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Winter Fuel Payments - don't miss out!

Under new changes outlined recently by the Government, access to the Winter Fuel Payment will be restricted, with only pensioners receiving a means tested benefit able to access the payment.

With these changes coming into effect, South Cambridgeshire District Council is asking all pensioners in the district to complete a short Pension Credit calculation online at https:// www.gov.uk/pension-credit-calculator.

Pensioners in the Huntingdonshire District Council area are asked to refer to https:// www.huntingdonshire.gov.uk/news/ residents-of-pensionable-age-are-urgedto-check-if-they-are-eligible-for-pensioncredit-to-access-the-winter-fuel-payment/

Pension Credit is one of the most under claimed benefits in the UK, with around 40% of eligible residents not claiming it. This winter, the Pension Credit will be the only


Hilton Carol Singing - Tuesday, 10 December



NHS Stay healthy this winter

NHS Cambridgeshire & Peterborough is urging anyone eligible for their COVID-19, flu, RSV or pneumococcal vaccines to make sure they've had them this winter. Please check if you, or someone you care for, is eligible

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough

Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Integrated Care System

Each vaccine has a slightly different eligibility criteria as follows:

- Flu vaccine for anyone aged 65 or over (including those who will be 65 by 31 March 2025); have certain long-term health conditions; are pregnant; live in a care home; are the main carer for an older or disabled person, or receive a carer's allowance; or live with someone who has a weakened immune system.
- COVID-19 vaccine for anyone aged 65+; those aged between six months and 64 years who are at increased risk of getting seriously ill due to a health condition or treatment; people who live in a care home for older adults, and those who are pregnant; and frontline health and care workers.
- RSV vaccine for anyone who is pregnant, or aged 75-79. •
- Pneumococcal vaccine for anyone 65 or over (only one dose is needed).

Preventative support in **Fenstanton and Fen Drayton**

Please do read this if you are looking out for an elderly person in either Fenstanton or Fen Drayton and particularly please read this if you yourself are over 60.

I am in my seventies. I am lucky enough to be still fully physically active and mentally capable of doing anything I want to do. I live with my equally active husband and we can look out for each other and solve problems together. But what if this wasn't the case?

For the last two years I have been on the link committee of the Cambs North West Villages Age UK Community Warden scheme. I have learnt about what a Community Warden does and it has opened my eyes to the potential benefits for over 60s who could do with some help. Not to mention peace of mind for their caring relatives and friends.

It's a unique scheme. Some of you may already know our Warden, Rachael Mortimer. Rachael really does care about the people she looks after and often goes above and beyond to provide the most consistent and flexible service possible to promote both physical and mental well-being. She helps build confidence and independence. She maintains confidentiality at all times. Working with families where appropriate to ensure best support, what she does is centred to each individual's needs. It is important that it's the same person who turns up or phones, not somebody different every day, as is often the case with home carers - a regular visitor is soon aware if something is not right. The whole purpose of a Community Warden is to keep an individual independent in their own home for as long as possible. Nobody wants to go into hospital or have carers come in if they don't have to.

So, what does Rachael do? Essentially, she contacts clients daily Monday to Friday to make sure they are ok. Yes, she can collect prescriptions and do a bit of shopping, but the following are just a few of the many other things she can do. And if Rachael can't



 Often recognised that something is wrong and taken appropriate action

who can"! She has:

- Taken individuals with an urgent need to the optician, the doctor, the dentist and even the vet!!
- Applied for benefits and blue badges
- Waited in long queues on behalf of clients on the phone and at the bank
- Sorted out problems with prescriptions, hospital transport and appointments
- Found out where to have broken-down household items repaired
- Taken individuals to clubs etc to promote independence outside the home
- Oh, and I understand Rachael plays a mean game of dominoes!

Residents of Fenstanton and Fen Drayton can try out the Community Warden service for free for the first three months. The Parish Councils in both villages really believe that the service is worth promoting and have agreed to cover the cost of a threemonth trial. After three months there is no obligation to continue using the service.

After that, the current charge is £10 per week for a single user, £12 for a couple. At this point I expect some readers are thinking. "my son/daughter/friend will do that for nothing, it's not worth paying". But when you think about private care costing on average £25 an hour, I think it's a bargain.

