Weeds need your help

You may have noticed with the wet weather we have been having recently, that the weeds in our villages have been enjoying these conditions. As a result the gutters of our roads are becoming overgrown. It is the responsibility of the County Council's Highways department to maintain these gutters. Currently they are dealing manually with reported cases from 2023. Your Parish Councils have been pushing for an earlier solution and have now had it confirmed that chemical weed killer treatment will hopefully start County wide on 24th June followed with HDC road sweeping within 3 to 6 weeks of spraying to clear dead weeds. The chemical weeding schedule will shortly be confirmed and published by County **Council Highways. A second chemical** weeding exercise will be conducted during October 2024.

In the meantime we can do our part to improve the situation. If we all simply maintained the gutter outside our own property our villages would look neater immediately. Similarly if you have weeds growing against your boundary fence or wall please find time to remove them.

Unfortunately no one else is going to do it. Between us we can make a difference to the appearance of our great villages.


The growth of Hilton 50 years ago: Church Leys Estate

Hilton's population was 245 in1921. Fifty years later, in 1971, it had more than doubled to 550, mainly due to building in Tithe Close, Westbrook and Chapel Close. In the next few years it expanded dramatically with the construction of 52 homes on farmland to the south of the village, previously owned by the Britten and Furniss families.

The builders, Falcon Development of Guildford, started work on The Church Leys Estate in 1973, after planning consent was granted by the Rural District Council - Hilton Parish Council had no say in the matter. The Parish Council's minutes indicate that a letter was sent to the Rural District Council in September 1972, deploring

",....the action of the County Planning Officer on passing plans for 52 houses in the Parish of a uniform design of limited architectural

interest, having previously advised the Council that the buildings would be of different styles and that those on the road frontage would be of a Georgian style" *

The spacious design of Church Leys featured scattered detached houses, with open plan front lawns interspersed with 'green areas' planted with many different species of trees. Initially Rutland Green, the largest of the green areas, constituted the builders' yard with a corrugated iron hut and office for the site foreman, Fred Willers.

The houses had a uniform rectangular footage and were of three sizes. The smallest, type A, was three-bedroomed; the medium, type B, had four bedrooms; while the largest, type C, had four bigger bedrooms, an ensuite, and the addition of a study on the ground floor. All had full length windows to the main ground floor rooms, front and back. Type A had small upper storey front windows, while type B featured a narrow full-length landing window, and type C had a broader version of this full-length window. The same distinctive porch was a feature of every house, and all houses had a detached garage (single, double or tandem) with a flat-roof. Initially an attempt was made to diversify the overall appearance of the estate by adding tile-hung or white cladding to the upper storey of selected houses. There were certainly no Georgian facades!

The Parish Council was invited to suggest road names. George Peterken (a Westbrook resident with detailed knowledge of the parish field-names) provided a list. To his surprise, all of the names on his list were used. Rutland Green led from Church End to the green area now also known by that name. Smeefield and Flackdale, were chosen for two cul-de-sacs (although the latter inexplicably became Flackdale Road), while Mill Hill End was an odd choice for a road with two ends!

Building proceeded in three phases. The first focused on the houses in the south bordering the Potton Road, and its junction with Church End, together with the west side



of Rutland Green. Phase 2 began in 1974 along the east side of Rutland Green and in Flackdale, but came to an abrupt end in 1975 when Falcon Development was bankrupted by another housing development at Little Downham, and went into receivership. The estate was taken over by Barclays Bank, and slowly the partly-built houses along the east side of Rutland Green and Flackdale were completed.

The final Phase 3, began with the completion of Mill Hill End, followed by Sparrow Way and then the north part of Church End. However there were changes. Although the overall appearance and size of the houses remained the same, the 'occasional ornamentation' of the upper storey was abandoned and, internally, type A became type D with the



addition of a fourth bedroom and type C became a five-bedroomed house, type E. The Parish Council became directly involved later on, concerning the narrow strip of Common Land between the houses and road in Church End. The issue of trespass was avoided by the construction of a private driveway to allow vehicles from 4, 6 and 8 Church End access to the road beyond this Common Land. At the request of residents, in 1976, the Council agreed to the erection of a guard rail where the footpath from Mill Hill End joined the B1040, to lessen the risk of children running directly into the road.

