Rediscovering freedom, fun and friendships

Research shows Cambs over-60s are *“rediscovering freedom, fun and friendships”*

People over-60 are frequently stereotyped by society as an ‘ageing generation’. However, new research shows this couldn’t be further from the truth – revealing that, in Cambridgeshire, this generation is, in fact, embracing a ‘second adolescence’.

Darren Roe, Managing Director of Stagecoach East, said: *“Our research shows that today’s over-60s are the punk-loving, legwarmer-adoring, 1980’s-rooted rebels at heart, who are now starting to rediscover old hobbies and reconnect with loved ones – all while leaving the car at home.”*

The findings from Stagecoach, parent of local operator Stagecoach East, show that free bus travel is giving over-60s the freedom, affordability and flexibility to make the most of their free time.

According to the research, today’s over-60s have more time and energy than ever – and they’re channelling it into spending time with friends and family (28%), discovering new hobbies (22%) and reigniting passions from their youth (19%).

Free bus travel isn’t just about leisure, it’s also about strengthening communities and reducing isolation. The research reveals the societal impact free bus travel has on



this generation – with 42% saying it gives them the opportunity to visit family and friends more often, over a third (36%) feeling more connected to their local community and more than one in five (22%) saying it’s helping them to discover new interests.

Nearly half (48%) of over-60s say free bus travel allows them to leave the car at home more often and ditch the taxis altogether (25%). However, 5% are unaware they’re eligible for free travel.

Stagecoach is now encouraging all over-60s to check their eligibility and claim their free bus pass to embrace their ‘second adolescence’.

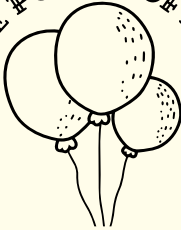

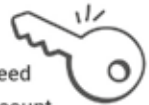

Boughton House NN14 1BJ

One of Britain's grandest and best-preserved stately homes, with park and gardens. Open on specific dates only for pre-booked tours of the house. Special events throughout the year. Café. Full details are on the Historic Houses website www.historichouses.org The finest example of an Eleanor Cross is in the centre of the nearby village of Geddington.



Wrest Park MK45 4HR

A 19th century mansion in the style of a French chateau which is also the home of the only known portrait of Lady Jane Grey. But the 90 acres of grand gardens are its real glory. It has also served as a filming location for a number of films and TV productions. Owned by English Heritage.



Kirby Hall NN17 3EN

One of England's greatest Elizabethan and 17th Century houses. Although its finest state rooms survive impressively complete, much of this vast mansion is now a dramatic roofless shell. King James 1 visited Kirby Hall nine times. Fine gardens. Owned by the Earl of Winchelsea and managed by English Heritage.



Deene Park NN17 3EG

A large historic house developed over six centuries. A minimum of ten rooms are open to the public, each with its unique style. Deene Park has a mixture of furnishings and family possessions full of sentimental value collected over many years. Open on specific dates during the year. Full details are on the Historic Houses website www.historichouses.org



Kelmarsh Hall NN6 9LY

Built in 1732, successive owners and influences have left their imprint on this elegant Palladian style home. The Grade II listed gardens boast a distinctive Walled Garden, Sunken Garden, topiary and rose gardens, woodlands, lake and herbaceous borders. Norwich Cathedral NR1 4DH

Norwich Cathedral is one of England's finest Cathedrals. It has the second tallest spire and is one of the finest examples of Romanesque architecture in Europe. If you fancy a trip by train, there are regular services from Cambridge North station, which served by the Guided Bus Route (service B). The cathedral is a 10-minute walk from Norwich Station.

Melford Hall CO10 9AA

A stately home in Long Melford, close to Kentwell Hall, it was mostly constructed in the 16th century. It is still lived in by the Hyde Parker family but is now owned by the National Trust, which organises talks on the seafaring adventures of the Hyde Parker family and the Hall's links with Beatrix Potter. Oxburgh Estate PE33 9PS

A moated country house built for Sir Edmund Bedingfeld in 1482, who obtained a special licence in order to build it of brick. The house boasts a priest's hole. The house is Grade I listed and the formal gardens are Grade II listed. See the National Trust website for more details. www.nationaltrust.org.uk



Castle Rising PE31 6AH

Castle Rising Castle is one of the most famous 12th Century castles in England. The stone keep is one of the finest examples of its kind anywhere in the country and it is surrounded by massive earthworks. Open Wed-Sun 10:00am – 4:00pm. There are tea rooms and a gastropub in the village. See www.castlerising.co.uk for more details.