Especially if support now from the Community Warden could prevent the need for paid care in the future by spotting a problem early. Rachael can never replace family, but although they are willing, do busy family members really have the time to be running around after you?

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

Updates from Clare Tevlin, your District Councillor



Pension credit

Residents of pensionable age are urged to check if they are eligible for Pension Credit to access the Winter Fuel Payment, which is worth up to £300 per household.

Pension Credit could be worth on average £3.900 per year for those who are over the state pension age (66+ years), on a low income.

Claims can be backdated by up to 3 months, but claims will need to be made by 21 December 2024 in order to receive a backdated Winter Fuel Payment.

Please visit www.gov.uk/pension-credit or call 0800 99 1234 to find out more and apply by 21 December 2024 to be eligible for a backdated Winter Fuel Payment.

Climate and Environment

Huntingdonshire District Council's successful 2024 Climate Conference took place in November - bringing communities from across Huntingdonshire together to problem solve and inspire.

Following partnership working, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) have launched a new Climate Opportunity Fund

- Funding up to £1M total capital projects
- Bids of £50K to £150K are welcome from not-for-profit organisations 10% match funding reauired
- Eligible bidders are not for profit organisations (including parish councils, social enterprises and voluntary organisations). Application window: 25th November 2024 to January 17th 2025.

Reeve's Ditch, Hilton By Gillian Sheail

Reeve's Ditch is the stretch of water beside the High Street in Hilton. It is fenced off from the road, shaded by trees and home to an assortment of ducks. What is known of its origin and former use? Historically a Reeve was the manager of a manor and overseer of the peasants, which suggests that the use and maintenance of this body of water was his responsibility. Its origin is obscure but it appears as a broad stretch of water on the oldest village maps. It is very shallow, and during the drought of summer 2022 it dried up completely. Old photographs and accounts of the feature provide a little more information.

A reliable water supply is essential for both humans and animals, especially in the agricultural parts of East Anglia where annual rainfall is low. Settlements usually developed around a good source of water, and in Hilton this was probably at the head of Reeve's Ditch. A spring or seepage of water at this point was of vital importance to the village. In time, wells or boreholes were dug here, and later pumps were erected at the site. Water trickled down across The Green to join the larger stream running through the village. Over time the Ditch was enlarged to form a shallow, but broader feature which provided water for village animals and those being driven through the village on the way to market at St Ives. The water was also available in case of fire. The Reeve would have oversight of the Ditch, allocating the use of the water and ensuring good maintenance of the water body. Today Reeve's Ditch is part of The Green, with a waste water pumping station where the old pumps were located.

A photograph taken in 1906 shows animals roaming the High Street close to the Ditch, while children are gathered round the pump, an obvious meeting point for villagers. Nine years later in 1925 another photograph shows the full length of the Ditch in front of The Old Post Office and Hilton Hall.

Louis King describes the location in his account 'A walk through Hilton in the 1930s'* There were no houses in the field facing Reeve's Ditch. It was a long meadow





used for grazing. The small cottage at the end at the end of Reeve's Ditch was once the village Post Office. Between this cottage and Reeve's Ditch was a hand pump mounted on a platform; it was erected this way so that the water carts could be filled directly from it. Winters in the thirties were much colder than now and most years there would be skating on Reeves Ditch. There was no mains water in the village at this time, so this large volume of water was most useful in case of fire and in summer the metal wheel rims of harvest carts would become loose, so the carts would be taken through the pond. The wooden wheels would expand, thus tightening the rims.

A little later in the early 1940s Tony Yates, a schoolboy evacuee from London who was living with his grandmother in the Old Post Office writes in 'My Life in Hilton during World War 2'*

Drinking water was kept in an enamelled pail of which there were several. It became my duty to replenish the water every morning from the pump at the end of Reeve's Ditch. In the early days I had to make several trips but as I grew older and stronger the trips became fewer and fewer.

At that time the road running alongside Reeves Ditch had no embankment. The ditch was framed by blackberry bushes growing alongside the road. In late summer when the water was low, one could walk along the shoreline and pick blackberries. In winter the ditch would fill and there was a danger that the water would undercut the road. One day several army trucks filled with soldiers and equipment arrived. They quickly removed the blackberry bushes and built an embankment using sandbags filled with concrete.