For the first couple of decades after completion the estate had a spacious ambience with broad greensward front gardens, a variety of healthy trees, and cars usually tucked away in large garages. No alterations were permitted in front of the building-line of each house, but gradually the original windows were replaced with doubleglazed units, and sometimes the lower portions of the floor-to-ceiling windows were bricked-up to reduce heating costs.



The estate has changed dramatically during the last three decades as planning restrictions have been relaxed. A few of the houses still belong to those who purchased them 50 years ago, but most have changed hands. The distinctive porches, a unifying feature of the estate, have been modified or replaced, so today only three remain. Major alterations and extensions have resulted in smaller front gardens. Lawns have often been replaced by paved parking areas or enclosed by hedges and fences.

Today the houses no longer have a unity of shape, size, or style. After 50 years it is often difficult to determine which of the three house types was originally built on any particular plot. However all the houses share one unifying fact: they were the first 52 houses in Hilton to have gas central heating. The Church Leys development brought the gas grid to Hilton, which was a landmark change, later benefitting many other households in the village.

Back in November I was an extremely lucky lady and enjoyed a truly epic adventure to Southern Africa. I enjoyed it so much that I wanted to share my adventures with you.

As guests of CroisiEurope, my husband and I were invited to embark upon a safari-cruise in

Southern Africa and it really was one of the most wonderful trips I have ever had the privilege to take. In August I will have been in the travel industry APARTHEIDMUSEL 40 years and have been so lucky to have travelled extensively. So to say that this holiday experience is my favourite to date.

We were then taken on a city tour or Johannesburg and enjoyed learning all about the former troubles and how the city is moving forward. We visited a very interesting Apartheid museum and were treated to a educational tour and learnt lots about Nelson Mandela and his quest for all to be treated the same and much of his story The Long Road to Freedom. We visited a township area and were surprised at the poverty in towns such as Soweto, where the living conditions

are beyond poor yet everyone seemed happy. The city has always been renowned for being far from safe. But much has been done to improve this and I have to say I felt safe at all times.

The next morning we took a short flight of approximately two hours, from Johannesburg to Kasane. Arriving here I felt immediately that we were now in true Africa. We were soon on our way in opensided jeeps for a short drive to the river, at this point we embarked on our first boat.

We then sailed along for about two hours and started to embrace the magical nature from the water, the land and indeed in the air. Our boat was small and allowed us to very adventurous.

Our first sighting of a hippo was from a distance, as we saw the large head simply bobbing above the water. The size seemed daunting and at first I felt quite frightened of what I know to be in the top 10 most dangerous animal in this world. But I have to say by the end of the trip I became quite at peace with these magnificent creatures and didn't flinch even when I was almost close enough to touch one!

The next three nights were spent at the

beautiful Kaza Lodge. Each lodge was beautifully designed, had its own infinity pool and separate bathroom with roll top bath with full floor to ceiling windows so you don't have to miss a second of the wonderful nature that is all around.

The highlight of my stay here, was on the first morning, when I opened the patio doors of our bedroom and stood out on the balcony that was situated above the river, only to find we had a hippo in our garden. Now that is not a sentence I ever thought I would say!

During our three days, I enjoyed many boat rides to different parts of the river



to allow us to see as much nature as we could. Crocodiles, birds and hippos were in abundance.

On day two we were taken on a land safari to Impalila Island. During our visit our exceptional guide took as off the beaten track so we could see everything possible. We saw vultures, warthogs, elephants, hippos, buffalo, zebra, impala, baboons and so many different species of bird. An exceptional day and one I will hold with me always.

On our third day after breakfast we went to visit a local village. I learned how they live their lives and enjoyed a wonderful dance show. Watching the children playing with a toy car they had made from a coat hanger

and a couple of paper plates was really inspiring.

When our time at the lodge came to an end, we sailed back to towards the airport and then took a light aircraft flight (about an hour) as we headed to Karib. On arrival here I truly thought we had stepped back in time, the airport was so old and antiquated.

