football fans which explains the numerous match day programs in the reception waiting area. "When growing up I watched my father, who I think is a workaholic, build the business and all I wanted to do at school was to work with my Dad. I enjoyed being hands-on and didn't want initially to move into customer servicing because I preferred



car servicing. However, I now recognise the importance of the role I play looking after our valued customers." And, if the thank you cards that clutter the reception desk are anything to go by he is doing a pretty good job!

Tom, who drives the customer service experience of the garage, prides himself on the thought of keeping the vehicles of local businesses on the road. "Local trades people rely on their vehicles and I like to think they can rely on us to keep them going."

It is not only commercial vehicles that Wilderspin specialise in as they maintain a number of vintage cars including a beautiful 1963 Aston Martin DB5. "We service all makes of cars and we do not want to become a onemake specialist. More and more customers are giving up on the expense of main dealer servicing which, to be honest, judging the number of complaints we hear are not doing a good enough job. One of the misconceptions, especially when physical service books were abandoned for online records, is that you have to use a main dealer to maintain your car's service history and warranty. We have access to the majority of manufacturer's online service records and as we only fit genuine parts we can maintain cars in accordance with the requirements without infringing any warranties or service history."

The Ray family and their three staff are kept pretty busy by their loyal following and with Mo's Motors closing the phone has been red hot. Tom says, "We are not the cheapest garage in the area and I am very honest



with people about that, but in terms of the quality of our work and the service we offer I think we are probably one of the best."

Anthony Browne, MP

Our MP, Anthony Browne, came to the Three Tuns on the evening of 9 November to meet constituents and discuss their concerns (pictured below). He was questioned on local and wider issues in the country and his party.

Concerns raised included rural crime. Mr Browne has a follow up meeting with the crime commissioner to reiterate our lack of rural policing and response to the continued break-ins we are experiencing.

Many parishioners spoke about the planning process and how the lack of water would affect us all. The huge number of houses planned for Northstowe raised particular concerns, not only about the water supply but also the lack of forward planning, which has left a community without a doctors' surgery, sporting facilities or shop-making a mockery of moving to a more sustainable car-free environment.

Mr Browne also spoke about the parliamentary boundary changes that affect his present constituency. We will be with St Neots and Fenstanton.





Community warden

South Cambs District Council has published the results of an external review of mobile/community wardens operating in South Cambridgeshire, provided by charities such as Age UK.

The report highlights client benefits, such as reducing loneliness and isolation, improving mobility, co-ordinating support from other services and helping to reduce or delay deterioration in health and wellbeing: "I love my phone calls from the warden and her visits really cheer me up." Benefits for family members are also covered: "The service is just what we need for our parents. Having someone to check on them is reassuring. Thank you!"

The report also outlines advantages for adult social care and the NHS: "We had a client who was ready to be discharged from hospital but there was no transport. The hospital put him in a taxi but needed someone to meet him at home, which the warden did. This meant he didn't need to stay in hospital for a further night."


Can you help us?

The Third Annual Report on Hilton Community Garden 2023

It has again been a pleasure to be Chair of such a committee with a lovely group of volunteers. We have met during the year to work on the garden, to plan and to evaluate the various activities.

During the year we:-

 organised a Gardeners' Question Time at the Methodist Church



- celebrated the King's coronation with the production of a fantastic floral crown and provided a throne and relevant clothing with photo opportunities for members of the public.
- enjoyed our visit to Godmanchester Community Garden where we admired their work and learnt from their experiences.
- invited members of Cambridge Gardens Trust to visit our garden as part of their meeting in Hilton.
- helped children from the village and Nursery to produce desert gardens which they entered in the Produce Show during Feast Week.
- entered several classes at the annual Village Produce Show and organised the potato competition.
- hosted groups of Brownies and Beavers on their visits to the garden and encouraged them to plant and care for the garden.

A highlight of the year has to be the inclusion of the garden, together with 6 other local gardens, in the National Gardens Scheme.

About 350 people attended and this resulted in £1973 being donated to the NGS for their nominated charities. A further £655 was shared between the two Hilton churches.

Our thanks go to Roland Randall, who initially provided the land for the Community Garden. He and his family show an active interest in the garden and provide a regular supply of manure.

My personal thanks go to everyone on the Committee for their enthusiasm, dedication and support. They have built new garden features, organised planting schedules, managed our finances, designed posters and displays, written reports and provided cake and drinks each week.



Our grant applications are very successful resulting in a healthy bank balance. No charge is made for produce and villagers are able to take any crop which they are able to use.