Local mobile coverage survey– your views matter

While speaking to residents on the doorstep, I have often had conversations about the poor quality of mobile signal in different areas across the constituency. Sometimes while travelling in the area, sometimes even in their own homes, I know that people are frustrated with the patchiness of connectivity and it is having a real impact on their ability to work, communicate, and even contact emergency services.

To build a better picture of the situation more widely across St Neots and Mid Cambridgeshire, I have launched a survey which asks about particularly troubling areas and which providers are failing to deal with issues. This winter, we were lucky that despite flood warnings being issued, there were



no major incidents in our area. However, I know that with developments proposed and ongoing in surrounding areas, flood risk in the future is still a very real worry for many people. I have written in my newsletter and spoken in Parliament a number of times about how development in our area must come alongside investment in education, healthcare and water infrastructure.

With multiple proposals submitted for development along the A14, each will affect different local parishes in different ways. I have attended consultations for each development and will continue to urge developers to ensure that any proposals not only mitigate flood risk but actively bring forward measures to reduce risk in future.

Let's do coffee



The Muddy Trowel café

Possibly not the most obvious place to go for coffee, but The Muddy Trowel has a lot to offer. Based at Godmanchester's Community Plant Nursery, this 4.5-acre green space is cared for by a team of over 50 passionate volunteers. Together, they have created a place that brings people, plants and wildlife and coffee lovers together.

The café which is open Thursday to Saturday, is well-loved for its famous sausage rolls, alongside homemade cakes, freshly brewed drinks and weekly specials using produce grown right on the doorstep at the nursery. It's the perfect spot to relax and soak up the surroundings. There is seating inside and out and they are both dog and child friendly.

In addition, across the site, you'll find a heritage orchard, colourful gardens, wildflower meadows, a peaceful woodland walk and even their own apiary. Every area is tended with care by volunteers, whose hard work makes the nursery such a vibrant and welcoming space.

But the nursery is about more than plants. It's also a place for learning, wellbeing and connection. They host workshops for schools, provide guided tours for community



groups and welcome visitors of all ages to explore the site. For many, volunteering here is a chance to learn new skills, make friends and enjoy the benefits of being outdoors in nature.

Whether you come to buy plants, enjoy a walk in the gardens, join a workshop or simply share coffee with friends, Godmanchester Community Plant Nursery is there to be discovered, enjoyed and cherished by everyone.

You will find the nursery behind bungalows on Park Lane, Godmanchester PE29 2AG. Turn at the Black Bull and we're on the left. The nursery is open 10.00 until 15.00, Tuesday to Saturday and the Muddy Trowel café in open 10.00 until 14.00 Thursday to Saturday.

A short guide to the world's greatest drink

Tucked into The Courtyard in Papworth, you'll find us — a coffee shop roasting its own beans in a barn in Elsworth. We've been roasting beans for over a decade and we're still on our own journey of discovery — we want to share a little of what we've learned with you.



Coffee starts life as a cherry on a tree. Inside the cherry is the seed — what we know as the coffee bean. Legend has it that it was first discovered in Ethiopia by a goat herder named Kaldi, who noticed his goats becoming unusually energetic after eating the cherries. Whether or not that's entirely true, it's a good origin story — any maybe this explains why the GOAT drink is coffee after all.

The two main species are Arabica and Robusta. Arabica is the one we tend to obsess over — smoother, more complex, often with notes of fruit or florals. Robusta is tougher, higher in caffeine, and delivers that punchy, bitter hit many people associate with “strong” coffee. Increasingly, farmers are experimenting with hybrids — plants that can survive disease and warmer climates while still tasting good.

Coffee grows in a belt of around 70 countries near the equator. Where it's grown has a huge impact on flavour. Ethiopian coffees can be bright and citrusy; Brazilian coffees are often more chocolatey and nuttier. Much of this traces back to coffee's journey: from Ethiopia to Yemen, then out through European trade routes and colonial planting.

Varieties like Typica and Bourbon — the “heirloom varieties” — were carried across continents and still form the backbone of what we drink today.

