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
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Local Cambridge Open Studios 2024


Plans are in full swing for Feast Week 2024, a week of Medieval merriment, from 21-27 July.

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
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

New Huntingdonshire Futures Grant Scheme launched

New HDC Capital Grant Funding for Rural Businesses

HDC has allocated £350,000 to support the growth of rural businesses with a grant from the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority, following an award from the government's Department for Environment Food and Rural Affairs (Defra).

The allocation of grant funding will be prioritised to businesses, including farms, to diversify income streams and opportunities resulting in a new product or service in addition to developing and expanding sustainable rural tourism offers.

Step into the Past

Some thoughts on the area of the parish that is now RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes

For most of the last few thousand years, the area that is now the reserve was riverside gravel terraces and grassland in a large river valley, formed by glacier action from the last ice age. At its height, about 22,000 years ago, the ice may have been a mile thick above the land. After the 'big melt' and when the land had recovered, ancient hunter-gatherers returned and would have roamed along the river banks fishing and hunting game. Then, around 8,000 years ago, others from the continent began to settle and become farmers growing ancient wheat and corn and raising animals. The people buried their dead in earth and stone mounds as seen in the short film, Ouse-side Barrows and Fishing Weirs: Palaeochannel Archaeology at Over/Needingworth (www.youtube.com/ watch?v=P5Z0V0TeQ2Q&t=726s).

Our fen has a similar scheduled, and apparently undisturbed, ancient mound – a bowl barrow named Low Hill (see below). Thirty metres across by two metres high, it was a notable feature in its own small field. Later, instead of leaving it with a wide skirt of land to show its profile to advantage, it was cut close during gravel excavations and is now on a small piece of land at Elney Lake and is looked after by the RSPB. Sadly, also taken out for gravel, was an ancient trackway named Elney, or Low Fen, Drove

– a picturesque tree-lined drove at least 2,000 years old leading from a Roman farm and villa in the Springhill area. In the 1950s, an eminent mathematician, Augustus Ward of Ivy House, found Roman remains at the river end of Elney. Cambridge University excavated what was thought to be a small Roman building connected to barge traffic. At another Roman site on Elney, south of the busway, more Roman roof tile and brick was found.

Things did not change much until Ramsey Abbey started to dam the river to build corn mills c1000 AD. There was much anger as this affected river traffic and peoples' lives and flooding became more of a problem.

During the medieval period strip farming took place on the higher and drier land near the village. Later, Vermuyden and the Adventurers started draining the Fens, which, again angered locals who relied on fishing and fowling. The grazing pastures created would have seen twice-daily comings and goings of cattle. At one time there were three milking herds in Fen Drayton.

Then, in 1847, came the Cambridge to Huntingdon railway line. To build it above the flood plain required large quantities of gravel, so a ballast hole was dug, which became the go-to fishing spot for village boys in the



1940s, 50s and 60s. During the Second World War around 30 RAF airfields located in old Cambridgeshire, required large quantities of building material, as did the cold war airfields of the 1950s and 60s, such as Alconbury, which needed hard runways for heavier aircraft.

When St Ives Sand and Gravel started working the Fen Drayton pits, their vehicles were small and did not impact the village too much. Then, before health and safety legislation, locals could get up close to the gravel as it came out the ground. Hundred million-year-old fossils such as ammonites and echinoids (sea urchins), mixed with much later mammoth teeth and flint tools such as hand axes, arrow heads, and even worked antler bone could be found. If we had had more knowledge of the subject then, many more specimens could have been saved. One item lay in my fossil box for 50 years before I realised it could be of interest and took it to the Portable Antiquities Scheme office at Shire Hall. It was identified as an antler mattock (hammer) head used for making flint tools, now classified as of county importance. (See CAM-7DCAEE.) Eventually national gravel companies took over the pits and eight- then 10-wheeled lorries rumbled through the village causing dust, noise and vibration. In the late 60s, the heavy lorries, plus Phantom jets on final approach to Alconbury, made Fen Drayton not a great place to live! Eventually, a new access road, avoiding the village, was built and is now the RSPB reserve entrance road.

