Saving Ratty: Should water vole conservation involve more than just mink control

The Huntingdonshire Local Group of the Wildlife Trust is pleased to welcome back Alistair Grant on Wednesday 11th February 2026.

Once a familiar sight along Britain's watercourses, the water vole is now listed as endangered after one of the steepest declines of any mammal since 1990. In some areas the population fell 90% between 1989 and 1998 alone! Although eradicating the non-native American mink has been vital, recent data shows that water voles do not always recover following this.

Drawing on extensive practical experience as a specialist riparian ecologist working

closely with water voles, Alistair will explore the ecological challenges and conservation strategies needed to secure a future for this much loved species.

Some places of interest - Part 4

This month we are heading north again, to places in the northern part of Huntingdonshire and around Peterborough. Although we are not normally going to include anything on villages or parish churches in this series, Little Gidding has two unique claims which justify it being an exception to our rule. (See below). And Holme Fen is included, even though we don't normally include nature reserves, because it also has a unique claim to fame.

Norman Cross PE7 3SP

A scheduled monument, this is the site of the UK's first purpose-built Prisoner of War Camp. The site was recently acquired by the Nene Park Trust. Although there is little to see on the ground, the Trust has produced a seven-minute explanatory video and it is planning to hold regular guided walks of the site. The video and more details are available on the Nene Park Trust's website.



Little Gidding PE28 5RJ

Little Gidding (population about 20) is the only village we know of which has a poem dedicated to it by a Nobel Laureate (T.S. Eliot). It is also the only place of pilgrimage in our area as far as we know. Details of events and the pilgrimage are on the Friends of Little Gidding website.



Holme Fen PE7 3PT

Site of Special Scientific Interest. The lowest point on land in the UK, it is 2.75 metres below sea level. The fen posts were erected in 1848 and driven down to the underlying clay, in order to record the peat shrinkage due to drainage of the fens. The posts now stand around 4m above ground level. More details are on the great fen website.



Peterborough Cathedral PE1 1XS

One of the finest Norman cathedrals in Europe, renowned for its magnificent architecture and rich history, which dates back to a monastery founded in 654. It is the final resting place of Katharine of Aragon.



Flag Fen Archaeology Park PE6 7QJ

The park sits in a unique Bronze Age landscape with a mysterious timber causeway and platform made 3,500 years ago. Exhibits include some bronze age boats that were discovered nearby. The photo shows one of the reconstructed prehistoric roundhouses. See the Flag Fen Archaeology Park website for more information.

Wansford - Nene Valley Railway PE8 6LR

Headquarters of the Nene Valley Railway, a heritage railway which runs between Wansford and Peterborough. The railway has been awarded the Tripadvisor Travellers Choice Award, putting it in the top 10% of recommended places to visit worldwide. Elton Hall and Gardens PE8 6SH

An extraordinary, romantic, part-Gothic historic house near Peterborough, nestled in the beautiful countryside. It stands proud in unspoilt landscaped parkland where a house has stood since the 12th century. Opening for the 2026 season on May 24th. See Elton Hall website for more details.



Longthorpe Tower PE3 6LU

Longthorpe Tower displays one of the most complete and important sets of 14th-century domestic wall paintings in northern Europe. The tower is managed by Nene Park Trust. Please visit their website for more information, including to book tickets for your visit. Booking is essential.



Helpston - John Clare's Cottage PE6 7ED

Historic home of Cambridgeshire's poet and environmentalist, John Clare. Open Wednesday – Saturday 10:30 -2:30. A glimpse into rural life 200 years ago. Café and garden. Small car park. More details on the clarecottage.org website.



Burghley House PE9 3JU

One of the grandest 16th century houses in the country with spectacular gardens. Privately owned. Gardens re-open to the public on February 14th. House re-opens on March 14th. See Burghley House website for ticket prices and more details.



Apethorpe Palace PE8 5DJ

One of England's greatest stately homes. A favourite residence of King James I and King Charles I. Previously owned by Queen Elizabeth I. Now a private residence open to the public for pre-booked tours in July and August. See English Heritage website for more details.







Fen Drayton Housing Needs Survey - Have Your Say



Cambridgeshire ACRE, an independent charity, is working with Fen Drayton Parish Council to carry out a Housing Needs Survey for the village. The survey will assess the need for affordable housing for local people. The Parish Council is supporting the survey so that any future decisions affecting Fen Drayton are informed by clear, local evidence rather than assumptions.

This survey is your chance to make sure Fen Drayton's voice is heard. It is independent and does not assume that any new housing will be built. Instead, it gathers vital information about whether people with a local connection to the village are finding it hard to access suitable housing now or in the future.

We encourage all households living in the village, and those with a strong local connection who wish to return, to take part. Even if you do not have a housing need yourself, your response helps build an accurate picture of the village as a whole.