We then took a short car journey to Lake Kariba and to our next home – Zimbabwean Dream, the most special cruise ship. The boat which has eight cabins was decorated throughout in African artwork and is styled beautifully. It is immediately apparent that we are going to have a super time here and that the staff will be a pleasure to be around.

Over the next three days we enjoy a further land safari, where animals were in abundance and we got so close. We sailed around Lake Kariba and saw so many sightings of large groups of elephants and even larger groups of hippo. We also visited Kariba Dam and learn't all about its history, and enjoyed sunset sailings and fishing trips. We really did enjoy the cruise and the staff, food and service were exceptional. I seriously can't recommend this experience enough. Although we were onboard for just three nights, I honestly felt like we made friends for life.

After three nights we then took a light aircraft from Kariba to Victoria Falls, again a short flight of about an hour. This time, my husband and I had a flight for just the two of us in an even smaller aircraft that takes just three passengers. What a unique and incredible experience that was. The views from the airplane were incredible. I felt like a celebrity with our own private aircraft!

In my naivety, I thought we had now left the animals behind and was quite sad that I wouldn't see any more. How wrong I was. Our drive from the airport to our next stay which was the Victoria Falls Safari Lodge hotel, provided yet more sightings of impala and zebra. We were taken for a fabulous lunch cruise on the Zambezi River, where once again we saw many hippos wallowing in the sun. In the afternoon I enjoyed a fabulous walking tour of Victoria Falls. It is quite something to be up close to something that you have seen film footage and photos of for many years. The Falls are 1708 meters wide with an average depth of 100 meters. The sheer drop of the giant waterfalls takes your breath away. The UNESCO World Heritage site has been creatively planted with lots of information along your walk as you enjoy every angle of the Falls. Be prepared for a little (or a lot depending on the weather) spray.

We enjoyed a lovely evening at the lodge and saw elephants and warthogs in the vast lands that are rooms looked over. The birds were in abundance here too, so the whole wildlife dream continued. There was me thinking I was going to be in some modern hotel in a city for this part of the trip, how happy was I that I got this bit wrong!

A further highlight for me was on our last day. We took a helicopter ride over the Falls. The cost was £100 and was so worth it. To see these awesome Falls from the air was quite something. We also saw the Dams and enjoyed the unique land that surrounds us.

Later that day we started our journey back to the UK and arrived back in the UK early the next morning.

Most of the travelling we did was on the water, which was idyllic. I did not miss cars and traffic one bit! I have to say it was a little inconvenient waiting for some hippos to slowly cross in front (I jest of course!).



Every day during the trip, I went to bed thinking 'this day has been the absolute highlight', feeling like it couldn't possibly get better tomorrow. Each day, I was wrong. In truth every day just got better and better, as we had new exciting experiences.

To finish off the safari/adventure, we took a trip to Victoria Falls which was quite something.

On top of watching the incredible wildlife and scenery by land and water, we also travelled on light aircraft, one of which just held the two of us! In all my travels I don't think I have come back from a trip where I genuinely cannot find one single thing I would change. The holiday was incredible!

Afoot in the Garden



Top 10 hardies for sustained Summer colour

A few hardy plants flower throughout the summer and into the autumn without pruning. They will give you exceptional value and months of colour. Here are my top ten.

Ceratostigma (shrubby plumbago) has masses of small blue flowers from June till the autumn frosts.

Eryngium Karvinskianus from Mexico has a continuous display of white daisy flowers. Self-seeds.

Erysimum 'Bowles Mauve' is a perennial wallflower growing up to 45cm (18"). Easy from cuttings.

Beloved Hardy Fuchsias come in a wide range of colours. Drought tolerant and also easy from cuttings.

Hardy Geraniums flowering continuously include 'Ann Folkard', 'Russell Prichard' and 'Mavis Simpson'. Many other varieties will flower again after trimming off spent flowers.

Hydrangeas Annabelle produces large flat panicles up to 200cm (8") across. Light thinning in early summer induces new flowering shoots into the autumn. There is a new pink flowering form.

Lavender Stoechas. French and Spanish lavenders send out new flowers throughout the summer.