Farming varies wildly. In Brazil, you'll find vast, mechanised farms. Elsewhere, it's smallholders — families picking cherries by hand on steep hillsides, passing knowledge down through generations.

After picking comes processing (broadly how much of the fruit is left on the bean as it dries), which shapes flavour as much as origin. Washed coffees tend to be clean and crisp, naturals are fruitier and heavier, and honey-processed coffees sit somewhere in between.

Then comes the journey to the UK. Importers who handle sourcing and logistics. Once it reaches us, we “cup” it (a structured tasting involving a lot of noisy slurping) to decide what makes the cut. Some coffees are sold as single origins; others are blended to balance flavour.

Roasting is where it all comes together. A lighter roast highlights fruit; a darker roast brings body and bitterness. We adjust depending on how you'll drink it — espresso, filter, or cafetière.

If you're curious about better coffee, start simple. Try a different origin or process. Ask questions. Grind fresh if you can. You're unlikely to find what you need in a supermarket — so a trip to a speciality coffee shop is really the only way forward.

Because good coffee doesn't need to be complicated — just a bit more considered.

To Vellore and back again...

I've known about the link between Churches Together in Cambridgeshire and the Diocese of Vellore for some time, particularly having hosted a visiting minister in 2022. At that time Revd Jared suggested that I might one day visit India but I never thought it would actually become a reality.

However, having navigated the various administrative hurdles and been generously subsidised by The Methodist Church, I found myself on board an Air India flight in January bound for Mumbai airport!! Was I ready? I wasn't sure what to expect and so answering the question of my being ready or not is a tricky one to answer.

Having had my tastebuds enlivened by the on-board meals, landing at Mumbai airport provided my first lesson in India. In spite of their being generous, open-hearted, welcoming people, polite queuing is not something they do whether in an airport or in church. It is very much a case of everyone for themselves, which was a bit of a shock to 'hold-back' person like myself. I simply had

to overcome my natural tendency, hold my position and push forward.

Stepping out of Chennai airport into the high temperatures of India was a pleasant change from winter in Cambridgeshire! From that moment I realised the people of India are its greatest treasure. Time and again in various contexts – school, hospital, community, home and church, I discovered people who though materially deprived were rich in hospitality, generosity, appreciation, spirit and joy.

The landscapes around me were vibrant in colour, diverse in fragrance, relentless in noise and awash with contrast between wealth and poverty. On our first trip, we encountered cows wandering at leisure in all sorts of contexts, dogs too as well as

Kala Kinda Pali. When we arrived the community had gathered and led us up the hill to their outdoor church. Drums and firecrackers when ahead of us! At the end of our time it all happened in reverse with dancing added. People wanted to hold our hands perhaps to make sure we were real. Many of them had not seen any person of a different colour before. The young boys were keen to know if I played cricket (though initially I thought they were asking if I played KitKat!). Smiles and hands held reminded me that there are things that can be understood in any culture without the need for words.

monkeys, and one elephant. As a runner I'd taken my running kit just in case but the absence of pavements combined with multiple laned roads on which pedestrians, people on scooters (without helmets), cars, tuk-tuks, buses and lorries all hurtled along, indicating by using their horns, I knew my running shoes weren't going to leave my suitcase!

Everywhere I went I was humbled by the welcome of the people. Never before have I been received in a way similar to a celebrity, frequently being 'shawled' which was a visible way of our hosts saying – 'you are noticed, valued, respected and embraced.'

Visits to schools and other places was often accompanied by food. On more than one occasion I thought of the story, 'The magic porridge pot' though in context it became the magic biryani pot – the food never ran out.

One visit stands out in my mind. It was to a small village community,

In spite of growing persecution, the Church in South India is growing. I had the privilege of being at church services where there were 50 young people confirmed in their faith and on another occasion 50 people were baptised! People attended church enthusiastically and expectantly. Some services did last quite some time – the longest being 4.5hours! Gatherings involved people of all ages and the vibrancy I saw in the culture around me infused worship too so that dancing, music, sharing, participation, all featured with joy, and no sense of duty. I was also privileged to attend a number of new church dedications and on those occasions was left wondering if

Step into the Past

A little light reading

The next time you are washing your hands and complain because the water temperature isn't just how you like it, think about how things used to be. Here are some facts about life in the 16th and 17th century:

Most people got married in June because if they were able to, they took their yearly bath in May and still smelled pretty good by June. However, they were starting to smell, so brides carried a bouquet of flowers to hide her body odors. Hence the custom today of carrying a bouquet when getting married.