The survey is confidential and takes only a few minutes. All Fen Drayton residents should receive the survey in the post though can also take part now at www.smartsurvey.co.uk/s/FenDrayton/ or by scanning the QR code. The survey closes on 27 February 2026.

An Answer Wanted:

"Almost every week a case of drunkenness, riotous conduct or similar offence is brought before the St Ives bench from this place. There must be a reason for this ignoble pre-eminence and it is desirable that we should not only ascertain the cause but also to endeavour to provide a remedy. We believe it is the frequent remark that Fenstanton causes the magistrates of the division more work than any other place".

Looking Ahead in 2026

Looking to the coming year, there is much to plan for – both across St Neots and Mid Cambridgeshire and in Parliament. Progress on legislation introduced last year continues, and we are expecting a range of new bills to be introduced soon, which, as always, my Liberal Democrat colleagues and I will be working hard to scrutinise.

Speaking to residents on their doorsteps during the Christmas period, as is so often the case, healthcare was one of the topics most frequently raised with me. The Government's 10 Year Health Plan was a step in the right direction to fix our NHS – but these plans must translate into real change for people in 2026. This year, I will be continuing to push for our local GPs, hospitals, pharmacies and dentists to receive the support they need to improve services in our community and put healthcare back into the hands of local people.

Following on from my campaign to protect palliative care beds at Arthur Rank Hospice last year, I will be continuing to put pressure on the Government to take real action on this. We heard in January that £25m in capital funding would be given to hospices across the country, but given that Arthur Rank is facing a deficit of almost £1m -- and these are running costs, not capital costs -- this new funding will be nowhere near enough to guarantee the sustainability of such services for years to come.

We are also expecting the Government to announce reforms to special education needs and disability (SEND) provision, news of which I know has been a significant concern for many local parents. The current system is not working, but any reform must be rooted in children's and parents' needs, not in cost-cutting. The drip-feeding of information that we have seen over the past year is unacceptable, and the Government must come forward urgently to clarify their plans so that SEND families have the clarity they deserve.



Much the same can be said for the changes to Personal Independence Payments (PIP) that the Government proposed last year. I am working to press the Department for Work and Pensions to work closely alongside those with real lived experience of disability before making any changes that might cause them harm.

Across the constituency, I am looking forward to continuing to hold my weekly surgeries, where I meet with residents to hear about the issues important to them and see where I might be able to support them with personal issues. I am pleased that I was able to help so many constituents last year, from smaller wins like getting incorrect parking fines refunded through to life-changing actions like securing new housing for someone who has been living for years in mould and disrepair. Of course there is much more work to be done, and I will continue to listen to, and stand up for, my constituents throughout 2026.

South African Safari

In September 2025 I was lucky to be going on a trip to three different game reserves in the north west of South Africa. The trip had been planned by my niece, my sister's younger daughter Sophie, since 2024 and I was invited to join my sister, her husband, Sophie and her husband and my sister's other daughter, Tracey, who I would be sharing accommodation with. My sister and husband had been to Africa on safari five times in three different countries and Sophie had been twice to South Africa. She did all the flights, transport between airports and lodges and booking the lodges so we had no travel agency involved.

We flew from Heathrow on a 10 hour night flight and arrived in Johannesburg at 10am. There is only one hour time difference between the UK and Johannesburg. The airport was very modern and immigration did not take very long. Our minibus with friendly driver was waiting outside for us, a modern vehicle with air conditioning and wifi so I was able to let Richard know I had arrived safely. We were going to travel NW of Johannesburg. Once outside the city the roads were very quiet. They were very wide, straight roads with a few holdups on the way for quite long sections of roadworks. It was a 3.5 hour journey to our first game reserve. Along the way we could see many small villages built at the side of the road. Some of the housing looked very poor, small huts made of corrugated iron, but alongside some fairly large bungalows and houses. The driver explained that often the parents choose to live in shacks and use their money to educate their children. When their children hopefully get good jobs they will build their parents a lovely home for later life. The road

passed through several towns and most of them had a modern shopping mall where we had a comfort stop, with the usual fast food outlets such as KFC and Burger restaurants. Gun shops, hunting and fishing shops were evident, even taxidermists!

First stop Mabula

Our first stop was Mabula Game Reserve and we were staying in Kwafubesi lodge. This lodge had accommodation for 10 people in five tented structures. The rooms were built on a wooden platform with steps up at the front and a veranda. There was a permanent, structured canvas bedroom and bathroom on top of the platform. It was very comfortable, nicely furnished and with tea making facilities etc. The shower was outside at the back with a screen fence around. The room had netting to keep insects out. There was a central building for all our meals which was wooden with a thatch roof, African style. There were armchairs and a small library. There was even a small swimming pool.