The Cambridge to St Ives railway closed to passengers in 1970 but freight continued until 1977. However, Fen Drayton then had its own British Rail timetable and station halt for the sand trains, some of which went over to France as the sand was of such high quality. The last train to run was a diesel excursion for locals in 1989. There was much debate as to what to do with the old trackway. A group of rail enthusiasts (including several local vicars!) wanted to run a preserved railway, the Cast Iron Group a full rail service, and a road was

also suggested. A guided busway, similar to one in Adelaide, Australia was proposed in 2001 and in 2011, the world's longest busway opened!

At the same time the gravel seams were running thin and gravel extraction petered out. Originally the land was to return to agriculture, but, as guessed by locals, they needed something to fill the 10-metre holes. Household refuse was proposed but, fortunately, the Environment Agency would not allow it as it would pollute the river. For a few years windsurfing took place on the lake now called Drayton Lagoon.

Thankfully, in 2007, the RSPB took over the area. It is a nationally known site for birds and fishing, particularly by the Monster Carp anglers! If the stand out bird species in the reserve is the bittern, then the stand out, individual fish would be one called The Client, which is probably over 40 lbs, but its exact weight remains a mystery!

Cycling Vietnam

Vietnam is increasingly a popular holiday destination famed for amazing scenery, friendly people, and great food - so I was excited to head out on a cycling holiday, travelling overland by a mix of bike, train and bus from the capital city of Hanoi in the north, to Ho Chi Minh City in the south.

Travelling solo, I met my tour group in the lobby of a Hanoi hotel. A mix of nationalities, ages and backgrounds, we all had one thing in common – zero experience cycling on roads in a city of 8 million people and 6 million motorbikes, used here by almost everyone to get around (parents riding with multiple children on one bike is a common sight!). This makes the roads chaotic to say the least, combined with fume-filled air and blaring horns.

Having been daunted enough just crossing the road (turns out raising your hand and slowly stepping out does the trick), getting on a bike here suddenly didn't seem like such a good idea! But led by a fantastically knowledgeable, fun and well-organised guide called Chí, we headed out for a lap of West



Lake. After a stressful few kilometres dodging motorbikes and cars from all directions, we started to find our feet as everyone seemed to naturally weave around everyone else.

The next day we headed into the countryside of north Vietnam. I travelled with Intrepid, an Australian company specialising in small group travel and responsible tourism, for example employing local people on fair terms and supporting small businesses. This meant we were joined by a local team who looked after us and our bikes along the way; and stopped at small roadside restaurants and even people's homes to eat, experiencing







food and local culture we never would have otherwise.

After staying overnight in a homestay, where the family served us a delicious dinner and plied us with rice wine served from a coke bottle, we continued (with slightly sore heads...) towards Ninh Binh. Known for its apparently stunning forest-covered karst rock formations towering above rice paddies, Ninh Binh was used as a location for Skull Island in the King Kong film – I say apparently, as the low cloud and driving rain we experienced meant we didn't see much!

Luckily, we were soon heading south by sleeper train to the promise of tropical sunshine. Waiting at the station, we were approached by a group of schoolchildren keen to chat to practice their English. While Chinese, French and Russian were historically the predominant foreign languages spoken here, English is now taught in all schools and is spoken well by most young people.

The train provided a surprisingly comfortable night's sleep, and we soon arrived in Huế, formerly the

capital city until Ho Chi Minh took power in 1945. Huế's citadel was also a scene of a major battle during the 1968 Tet Offensive; however the remnants of the American War (as it's known there) are rarely visible on the surface nowadays. Chí explained to us how many Vietnamese people have opted to look positively to the future rather than be resentful about the past. I later learnt more about the horrendous events of the war from a Vietnamese rather than Western perspective in a local museum, which only reinforced how incredible it is that Vietnam

seeks to build positive relationships globally, and not only welcomes American tourists but also Presidents with open arms.