Reeve's Ditch had its place in village life. While in summer the children could paddle and play in the water, in cold winters freezing conditions heralded the arrival of the skating season. The Ditch was shallow and obviously deemed safe. Clearly 'Health and Safety' did not present any problems when children from the village school were photographed standing on the ice in 1928. Today cars speed along High Street almost unaware of the feature that once was of great use and pleasure.

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Trains, Boats and Planes

Bewitching Barmouth beckons

Barmouth, or Abermaw in Welsh, (meaning mouth of the Afon Mawddach river) is one of our most favourite holiday destinations. We have travelled all over Europe, even once towed a caravan over the Alps all the way to Rome, but every now and again we just have to go back to Barmouth.

Barmouth is a small, charmingly oldfashioned seaside resort in Northwest Wales, just outside the Snowdonia National Park, on Cardigan Bay on the north side of the Mawddach estuary. The town itself has a range of small shops, a reasonable Co-op supermarket, a market on Thursdays, a small theatre and a fair number of coffee shops and cafes. It has a small fair and amusement arcade near the beach, which is sandy, and you can buy the fish and chips and candy floss typical of a seaside resort. Once a fishing port, Barmouth has a small harbour, plus a long prom about a mile long, with lots of reasonable parking. You can hop on a train at the station in the centre of Barmouth to go north or south along the coast to take in the sea views.

We are not the first people to love Barmouth. Charles Darwin spent two whole summers here in the 1820s, collecting samples for his studies. Other famous holidaymakers include Shelley, Wordsworth, William Wilberforce and General Booth. Wordsworth described it so, "With a fine sea view in front, the mountains behind, the glorious estuary running eight miles inland, and Cadair Idris within compass of a day's walk, Barmouth can always hold its own against any rival."

We first fell in love with Barmouth when our children were little and we were looking for a beach holiday with the added bonus of mountains nearby for fell walking. We rented a flat with windows overlooking the end of the prom and we were hooked. That's

despite our daughter being frightened of a doorstop in the shape of a Welsh dragon! We often saw "porpoises" swimming across the bay (we found out recently they are probably dolphins) and in bad weather we watched waves crashing over the sea wall at the end of the prom. And the sunsets were, and still are, to die for.

The Mawddach estuary is stunning all the way from Barmouth inland as far as the quaint town of Dollgellau, about 8 miles away. (Our German friends renamed it Doodle-doo!)

Motor round the estuary, or walk from Barmouth across the railway viaduct known as Barmouth Bridge to try the Mawddach Trail on the other side. This is an 8 mile long cycleway and footpath on the bed of a disused railway and was the subject of one of Julia Bradbury's original Railway Walks. Or you can walk one way and catch a bus back! Crossing the bridge is a real experience in itself, as Barmouth Bridge, built in 1867, is a Grade II listed single-track wooden railway viaduct 820 metres long. Not only can you enjoy the fantastic views, but

two-carriage trains travelling along the coast rumble across the bridge right beside you as you walk. One of our favourite eating places is part-way along the Mawddach Trail at Penmaenpool. The George III inn was once a station on the disused railway to Ruabon and it retains its station character, complete with signal. It serves up good food with views of the Mawddach estuary, which is wide at this point. A rackety vehicular toll bridge crosses the estuary here, a £1 toll saves a good few miles if you

don't want to go as far as Dollgellau. When our children were small this was renamed the Troll Bridge and we had to look out for trolls as we crossed over! Every September the annual Barmouth Hurly-Burly event is held: swimmers use the incoming tide to race from Barmouth to Penmaenpool.

At the mouth of the estuary the little Barmouth ferry, once used by Royal Mail, still carries people across to Penrhyn Point opposite, where there's a narrow-gauge railway to the village of Fairbourne. And



if little trains are your passion, 11 miles south down the coast from Fairbourne is Tywyn, the seaside terminus of the Tallylyn Railway, which travels inland into southern Snowdonia.