As soon as we arrived there was no time to unpack as our first game drive was at 4pm just after a delicious afternoon tea. Our guide was called MJ, an Afrikaans young man. Even before we set off we could see rhinos in the distance from main building. The vehicles

used are Toyota Land Cruisers which seat 10 people plus the driver. They are quite high up so you need to be agile to climb up into them. The dirt roads are very rocky and so it's a bouncy ride and difficult to take photos.



We saw many rhinos, different antelopes, zebras, hippos and different birds. The guides communicate with one another by radio in Afrikaans to tell each other where the different animals are to be found. Every evening game drive stops at a suitable place to watch the sunset and have a sundowner drink. The guide unpacks a large cool box with beers, wine, many different gins as well as soft drinks and snacks such as crisps, biltong and nuts. We got back to the lodge at 7pm and our pre-ordered four course dinner with wine was waiting. The meals were fantastic and worthy of Masterchef. I was not going to be hungry!

The next morning we were asked to get up in time for a 6am game drive. Every morning we had to get up about 5.15, sometimes even earlier at 4.30am! Coffee and a biscuit were available to keep us going, as breakfast was taken on arriving back at 9am. MJ had heard that a pride of lions was on the move so we headed to another part of the game reserve early. The lions had not fed for several days so were on the move to hunt and we didn't have to hunt for them. There was a male lion, two lionesses and some young lions, three males, one female. They were walking towards us very close to our vehicle and we were able to follow them as they set off. The

lions were kept in a separate fenced area as there was a resident cheetah and two young cheetahs due to arrive in the main reserve. Lions are very territorial and will attack cheetahs and their young, and in the past had killed cheetah cubs. Two days later we heard that the lions had made a kill of a zebra and we were driven to where they were eating. The male lion and young males eat first and then the lionesses get their turn to eat. The adult male was full and starting to sleep so the lionesses were able to tuck in. It was great to see them so close up.

We had free time in the day for writing, charging batteries, sorting luggage, laundry etc. A cooked lunch was provided at 1pm then afternoon tea again at 3.30pm and off on the afternoon game drive at 4pm. There were rumours that a cheetah had been spotted and after quite a lot of driving and tips from other guides by radio we were lucky to see it only 100 yards away resting under a tree.



Onto Pilanesberg

After four days in this reserve it was time to move on to the Pilanesberg national park and our lodge, called Black Rhino. This park is a much bigger area, quite mountainous in places. There were many large areas of water where we could see crocodiles and hippos



as well as a variety of water birds and many different antelopes. Black Rhino lodge had a lot more accommodation than our last lodge and the buildings were of solid construction with African style thatched roofs. The room was very spacious, large bathroom and sitting area and had all mod cons and wifi at our disposal. Again the food was excellent.

Our guide was a man called Freedom. His father had also been a guide. He was extremely knowledgeable about the wildlife and went the extra mile to make our experience a good one. The guides do not earn much money, average £450 per month. Prices are much lower than the UK, for instance a large glass of wine is about £2. It is customary to leave the guides a good tip at the end of your stay. My niece said £50 per person would be about right and the guides were well worth it. A lesser sum is left to be shared amongst the housekeeping and catering staff. Freedom came from Soweto and told us he had three children, two boys aged 12 and 8 and a girl age 3, his little angel he called her. He worked three weeks on and three weeks off.

As this park is very large it was about an hour's drive from our lodge to get to where the animals are so we set off very early again. It is very cold first thing and we were supplied with fleece lined ponchos and blankets as the vehicle is open sided. These were very welcome. We saw hot air balloons being used to track the animals and the information relayed to the guides. They do not use drones because poachers also use drones and so it would cause confusion. There had been no rain as it was spring, the trees just coming into leaf and many flowering. The temperature rises to about 28-32°C. The rainy season doesn't come until November or December, so the weather pattern is dry winters and wet summers. As it was spring many of the male animals were fighting each other and the winner would have the right to mate. We saw the male giraffes "necking" where they hit each other with powerful blows using their necks and



horns. It made quite a noise. We saw cape buffalos with large horns charging each other, sometimes we learnt they fight to the death. Also the rhinos charge each other.

There are about 12 types of antelope in the reserves and we were lucky to see them all. The most numerous are impala and these make up the main diet of predators. There were eland, springbok, kudu, nyala, bushbuck, wildebeest, tsessebe, waterbuck, klipspringer and steinbok. We saw the springbok pronking where they take off on all four legs at the same time. We saw many white rhino and a lot of them had young which is a good sign for the species. They came very close to our vehicle and were not upset by it. They have quite poor eyesight. On our third day in the park Freedom suggested that instead of two game drives we get up extra early (4.30am) and take a picnic and spend all day in the park. This was a good suggestion as it saved us driving for an hour to get into the park and back twice and meant we could cover more ground. It

was dark when we left and a young male lion suddenly appeared walking along the track in front of us. We had to drive slowly behind him until he decided to go off into the bush. We saw an elephant herd with young, different antelopes, a herd of cape buffalos, 2 brown hyenas on a distant rocky ledge and many rhinos some with young. There were several lakes with hippos, crocodiles and many birds. We were lucky to see a spoonbill, a fish eating eagle, African sacred ibis, cormorants and blacksmith lapwings.