We continued south, frequently greeted by local people with shouts of 'hello' and high-fives as we went. We grew more used to the (lack of) road laws and customs, such as red lights being apparently optional and people on motorbikes often darting up the wrong side of the road. But despite this, almost everyone was incredibly calm, courteous and friendly.

We then headed over the Hai Van Pass – the 500m ascent presented the biggest physical challenge of the trip, compounded by the now hot and humid conditions – but we were rewarded with the most stunning views along Vietnam's coastline. We spent the next day recovering in Hoi An, formerly a small fishing village and now a popular tourist destination because of the traditional lanterns which adorn the brightly-coloured streets. Hoi An is also renowned for its tailoring (you can get a tailor-made suit in 24 hours) and amazing three-course meals in high-end restaurants which cost less than a tenner.

As we continued along the coast we passed through multiple fishing villages, as well as the cities of Quy Nhon and Nha Trang. The roads adorned with flags bearing the hammer and sickle, frequent posters and statues of Ho Chi Minh, and loudspeakers

blaring government propaganda, were frequent reminders that while Vietnam now has a largely free-market economy, it remains a one-party Communist state where free elections are not held, and the government exercises tight control over enterprise, education, and the judiciary.

As the trip neared an end, we left the coast for the mountain town of Dalat. With hillsides lined with villas and chalets, Dalat resembled a French ski resort (without the snow) - it

was originally built by French colonialists and remains a popular holiday (and second home) destination for many of Vietnam's richest businesspeople and government officials. Being 1500m above sea level, this also provided us with some respite from the heat!

We then embarked on our longest continuous ride of over 100km to the up-and-coming coastal resort of Phan Thiet, before heading to our final destination of Ho Chi Minh City – or as its still known to many locals, Saigon. Perhaps most famous to Westerners for dramatic scenes when the American military pulled out in 1975, Saigon is now a prosperous city of high-rise buildings and tree-lined boulevards. There's lots of motorbikes here too, and perhaps I was just accustomed to the chaos by now, but Saigon felt a much more relaxing place compared to the initial culture-shock I experienced in Hanoi two weeks earlier.

In all we cycled over 650km through this friendly and fascinating country. From the food, culture and history to the beaches and rolling hills, Vietnam has something for everyone. And whether its by bike or not, travelling overland as part of a small tour group provides an opportunity for experiences you would never get otherwise, alongside likeminded people from around the world – I would highly recommend it.





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
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Life on a Plate

It's barbeque season!

If you're cooking more than just a sausage and a burger, here are a couple of side dishes that go fabulously with a Rump Steak or a Butterflied Leg of Lamb!

Potato and Green Bean Salad with Pesto

Prep time 15 mins Cooking time 30-40 minutes

Ingredients:

One bag of Charlotte potatoes halved or quartered lengthways

1 tbsp of olive oil

Sea salt to taste

250g green beans

1 red onion

One jar of green pesto or feel free to make your own

I small bunch fresh basil

Method:

Preheat oven to 220C or Gas 7. Toss potatoes in the oil and sea salt, arrange on a baking tray. Bake for 30 – 40 minutes or until lightly brown, turning once or twice during cooking. Set aside and leave to cool.

Blanch the green beans, cut in half, 2 mins max in boiling water, take out and put into very cold water to stop the cooking process. Cut in half (to make them shorter)

Tear the basil leaves into small pieces and discard the stalks. Peel and finely slice the red onion.

Combine the potatoes, beans and red onion and stir in the pesto and basil leaves, Add a little more olive oil to loosen the salad and serve.