Baths consisted of a big wooden tub filled with hot water. The man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water, then all the sons, then the women, finally the children and last of all the babies. By then the water was so dirty you could actually lose someone in it. Hence the saying, don't throw the baby out with the bath water.



Houses had thatched roofs, thick straw-piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to keep warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice, bugs etc) lived in the roof space. When it rained it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying it's raining cats and dogs.



There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem as bugs and other droppings could land on your bed space. For this reason, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. That's how canopy beds came into existence. This was not true for the labouring classes who mostly slept on rags on a bare earthen floor.

Most floors were bare earth and dirt, only the wealthy had something other than dirt, hence the saying, dirt poor. The wealthy had slate or stone floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on the floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on, they added more straw until, when you opened the door, it would all start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entranceway, hence the saying a thresh hold.

In those old days, they cooked in the kitchen area with a big kettle that always hung over the fire. Every day they lit the fire and added things to the pot. They ate mostly vegetables and did not get much meat. They would eat the stew for dinner, leaving leftovers in the pot to get cold overnight and then start over the next day. From time-to-time stew had food in it that had been there for quite a while.

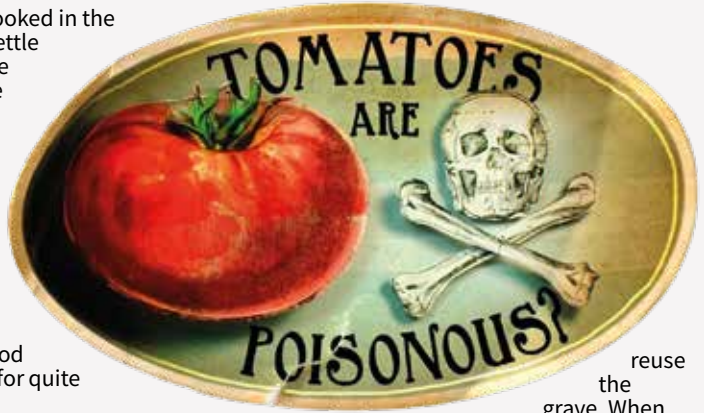
Sometimes the poor people would obtain some pork, which made them feel quite special. When visitors came over, they would hang up their bacon to show off. It was a sign of wealth that a man could, **bring home the bacon. They would cut off a little to share with guests and would all sit around and chew the fat.**

Although most poor people eat off wooden plates those with money had plates made of pewter. Food with high acid content caused some of the lead to leach onto the food, causing lead poisoning death. **This happened most often with tomatoes, so for the next 400 years or so, tomatoes were considered poisonous.**

Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and guests got the top, **or the upper crust.**

Lead cups were used to drink ale or whisky. The combination would sometimes knock the imbibers out for a couple of days. Someone walking along the road would take them for dead and prepare them for burial. They were laid out on the kitchen table for a couple of days and the family would gather around and eat and drink and wait and see if they would wake up. **That's why the custom of holding a wake.**

England is a small country and the local churchyards started running out of places to bury people. So, they would dig up coffins and take the bones to a bone-house, and



reuse the grave. When reopening these coffins, 1 out of 25 coffins were found to have scratch marks on the inside and they realised they had been burying people alive. So, they would tie a string on the wrist of the corpse, lead it through the coffin and up through the ground and tie it to a bell. Someone would have to sit out in the graveyard all night (the graveyard shift), to listen for the bell. **Thus, someone could be, saved by the bell or was considered a dead ringer.**

And that's the truth. Now, whoever said history was boring!!!