The community garden has become a go-to destination in the village and provides a haven for those who want to take a break from their busy lives in peaceful surroundings, it is a place to work, to rest, to enjoy, to sit or just to relax. This garden is for everyone and I am so pleased that it is indeed enjoyed by everyone.

I have no doubt it will continue as an important amenity in this village for years to come.

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
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Wilderness Scrub

The Council agreed to spend £450 for an agricultural contractor to flail the overgrown scrub along the town drain around the wilderness and along the Green towards the Fenstanton Road.

Tree Work

The Council approved the category A (urgent) tree work at a cost of £1,988, which is within the budget for these works.

New Councillor

Clara Robinson has been co-opted onto the Council and the Clerk will complete the induction process.

Policies

The Council agreed an amendment to their standing orders, a new co-option policy, a pavilion lettings policy and reviewed this years' action plan.

Swavesey VC Bus Stop

Members of the Council and the Clerk met with representatives from the Cambridge Bus Company and Cambridgeshire County Council Social & Education Transport Department to discuss the safety of students using the Swavesey Village College bus. Over the last 40 years there have been two serious accidents, one of which was fatal, involving students alighting from the school bus and then crossing the Potton Road. Currently, the school bus only stops at Scotts Crescent, which means that all students from the west of the village have to cross the Potton Road to catch their bus. The Cambridge Bus Company has agreed to reinstate the Potton Road stop to enable students from the west of the village to catch their bus without crossing the Potton Road, whilst students from the east of the village can continue to catch their bus



in Scotts Crescent. CCC would like to remind parents that, according to their policy to which parents agreed when they applied for a bus pass, parents are responsible for their children until they are actually on the bus. Therefore, the bus company, Hilton Parish Council and CCC would like to encourage parents to instruct their children to board and alight the bus at the correct stop to reduce the risk of children crossing the Potton Road.

Local Highways Improvement Funding

The window has opened for this funding and the Council has instructed their LHI working group to draft a proposal for the Council to review at their next meeting. Suggestions include extending the bus stop on Potton Road to enable the buses and coaches to pull completely off the road, increasing visibility and therefore safety, and realigning the carriageway at the crossroads to improve lines of sight and therefore safety.

The Council has also received correspondence from CCC with the designs for the HGV signage approved under last year's bid. The Council has instructed their LHI working group to review these designs and make recommendations.

Streetlighting Energy

The Council has agreed to enter into a 2-year contract with Yu Energy for their streetlighting energy, at an annual cost of £2,777.94.

Streetlights

Land Registry

Hilton Parish Council has agreed to spend £150 to change their correspondence address with the land registry.

Fire Safety (England) Regulations 2022

The Council has instructed the Clerk to conduct a fire safety risk assessment of the pavilion and report the findings to a future council meeting.

St Ives Neighbourhood Plan

The Council has delegated the response to this consultation to the Clerk, in consultation with Cllr P. Balicki and Cllr S. Suckling. The draft Neighbourhood Plan and supporting information is available for viewing on the St Ives Town Council website: https://www.stivestowncouncil.gov.uk/Regulation_14_Consultation_Oct_2023_45793.aspx

Feast Week

Hilton Parish Council has granted permission for Feast Week on the green from Sunday 21st July to Saturday 27th July, with the marquee erected from Monday 15th July to Monday 29th July.

Bonfire and Fireworks Event

The recent successful event raised £2,051.50 in income, though there will be card charges to subtract from this total. The Council has asked their bonfire working group to review the event and present a report to

Trains, Boats and Planes

How about going by bike?

There are many ways of travelling but one of my favourites is cycling. I'm not a fast cyclist but I do like distance and I frequently take my bike to France. You can plan independently (plenty of route planners available), book a holiday cycling tour OR take on a Charity Challenge, which is what I did last year for Women v Cancer. I had taken part in two of their events, Ride the Night which was 100km route in and around London at night...great fun! Then I heard that they were doing a 10yr anniversary cycle trip from London to Amsterdam and signed up. It actually turned into an 11yr anniversary as Covid got in the way! With charity events, you can usually choose how to fund it either committing to raise a minimum amount beforehand, with the charity paying your costs, or to self-fund, raising as much as you can. The former enables folk to join an amazing trip which might not have been possible...mind you; there is a lot of hard work to do in fundraising so not an easy option!



So, to the trip itself... the first thing was to pack everything in panniers and pedal to Huntingdon to get a train to Woolwich, start of the challenge. Changed at Farringdon to the Elizabeth Line, not long opened and the first time I had taken bike on the underground!