Anglo-Asian Salad

Ingredients of salad:

2 tsp garlic oil. If this isn't available use olive oil with 1cm squeeze of garlic puree

1 packet (180g) Salad leaves

3 tbsp chopped fresh mint

1 red chilli, deseeded and finely chopped

2 spring onions finely sliced

1 small pack of Lancashire or White Cheshire cheese, crumbled

Dressing:

2 tbsp of fish sauce

1 tbsp redcurrant jelly

2 tbsp rice wine vinegar, or dry sherry

1 tsp dark soy sauce

Method:

Arrange the ingredients of the salad on a plate. Whisk the dressing ingredients together and pour over the salad. Serve immediately.

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The Wedding Season is here! Do you need a Pre-Nuptial Agreement?

The wedding season is underway.
Understandably everyone's focus will be on the wedding day. However, although perhaps an unromantic and negative prospect, consideration should be given to the effect of the marriage on the couple's financial future.
This is where a Pre-Nuptial Agreement can be essential.

A Pre-Nuptial Agreement (or Pre-Nup), in the UK is a legal document drawn up between a couple before their marriage to outline how each of their assets will be divided between them in the event of a divorce. Although Pre-Nuptial Agreements are not automatically legally binding in England & Wales the family courts will look to uphold a Pre-nuptial Agreement if certain qualifying criteria are met. It is important to remember that the Court will always have the last word and will view all matters (including the terms of a Pre-Nuptial Agreement), within the provisions of the Matrimonial Causes Act 1973.

The aim of the Agreement is to offer some certainty in circumstances where parties prefer to agree in advance the distribution of their assets on divorce rather than leaving it to the

discretion of the Divorce Courts. Without a Pre-Nuptial Agreement if the marriage ends both parties' assets, even if acquired before the marriage, could be held to be matrimonial assets to be included in the "matrimonial pot" and shared.

Contrary to popular belief, Pre-Nuptial Agreements are not reserved for the rich and famous. They are more likely to be put in place where one party already has or is likely to acquire more assets than the other, for example couples who are marrying in later life, those entering into a second marriage, those with large inheritances or other pre-acquired assets.

For a Pre-Nuptial Agreement to have the best chance of being upheld by the Court on a divorce the Agreement must be considered fair to both parties and there are other strict criteria that must be met when preparing the Agreement.

Honey Hill - Cherry Trees

Following the loss of one of the branches from one of the Cherry trees on the green at Honey Hill your Parish Council engaged with an arborist to examine the trees due to safety concerns. The arborist has reported that the tree in question is diseased and will need removing. He has recommended that the remaining trees are thinned out and selectively pruned to help preserve them. These trees are the responsibility

of Cambridgeshire County Council who have been notified and will arrange for their arborist team to assess the trees. In the meantime we are having the offending tree scanned so we can be 100% sure of its condition before any further action is taken. As the trees are in a conservation area we have applied for permission for work and it is hoped that this can be implemented later in the year after the nesting season.

Potholes - repairs

Hopefully, you will have noticed that work to repair the potholes in the village has begun. Potholes on Headlands have now been repaired. Temporary repairs have been made to the potholes at the Low Road/Huntingdon Road and Conington Road junctions. Full resurfacing of these areas will take place later this year. Your Parish Council will continue working closely with our CCC Highways Officer to address further issues.

If you spot a pothole in the village, please report this to the Clerk by email.



Flooding – Environment Agency Regional Flood and Coastal Committee meeting

One of your Parish Councillors recently attended the Regional Flood and Coastal Committee meeting presented by the Environment Agency to hear their report on local flooding issues. It was apparent from the information shared by the Environment Agency that there were inconsistencies in the report risk assessments, which our Councillor highlighted. A representative from the Environment Agency has agreed to meet with representatives from your Parish Council along with representatives from Hemingford Grey Parish Council and other interested parties to understand the issues raised by our Councillor.