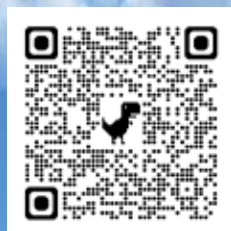

May! Time for Chelsea

The greatest flower show on earth. When I was young when I helped build the NFU display in the marquee. Later I grew plants specifically for Chelsea and assisted with plant displays. But my biggest task, with a colleague, was buying specimen plants for a Chelsea Garden. Flowering Rhododendrons were deemed ideal and via a contact of a contact we were given the name (long and eastern European) of a gentleman, his telephone number and address in Kensington! By phone a 'Rhodo' viewing was arranged at his nursery in the Surrey Weald. As we drove up a long gravel drive, through a stand of eucalyptus trees, we were met with what could easily be a scene from the Hobbit. In the middle of the drive was a brightly dressed dwarf with a long, pointed beard consulting hidden forces with a dangling spinning crystal. Even when we stood he was not very tall. But the real magic was in the nursery which was high up on a sandstone ridge with magnificent views over the Weald and a hundred or more 6ft plus tall specimen 'Rhodos' growing in 6in 150c of compost which turned out to be silver gilt treasure.

Prune back early flowering shrubs like forsythia, ribes and Japanese quince. Remove seed heads from hellebores, stake



perennials and tie in climbers as required. Apply liquid feed around spring bulbs and top dress your borders and roses with granular fertiliser.

One of gardening's best jobs is planting up summer bedding plants. The shopping trip to a nursery or garden centre and the feel of friable compost in your hands when you plant. Always water your plants well in advance of planting and again once planted. necessary.

Other tasks for May include - weeding feeding and mulching borders, deadheading daffodils and hellebores, tying in climbing plants and setting supports for tall and heavy headed perennials.

Flowers to look out for in May – Lilacs, Rhododendrons, Azaleas, Wisterias, Iris and early roses like Canary Bird and Geranium x cantabrigiense

- Prune spring flowering shrubs
- Tie in climbers
- Weed feed and mulch
- Plant summer pots
- Replace hose washers

Clock Tower restoration completed

Family Court changes in 2026: why early advice matters

Families facing court proceedings involving children may soon notice important changes in the way cases are handled.

From 5 May 2026, new Family Court guidance on allocation and gatekeeping in children proceedings is expected to come into force. Issued by the President of the Family Division on 31 March 2026, the guidance is intended to help the court deal with cases more efficiently and ensure that matters are heard at the right level from the outset.

In simple terms, this means the court will place greater emphasis on making sure each case is dealt with by the most appropriate judge. More straightforward cases are likely to be heard by Magistrates, while more complex or serious matters may be allocated to District Judges or Circuit Judges. If a case becomes more complicated as it progresses, it can still be transferred.

Although this may sound like a technical change, it is one that could have a real effect on families. Proceedings concerning children are often stressful, emotional and time sensitive. Any step aimed at reducing delay and improving the use of court resources is likely to be welcomed by parents and carers already dealing with difficult circumstances.

Another notable change is the move to a single, unified framework for both public and private law children cases, replacing the older separate approaches. The overall aim is to create a system that is more consistent, better able to respond to pressure on the courts and more proportionate in the way cases are managed.

For families, one message is clear: early advice matters. The issues raised at the beginning of

a case, the evidence available, and the way concerns are presented can all influence how proceedings develop. Good preparation at an early stage can help families understand their position, focus on the key issues and avoid unnecessary delay.

New laws for dog owners

The Dogs (Protection of Livestock) (Amendment) Act 2025 has now received Royal Assent, giving police stronger powers to tackle livestock worrying.

What is livestock worrying?

A dog does not have to bite or injure livestock for an offence to occur. Chasing, attacking, or even being loose among animals can cause serious stress, injury, abortion in pregnant animals, and in some cases, death.

What's changing?

The new law introduces tougher measures to protect livestock, including increasing the maximum penalty from £1,000 to an unlimited fine. It also extends offences to cover incidents on roads and public paths, not just in fields, and broadens the definition of livestock to include animals such as llamas and alpacas.

Police will now have the power to seize and detain dogs where there is a risk of further incidents, as well as take forensic samples from dogs or livestock to support investigations. In addition, courts may order offenders to pay the costs associated with seizing and keeping a dog.

A reminder to dog walkers

Please keep dogs on a lead when walking near livestock and ensure they are always under close control. Even well-behaved dogs can act unpredictably around farm animals. Being mindful helps protect livestock, supports local farmers, and avoids serious consequences for both dog owners and their pets.

Pond looking its best for Spring

Many of you will have noticed how smart the village pond is looking lately. Our new maintenance contractor has carried out a thorough tidy-up, restoring it just in time for spring.