Now the mountains. For peak baggers, Mount Snowdon is about an hour away by car. The downside these days however is that Snowdon has huge numbers of tourists, enough to put us off. The ridge walk behind Barmouth is much quieter and takes you first to Diffwys (750m) and eventually to the Rhinogs. And Cader (or Cadair) Idris is virtually on your doorstep, just south of Dollgellau. At 893 metres, this peak is one of the most popular in Wales for walkers, but thankfully doesn't have as many visitors as Snowdon. Cadair Idris means "Idris' Chair". Idris is usually taken to be the name of a giant. Legend says that anyone who sleeps on the side of this mountain will awaken either a madman or a poet. The natural depression which is the chair was formed by a circue glacier during multiple ice ages. There are three main paths to the top: The Pony Path begins either at Dolgellau or at the Mawddach estuary and is the easiest but longest of these. From the top there are fantastic views of the Mawddach estuary, Barmouth Bridge and Cardigan Bay.

Then for those who love history, there are




the castles. Harlech Castle, just north of Barmouth, stands atop the small town of the same name and is well worth a visit. Castel y Bere is not far away too. And north of Harlech is the Italianate village Portmerion, used as a backdrop for a number of films and TV shows, most famously the 1960s show "The Prisoner".

And I still haven't mentioned visiting the Llanfair slate caverns along the coast. Nor the fact that there used to be a gold mine along the north side of the estuary which in 1899 produced £60,000 worth of gold.


For those seeking the bright lights of a big resort, Barmouth is not the answer. But for a more active holiday, with both history and fantastic views of the mountains and the sea, Barmouth fits the bill. We will definitely be back!



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News from the Pews

Hilton Parish Church



Dear Friends,

Candles. Prayers. Emotive singing. Large gatherings. Stirring addresses. Public illuminations. Acts of kindness and generosity.

Special messages and greetings. I could be describing some of the trappings of Christmas. But this could also be a description of some of the responses to contemporary outrages and calamities.

Similar activities commemorate both an event long ago with many historical uncertainties – the first Christmas - and events in our time that are unavoidably real. One is a story of hope and one of horror, but the hope comes in a setting of fear, vulnerability, and surrounding darkness. The horror brings with it renewed commitment by some to finding our shared humanity, and even expressions of hope from some of the bereaved.

One phrase keeps coming back to me: 'Fear not.' It appears like a refrain throughout the Bible, and in the Christmas story itself. Mary when she learns she is to bear Jesus, Joseph when he learns Mary is pregnant, the shepherds when the angels approach, all are told not to be afraid. The supreme good news comes in disguise, as something that looks frightening at first. But being told not to be afraid doesn't sound like a solution.

'Fine,' one might reply, 'but how exactly am I to lose my fear?' The words themselves do go some way to calming us. They are what we say to frightened children. But there are also actions we can carry out that in themselves dispel fear, both in those who do them and those who receive them. 'Perfect love drives out fear.' (John 4:18) The secret then is to act in love. That is why the Christmas angels say, 'Fear not.'

Perfect love is coming in to the world. May we act always in His name, and proclaim His peace. Fear not. Love extravagantly. Live generously. Happy Christmas!



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Afoot in the Garden

A burnt sprig of holly

Always the showman I remember dad always managed to prick and burn his fingers when he removed the smoking holly sprig from the Christmas pudding. His wounds were soon healed by a glass of brandy. Naturally he would only use a sprig with berries and not all holly trees bear fruit. Hollies varieties come with male flowers, female flowers or both on the same tree. The best variety for your Christmas pud is probably 'J C. Van Tol' which is self-fertile, having both male and female flowers, and has the added benefit of being almost spineless. We grew 28 varieties in college and I remember 'Ferox' also known as the hedgehog holly and two varieties for the panto season.' Golden King' which has berries and is actually a female and 'Silver Oueen' which is a male variety. Other varieties I particularly remember are 'Handsworth New Silver' with attractive purple stems named after a park in Sheffield and 'Belgica Aureomarginata' which produces berries and has subtler colouring than 'Golden King.'

Winter colour

The low winter sun, when it does shine, lights up the garden and coloured barks and evergreens come into their own. Winter flowering shrubs like camelia, jasmine, mahonia, skimmia and viburnum are a welcome joy, while pansies, violas, bellis and snowdrops and sometimes crocus flower at ground level or in our pots and tubs.