West Brook and Hall Green Brook

Afoot in the Garden

The miracle of orange roses

100 years ago, an orange flowered rose was just a dream! The story begins in 1882 when Monsieur Pernet-Ducher started using pollen from the long cultivated rich yellow rose r. foetida (foetida meaning stinking). It intermittently sported to rosa feotida bicolour with petals yellow on the outside and orangey-red on the inside. Tradition has it that rosa foetida was introduced from Persia in the 700 hundreds. After more than a thousand years propagation it was renowned for being infertile. That is until Mons. Pernet-Ducher spent almost a decade before he eventually grew two seedlings. The first was infertile, while the second led to the bright yellow and fiery red roses we know so well today. Initially buff and amber coloured roses were bread then various shades of apricot, orange and brighter oranges that made previous orange roses look pink! As 'Alexander' did to 'Superstar'. Then in the early 1990s, 100 years after the first cross 'Fellowship' was introduced with leaves, thorns and flowers so reminiscent of r. feotida Bicolour!

Tasks for June

It is a traditional time for pruning hedges. However, to avoid disturbing nesting birds, farmers and landowners are encouraged to prune later in the year. If it is a tight formal garden hedge then I think its ok to trim but please 'with care'. Prune and feed spring flowering shrubs like forsythia, ribes, and viburnums. Lilac trees can be cut back by a third after flowering.

Wisteria side shoots can be trimmed to four buds to promote later flowers. Train Japanese quince and trim side shoots back to four buds to encourage flowers next spring.

Dead head/summer prune and feed roses. Sow hardy annuals and perennials like forgetme-not, aquilegia, campanula, foxglove, and scabious.

Water and regularly feed summer pots. If you are away for a few days water then feed with liquid fertiliser shortly afterwards and pots will stay moist for longer.

A very local story

In Fenstanton there are three families that are woven into the history of the village; Barnett, Burgess and Jacob. The Jacob family can trace their roots back to 1760 when they first appeared in the Parish Register and today Ron Jacob is carving out the next chapter of this families' history.

Born in a house on the corner of Church Lane, he now lives and runs the village farm shop opposite to where he was born. "I haven't moved far! I was born over the road and lived in the house next door and now live here next to the shop. The village has grown over the years and I think on the whole that is for the better. It would have sadly died without the new developments," explains Ron.

His grandparents bought the adjoining cottages (2 and 4 Honey Hill) and the surrounding land in 1938 for three hundred pounds nine shillings and eight pence! They ran a market garden business there supplemented by other land on what is now the allotments and Walnut Tree Crescent.

Ron walked around the corner to his first school which was then housed in the old Church Centre. "I can still remember Miss Mumms the reception teacher. The rooms were divided by partitions and we had one coal heater for the whole space. The older boys were sent to the cellar to collect the fuel." Next stop was St Ivo school. Ron can remember cycling in a large group down the Low Road to St Ives, which was fine until it flooded even in those days!

"I left school at 15 in 1960 the year I was Head Boy. I joined the family business working with my uncles and learnt how to work the land, which is knowledge you never lose."

Ron's uncle Fred was particularly enterprising and ran the local courier business. With Primrose, his horse and cart he would run a delivery and pick service to St Ives and back. If you wanted his services you simply put a J sign in your window. He later upgraded to a small van for what was simply an early version of Amazon.

At the age of 24, Ron bought a shop on the High Street. "It was a typical village shop with fruit and veg on one side and sweets, newspapers and cards on the other. We did Christmas trees every year and flowers on special occasions. We had the shop for 20 years and sold it in 1990."

After a few years of market trading Ron opened Ron's Farm Shop in 1995. "I source all of our produce direct from growers and suppliers around Wisbech, so most things are very seasonal. I supplement the produce with items I have grown myself, so I haven't lost the skills learnt all those years ago from my uncles," Ron says.

Ron has always been interested in sport and cricket is his real passion having played for the local cricket team from the age of 12. Today, Ron's playing of sport is restricted to golf, which he tries to fit in each week weather allowing.

