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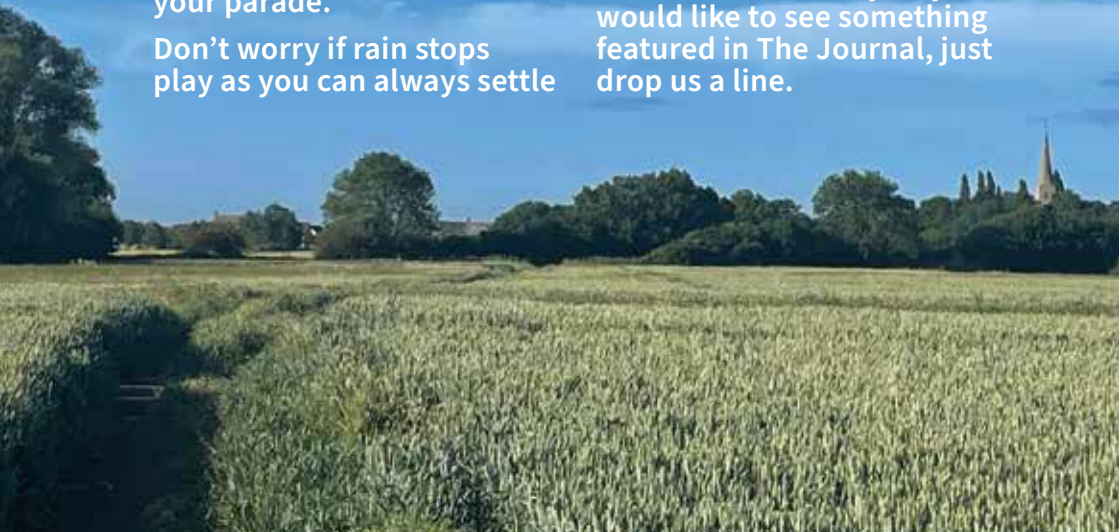
FLAMING June

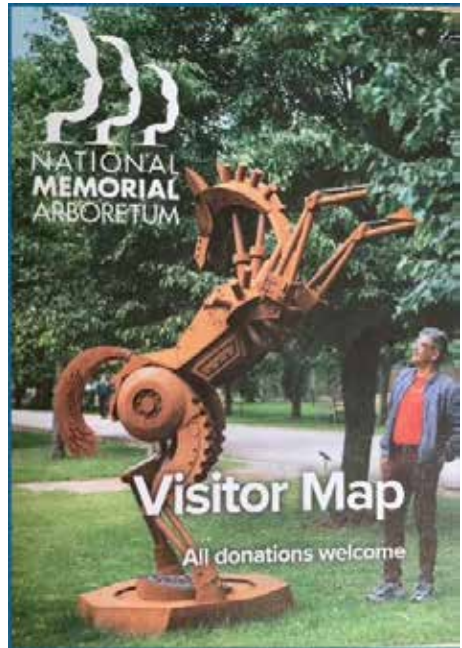

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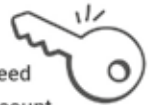
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Free driving workshops for the over 65s

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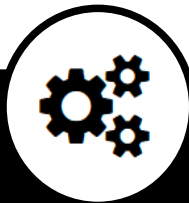


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Calling all proud Fenstanton dog owners!

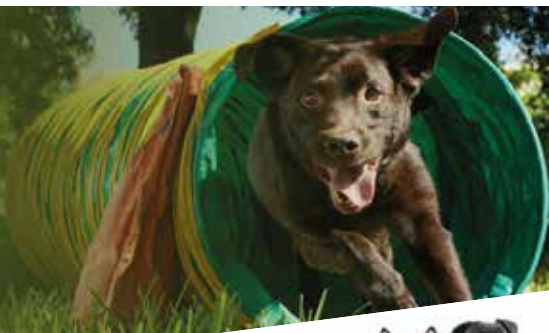
All dogs must remain on leads whilst in the show ring and on the school playing field before and after the dog show.

South Cambridgeshire and Huntingdonshire District Council Elections

The dust is finally settling on what has been a very busy election period. Thank you to everyone who took the time to speak to me, our candidates and our members on the doorstep over the campaign period. Our Liberal Democrat councillors will always listen to the concerns of the community and will continue to stand up for what matters most to you.

I am pleased that the Fen Drayton, Fenstanton and Hilton area now has two excellent Liberal Democrat councillors: Vivien Biggs in the Swavesey Ward (South Cambridgeshire District Council), and Nick Sarkies in the Fenstanton Ward (Huntingdonshire District Council).

Visit to Fen Drayton Primary School

It's always a pleasure to get out and see the breadth of education being delivered across the constituency. I was recently invited to visit Fen Drayton Primary School to speak with pupils about my role as an MP and the work of Parliament, and to watch an excellent presentation from year 5 and 6 pupils on the school's values. With governors and leadership staff, I discussed



the unique challenges faced by a small rural school such as Fen Drayton – which were particularly highlighted when part of the school was badly damaged by a fire in August 2024.