Oesteospurmum. Hardy varieties of African Daisy flower all summer and include 'Cannington Roy' (purple) and 'Weetwood' mauve tinged white. They are good doers in full sun on free draining soils.

Roses! One of my favourites is rosa rugosa 'Frau Dagma' with large scented single pink flowers. Later in the year they are accompanied by large flattened orange/red hips. Rarely suffers from black spot!

Salvia Microphylla. The baby sages are twiggy shrubs with scented foliage and a profusion of small flowers all summer long. Many varieties are available with white, pink, red and purple flowers.



Other suspects include scabiosa, verbena/ glandularia, abutilon, penstemon, rudbeckia, for example.

Tasks for July

Tips for preparing pots and baskets for a holiday. Make sure you use a good quality compost especially designed for pots and baskets. Move pots and baskets to a shady area of the garden. Place pots in saucers to add a reservoir. Dead head and trim bedding plants before you leave. Water and then feed with liquid fertiliser shortly afterwards and pots will stay moist for longer. Alternatively set up an irrigation system. Ask family, friends or friendly neighbours to check and water your plants every couple of days.

Meet our new curate - Rev Claire







D-D Remembered



On 5 June a large number of Hiltonians gathered at our Lychgate Memorial to remember and commemorate the 80th Anniversary of the D-Day landings, led by Dr Roland Randall, and to pay particular homage to the courage and fortitude of the British armed forces and our allies, each of which were represented.

With sadness we acknowledged the number of Allied and German casualties, especially the many young men of 16-20 years and the stark comparison with our own sons and grandsons today. As we know, only a very few remain, now aged around 100.

Prior to a minute's silence, David Lindo, Royal Air Force retired, recited the Exhortation and Alan Claridge ot the Household Cavalry, retired, reverently placed a wreath at the World War 2 plaque.

Margaret Andrew spoke movingly of her father, Senior Chief Petty Officer David Haswell RN, who on 5 June 1944 was on board his ship at Chatham Dockyard and she read a tender letter written by her five year old brother saying 'when are you coming home. Daddy, if you are not coming I will cry'. During Dr Randall's prayers he was joined by Master Sergeant William Pickett of the United States Airforce and the ceremony concluded with the traditional Kohima by Monica Thompson of the Royal British Legion and Dr Roland's blessing.

We were also pleased to welcome Michael Williamson, President of the St Ives Royal British Legion, Grace McLaren, Chair of the Women's Section Julie Briggs, as our Standard Bearer and finally a supporter of the RNLI.

We then enjoyed refreshments and warm conversation at the Village Hall.

Chairman and Vice-Chairman

Cllr Peter Balicki was re-elected as Chairman and Cllr Ett McCarthy was re-elected as Vice-Chairman for the 2024/25 municipal year.

Policies and Committees

As this was the annual meeting of the Council, it reviewed and approved all policies, committees, terms of reference and memberships for the coming municipal year.

Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR)

The Council reviewed and approved the AGAR for 2023/24. The dates for the period of electors' rights was set as Monday 3rd June to Friday 12th July. A copy of the return is available on the Parish Council website.

Earmarked Reserves

Based on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, the Council reviewed the allocation of the earmarked reserves and reallocated them appropriately.

Box Hedges

Unfortunately, the box hedges in the village garden have been blighted by the box moth. The Council has asked the Green Open Spaces working group to present a recommendation to a future Council meeting for their replacement.

The Ware

The Council approved the work for the drainage holes in the Ware at cost of £980.

HGV Sign

Cambridgeshire County Council has advised that the cost of the agreed warning sign on the approach to the Shilpa roundabout has increased and Hilton Parish Council has agreed to increase their contribution from £220 to £583.

Potton Road Bus Stop

The Council has authorised expenditure of £500 for a privately funded highway improvement application to establish the feasibility and cost of improvements to the bus stop on Potton Road.

County Broadband Telegraph Poles

The Council considered the response from County Broadband to state that if the Council insists that the telegraph poles are removed then several houses will not be connected to the new hyperfast network. County Broadband has also offered to double the compensation amount due to the fact that the telegraph poles were installed without permission. The Council has therefore resolved to accept the wayleave agreement for the telegraph poles and the double compensation amount of £1,260.