As anybody who shops at the Farm Shop knows, you cannot go in or out without a chat with Ron. This is what makes it so special. As his family are so deeply ingrained in Fenstanton there is little Ron does not know about the history of the village.

Ron's Farm shop is a massive asset to Fenstanton and we'd all be lost without it! Whether it's for extra veg for Sunday lunch or bedding plants or just a chat, you can always be guaranteed a cheerful welcome!

Dogs ... again!

The parish council has received reports that dogs are running free on the football field. Dogs are only allowed on the football field if they are on a lead and being walked around the perimeter – there are notices stating this clearly. The field is used regularly for sport, both adult and particularly children, so any dog mess on the field is a health hazard.

Village hall car park

The parish council is responsible for the two grass aprons either side of the entrance to the car park and for the woodland on the left-hand side. The village hall is responsibe for the car park itself.

The parish council has redefined the parking area by putting boulders on the edge of the grassed area (thank you to the volunteers who rolled them into place) and using tree trunks and bark chippings at the edge of the woodland. Four dead trees in the woodland had to be felled for safety reasons, so we used them to mark the boundary and spread the bark chippings as a weed suppressant. All smaller branches have been left in a pile as a wildlife habitat. This meant that no material needed to be

taken off site. The contractor working on the neighbouring affordable housing site filled in some of the potholes.

Speedwatch

The Speedwatch team continues to monitor vehicle speed through the village. It's a bit short of numbers, so if you think you could help, please contact the parish clerk. The MVAS monitor is deployed in several locations around the village as a reminder to drivers to stay within the speed limits. It also collects data of vehicle counts and speeds which can be used to support grant applications we may make for traffic safety/calming measures.

Crime in Fen Drayton

Last month a public meeting was held with PC Smits of the Neighbourhood Police. Over 30 people from the village attended. In response to questions about why the police did not attend every incident, it was explained that there are only five officers to cover 115 villages. Residents should report all crimes, and any CCTV footage provided by the public is valuable to the police. There was also a discussion about creating a Neighbourhood Watch scheme in the village. A follow-up meeting with

Open Gardens in Hilton

As part of the fund raising for the National Garden Scheme (NGS), six gardens in Hilton are opening their gates on Sunday, 07 July from 2pm to 6pm. In contrast to Hilton Open Gardens in 2023, 5 of the 6 gardens are all associated with mid to late 20th Century properties, the exception being the Prince of Wales garden with the pub dating from the 1830's. The six gardens represent a large variety in terms of size and planting.

At 27 Scotts Crescent, the owner, a member of the Hardy Plant Society, uses their breadth of knowledge to great effect with unusual and delightful planting.

In 8 Graveley Way, the garden demonstrates creating a space for entertaining yet still have a beautiful space with trees, shrubs, flowers, vegetables and a wild meadow. All in an average sized garden.

12 Westbrook is one of the more established gardens of the 6, but having acquired the somewhat overgrown property only a few years ago, the current owner has worked hard to reclaim the space and showcase a large variety of planting.

The owners of Moat House, College Court, are in the process of remodelling a large plot which consisted predominantly of lawn.

The Prince of Wales private garden is the creation of its very artistic owner and demonstrates a hugely imaginative and different garden with the theme of sustainability and recycling.

At Sherwood House the owners have created a variety of different areas, each with its own contemporary style and theme, whilst also benefiting from views over open countryside.

Hilton, as well as Fenstanton, has associations with Capability Brown, as it was part of the same Manor and several of the open gardens were part of his land in the 18th century. Whilst here, why not visit the historic maze which was cut in 1660 to commemorate the restoration of Charles II?

A selection of beverages and cakes, as well as ice cream, courtesy of Monach Farm, will be served in the Methodist Schoolroom on Potton Road.

Parking is available by the Village Hall on the Green with additional Blue Badge parking at the Methodist Chapel.

Gardens will be open from 2-6pm with a price of £7 per person (free for children under 15). Tickets including a map and guide will be available at each garden.