As is so often the case when I speak both to teachers and parents, SEND provision is top of the agenda; particularly the impact that tight financial constraints are having on schools trying to deliver the right support for every child. We Liberal Democrats have long advocated for a credible plan to recruit and retain the staff needed to ensure every child gets the education they deserve, and with the Government's schools' white paper now published, we will be continuing to push for this.

Each week I have been holding both in-person and online surgeries to speak directly to constituents about their issues. It has now been almost a year since I was elected as the Cambridgeshire County Councillor for The Hemingfords & Fenstanton division, which includes Fenstanton, Hilton, Hemingford Grey, Hemingford Abbots, Houghton & Wyton and Wyton on the Hill. I wanted to use this first article to introduce myself properly and explain a little about what the role involves.

County councillors deal with a wide range of services that affect everyday life: highways, drainage, transport, adult social care, children's services, education, libraries, public health, waste disposal and more. Much of the work is not dramatic, but it matters: following up potholes, checking drainage concerns, chasing highways updates, attending parish meetings, helping residents find the right route through council systems, and making sure local issues are not lost inside a very large organisation.

A significant part of my first year has been spent building relationships with parish councils, officers and community groups. I have tried to attend as many parish meetings and local events as possible, because the best way to understand an issue is usually to hear it directly from residents and those who know the village well.

In Fenstanton, I have been pleased to support work around the Village Hall project, including following up with County Council officers on the matched funding process. I have also been working with the Parish Council on issues including Huntingdon Road, Hall Green Lane, Low Road, gullies, bridleways, weed spraying and residents' parking concerns. These are often slow-moving matters, but I know they are important to those affected and I will continue to press for clear answers and practical progress.



In Hilton, I have attended parish meetings and local events, including Hilton Feast Week, and have followed matters such as traffic speeds and highways concerns. I also took part in the County Council delegated decision meeting relating to new 20mph and 40mph speed limits in Hilton, an example of how local concerns can move through the formal county process.

Alongside local work, I serve on County Council committees including Adults and Health, Planning, and the Pension Fund. These responsibilities involve scrutiny of major services and long-term decisions affecting the whole county.

My aim is to be visible, practical and responsive: to listen, follow up, and explain what can be done, what cannot, and why. I look forward to continuing to work with residents, parish councils and community groups across the division.

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MILO - a cat for dog-lovers

Milo had arrived into our lives around the time of lock-down (via Woodgreen), around eight years old, he was a beautiful blond, lilac-tipped Burmese, the 'lilac' meaning he had grey ears/face/tail and paws in pale grey with soft, thick creamy fur. We had to learn pretty quickly what cats were all about, having only had dogs to care for and preferred - or so we thought.

Unlike dogs, with their happy, open and smiley faces accompanied with vigorous wagging tail when anyone entered the house or a room, and always being ready for a game - Milo walked neatly passed us and, over the next few days, carefully selected his preferred place to sleep ALL DAY FOR HOURS, quite unlike any dog. He was definitely not at all interested in being picked up onto a lap for a stroke which was a great shame as you will see from his photo, he was so soft and cuddly.

The next thing for us to organise was to make sure the garden was cat secure for around three weeks, and you have no idea how many days/hours we spent constructing all manner of ingenious barriers (WE thought) to prevent his getting out and accessing Church End, usually fairly quiet but, it only takes one car. Colditz had nothing on us but he remained completely determined to 'beat the system'.

One Sunday morning during Milo's own lock-down, he jumped up onto a wheelie bin, balanced along the fence top trying to force his head through the fine netting we had erected between small bamboo sticks, he looked like Ena Sharples in a hair net! I was watching him but he out-witted me, scrambled down the fence onto the gravel driveway and began heading towards the parked car, at which point I made a lunge to grab him but, unfortunately continued lunging onto my knees and side of face, only afterwards realising I had scratched my new, costly glasses - urrrgh!

At the end of the three weeks in a battle of wits, we decided it was actually cruel trying to keep him confined so removed all barriers - his challenges gone, he wasn't bothered any



more and content to find a favourite bush in the shade to spend his days sleeping in 'his garden'. During those long, hot days of lock-down we became more confident even leaving him out all night and, in the mornings he would be waiting patiently at the back door, then wander in and have his breakfast.

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A short cruise to Norway

At over 125 miles long, the Sognefjord is the longest ice-free fjord in the world and it was our introduction to our cruise around three of Norway's spectacular fjords. After leaving Newcastle on a Thursday afternoon, we arrived at our first port of call, Skjolden, on the Saturday morning. Skjolden is a small village at the head of the fjord and it is also on a main road across Norway but the fjord is still very deep there and can easily accommodate cruise ships such as the Balmoral, which has 11 decks and a displacement of 43,500 tonnes. We took a coach tour from the village to the highest point on the route across the mountains, through spectacular scenery, quite a lot of snow (by British standards) on a road with many hairpin bends. It was a steep climb, with some impressive drops, so it was easy to see why that trip isn't recommended for anyone who suffers from vertigo! Although there was a bike hire business in the village, we didn't actually see

any cyclists – kamikaze or otherwise - while we were there.