Day 1: London to Calais. Up at 5am to meet the group of 37 at the start point. After briefing from the leader, three medics plus support team and van, our bags were loaded on the van and we left at 6.30am south to Dover. London traffic not bad, weather kind but Kent hills were awful, 5249 ft climbed that day but we caught the ferry at 7.30pm! We had another 3 mls to get to our hotel in Calais. 90.36 mls

Day 2: Calais to Brugge Left 6.30am heading through France and Belgium cycling on side roads via Dunkirk into Belgium.
Continental drivers are really considerate to cyclists and we made sure we weren't bunched to cause any problem. Crossing into Belgium, we stopped at Veurne for excellent lunch (trip was very well catered, meals included). Belgian countryside was lovely and we skirted Oostende before reaching outskirts of Brugge. The hotel was all cycle themed, called Velotel. A good rest followed another excellent meal...thought we were going to lose weight on this escapade, must pedal harder! 75.7 mls and no hills!

Day 3: Brugge to Rotterdam 6am start, what a great day, good weather with a tail wind. Crossed border into the Netherlands and needed to use ferries and bridges to get through Zeeland, birthplace of Vermuyden! The ferries, especially the first, were truly bike friendly. It was spectacular scenery as we cycled around and over the masses of water and alongside dunes on quiet roads and cycle paths. Now, no cycle trip would be



complete without an unexpected diversion!
Ours was on the way to the final ferry where
the road was closed, as the ferry was the last
crossing that day, speed was of the essence...
we caught it! We then pedalled through
industrialised Rotterdam (attractive in its
own way) to reach our hotel. 94 mls, the
hilliest on this side of the channel but only
1652ft climbed!

Day 4: Rotterdam to Amsterdam 7am start, what a wonderful final cycling day with such an extensive cycle network which was a real pleasure to use. Cycled through beautiful villages, small towns, alongside ponies and traps and would have loved to have more time, especially for Delft. We reached Amsterdam and it was amazing to cycle past famous landmarks e.g. the Rijksmuseum and to cross the myriad of canals by bike. Our trip now complete, our bikes were taken to be loaded on transport for the UK before we headed for a Celebration Dinner. 64.6 mls

Day 5: Back to UK I wish I had booked an extra night to revisit the wonderful things Amsterdam has to offer. As well as museums (including the Moco which has work by Banksy) and art galleries, there is Anne Frank



Huis and lots more. Sadly, our Eurostar return left at lunchtime, so coffee and cake by a canal had to suffice. Just over 4hrs and we were back at St Pancras to meet our bikes.

I aim to return **but** will go as foot passenger from Dover to miss the Kent hills. Choosing a charity trip, wherever you want to go, allows you to join a supported trip raising funds for a charity you choose and I would thoroughly recommend it.





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Bird's Eye View

An update from Fen Drayton Lakes



With the end of the year fast approaching, we share a brief review of 2023 looking at the wildlife that has been seen on site and the work we have undertaken on the reserve.

We experienced a couple of cold snaps over the early winter period which led to several of the lakes completely icing over. On the remaining lakes, patches of water were kept open by the ducks and other wildfowl which were all condensed into small areas. This brought in some Smew, scarce ducks from the continent, the adult males dressed in white with neat black trim and the females plus youngsters having a chestnut-red head.

Come spring, the volunteers had repaired the floating fences which surround several of the islands on Moore and Ferry Lakes and we towed them out by boat. The fences help stop mammalian predators from reaching the islands and taking all the bird's eggs. However, flooding shortly after led the fences to be damaged. With that and bird flu it was a tough breeding season for the Black-headed Gulls and Common Terns, but some made it and even managed to fledge youngsters.

We were pleased to record several of our target breeding birds in healthy numbers. Two Bitterns were booming from the reedbeds this year and at least three Turtle Doves purred from treetops. Two of the Turtle Dove males are thought to have found females and raised young. The latter species is declining in the whole of the UK with just 2000 pairs left.

Over the summer we were delighted to find for the first time a nest of Hobby Falcons, an uncommon bird of prey that feeds exclusively on dragonflies and small birds. The adults went on to fledge three youngsters. Although we hear adult Cuckoos throughout the

summer, we rarely observe young Cuckoos, but one near the main car park delighted several visitors.

Autumn was spent improving the path on the new family trail, which will be opening soon. It will run from the main car park and go around an area of woodland that few have previously been able to explore.

Late in the year our work focussed on keeping the habitats in good condition for our rare breeding birds. This involved removing willow saplings and coppicing some areas of hawthorn to encourage Nightingale back to breed one day.



Throughout the rest of the winter, we will continue to maintain and improve habitats around the reserve. We look forward to seeing what wildlife the winter will bring, as well as the arrival of breeding migrant birds in the spring.

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
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