Later we were hunting a leopard, very difficult to spot. It was found but well camouflaged in the distance so not easy to see. We arrived back at the lodge about 3.30pm and that evening was a braai or BBQ. There was a fantastic selection of salads and meats as well as vegetarian options and followed by, strangely, sticky toffee pudding and custard!

On our last day here we saw a kori bustard with the male in a courtship display. There was a large herd of female elephants with young. One baby elephant was tiny, only 1-2 months old and was suckling. Freedom had arranged to take us stargazing after dinner. He was very knowledgeable about the stars of the southern hemisphere but unfortunately it was rather cloudy that night so the stars kept disappearing. We did see the Southern Cross clearly and the Scorpion.

Moving onto the Waterberg region

From Pilanesberg, after four days we were moving on to the Waterberg region and Welgevonden game reserve. We stayed in Nungubane lodge. This was my favourite reserve. It was 1500 metres above sea level and had a high water table with many

streams and water holes. It was surrounded by mountains which are 1800 million years old and had lots of different trees. It was more rocky and the road to the reserve was extremely difficult for the minibus driver with huge ruts from the rains and many boulders in the dirt road. We had four days in this lodge and the manager, Keegan, was our guide, an Afrikaans man. His wife looked after the admin side. Again the food was amazing and the accommodation was spacious and comfortable.



This reserve has 50 plus mammals and all the big five. The only one we didn't see was the black rhino. We managed to see a cheetah and many lions close up. We saw many elephants with babies which was lovely. We also had a close encounter with a large bull elephant in "musth" who started to charge at us - so reverse gear had to be selected

very quickly as the elephant was moving very fast! The reserves have to control the elephant numbers as they need to eat 200kgs daily of trees, bark, roots and fruits and they cause a trail of destruction in their path. Some of the elephants have been darted with contraceptives to control their numbers which is sad but there isn't the habitat to maintain large numbers.

Keegan was able to identify all the different rhinos as they have a system of notches in the ears. The left ear has notches at the top for no. 4, the middle for 2 and the bottom for 1. The right ear has similar notches but the values are 40, 20 and 10. This system enables the rhinos to be identified, important for the genetics. Keegan told us that rhino horns are much shorter than they used to be. Poachers over the years have killed the rhinos with



the longest horns, maybe 1.5 metres long, so genetically rhinos now have much shorter horns. In some reserves the rhinos have their horns cut off so they are not poached. We were lucky to see rhinos with their horns but these reserves have to be more vigilant to prevent poaching and the rangers are armed and will shoot to kill. The reserves all have a conservation fee to be paid which helps fund anti-poaching.

We went further afield in the steep mountains to search for the elusive black rhino, no luck but we had a rare sighting of a family of bush pigs which our guide was very excited to see as he had only ever seen them three times before. It was getting dark and we spotted an eagle owl and also a nightjar on the road. I liked the families of wart hogs with their piglets and we learnt they sleep in holes in the ground and we were lucky to see one backing into a hole at dusk. We also heard a black backed jackal calling and it passed quite close to us.

We had a braai at each of the lodges we stayed in but the one in this lodge stays in my mind. All the women, nine of them, who worked there, danced and sang Zulu songs

to us and their voices were beautiful. They were all so friendly and seemed very happy people.

On our last day Keegan was optimistic that we would see lions. There was a report that Sharka, a male lion, had been sighted. We drove to the dam and he just walked out from behind a bush a few yards from us and he continued walking across the dam wall. When he reached some bushes on the other side about 500 yards away he gave a huge roar which carried to us. He was calling for his lionesses. A lone buffalo had strayed near to Sharka and we saw him run to catch it but fortunately the buffalo escaped this time!

Reflections on my trip

My lasting memory is of the vast open areas with the many different animals grazing together and each with a part in the ecosystem. I learnt so much about the country and the flora and fauna, too much to mention here. I would definitely like to return one day and perhaps visit the south, Cape Town, botanic gardens, the garden route and Drakensberg mountains and maybe finish back at Nungubane lodge to see more animals.


Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) update:

There are the four options that have been submitted to the Government for Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) in Cambridgeshire. Huntingdonshire District Council's Cabinet agreed to submit to Ministers **Option E** as part of plans for LGR. This decision followed a preceding Full Council meeting, where there was a majority vote in favour of **Option E**: A Three Unitary Authority split, with Huntingdonshire as its own authority.