One of the joys of being on a cruise like this is that someone changes the scenery for you overnight, so the following morning we found ourselves at the town of Olden on the Nordfjord.

As it was early Spring in this part of Norway (mid-April), the temperature wasn't impressively high and although we didn't have much sunshine, we didn't have any rain, fog or snow either. The excursion from Olden to the Kjenndalen glacier was mainly by boat along the emerald-green and tranquil Lovatnet lake, which is surrounded by high mountains. After reaching the end of the lake, we boarded a double-decker bus for a surreal journey through the forest on a single-track road to a viewpoint near the foot of the glacier.

Although the glacier doesn't look very large from a distance, it is actually just the lowest arm of the Jostedalbreen glacier, the largest in continental Europe. The blue colour of the glacial ice contrasted with the white colour of the surrounding snow and the forbidding dark hues of the mountains. (The blue colour is due to the fact that glacial ice contains very few air bubbles because it has been compressed by the weight of snow over



many years.) On the way to the glacier, our party sampled the delights of home-made waffles served with cream and strawberry jam. Such is life!

day's sunlight.

Even though the town is at a latitude of more than 62° North, it has a temperate climate thanks to the Gulf Stream. It is also at the end of the Rauma railway line, which provides a connection eastwards to Lillehammer and Oslo. The railway itself features in a Netflix film, "The Gold Run" which tells the story of how the Norwegians saved Norway's 50 tonnes of gold reserves from the Nazi invaders in 1940. The tourist train into the mountains is also called "The Golden Train" to recognise that chapter in Norway's history. The railway has also been voted "Europe's most scenic train journey" by Lonely Planet – quite a claim! The route passes through awe-inspiring

In the evening we enjoyed a fine dinner en route to our next port of call, Åndalsnes on the Romsdalen fjord, while our ship glided through magnificent scenery, with the snow on the mountain tops glistening in last of the

mountain scenery and along the bottom of Europe's tallest vertical rock face, the "Troll Wall". It also features a switch-back tunnel in order to climb through the mountains and the impressive bridge across the Rauma river

gorge, the “Chicken Bridge”, has featured in a number of adventure films, including Mission Impossible. The whole area has now become so popular with film companies like HBO and Netflix that it has earned the nickname “Tollywood”!

Ålesund was our final port of call in Norway and was the only city we visited, other than Newcastle. Although it is built on seven islands, it is quite a small city by British standards but it is situated in a spectacular setting and is a popular destination for cruise ships. Fortunately for us, there were no other cruise ships when we were there, so there were no more than about 1,000 tourists in town that day, although in the summer time there can be ten times that number when some really big cruise ships call. Many of the streets are pedestrianised, offering shops, art galleries, cafes and an Irish pub. Much of the city centre was rebuilt with art deco architecture after a disastrous fire in 1904 and although some buildings were subsequently

demolished and rebuilt in more modern styles, many art deco buildings are still standing. In the Second World War the city was a centre of resistance against the Nazis and monuments commemorate the Heroes of Telemark and the covert link between the city and Shetland.

We decided against climbing the 418 steps to the cafe at the summit of Mount Aksla, which provides the best views of the city, so the photograph shows kayakers in the harbour in the older part of the city centre instead.

The cruise was a fascinating way to see just a part of Norway and to learn more about the country. Our last day was spent at sea in calm weather, where we were able to see a number of oil and gas platforms from the deck, relax in the lounges or take part in some of the many indoor entertainments. Step into the Past

The demise of the pubs of Fenstanton

Fenstanton has been blessed with many public houses of the years and none more so than in the early 1900s. Why were there so many pubs in Fenstanton? There are a number of reasons why Fenstanton had so many pubs. In past times drinking water had been contaminated by the large number of toilets and cesspits that over the centuries had contaminated the underground water. So, it was safer to drink beer that had been boiled which destroyed most contaminants.

In addition, our village was and is on the old Roman road heading north and south. Anyone travelling through from London, Cambridge and on to Huntingdon and further north would have to come through our High Street.

We have to remember that the majority of working men in the village worked on a farm. In the days before mechanical assistance all work was done manually. So, at the end of a working day most men would go to their chosen pub to 'sink' a few pints.

Another group of people who came to the village were the drovers. These drovers would drive their cattle, sheep and ducks to the St Ives market. They came from all over the country. Many would stop off in Fenstanton as local farmers allowed them to graze their stock in their field prior to going on to St Ives market. The drovers would frequent the local pubs.