Car Park

Hilton Parish Council has authorised expenditure of £212 for the maintenance of the car park adjacent to the Village Hall.

Electrical Waste Recycling

Electrical Waste may be recycled at any household recycling centre. Bulky electrical items can be collected by Huntingdonshire District Council and further information can be found on their website https://www. huntingdonshire.gov.uk/bins-waste/bulkywaste-collection or by calling 01480 388640. Alternatively, charities such as the British Heart Foundation or Cambridge Re-Use will collect furniture and electrical appliances free of charge.

Playground Inspection

Hilton Parish Council has authorised Wicksteed to conduct their annual playground safety inspection at a cost of £132.

Events

The Council granted permission for the Community Garden to hold a plant sale on Saturday 8th June and for the Community Hub Sub-Committee to hold their weekly meetings on the Green and utilise the games equipment.

Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Monday 03 June

Pavilion Electrics

The Council considered the Electrical Installation Condition Report for the pavilion and approved the expenditure of £2,121 for the remedial works to both category C2 and C3 faults. £774 of this expenditure will be recharged to Hilton Feast Week CIC for their electrical box.

Model Financial Regulations

Hilton Parish Council considered the new NALC model financial regulations and resolved that the Responsible Financial Officer will complete the blank sections of the model document and then the Policy Group will then review the document before presenting to a future Council meeting.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 8th July 2024 in Hilton Methodist Church. Agendas will be issued in advance on the village notice boards and the Council's website www.hiltonparishcouncil. com. Parishioners are welcome to speak at council meetings on agenda items.


Making Fenstanton an even better place to live

Cherry Tree - Honey Hill and Box Tree - Churchyard.

We are sorry to announce that the tree on Honey Hill, that we were trying to save has been felled. The tree technically belongs to the County Council and after it lost its second branch they declared it unsafe. Despite our best efforts to have the tree saved and a report from a highly qualified arborist that suggested it could have a life span of a few years it has been cut down.

Our plan is to replace this tree with two new cherry trees later in the year when the stump of the old tree has been ground out by the County Council's contractors. Obviously as your Parish Council we will be working hard to have the area returned to its former glory albeit with two new young trees.

Following an inspection by an arborist, it has been confirmed that the Box Tree in the Churchyard has succumbed to a severe infestation of Box tree moth caterpillars. Unfortunately, due to the extent of the damage, the tree will need to be felled.



Hall Green Lane/Manor Drive - collapsed drain.

The Chair of your Parish Council has been working with CCC Highways to press for the repair of the collapsed drain for some time. A 13-week work order has been raised and following a meeting with County Councillor Doug Dew, he is going to follow up with the CCC Drainage & Resilience Team & Projects Team to provide a date for remediation.





Fly-Tipping

Your Parish Council wants to remind everyone about the importance of proper waste disposal. Recently, a well-intentioned individual left a bed base at the bus stop, likely intended as a resting place for weary travellers due to the infrequency of the buses. While we appreciate the gesture, leaving unwanted items on the street constitutes fly-tipping, which is illegal. It not only detracts from the appearance of our community but also diverts valuable council resources that could be used elsewhere. Here is the good news: Thankfully, the bed base seems to have found a new home, hopefully with someone who needs it. This incident serves as a reminder: If you have unwanted items, please dispose of them responsibly. Our local council recycling sites offer an excellent and legal way to get rid of bulky waste. Let's work together to keep our village clean and beautiful!

Chequer Street carpark - further improvements

Your Parish Council plans to make additional improvements to the Chequer Street carpark. The metal barrier will be replaced with wooden bollards, the ditch will be reinstated, and a variety of wildflowers will be planted. Additionally, there are plans to install a mixed species hedge between the carpark and the Anglian Water pumping station.

Chequer Street play park - Improvement proposal

The proposal has been based on the feedback received and reviewed from the survey on play park requirements in the village.

The photograph shows the ideas recommended to us which include a trim trail, basket swing and a new main climbing structure. To install these new features we will be removing the two concrete drainage pipes. We would be delighted to hear from you regarding this proposal.