I, however, listening to residents, voted for Option C at the Full Council meeting, which

would have joined Huntingdonshire with South Cambs and Cambridge City. However, Option C is no longer on the table, as we could only put forward one option per Authority to Ministers.]

Step into the Past



A Potted History of the Tudor Hotel - Part 1

The Tudor Hotel that once stood on the corner of Swan Road and the High Street was demolished to make way for housing in 2025. It was a local landmark for nearly 100 years. Although it was within the Fenstanton village conservation area it was not a listed building.


The land that it stood on was for many centuries the high ground before the marshes at Little Moor and the Great Moor. Bronze Age people would have been the first people to use it as farmland and it would have continued as farmland for the next two thousand years. This land was half a mile from the old village centre and it fronted onto the Roman Road, now the High Street. This piece of land would have seen the coming of the Romans, Saxons, Vikings and Normans, all using the old Roman Road.

We have no way of knowing who owned the land in antiquity. Although the mid sixteenth century survey of Fenstanton gives the names of the owners of each plot of land in the village, unfortunately it does not have a map to show where these plots were. Sadly the last owners of the Tudor would not agree to

an interview so there was no opportunity to see the list of prior owners in the deeds. Much of the information and dating comes from newspaper articles. Unfortunately some of the dates do not match up with local people's memories of the various landlords.

So, we have to start at the place where we do have records and this is with Thomas Coote who owned Oaklands House from 1837 to 1906. Thomas added much to the house and its estates including the purchase of land to the left of Swan Road. Here he built a thatched cottage for his head gardener; he called it The Swiss Cottage. There was also a fish pond, tennis courts, a kitchen garden and orchard. The Tudor Hotel was later built on the site of the kitchen garden.

This late 19th century map shows the original



Swiss Cottage house at the top left and the now demolished Oaklands House at the bottom right. The Swiss Cottage café and restaurant (Tudor Hotel) was built facing onto the High Street.

The Swiss Cottage café and restaurant was built in 1927 by Mr Charles Montague Bennett and his wife Elizabeth May Bennett. It would appear from the records that neither of the Bennetts had family links with the village.

Mr Bennett had been involved in tea planting in Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) and his wife had been the manageress of a London coffee house. How they came to hear of the Fenstanton site is not recorded but they must have appreciated the great profit potential offered by the volume of local and passing traffic.

The original building bore no resemblance to the building that was recently demolished. It rather resembled the type of colonial bungalow that the British liked to build in the colonies. Or even a cricket pavilion, with its wide veranda and supporting pillars. The Bennetts lived in the Swiss Cottage at the bottom of the very large garden.

Cambridge University graduates of that era would well remember visiting the Swiss Cottage for early morning breakfast, especially after the May Balls! Breakfasts were sometimes served as early as 3 to 4 o'clock in the morning! The tearoom was also very popular with cycle clubs as it was a good place to stop for refreshments on the return journey to Cambridge.

Charles Bennett died in June 1935 at the age of 65 years. I have been unable to trace his will but he must have left a considerable amount of money to his wife as soon after his death, the building was extended and a second story added.

At the time of the 1939 national register the owner was recorded as Elizabeth Bennett, who was aged 51 years and she lived in the thatched cottage in Bell Lane. The Swiss Cottage café was described as a private hotel and café. At the start of WW2 in September 1939, the government took the building over and used it to house army officers who

were stationed locally. From time to time there were British, American, Canadian and Australian army officers billeted there.

The following is an extract from 'Hansard', the official record of House of Commons activities.

Dr. Peters asked the Secretary of State for War whether his attention has been drawn to the case of Swiss Cottage Café Fenstanton, Hunts,

in respect of which the War Department had to pay the sum of £ 243 2s. 3d., in excess of fair wear and tear, for damage to, and loss of, furniture and effects, and damage to landlord's premises and fixtures occasioned by the occupation of the premises by officers during the period 8th October, 1939, to 19th November, 1940; what disciplinary action has been, or will be, taken in respect of this occurrence; whether he will state the total sum expended in like cases throughout the country since the outbreak of war; and what steps have been, or will be, taken to recover these moneys from the officers responsible for the damage?

Captain Margesson reply;

I am aware of the case to which my hon. Friend refers, and the disciplinary aspect of it is being considered. I regret that no record of

payments for abnormal damage is available

In 1939 John Blomiley Hadfield was living in the Oaklands House porter's lodge where he had been living since returning from abroad in 1936. The Porter's Lodge was opposite the Swiss Cottage. John was registered as being 34 years old, single and a manufacturer's representative in the furniture trade. He was also involved in the village air raid precautions. A relationship was formed with

Elizabeth Bennet and they were married in Warwick in 1944. Elizabeth was 56 years old and John was 40 years old. Why Warwick? Who knows? Perhaps Elizabeth had family there, John was from Cheshire. As soon as the war finished in 1945 Elizabeth Bennet, now Hadfield, reopened the Swiss Cottage as a quality tea room and restaurant with a lovely garden.