In the harvest seasons many itinerate labourers came to the village to find work. Especially when the fruit harvest was ready. At one time Fenstanton was well known for growing fruit especially plums. Lots of men (and their families) would come over from Ireland and were accommodated in local homes. They would have spent a lot of their earnings at the local pubs,

The George Posting Inn (now the Dutchess) was the main stopping point for coaches passing through. It was a posting inn, a place where stagecoaches carrying the post would stop to change horses and exchange

passengers. It would have been a very busy place for many centuries. Even before the days of the stagecoach, travellers would have stopped here for refreshment and accommodation.

The Queen's Head in Talls Lane is a bit of a puzzle. It is strange that this inn was used by many mail coaches considering that it is well away from the High Street which was the main route from Cambridge to Huntingdon. The inn was also used by pilgrims who were on their way to take the Holy Well water at Holywell on the other side of the river Great Ouse. Apparently if they purchased a pint of ale the landlord would take them, (free of charge) by pony and trap, to catch the Holywell ferry.

The list of public houses below has been compiled with the help Jack Dady's book 'Beyond Yesterday' and the 1901 England census:

Hearts of Oak pub, Church Lane. Mentioned in Jack's book but not in the 1901 census, possibly closed between those dates. Now a private residence.

The Queen's Head coaching inn, Talls Lane. Publican Jim Abrams who was born in Ramsey. He had a second job as a bricklayer. Burned down in the 1920s and then replaced by a bungalow.

The Chequers pub, Checker Street. Publican Joseph Witherow, aged 72. Born in Fenstanton and was a retired bricklayer. Now a private residence.



The Blue Cow Pub, Chequer Street. Publican George Holmes who was aged 29 and born in Elsworth. He had a second job as a butcher. Now a private residence and air BnB.

The King William IV Pub (King Bill), Huntingdon Road, opposite Chequer Street. Publican William Joyce aged 48 and born in Fen Drayton. He had a second job as a brewer and cellarman. Now a private residence and Air BnB.

The Rose & Crown Posting Inn, High Street, next to what is the Duchess's car park and now a private residence. Publican John Hewson aged 33 and born in Ramsey. His second job was as a master gardener.



The Sign of the Valient Trooper pub, High Street. Publican William Land who was born in Norfolk. Next to the fish and chip shop, now a private residence.

The George coaching and post inn, High Street, (now renamed The Duchess). Publican Charlotte Brown aged 50 and born in Godmanchester. She was the widow of George Browne retired soldier. He purchased the Inn after retiring from the army. Charlotte ran the business for more than 20 years.



The Prince of Wales Feathers pub, High Street, now demolished and replaced by a house.

The Crown pub, High Street, now the Crown & Pipes. Publican William Land aged 67 and born in Norfolk. He was a retired policeman.

The Brewer's Arms pub, High Street, at the site of the old brewery. Publican William Fellows he had a second job as a gardener. Now a private residence

The Swan pub, corner of High Street and Swan Road, now a private residence.

The Woolpack pub, the junction of Huntingdon Road and Hilton Road. Publican Frederick Basford aged 37 and born in Fen Drayton. His second job was as an engine driver on a local farm.



The Royal Oak pub, Honey Hill. Publican William Roberts aged 46 he was born in Elsworth. Now a private residence.

The Bell pub, Bell Lane. Publican James Garrard born in Elsworth. Now demolished together with a row of cottages to make way for a row of terraced houses

The Black Bull pub, Bridge Terrace, London Road. Publican Elizabeth Troughton aged 40 and born in Leeds. She was married to a soldier.

In addition, there were unregulated beer houses, where beer was brewed in the kitchen and sold through the front window.

It's interesting that even as far back as 1901 most publicans could not earn a living without having a second job.

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Fenstanton Pubs from the 1939 register:

The Black Bull, London Road, Albert Laurie, publican and chicory labourer. London Road was then in the parish of Fenstanton but is now part of St Ives. Now the Sultan Indian restaurant

The Woolpack, Huntingdon Road, William Fordham, publican and groundsman at Wyton RAF base. Demolished in the 1960s to make way for the A604 later the A14.

King William IV, Huntingdon Road, Charles Loates, publican. Now a private residence and Air BnB.



The George Inn, High Street, Harold Glenton, inn keeper. Later renamed as the Dutchess. Now closed.

The Crown Inn, High Street, George Green, inn keeper, a police pensioner. Later renamed the Crown & Pipes.

The Royal Oak, Honey Hill, Anthony Hopkins, publican and wholesale milk worker. Now a private residence.



The Chequers Inn, Chequer Street, William Fox, publican. Now a private house.



The Tudor Hotel was not listed here as in 1939 it was a tea room.

Fenstanton Pubs in 2026:

The Crown & Pipes, High Street corner of Bell Lane.

The closure of public houses across the county is not unusual but possibly more so in Fenstanton. These closures reflect the changing habits of the population and it proves more than ever the old adage 'use it or loose it'!