Life on a Plate

Summer Favourites

Strawberry Salsa

This is a unique way of using one of our very favourite fruits in a savoury dish. Ideal with grilled chicken, lamb and salmon, it's a slightly sweeter version than the tomato salsa we all know and love.

Ingredients:

1 punnet fresh Strawberries

1 Red Onion finely chopped

1-3 Fresh red or green chilli's according to how hot you like your salsa, deseeded and finely chopped

1 bunch of fresh coriander

1 Lime, zest and juice

2 tbsp White Balsamic Vinegar, you can use normal balsamic but the salsa will be quite dark in colour

Salt and Pepper to taste

Sugar to taste – although start with none, the strawberries may be sweet enough.

Method:

Add all ingredients to a bowl and mix together. This is best served immediately.



Cucumber and Orange Syllabub

This desert is both refreshing and unique. Cucumber isn't just for your salads! This recipe serves 6

Ingredients:

1 cucumber

3 tbsp of Cointreau

2 tbsp of Orange or Elderflower Gin

150ml German fruity white wine

1 x Orange (medium sized - finely grated zest and juice)

50g Caster sugar

300ml Double cream

Method:

Top and tail the cucumber, cut 12 small round slices, this is the garnish, so put aside.

Slice the rest of the cucumber lengthways and deseed – using a spoon. Then chop up the cucumber so that you can half moon shapes. Put even amounts of cucumber into 6 wine glasses, and sprinkle on 3 tbsp of the Cointreau. Half a teaspoon in each glass.

Stir together the white wine, orange zest (leave one teaspoon of zest out for decoration) and the juice and the gin with the caster sugar until the sugar has completely dissolved.

Pour the cream into a bowl and whisk until it begins signs of thickening, then gradually add in the fruity wine mixture whilst whisking to make a thick and creamy syllabub.

Pour this syllabub into the glasses on top the the boozy cucumber, top with the saved slices of cucumber and use the left over orange zest to decorate.

Put in the fridge and chill for two hours.

Serve with an amoretti biscuit or shortbread thins.

Business Spotlight

Like father, like son and son

When the school bell rang the last time for Jason, aged 15, he knew exactly what he wanted to do. "I didn't really enjoy school, so as soon as I could leave I was out of there and into my Dad's van. My father was a painter and decorator, like his father before him and I wanted to follow in his footsteps," Jason explains.

Jason completed his three year apprenticeship and was looking forward to working with his father. Unfortunately a year later it all went wrong. His parents divorced and he found himself out of a job and homeless. "To be honest I was scared, I had no job and no home but I did have my trade card. So I hit the phones looking for work. However,

a lot of the rival firms would not employ me as they suspected that I was a spy for my father, thinking I was only there to nick their clients."

Eventually, Jason was given his first break and working wherever he could find a job he slowly started to build a reputation. *"If someone* rang up and said there was

a job in London I had no hesitation, it was yes when can I start. I was working all hours and weekends to earn as much money as I could."

"Gradually things started to turnaround and I bought my first van for £500, which I had to borrow and I was in debt everywhere but I had the dream of making the business successful. I advertised in as many local magazines as I could afford like The Journal, as these have always been a good source of work for me."

Now 26 years later Jason employs 18 people and has 15 vans. His big breakthrough was being invited to work for St. John's College in Cambridge. One college lead to another, then to another and then came the various builders in Cambridge to the point where he felt he was the only painter and decorator in Cambridge.

"We were doing really well financially but I was not enjoying it. We were being put under amazing pressure to deliver projects and our standards were dropping. I was privileged to be able to pick and choose what we wanted to take on. Now years later we have select group of private residential clients and everyone is much more relaxed, me included!"

Jason has built a fantastic reputation for the quality of his work and he would have

District Councillor, Sue Ellington 2023-24 report

South Cambridgeshire District Council has had a busy year focusing on the experiment of introducing all staff to a four-day week. The desk staff started in the spring of 2023 and were encouraged to reduce meeting times, use virtual meetings when possible and complete their five days' work in four, while continuing to be paid their full salary.