Elizabeth May Hadfield died in Addenbrookes hospital on 31st March 1952. In her will she left the sum of £11,448 (today worth around £416,000) which probably included the value of the Swiss

Cottage restaurant. John died a few years later and by then the Swiss Cottage Cafe had been leased out. Elizabeth is buried in the village cemetery but John is not.

From this time onwards, apart from newspaper reports and advertisements, there are few records to consult but I am grateful for the memories and experiences of those people who lived in the village and who remember some of the owners. It would have been nice to have seen the deeds to the building but it was not meant to be.

It is not clear when the name of the hotel was changed from Swiss Cottage to The Tudor Hotel, nor which of the owners made the change. But from newspaper reports it looks likely that it was in July 1955, when it was called the Tudor Restaurant and Country Club.

Step into the Past

Independent Press, Friday July 8th 1955.

"Opening shortly, The Tudor Restaurant and Country Club (Formerly Swiss Cottage), Fenstanton. The above restaurant is being re-opened under new management and the proprietor extends a cordial welcome to old and new customers for; Morning Coffee, Luncheons, Teas, Suppers".

In January 1950 Hugh John Watson had become the tenant of the Swiss Cottage Hotel, Fenstanton, taking it furnished at a rent of £10 a week. At that time Watson had an overdraft of £1,150 and he stated that, "while I was at the Swiss Cottage my overdraft increased by £500. Not in the whole period I was at the Swiss Cottage did I do well. It was a difficult place to find for anyone not knowing it to find".

His first year there resulted in a net loss of just over £300 but he admitted to drawing a £1,172 salary. Since February 1951 he had had several spells in hospital with nervous troubles. He said he had reduced his debts a good deal since 1951, by about £2,000. Asked what business at the Swiss Cottage was like for the twelve months before bankruptcy Watson replied; "Terrible". On June 6th 1954 he decided to file for bankruptcy".

In July 1955 Hugh Watson was declared bankrupt, (The London Gazette, 13th July 1956). Peterborough Standard, Friday

August 5th 1955. "Last 12 months trade at Swiss Cottage was terrible. Well known in St Ives and district, Hugh John Watson (56) formerly residing and carrying on business at the Swiss Cottage Hotel, Fenstanton, appeared for public examination at Peterborough Court on Friday".

From the Peterborough Standard 1957: "A former licensee's Discharge. A former licensee was discharged from bankruptcy. He was Hugh John Watson (52) who formerly resided and carried on business at The Swiss Cottage Hotel, Fenstanton. The discharge was granted on Watson submitting to judgment for £150".

From the Saffron Walden Weekly News, Friday 24th May 1957. "Sale Next Friday by direction of the owner between Cambridge and Huntingdon.10 miles Cambridge, 6 miles Huntingdon, busy main road position (A604), prominently situated, valuable freehold

premises, formerly Country Club, known as The Tudor Restaurant. Containing dining room, lounge, bar, kitchen, 7-bedrooms. Also newly constructed ball room, car park and gardens with lake. Vacant possession".

From the Independent Press, Friday July 26th 1957. "For sale: Freehold, immediate possession. Tudor Restaurant and Country Club. Main road position, nine mile Cambridge, with newly constructed dance hall. Two acres grounds with boating lake. Cheap for quick sale".

In 1958 the next owner of the business was John (Pop) O'Hannan together with his partner and housekeeper Winifred Saunders and their daughter Hazel. The name was changed to the 'The Music Box'. He was very eccentric and the hotel housed an eclectic collection of music boxes, instruments, bird cages, rabbits, old fashioned cylinder records and so on. They served high class afternoon teas on pretty bone china. Bus trips were organised to come and sample the afternoon teas.

Saffron Walden Weekly News Friday 2nd October 1959. "Fenstanton man did not tell police. John Selwyn O'Hannan (55) of the Music Box Fenstanton was fined £1 with £3.5s.4d costs at St Ives magistrate's court on Tuesday for failing to report an accident at Market Square St Ives"

Peterborough Evening Telegraph 10th November 1959. "Ballet Visit for Film Group. Members of the Peterborough Film Society and their friends enjoyed a social evening when they visited the ballet at Cambridge. Later they had supper at the Music Box Fenstanton".

Saffron Walden Weekly News Friday 11th December 1959. "Tried to keep on right side of law. Café proprietors view of licence offence. John O'Hannan a café proprietor of the Music Box Fenstanton told magistrates on Thursday. He pleaded not guilty to obtaining a driving licence while being disqualified. After a short retirement and because of special circumstances he would be given a conditional discharge."