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Blooming June

I had a non-flowering climbing rose growing under a purple leaved maple tree, (*Acer platanoides* 'Crimson King') I removed the lower branches (raised the head) and hey presto the rose now flowers! It is Mme Alfred Carriere, with space enough as its 15+ footer. It was at one time the go to white climbing rose with beautiful and fragrant flowers. Iceberg is more floriferous but without a scent.

For many, June is a month to take a holiday before the great summer price hike. So here are a few tips for preparing pots and tubs for a holiday.

A week before you go on holiday reduce the amount of water you give them, even allow pots to dry out a couple of times. This will harden off the growth. Arrange for a friend or family to water for you. Set up an irrigation system. Keep it simple a sprinkler on a timer is adequate. See photo below



Move pots and baskets to a shady area of the garden.

Dead head and trim bedding plants before you leave. (You can remove all the flowering heads with flowers of geraniums).

Water and then feed pots with diluted liquid fertiliser and your pots will stay moist for longer.

Place pots in saucers to give them a reservoir.



Tasks for June

It is a traditional time for pruning hedges. However, to avoid disturbing nesting birds, farmers and landowners are encouraged to prune later in the year. If it is a tight formal garden hedge then, I think its ok. Prune and feed spring flowering shrubs like forsythia, ribes, and viburnums. Lilac trees can be cut back by a third after flowering. Wisteria side shoots can be trimmed to four buds to promote later flowers. Train Japanese quince and trim side shoots back to four buds to encourage flowers next spring. Dead head/summer prune and feed roses. Sow hardy annuals and perennials like forget-me-not, aquilegia, campanula, foxglove, and scabious. And finally, water and regularly feed summer pots.

Annual Meeting of the Parish

Chair's report 2025/26

The purpose of the Annual Meeting of the Parish is to provide an update on what your Parish Council has been up to during the previous 12 months.

However, I'd like to note that this is also the end of the current term of office for all parish councillors.

Of the nine councillors who were elected in 2022, only two remain current members. We co-opted additional councillors over this term, who have enabled the Parish Council to continue to function.

All Council seats are up for election in May and nominations are now closed. For the first time in a while we have a contested election, as we have 13 applicants for the 11 seats in the South ward. Hopefully after the election, we will also have applicants to be co-opted for the North ward. It would be good to have a full complement of parish councillors for the year ahead.

We started this council year with quite a lot of upheaval having taken place, with no permanent Clerk or Responsible Financial Officer (RFO) in place.

Ali Watchman, our Assistant Clerk and Kevin Mitchell, a former councillor who stepped in as locum RFO, kept the Council running as smoothly as possible while the search for a new Clerk and RFO took place and I'd like to extend my thanks and gratitude to both of them.

After a lengthy recruitment process, in June we were delighted to welcome Sarah Barber as our new Clerk and RFO.

Sarah joined us from Coedffranc Town Council, having relocated to Hemingford Grey to be closer to her family.

Our handyman Chris Burns continued to work effectively to support and maintain the services required to provide village amenities.

Draft financial year end accounts are currently being prepared for the period ending 31st March 2026. The unaudited annual accounts will be made available to members of the public around June or July this year.

In order to maintain the current level of service provided and achieve a balanced budget in the coming financial year 2026/27, the Parish Council voted to increase the precept by 10.3%. However, due to the increase in the number of properties in the village, this equated to a 6.6% increase or 85 pence per month for a Band D property in the village, roughly half last year's increase.

At the year-end the total balance in the Council's accounts stood at £196,010.75, which as well as the operating reserves, includes funds already committed to projects but not yet spent.

The planning committee reviewed 27 applications, ensuring all approved plans are in keeping with the needs of the village.

We upgraded the electricity supply to the Clock Tower in order to accommodate the Christmas Market and improve the safety of the supply. We also carried out essential maintenance and repairs to ensure that the Clock Tower is preserved for future generations.

The Parish Council continued to fund the hall hire and heating for the Welcome Space, including funding for the seated exercise class.

We also continued to fund The Big Village Fun Day and funded the inaugural Christmas Market event including the purchase of the Christmas tree.

We started funding the Connections Bus youth project, which runs weekly during term time, and I would like to thank Fenstanton Football Club and Fenstanton & Hilton Primary School for their support in hosting the Connections Bus.

We held a successful pump track trial event on the Hampton field last summer, which was well attended and very popular.

We continued to support both the Age UK warden service and Fenstanton Glebe Allotments Association; gave a grant of £300 to the Friendship Club, donated £100 to the poppy appeal and voted to purchase and donate equipment to the newly formed short mat bowls club.

In association with the Net Zero Villages

Grant funding scheme and Cambridgeshire County Council we installed a new pedestrian crossing on Cambridge Road and extended the footpath from the High Street to this crossing.

We also continued to deploy our MVAS units in the village, rotating the units at known speeding hot spot locations.

We undertook regular monitoring of the play areas, to ensure they are safe and there are repair works planned for when the risk of frost has passed.