In the autumn the refuse collectors also started a four-day week. It required the introduction of two additional teams and two new refuse lorries.

The government office for levelling up intervened in October, requiring the administration to produce weekly productivity data to support their supposition that the level of activity has not declined. The data will be evaluated this summer to determine if the changes should be confirmed as general practice.

I have expressed my concern that this experiment, in addition to the policy of working from home for two days a week, reduces the opportunity for new staff to learn from colleagues and for councillors to talk to staff informally about local issues.

The budget for 2024 was set to include raising council tax by the maximum allowable in order to pay for additional administration costs of £4.5million and an increase in councillor remunerations. I felt this was unnecessary, especially as council housing tenants were also required to pay more rent at a time of a significant cost of living crisis.

Last summer the council undertook a corporate peer review which involved a number of senior councillors from other areas looking at all aspects of council work.

This involved talking to key groups such as councillors, officers and the public. They concluded in very general terms that waste and recycling are performing well, but there were issues about the speed of responses to queries and the closure of accounts.

Road charging was a controversial issue during the year and eventually put on the back burner by The Greater Cambridge Partnership (made up of leaders of the city and district council as well as Cambridge University leaders).

Finally, parking enforcement by the district council was introduced from February 2024. This has been welcomed by many schools and streets across the district but has also surprised those who park on verges inside yellow lines, as that is also an offence.

Navigating Parental Disputes over School Holiday Arrangements

It is that time of year where two parents are separated, disagreement can arise in regard to their child's living arrangements throughout the school holidays and often revolve around conflicting holiday plans, travel arrangements, and concerns about childcare during breaks. These issues can escalate quickly, leading to heightened stress and strained relationships between parents and for the children involved.

If, after exhausting all dispute resolution avenues, an agreement cannot be reached, an application to the court for a Child Arrangements Order (CAO) may be necessary. CAOs offer a structured approach to resolving such conflicts, providing clarity and stability in determining where children will spend their holidays both short and long term.

Understanding Child Arrangement Orders

Obtaining a CAO for school holiday arrangements involves considering various legal factors, the priority being the children's welfare and the ability of parents to cooperate. Whilst some parents may be able to reach agreements through negotiation or mediation, others may require court intervention to formalise arrangements.

CAOs are legally binding court orders that outline where children will live and how much time they will spend with each parent. They come in various forms, including Specific issue orders (addressing particular matters like schooling or healthcare) and Prohibited steps orders (restricting certain actions by one or both parents).

CAOs can provide a clear framework for parents to follow. These orders can specify holiday schedules, allocate holiday time between parents and establish communication protocols. By outlining expectations and responsibilities, CAOs can help reduce conflict and promote cooperative co-parenting.

Benefit for the Children

CAOs are granted in the child's best interest and as described, their welfare is paramount. CAOs aim to promote stability and consistency for the children, ensuring they have a structured routine during breaks. A CAO leaves no room for debate, these orders are legally enforceable and compel the parties to adhere, minimising disagreement and the emotional stress often experienced by the children themselves.





Extensions New Builds Garden Walls

An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

RSPB

Our year on the reserve is split into two halves: the autumn-winter habitat management season and the spring-summer breeding season.

During the colder months of the year there is plenty for us to do. With our volunteer groups, we are kept busy as we go around the reserve carrying out work to maintain or enhance areas for our key breeding species. Nesting islands and rafts on the lakes are cleared of vegetation, willow is removed from reedbeds, scrub is coppiced, and many other tasks are carried out to provide the ideal habitats for our target breeding species.

The spring and summer are when we get to see the results of all this hard work as millions of birds pour into the UK to take advantage of the warmer weather for breeding. There is always some apprehension early in the season as we wait to see which species arrive on site to set up territories and nest. Many of our breeding birds are long distance migrants, spending the winter throughout Sub-Saharan and Southern Africa.

Some, like the Common Whitethroat may

have been in Nigeria for the winter. Averaging just 14g, this small bird will fly thousands of miles over its lifetime, often coming back to the same patch of scrub year on year to nest.

As the summer progresses, why not come down to the reserve to look for these, and many other, charismatic birds around the trails.