December/January **Top Tips**

- Enjoy colours of winter
- Turn off outside taps
- Plant trees and shrubs
- Weed, mulch and tidy
- Plan for next year



Cultural tasks

Continue to gather up fallen leaves for the compost heap. On frost free days garden trees and shrubs can be pruned and perennials tidied. Avoid walking on the lawn in frost conditions or exceptionally wet weather. You can still plant trees shrubs, perennials during mild spells. You can also plant out bulbs that have finished blooming indoors like narcissus and hyacinth. Do not be afraid to mow lawns in mild weather. In severe weather protect pots and tubs, wrap them to a wall if you can, and don't forget to drain out hose pipes, fittings and turn off and wrap outside taps.

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Budget and Precept

Hilton Parish Council has agreed their draft budget which is shown below. This does include the increase to NI announced in the recent budget.

This budget will result in a precept of £39,826, compared with the current precept of £36,980. This is an increase of £2,846, or 7.7%. At the current tax base, this equates to an increase of £6.26 for a band D property, or 52p per month. The Council will be ratifying this budget and precept at their December meeting, to enable parishioners to comment if desired.

Tree Work

The volunteer group has completed several pieces of tree work and relocated all of the resulting material to the bonfire site. The Council has authorised the annual tree work at a cost of £2,030, which is within budget.

20mph Application

The Council has reluctantly agreed to proceed with the plans drawn up by CCC for the 20mph limit in the village. As you can see from the drawing below, the 20mph areas (blue) will cover most of the village. Hilton Road across the Green will remain 30mph (grey) as will the section of Potton Road from the junction with Church End to the shop. There will be 40mph buffer zones (orange) on Graveley Way, St Ives Road and Potton Road. The Council has been corresponding with CCC to get the Green and Potton Road included in the 20mph scheme, however following their executive review they state that keeping the 30mph limits in these areas is in keeping with the guidelines and that this could be reconsidered in the future if additional traffic calming features or residential development was installed. The next stage in this project is the Traffic Regulation Order application, which will include formal consultation, so residents will be able to contribute to this project. The Council will advertise the consultation once there is more information.

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Financial help for unmarried parents. Schedule 1 of the Children Act 1989 – What is it?

Schedule 1 of The Children Act 1989 enables the family Court to make financial provision for the benefit of children. Potential applicants include a parent of a child, a guardian or special guardian of the child, a person named in a child arrangements order as a person with whom the child is to live or the child themselves.

In practice the main classes of Applicant are unmarried parents who have no rights to financial support for themselves in the same way as married parents who can apply in their own right under The Matrimonial Causes Act 1973 for financial provision.

The number of children born to unmarried parents is rising, some 51.4% were born to unmarried parents in 2022 (ONS data) and so it is surprising that this Act is not more widely used.

What orders can the Court make?

Lump-sum

A Lump sum order can be made for the benefit of a child. This differs from a lump sum under the Matrimonial Causes Act 1973 as under schedule 1 the Courts can make many lump sum orders and it is not restricted to just one. Claims can include for a vehicle needed for the child, furnishing a home or even medical and dental fees. One notable feature of Schedule 1 is its flexibility. The Court has the discretion to tailor orders based on the unique circumstances in each case. This adaptability ensures that the financial provisions align with the specific needs of the child and the financial capabilities of the parents.

Transfer of property

The transfer of property can be ordered to meet the housing needs of the children. With this order the property which is transferred will usually be returned to the owner when the children reach a certain age typically at the age

of 18 or when they complete tertiary education. In some limited cases the Court may order that a property transferred out right to the child and held in trust for them during the minority with the difference being that it would not then revert to the transferring parent when the child attains the age of 18.

Periodical payments

In the majority of cases child maintenance is assessed by the Child Maintenance Service, save, where the non-resident parent's income exceeds the maximum level then the Schedule 1 allows the Court to order one parent to make regular 'top-up' maintenance payments to the other parent for the benefit of the child. This ensures a consistent and reliable source of financial support to cover the child's day-to-day expenses. This can include an order that the non-resident parent pays a child's school fees and other appropriate educational expenses.

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Life on a Plate

Seasonal Yorkshire Wine Cake

This method of preparing a fruit cake was given to me years ago by two Yorkshire sisters. It makes a lovely Christmas cake.