Last year CCC Highways and Transport committee approved the reconstruction of the Hall Green Lane/Manor Drive collapsed drain. These works are planned for this financial year, and we will continue to press the County Council to ensure they happen.

We also continued to press the Environment Agency and Regional Flood Forum Committee on the state of the St Ives and Brownhill sluices.

We continued with monthly parish councillor surgeries on Saturday mornings, for parishioners to raise their concerns or seek clarification on village activities face to face with parish councillors.

We also continued to use the Journal, Facebook and the Parish Council website, to communicate news and information to parishioners.

Last year the Council undertook a survey of the cemetery using ground penetrating radar in an effort to identify any further potential plots and while there may be spaces available, these will still need to be confirmed by digging trial holes.

No new potential areas to extend the cemetery have been identified but this is still a priority for the Council.

As before, during the last year we maintained many areas of the parish, including areas previously the responsibility of the District and County Councils.

We also continued to support the regular litter picking to help keep our village tidy.

The Parish Council plans to continue with and support the following existing initiatives

- Developing the Parish Council asset register

- Developing plans for Hampton Pocket Park
- Developing plans for a pump track
- Developing a Neighbourhood Plan
- Providing financial support for The Big Village Fun Day and Christmas Market
- Providing financial support for the Connections Bus youth project

We are also looking into registering Assets of Community Value and intend to continue to look to further improve road safety and connectivity within the parish.

As the new Fenstanton Community Hall approaches completion, the Parish Council has agreed to move their office into the new building later this year, providing an improved work environment for our employees, better access for the public and a guaranteed revenue stream for the hall.

The business of the Council has continued to function efficiently and professionally, and I have been extremely proud of the way our staff and councillors have conducted themselves, especially given the tumultuous start to the council year.

Fenstanton is a wonderful community, with so many volunteers giving time when they can, and collectively they make a big difference.

From the groups who run events like the Big Village Fun Day, the litter pickers who help keep our village tidy, the trustees of the new village hall, those who deliver the Journal or help at the Welcome Space, to the individuals like Donna Butcher, David Mead, Jean Ding and Roy McGee, who do so much between them.

It is this community spirit that makes Fenstanton a great place to live, and that inspires your Parish Council through the year.

Therefore, I'd like to acknowledge these volunteers, along with all those I've not mentioned, and offer the council's thanks for all they do on behalf of this parish and the wider community.

I would also like to thank District Councillor Clare Tevlin and County Councillor David Keane for their assistance with promoting the interests of the parish to the District and County Councils over the past 12 months.

Finally, I'd like to take this opportunity to acknowledge all those councillors, past and present, who have worked tirelessly over the last four years not only in council meetings but also behind the scenes. Whether it's pitching for funding, writing to and meeting

with various stakeholders, delivering projects, helping with litter picks, assisting with inspections to the cemetery and play parks and much more, I offer my thanks for all their contributions.

Responsible Financial Officer's Report 2025/26

I have held the post of Responsible Financial Officer and Parish Clerk since the end of June 2025. Prior to this, I worked as a Clerk to a Town Council in South Wales and have been employed within local government since 2020. Since joining Fenstanton Parish Council, my focus has been on developing a clear understanding of the village, its priorities, and the Council's statutory responsibilities and ongoing commitments.

The financial position I am reporting this evening relates to the year ending 31 March 2026. These figures remain subject to any adjustments following the forthcoming internal and external audits, which are due to take place in the coming weeks. The full and audited Council accounts will be published in July 2026 following submission of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return, or AGAR.

Overall, the Council's cash balance has increased during the year, from £192,141.99 to £196,010.75. This balance includes committed expenditure, most notably £40,613.50 earmarked for the new Village Hall. It also includes funding relating to the Cambridge Road development, which has now been completed at a total cost of £80,000 and is due for payment in May 2026. Once this payment has been made, the adjusted balance will be £116,010.75.

As of 31 March 2026, the Council held £74,148.27 in the CCLA Public Sector Deposit Fund, together with £454.62 in a Unity Trust Bank account. In addition, the Council holds £2,585.27 on behalf of the Youth Club.

Moving on to operational expenditure, the majority of the Council's income continues to come from the annual precept, which is collected through Council Tax by Huntingdonshire District Council. For the 2025–26 financial year, the precept was set at £204,930. This has increased to £226,033.87 for 2026–27, representing an increase of 10.3 per cent.

To put this into context for residents, the annual charge for a Band D property has risen from £153.29 to £163.45. This is an increase of 6.6 per cent.

Additional income during the year has been received from the Glebe allotments, along with reimbursements for grounds maintenance work carried out on behalf of Huntingdonshire District Council and Cambridgeshire County Council. There has been around 19k of miscellaneous income which includes bank interest.