Reeds, bullrushes, and overgrown grass have been cut back, with weeds, brambles and saplings cleared. Litter was removed, trees pruned, and overhanging vegetation from nearby properties cut back. The duck house was cleaned, debris raked from the pond, and central growth reduced, to maintain open water.

Drainage channels have been cleared, though one blockage remains and has been flagged for further investigation. Additional improvements include mowing, installing a bird box, creating a small log pile for wildlife, and laying a woodchip path to help control weeds.

Wildlife is already thriving, with birds including moorhen, wren, robin, blue tit, great tit, and blackbird seen around the pond. Spring flowers—daffodils, bluebells, hyacinths, primroses, and comfrey—are in bloom, alongside pond plants such as bullrush and *Equisetum japonicum* (horsetail).

We've also had lovely feedback from residents, with one neighbour commenting that it's the best the pond has looked in years.



Busway crossing at Moore Brook

Representatives from Fenstanton, Fen Drayton and Swavesey met up on 8 April 2026 to discuss the best way forward to protect the busway crossing at Moore Brook, adjacent to Paddy's Pond on the RSPB reserve

It was agreed that pursuing a Definitive Map Modification Order (DDMO) with the County Council was the best way forward, based on extensive research.

- 1 x 2lb., loaf tin lined with a parchment greaseproof paper liner.

Method

1. Place margarine, banana, sugar and egg into your jug to blend or liquidiser and blend until smooth.
2. Weigh the flour into a large mixing bowl.
3. Add bicarbonate of soda and salt to the flour and stir to mix.
4. Add the blended banana and sultanas.
5. Mix well.
6. Bake at 140°C in a fan oven or 375°F., for 40/45 minutes.

update

Village meeting

A big thank you from the PC to all residents who attended the annual village meeting (aka the annual parish meeting) on 13 April. These meetings are an ideal opportunity for the PC to update residents about developments, past and planned, in our village.

Refreshments were available after the slide presentation, and our district and county councillors joined our parish councillors in chatting with residents and discussing any concerns.

Busway crossings

The PC chair and clerk, and a village resident, met with colleagues from Fenstanton and Swavesey PCs in early April to discuss protecting the well-used busway crossing at Moore Brook on the RSPB reserve, which is due to be fenced off by the county council later this year.

All agreed that pursuing a Definitive Map Modification Order (DMMO) was the best way forward, based on the resident's extensive research.



If you have used this crossing on a regular basis for several years (20 or more is ideal) and are willing to complete a User Evidence Statement to that effect, please email the parish clerk at: clerk@fendrayton.org. Copies of the form will also be available at the Community Cafe on 9 May.

Cambridge Road improvements

Those of you who use Cambridge Road when joining or leaving the A1307 may have already noticed new signage advising drivers of priorities over the narrow bridge. This was funded by a grant from the Northstowe S106 and the parish council.

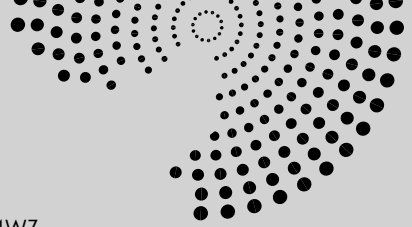

Fen Drayton's Greenways proposal

Fen Drayton residents will soon be invited to complete a questionnaire asking them to consider a new proposal as part of the wider Greenways project. The project aims to improve cycling, walking and horse-riding routes between Cambridge and surrounding villages.

Plans for the Fen Drayton link of the St Ives branch have been discussed for over 10 years, with earlier options ruled out due to issues such as flooding and lighting. The Greenways team is now putting forward a proposal involving the installation of four one-metre-high bollards across Holywell Ferry Road, with additional signage to limit general vehicle access.

The aim is to make the route to the guided busway safer and more pleasant for non-motorised users, while still allowing access for farm vehicles, emergency services

and the RSPB. The scheme also includes regrading the gravel section of the road and creating a bike storage area near the guided bus stop.

Middleton Way

Middleton Way is a private road, solely maintained by the Fen Drayton Road Management Committee and funded by its residents. It is a narrow, single-track road with no footpaths and a 20mph speed limit. Residents have reported speeding vehicles resulting in several near misses, including a child waiting for school transport.

Please would non-residents keep to the Highways-maintained roads (Cootes Lane and Mill Road) for their journeys and not use Middleton Way as a rat run.