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The Highs and Lows



When it comes to the weather, do we know what is normal any more? Take last winter for example. Extreme rainfall, repeated storms and one of the mildest on record, not only in the UK but in many parts of Europe as well. For the third year running there was not a single "easterly spell" during the three winter months. In our part of the UK there was no snow, now a rarity, with snow falling on only two days, one each for the previous two winters. The number of frosts has also reduced significantly. If the last three winters are a guide to the future, February is now becoming a Spring month, which this year was the mildest on record in East Anglia. At the end of January some cherry trees were in blossom with daffodils and other spring flowers widely in evidence, four to five weeks early. Night time temperatures were more in line with those to be expected in early summer.

March started with a few chilly days, but from the 13th to the 21st there was a very mild spell which included some warm days in the mid to upper teens centigrade, 15C to 17C (59F to 63F). The rainfall total was higher than average, but not exceptionally so. April started with a fortnight of very mild/warm unsettled weather brought by unremitting south-westerly winds. Storm Kathleen produced an unusually warm day on the 6th as the worst of its impact affected north-western parts of the UK. A dramatic change took place on the 15th as a very lively cold front was accompanied by hail, thunderstorms and squally winds followed by a surge of polar air. It heralded a fortnight of cold, showery and breezy conditions which was very much a shock to the system. Much warmer conditions returned on the 29th and by 1 May the temperature reached 21C (70F). Although the impact of Storm Ingunn on 1

February was largely limited to the Western Isles and Northern Scotland, its power was stronger than the great storm of 1987 which hit southern Britain. Ingunn was as strong as a major hurricane producing sustained winds of 120mph as it travelled between Shetland and Iceland to Scandinavia. A gust of 155mph was recorded in the Faroes as the storm incorporated a "sting jet" which occurs when cold air is drawn down from the Jet Stream, further escalating wind speeds. Waves between 65 and 85 feet (20 – 26metres) in height hit parts of the Norwegian coast.

Worldwide, February brought another slew of global and regional high temperature extremes, overall being the warmest February ever. Despite this there are still instances of anomalous cold, as happened this year in Mongolia, which endured its snowiest season, December to March since 1975 and was the coldest country in the world in February. Locally, this event is known as a dzud.

Extreme rainfall and snow events have occurred in California as several potent winter storms have hit the State. One of the worst occurred in early March when between 8 and 10 feet (2.5-3 metres) of snow fell in upland areas of the Sierra Nevada mountains causing ski lifts to get stuck in the snow. In ski resorts around Lake Tahoe winds gusted in excess of 150 mph.

Extreme rainfall also hit Oman and parts of the UAE on 17 and 18 April. A record 254mm (10 inches) was recorded in Oman with 19 people killed in the resulting floods. Historic floods also hit Dubai when 5.59 inches (142.2mm) fell in a day. This is almost 2 inches more than most of the UAE receives in a year!

Meanwhile in the southern Chinese province of Guangdong 60.9cm (24.5 inches) of rain fell in April, the highest total recorded since records began in 1959. Highways and bridges collapsed with widespread flooding necessitating the evacuation of 100,000 people.

As you paddle gently through the waterways, you'll find yourself immersed in a world teeming with life. Majestic bitterns stand sentinel in the reeds, their long legs perfectly adapted for wading through shallow waters as they hunt for fish. Moorhens dart among the reeds, their distinctive red bills and black plumage adding splashes of colour to the landscape. With patience and a keen eye, you may also catch a glimpse of an otter moving through the water, a real highlight of any visit to the reserve.

Canoeing offers a sustainable way to explore these delicate ecosystems without disturbing

the wildlife. The quiet, non-intrusive nature of a canoe allows you to observe animals in their natural habitat without causing undue stress or disruption. It's a chance to become a mindful observer, blending seamlessly into the environment and experiencing nature in its purest form.

So consider grabbing a paddle, embarking on an adventure and letting the wonders of the natural world unfold before you.