The Council's operational spending covers the daytoday running of the Parish Council office, including staffing costs for both the Clerk and Assistant Clerk. It also includes routine village maintenance such as waste bins, general repairs, floral displays, the Christmas tree, and the twiceyearly cleaning and maintenance of the village pond.

A new local contractor has recently been appointed for the cutting and maintenance of green spaces, following a Council decision that this arrangement offers better value for money and a more thorough service.

The increase in precept reflects rising operational costs and expanded

responsibilities, including tree and grass maintenance, footpath upkeep, and the installation of new benches. The cost of these services now totals £41,195.62. In several cases, these responsibilities have transferred from Huntingdonshire District Council, and Fenstanton Parish Council has continued the work to ensure that appropriate standards are maintained within the village.

During the year, the Council also spent £12,886.46 on clearing and maintaining the Orchard, with clear plans in place for its future development. As with many councils, we are also seeing increased staffing and general running costs due to wider economic pressures, alongside growing demand as higher tiers of local government reduce or withdraw certain services due to budget constraints.

In addition, urgent restoration works were carried out to the Clock Tower at a cost of just under £6,000. I'm pleased to note that this work is now covered by a tenyear guarantee.

The Council continues to support a range of local initiatives and community groups, including the Welcome Space and the Christmas Market. Financial support during the year includes £8,000 to the Big Village Fund Day and £4,000 to Age UK Fenstanton. The Connections service is now fully funded by the Parish Council, with costs to date totalling £10,329. Also, a thanks must be shown to Councillor A Puntambekar for the support and application made for grants for the Welcome Space which have been awarded by Nisa Stores – Community Funding for a sum of £2000

In summary, the Council remains in a healthy financial position. However, it is important to note that no further Community Infrastructure Levy funding is currently anticipated. At the same time, the Council is experiencing increasing pressure and demand for the services it provides. While we remain committed to supporting valued community initiatives, it is essential that we continue to manage our finances prudently and maintain a cautious approach to future expenditure.

Dear Friends,

When I was at theological college (which is what the Church of England calls its vicar training schools), we had a tutor called Michael Williams. Like many of us, I have found it very easy to forget much of what I have been taught, but I do remember Michael saying this: 'Make sure, when you are preaching, that what you have to say is good news.'

Christians call their message about God and Jesus Christ the gospel, which is old English for good news. I have tried always to follow Michael's advice, and when I preach to make sure that people don't walk away feeling they have been told off or given doom and gloom. I am not exactly preaching now, just sharing some thoughts, but here is a piece of definitely good news, which I am sure we could all do with. There is a YouTuber called Simon Clark, who has a PhD in atmospheric physics, and is, I think, an excellent communicator of scientific knowledge, especially concerning climate change and green energy.

In a recent posting, Simon shared some graphs and figures from a couple of technical reports that show that in 2025, the demand for electricity generated worldwide from fossil fuels fell by 38 terawatt hours. According to the internet, a terawatt hour is a million million watt hours, so 38 of them is the equivalent of keeping 950 thousand million lightbulbs on for an hour. And the world wanted that much less energy from fossil fuels last year, thanks entirely to the growth in clean energy such as wind and solar power.

At long last, we are starting to use less of the dirty expensive stuff that comes from underground and can only be used once, the stuff that has got us into all kinds of trouble. We have a long way to go, but it's the right direction, and that trend will almost certainly accelerate. Good news indeed. For those who believe this world is not ours to mess up in the first place, but is on loan to us from the God who created it, this is proper Gospel.

May God bless his good earth, and teach us before it is too late to care for it properly. And thank you Michael Williams, and Simon Clark, for being in your very different ways heralds of good news. May we do likewise.

Lasagne

This recipe has both a vegetarian and a meat version,

Ingredients:

For both versions:-

- 1 red pepper/capsicum
- 1 medium onion
- 1 box tomato passata
- 2 oz./ 55gm. mushrooms
- Salt and pepper to your liking
- Basil to your liking
- 1 packet, lasagne sheets.
- Cheese sauce
- Approximately half a pint of milk
- 4oz./115gm. Strong cheddar cheese or mozzarella if you prefer.
- Approximately 1 tablespoon cornflour
- Salt to your taste
- Extra grated cheese to cover the finished dish.

Requirements

An ovenproof square shaped dish approximately 10 inches square, 2½ inches deep or 24cm. square, 5cm deep.

Method

1. Chop all above ingredients
2. Gently fry the onion until just soft.
3. Add the mushrooms - fry on a high heat or they will be very watery.
4. Add the chopped red pepper and fry until softened.
5. Add the passata.
6. Add salt, pepper and basil to your liking.
7. Cook for about 20 minutes until flavours are well combined. Leave to cool
8. Either leave the sauce chunky or blend in with an autochop or blending stick to a smoother consistency.