In the next part in March's copy of The Journal we will pick up the story when the Tudor changed hands again in the 1960's.

Afoot in the Garden

The promise

February brings that uplifting moment when we know that warmer days are on their way and our gardens transformation from winter browns and greys gathers a pace. The promise of warming sunny days grows and grows until the day we all notice the world is green and lush again. A promise that starts with the snowdrops, crocus, winter aconites, dwarf narcissus, primroses, hellebores and friends.

While the deciduous trees and shrubs are still leafless, take a moment to assess the structure of your garden and plan any changes. Look to achieve a natural balance of shape and form. If you want to colour theme your borders, I would recommend getting a copy of the RHS Encyclopaedia of plants and flowers. Visiting gardens and concentrating on structural features, especially in February, can be very inspirational. I have a project to make a wild, tangled, rustic trellis inspired by a visit to Puzzle Wood in the Forest of Dean. It is a magical place used in tv programmes and films including 'Dr Who', 'Merlin', 'Star Wars', 'Harry Potter' and 'The Secret Garden'. Nearer to home many a Botanic Gardens has exciting, small intimate gardens that are full of structural and planting ideas.

Mild February days are a great opportunity to complete the winter pruning and give the garden a tidy. Direct spring seed sowing of half-hardy annuals and perennials is a great budget friendly way of adding colour to your borders. It always amazes me how spring edging lawns makes a garden look so neat and tidy. Repair bare patches in lawns by lightly forking the soil and sowing fresh lawn seed mixed with compost.

It's a rewarding time to plant as the moist soils and warming weather helps plants to establish quickly. Many 'summer impact' bulbs and corms can be planted from February onwards. These include lillies (I love the giants), gladioli, sparaxis, nerine, cyclamen and crocosmia. Always water well and mulch after planting to settle plants in and reduce competition from weeds.

Food waste bins

From March 2026, all residents will receive:

- a 7-litre grey kitchen caddy
- a 23-litre external grey food waste unit

These will be provided by Huntingdon District Council free of charge.

Residents can place any food waste, including raw or cooked meat and bones, dairy, eggshells, tea bags, coffee grounds, vegetables and fruit into their kitchen caddy before transferring it to the external food waste unit for weekly collection.



This new service is part of a commitment to promote sustainable waste disposal, support national changes to household recycling and reduce the amount of food that ends up in landfill.

Age UK support services in our community - use it or lose it!



Age UK provides a wide range of practical and wellbeing support services to help older residents remain safe, independent, and connected within their own homes and community. These services include regular welfare visits, help with everyday tasks, companionship, and reassurance for both residents and their families.

- **Favourite memories:** especially the Christmas Eve carol services, along with weddings, christenings, funerals, and other cherished community events.
- **Hopes for future use:** clear support for concerts, exhibitions, children's activities, quiet reflection, and continued worship — with community emerging as the most frequent theme.
- **Barriers to use:** heating, toilets, and essential repairs were identified as the biggest obstacles to wider and more comfortable use.
- **How the church is valued:** almost three-quarters of respondents rated St Mary's as a highly valued community resource.
- **Offers of help:** many of you expressed interest in volunteering, joining a project group, or contributing skills such as fundraising, event planning, practical repairs, and more.



This feedback gives the PCC a strong foundation as we plan the next steps for repairs, future events, and wider community involvement. As part of this next phase, we are also working towards the creation of a Friends of St Mary's group — a welcoming way for anyone in the village who wishes to support, promote, and care for our church to get involved.

Hilton Methodist Church



Dear Friends,

I know Christmas is barely behind us, but February already points us towards Lent – a season traditionally associated with reflection and renewal.

One of the central themes of Lent is the idea of change: recognising that none of us has life completely sorted and that there is always room to grow, to mend, and to begin again.

You may already know something of the story of the Colman's Mustard Factory in Norwich. In the 19th century, the Colman family, whose Christian faith shaped their values, believed that people mattered deeply. At a time when harsh working conditions were the norm, they introduced practices that were well ahead of their time – decent housing, education, healthcare, and support for workers and their families.

Their beliefs weren't just words; they were lived out in practical, everyday ways, and the impact of those choices was felt across the community for generations.

Lent invites us to reflect in a similar way. For Christians, it is rooted in the belief that God offers transformation that goes deeper than self-improvement alone – a change of heart that shapes how we live and how we treat others. Even for those who don't share a Christian belief, Lent can still offer a valuable pause: a chance to think honestly about our habits, our relationships, and the kind of people we want to be.

It is easy to speak about wanting a fresh start or a 'new heart', or to pray the words of the psalmist, 'Create in me a clean heart,



O God...' (Psalm 51:10), but much harder to live that out in practice. When we do, however, even small changes can ripple outward, shaping our homes, our village, and the wider world in ways we might not expect.