Report from the Meeting of the Council dated Monday 13 April

The 2026 Bonfire and Fireworks event

The Council received a verbal update from the Working Group on plans for the 2026 event in November, including proposals about the provision of suitable parking for the occasion. Other details - including pricing and access arrangements - will be published nearer the time.

Green Open Spaces update

The Council agreed: repairs need to be made to the damaged ground around the goalposts and an action plan on how to achieve this in the next few months; also, to seek quotations for cutting back overgrowing and overhanging foliage to facilitate agricultural machinery using the track along the southern boundary of the Wilderness.

Flood Action Working Group

The newly formed Hilton Flood Action Working Group will meet on Tuesday 2nd June. Membership comprises elected Councillors and interested parishioners.

From our County and District Councillors

County Councillor Keane had come to Hilton straight from another meeting. On highways issues he is closely monitoring the A141 / St Ives Improvement Scheme, where changes have already been made following resident feedback. At County Council, he attended (during March): Adults and Health, Assets and Procurement, Full Council and Pension Fund committees. Key decisions included additional funding for drug and alcohol Treatment services and approval of a £58 million highways maintenance programme for 2026/27.

Locally, he attended multiple parish council meetings (including Hilton), community litter picks and civic events, and responded to the

government consultation on Local Government Re-organisation proposals supporting option E, sharing that response with parishes and partners. He remains available to follow up on any local issues raised. District Councillor Tevlin had sent her apologies.

20mph speed restrictions

The Council noted comments made by parishioners about the new arrangements and felt the 20mph speed limit is already making a positive impact.

The Jubilee Playground

The Council received the latest formal safety inspection report on the area and noted where action needed to be taken in the interests and well-being of children using the equipment.

Cricket Courses for young people

It is hoped these will run for up to 7 weeks following the May half-term week. Full details will be published and disseminated as soon as they are finalised.

This was the final meeting before the local elections on May 7th. Seven existing Councillors were nominated and duly elected leaving 2 unfilled places. Councillors Capes and Sarkies had decided not to seek re-election and were thanked for their contribution to the work of Hilton Parish Council over a number of years.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 11th May 2026 in Hilton Methodist Church Hall. Agendas will be issued in advance on the village notice boards and the Council's website www.hiltonparishcouncil.com. Parishioners are welcome to speak on agenda items at council meetings.

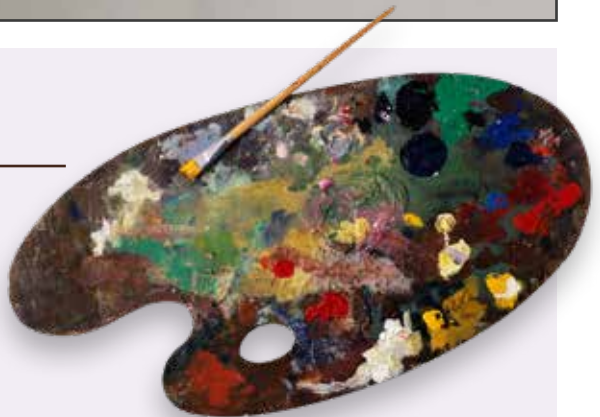

Then - a game of Shipwreck - when Sue and Margaret grouped members into teams with a list supplied by the Maritime and Coastguard Agency of 12 items necessary to rescue to the lifeboat (remember that photo!). The order of importance before a rescue was discussed, aiming to achieve the closest from the list. Intensive debate followed then the official list was announced, top of which is surprising and frankly controversial. If you are curious, maybe make your own list, talk about it and then ask a WI member for the topmost item of the Agency and its supporting reason.

Jane Kennedy is our next speaker on British Sign Language and again, thank you to Mel for providing us with such varieties of speakers with most months now booked well into 2027 and beyond

Our Clubs are flourishing. The Cinema Club recently saw Lee, based on the famous WW2 lady photographer - grim but thought provoking, and Mothers' Provide, such fun and entertaining. We are fortunate to have two venue choices, either Cineworld in Huntingdon or a monthly film at St Ives Corn Exchange where it only costs the public £7.00. That really is an inexpensive evening. The Book Club, Craft Club, Rummikub, Art for Fun Club and fortnightly Canasta continue to flourish.