For the vegetarian version:-

9. Chop finely, fry a further 4oz./115gm. mushrooms, or aubergines or the equivalent in soya chunks.

For the meat version:-

10. Add 8oz./225gm lean mince
11. Cook in the passata mix until tender, about half an hour.
12. Leave to go cold.

Moore Brook busway crossing

As mentioned last month, Fen Drayton PC, together with Fenstanton, and Swavesey PCs and the RSPB are working to keep the Moore Brook busway crossing at Fen Drayton open to the public after the busway fencing is installed.

To this end, a Definitive Map Modification Order (DMMO) is being drawn up to ask Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) to investigate whether this route should be formalised.

Long-term users of the crossing were asked to complete a Public Right of Way

User Evidence Statement, to help establish whether the route in the application is a public right of way.

Around fifty completed statements have been submitted to the CCC by Andy Brown, a Fen Drayton resident who researched and initiated the DMMO process.

The application will be prioritised by the CCC map officer who is handling the case.

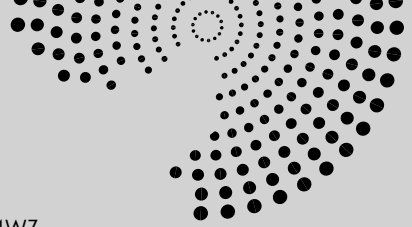

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The Highs and Lows

Weather Watch by Patrick Landucci



Spring starting earlier, this year by 2-3 weeks, and long dry spells are the most noticeable characteristics of the weather in our part of the UK during the last few years, combined with a complete lack of snow and many fewer frosts during the Winter months. Whilst in other parts of the UK different conditions will have been experienced, 2026 gave us a most beautiful early Spring especially the display of blossom. It was however, largely over by mid-April with even the bluebells, which usually flower in May, fading by the end of April.

As with much of last Winter there were no air frosts in either March or April though with a high number of clear cloudless nights a chilly start in the mornings was ensured. A remarkable day occurred on 6 April when, with a diurnal range of 20 degrees C (36F), the maximum temperature reached 25.2°C (77.4°F) which was very close to but not quite beating the all-time UK record for April set in 1949. Half the days in April had unbroken sunshine. Only 2.5 mm (0.10”) fell during the month of April, a drought which started in mid-March.

Looking back at Winter 2025/26, December and February combined produced just 3 occasions when air frost occurred and even those nights barely dropped to 0°C (32°F). The only cold spell of the Winter occurred during the first half of January when the coldest night at -6.3°C (20.7°F) was recorded. February was a wet month and

above average, though we were spared the much higher totals which other parts of the UK experienced. For anyone who wants to see snow, we have seen in recent years that East Anglia generally has had very little. In our region of the UK based on the long term average it is just 5 days. In Met.Office terms a snowy day is one which has lying snow at 9.00am.

And now a few notable events further afield!

1. Iceland had its hottest Christmas Eve on record at 19.8°C (19.7°F) while across large swathes of the United States numerous places set new record high Christmas temperatures including 21.7°C (71.0°F) in Denver, Colorado and 26.1°C (78.3°F) at Charlotte, North Carolina, areas normally accustomed to snow at that time of year!
2. In mid-February a Calima event (a strong hot southerly wind, usually lasting 3-5 days which lifts copious amounts of Sahara dust) affected countries in Southern and Western Europe creating appreciable pollution and later “blood rain” over parts of Iberia coating streets and buildings. It also resulted in dramatically colourful sunrises and sunsets.
3. In January and February, France was hit by four named storms which brought exceptionally wet conditions which, after 40 consecutive rainy days set a new national record for the longest sequence since they started measurements in 1959.

This being the first meeting of the new 'Council-year' (May to April), the first items of business resulted in the election for 2026/27 of Peter Balicki as Chairman and Ett McCarthy as Vice Chairman. Time was spent reviewing Terms of Reference and composition of the various committees and working groups; also, the Council's policies including the code of conduct for councillors, freedom of information, data protection, a host of employment matters, as well as standing orders, financial regulations and banking arrangements, asset register and management plan, and the like. The Council agreed to a proposal for post-and-rope fencing (to replace the temporary orange plastic) to go round the Major Oak; supported by suitable signage designed to discourage people going too close – for their own safety and the ongoing management of the tree.

Repairs to the Churchyard walls

The Council was pleased to note the plan to repair the churchyard walls is now expected to take place over the summer; and extended support for the builders to set up a temporary compound to store materials on the Green, near the west wall of the churchyard. In the interests of public safety and to maintain as much use of the path as possible in this period, some temporary fencing will be installed along the edge of the footpath near the east wall running

up to the Lychgate. Any damage will be made good by the contractors at the end of the project.

From our County Councillor

County Councillor Keane reported despite Easter and elections his work had continued on highways and local issues, continuing involvement with county level discussions on local government reorganisation and the future of adult social care services as well as attendance parish meetings and community events.

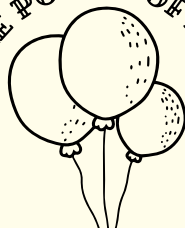
Friends of Fen Drayton Primary School