This Lent, may we each find space to pause, reflect, and discover how God's renewing love might quietly shape our lives and our community.

District Councillor, Sue Ellington's report

The issues around the four-day week and the A14 logistic sites have not moved on since last month, but they are both still very much alive.

The closure of Cootes Lane has caused concern to Fen Drayton residents and I'm grateful to the parish council for negotiating some mitigating solutions. The situation needs further investigation and the development of a procedure for any future need to close the road. Hopefully the new Unitary Authority with combined responsibility for Highways and Planning will have departmental collaboration.

The emergency full council meeting to debate the plans for the Unitary Authority resulted in South Cambridgeshire District Council opting for a City/South Cambridgeshire authority. The government will ultimately decide later this month.

The council was asked whether it wished to cancel the May elections due to the increased workload involved. The council has not made its response public yet, so we await a decision.

Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Monday 1 December



A Civility & Respect
Pledge Council

The 2025 Fireworks and Bonfire Event

This was deemed a successful occasion with a bumper attendance and receipts. Looking to the future, the working group will discuss the potential for ticketing the event, reorganising parking arrangements and finding more people to litter pick the area in the aftermath.

Re-roofing the Bus Shelter

As the Council is keen to carry out this important repair, quotations are being sought and will be considered early in the new year. The work will include removing asbestos sheets, replacing rotting timbers and providing a new suitably bonded roof covering.



Street Lighting

With the existing contract for street lighting due to expire at the end of January in respect of the 29 lamps that are the responsibility of the Parish Council, it was decided to call an extraordinary meeting in mid-January to agree a new contract. It is anticipated this will generate increased costs to the Council when compared to the current contract.

Concerns about the Graveley Way watercourse

In view of ongoing concerns brought to the Council's attention by parishioners and the importance of transparency about which body

carries appropriate responsibilities, it was agreed to form a Hilton Flood Action Group comprising councillors, residents of Graveley Way and District Cllr Tevlin.

From our County and District Councillors

County Cllr Keane highlighted a letter he has sent jointly regarding the A141 consultation and that individual responses are recommended as the volume of responses is considered in these matters. District Cllr Tevlin reported discussions about proposed local government reorganisation plans resulted in the HDC cabinet putting forward Option E – for a standalone Huntingdonshire unitary authority - for consideration by central government. This will NOT affect the existence and significance of local parish councils. Cllr Tevlin informed the meeting that food waste collection arrangements will change in April 2026, and further communication will be forthcoming nearer the time.

Green Open Spaces update

The council noted a couple of trees close to the Community garden had fallen; likewise from the bank of The Ware. A parishioner had expressed concern about branches taken off a tree within a conservation area advised this is something that should be reported to the HDC Tree Officer. There was an update on tree work discussed at the previous meeting and the views of HDC on the best way to manage the Major Oak.

There will be an Extraordinary Meeting of the Parish Council on Monday 19th January 2026 at 7.30pm in the Methodist Church Hall; the next regular Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 4th February 2026 in Hilton Village Hall. Agendas will be issued in advance on the village notice boards and the Council's website www.hiltonparishcouncil.com. Parishioners are welcome to speak at council meetings on agenda items.

Mayonnaise Cake

The usual reaction is, "Mayonnaise cake! Ugh!" but this cake has been a family favourite for many years. You would never guess that mayonnaise is a significant ingredient, but it makes for a lovely light, moist chocolate cake. Originally it was a "Blue Peter" recipe.

Ingredients:

10oz (285gm) self-raising flour

8oz (230gm) caster sugar

1½ teaspoons baking powder

7oz (200gm) jar mayonnaise

4 tablespoons cocoa in 8fl.oz.
(230ml) boiling water

1 teaspoon vanilla essence

For the icing:

2 tablespoons cocoa

2 level teaspoons instant coffee

2 tablespoons hot water

8oz (230gm) icing sugar

3oz (85gm) soft margarine

Method for the cake:

1. Mix all the dry cake ingredients together.
2. Add the mayonnaise and mix well.
3. Add the cocoa mixture and fold in carefully.
4. Put the mixture into an 8 inch greasproof paper lined tin
5. Bake for one hour in the oven at 350°F, 180°C or gas mark 4.
6. Allow to cool in the tin – this is essential.

Method for the icing:

1. Add the instant coffee and cocoa to the hot water and mix well.
2. Blend the soft margarine into the icing sugar.
3. Add the coffee and cocoa mixture to the icing sugar mixture and blend until smooth.
4. When the cake is cold, spread the icing mixture all over the cake with a palette knife in a swirling pattern.
5. Decorate as required, (e.g. with mini-eggs and a fluffy Easter chick for Easter).