Ingredients:

12oz. / 350g Currants 6oz. / 175g. Sultanas 6oz. / 175g. Raisins 4oz. / 100g. Glace Cherries (cut into pieces) 2oz. / 50g. Finely cut mixed peel 4oz. / 100g. Plain flour 4oz. / 100g. S.R. Flour Half teaspoon Cinnamon Half teaspoon Mixed spice 6oz. / 175g. Butter 6oz. / 175g. Butter 6oz. / 175g. Dark brown or muscovado sugar 3 Eggs Half cup Sherry (the cheapest is fine)

decoration

The week before you intend to cook the cake weigh out all the fruit. Pour on the sherry. Stir each day for five days. Keep in a cool place during this process.

Double line a 7" deep cake tin.

Mix the cake mixture in the usual way - creaming the butter and sugar, then adding the eggs and flour.

Transfer to the cake tin, smoothing the top carefully. Decorate the top of the cake with split almonds and cherries. Place in a cool place overnight. This prevents the fruit from sinking when it cooks. If you want to decorate your cake with marzipan and icing leave out this step.

Cook for one hour at 130 degrees, then two hours at 120 degrees. Check after two hours and if a cake tester comes out of the cake clean it is done or extend the cooking time as necessary.

This is a lovely moist cake. There is no need to dose the cake with brandy. Indeed if you do the cake crumbles.



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Business Spotlight

Passion personified

If you are looking for a passionate and enthusiastic vet, then look no further. Hayley Baker who owns Vet for Pets in Bar Hill absolutely fits the bill. Her practice is situated above Pets at Home next door to Tesco.

Hayley, who originates from Guildford, has always wanted to be a vet since she was five after spending time in consulting rooms with her aunt who was a veterinary nurse. She studied at Trinity Hall, Cambridge for three years and then undertook a further three years of study at the University's Veterinary College on Madingley Road before qualifying in 2008. Whilst at Trinity Hall she openly admits that she maybe spent too much time rowing rather than studying. However, it all paid off as in 2006 her crew won the ladies' Boat Race setting an all time course record for which she was awarded a Cambridge Blue. She met her husband through rowing and



to this day he still coaches the University's mens' Boat Race crew at their facilities based in Ely. Hayley has a long rowing history in her family and she is actively trying to discourage her daughter to follow in her footsteps.

On completing her training she tried a spell at equine veterinary work but quickly realised



her passion

for four years

before returning to Cambridge to set up her own business. Her practice in Bar Hill is state of the art and houses operating equipment that is only found at the Royal Veterinary College in London. She specialises in key hole surgery as this is less invasive than the normal surgery used on pets. Hayley explains, "Key hole surgery is taken for granted in humans so why should we not use it on our pets. The animals recover much more quickly and the whole process is less uncomfortable for your pet. Dogs walk out after surgery the same way they walked in. We are one of only a handful of vets in the UK offering this facility and I spend a lot of my time training other vets in the technique using our dedicated training facility here on site."

Her practice has a number for operating theatres including one exclusively for dental work which has a dedicated air extraction system to prevent the spread of bacteria dislodged in teeth cleaning.

"With our specialist equipment, including the use of AI to speed up biopsy analysis, we are bridging the gap between first opinion vets and referral vets. We are able to do a lot of simple referral procedures here that a normal vet would have to refer on to a specialist, thus saving money for our pet owners".

Hayley has seen a number of interesting cases whilst being a vet including a dog with a very odd shape lump in its stomach that turned out on examination to be toy duck! "Why and how this dog managed to swallow it whole is a mystery. It was successfully removed and no harm was done to either the dog or the duck which was returned to the children's bath undamaged."

Fen Drayton floods

Last September Fen Drayton village experienced heavy rainfall that caused water levels in the River Great Ouse to rise dramatically, resulting in floods. It was the earliest time in the autumn that anyone could remember this happening.

Water levels in Oxholme Drain, that runs alongside Fen Drayton's High Street, rose rapidly and within two days the High Street and Daintrees Road were impassable for cars. Highways closed the road to prevent vehicles driving too fast through the water and flooding properties with their bow waves.

The Fen Drayton flood group and village residents also worked to minimise the chance of any houses being flooded. The major problem was the lack of access for emergency vehicles: ambulances to take two people to hospital; and a fire engine to deal with a car stuck in the flood.

Cambridgeshire County Council has now fited one-way valves on the road drains at the south end of the High Street, as requested by the parish council. They will delay flooding of the road, not prevent it.



To seek a long-term solution, the parish council met with CCC, its consultants, Atkins, and SCDC on 1 October. At that time the priority was to deal with the flood. Fortunately, it receded within a few days as the river levels dropped quickly.

The parish council has set up a further meeting with CCC and SCDC, on 26 November, to see if a short-term solution is possible to moderate the impact of future floods. We will update you in 2025.

Pump track

Thank you to everyone who responded to the village survey relating to the proposed pump track on the village hall recreation ground. Over 140 households responded, with 65% indicating that they were in favour. A breakdown of the results is on the parish council website: www.fendrayton.org.

We have subsequently had a site meeting with the proposed contractor and envisage that the track will run from the tennis courts towards the northern boundary of the recreation ground. Its position will, amongst other things, enable us to keep the current football/basketball triangle in its current site. Screening will be put in place at both ends of the track.

The track should be completed later this year. We anticipate that it will provide a popular new amenity for young children, alongside the tennis courts, zip wire, bowls green and playground.


Panathlon Games





As I finish this article on Remembrance Sunday, having just experienced 12 days of "anticyclonic sunless gloom", summer is but a distant memory and yet my last weather review was written at the end of July. Then, despite having had a warm and dry second half of July some were still asking "where has summer gone?"

August, the principal holiday month, continued the warm, dry spell for the first three weeks, with the heat peaking on the 12th, when Cambridge recorded the hottest day of the year in the UK at 34.8C (94F). The remnants of Storm Lilian provided most of the rain which fell in August on the 24th (or 0.60" out of the months total of 0.71"). In many ways summer 2024 was typical of what used to be a "normal" British summer.

I moved with my family from Hilton to Hartford, close to the River Great Ouse on 12 September and was greeted with a thunderstorm in the evening, a rarity this year with none recorded during the three summer months. The second half of September and first part of October brought one of the wettest spells ever recorded in our part of East Anglia, illustrating what a difference a day or two can make when looking at monthly records.

Gillian Sheail recorded a total of 106.4mm in September which fell short of her highest total of 124.4mm (4.85") which she recorded in 1995. The rain which she recorded on the 1st and 2nd of October totalled 18.2mm which if it had been 2 days earlier and added to this year's September figure would have just topped the previous record. This is, however, well short of the amount of rain which fell in nearby Bedfordshire, where in some places a new monthly record of180mm (nearly 7.5") was established.

Rather unusually for our part of the UK, there have been a number of opportunities to

view the Aurora Borealis (Northern Lights). A particularly good display occurred on 10th and 11th of October.

The weather during the last part of October and the first 10 days of November were dominated by a large area of high pressure over central Europe, hence the quiet, cloudy conditions. Countries to the south of the high pressure, particularly Spain, have been affected by slow moving intense areas of low pressure with extreme rainfall and flooding events, notably in the Valencia and Barcelona regions where a year's worth of rain fell in a day, particularly in Valencia where more than 200 people were reported to have lost their lives as well as many homes and properties destroyed.

Given that Christmas is approaching, I am finishing on a lighter note with a few facts about the fascinating history of snowmen. The snowman has long been a symbol of winter joy captivating imaginations through the ages. It was a snowman that appeared on some of the first postcards, starred in some early silent movies and on a couple of the earliest photos, dating back to the 1800s. The tradition of building snowmen dates back to medieval times, since snow was free and in abundance. One story involves the Italian artist Michelangelo who, in 1494, was commissioned by the ruler of Florence to sculpt a snowman in the courtyard of his mansion. Fast forward to the 21st century and the snowman has become a cultural festive icon, inspiring songs, movies and literature. From the Christmas tune Frosty the Snowman to the character Olaf in Disney's "Frozen", snowmen have withstood the test of time, they carry with them a piece of history with perhaps a touch of magic too. All that is needed now is some snow this coming winter!
