# An introduction to British Ants

The Huntingdonshire Local Group of the Wildlife Trust is pleased to welcome Brian Eversham, the Chief Executive of Beds, Cambs and Northants Wildlife Trust. Brian's topic will be An Introduction to Ants and the talk will be held on Wednesday 13 December at 7.30pm at Brampton Memorial Hall.

Brian will introduce us to the habitats and behaviour of ants, explaining that they have some of the most complex and elaborate behaviour of all insects. We will discover their social structure, their complex interactions with other animals and plants, plus their foraging and defensive tactics. Ants are the most accessible and easily identifiable of the social insects, with only about 50 species, a handful of which can be found in our gardens. Brian says that this is a group that anyone can get to know and careful observations can add to our understanding.

# Fen Drayton's new pavilion

#### The new pavilion

Fen Drayton Parish Council proposes to purchase a modular building with fullyfitted changing rooms, similar to those already used by many schools and sports facilities. It is a cheaper, workable solution when compared with a conventional build, which would cost over £300,000. Also, the facility could be expanded in the future if needed. The cost of the new building will be in the region of £75,000. In order to save money, local volunteers and members of the Drayton Lions football club will dismantle the existing pavilion. A local businessman is kindly donating labour and materials for the groundworks.

# £75,000 – how will this be funded?

Funds will be raised from members of the public, the Parish Council, the Drayton Lions football club and grants from local businesses, local councils and national charities such as The Big Lottery and Mick George Community Fund. The pavilion will be available for all Fen Drayton clubs and groups to use – so we hope to benefit from donations from businesses and individuals within the village. Perhaps a local donor may want the pavilion or individual rooms to be named after them? We're open to offers!

Application for a grant must be made in writing and submitted no later than the end by the 30 November 2023 and will be considered by the Fen Drayton Community Trust at their next available meeting.

The form should be put in an envelope marked Community Café and posted into the letter box at the village hall. Alternatively it can be emailed to fendraytoncommunitycafe@gmail.com

Applicant groups will be notified in writing about the result of their application.

## The application should include the following information:

- Name of the group/club/society.
- The group/club/society should be recognised and take place in the village
- How long it's been in existence in Fen Drayton
- Why the application is being made, e.g. what will be purchased with the grant, or what will the grant be put towards, (item/s or activities to be specifically identified with costings)
- Who will benefit from the grant and items/activities
- What will be the nature of the benefits,
   e.g. improve health, skills of participants,
   able to participate in an activity
   previously unaffordable, and how long
   are those benefits expected to last

#### PLEASE NOTE

By applying for the grant the group/club/society give the Community Café permission to publicise that a café grant has enabled the purchase of items/activities.

Priority will be given to applicants who have not received a grant in the last 12 months, however this does not exclude those from applying.

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

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# Hilton a hundred years ago

The census occurs every ten years, but privacy laws prevent the records being available until 100 years later. The results of the 1921 census were released on 06 January 2022, and they contain detailed information about the people of Hilton, their homes and occupations.

The census form, completed by every household on the night of 19 June 1921 recorded 71 occupied dwellings. There were 245 persons in the village on census night, but two were visitors, so the resident population was 243, comprising 126 males and 117 females. These figures do not reflect the national trend, where, as a result of losses during the war, females exceeded males, and on average there were 1,096 women for every 1,000 men. However as anyone passing under the church lych gate will see, the village lost eleven of its menfolk serving their country during the First World War.

The oldest inhabitant was Hilton-born Richard Starling of Wraggs Row who was 89 years old, while the oldest couple were Samuel and Sarah Bedford living on the Potton Road, both 82, born in Fen Drayton. There were 61 children under the age of 14 (the school leaving age) of whom 34 (aged 5-13 inclusive) attended the village school. Three babies had been born in 1921 prior to the census. The population pyramid for Hilton shows a fairly even distribution of persons of all ages.

Over a half of the population (52%) had been born in Hilton, and a further 21% had started their lives in the neighbouring villages of Elsworth, Knapwell, Papworth, Graveley, Yelling, Hemingford Grey, Hemingford Abbots, Fenstanton and Fen Drayton. So almost three quarters of the inhabitants had been born and had lived most of their lives in Hilton and its environs, knowing the local area well and with relatives living nearby.

The most common occupation was agricultural or farm labourer, reflecting the situation of the village in an agricultural part of the country. 45 persons were agricultural labourers, and a further 4 had more specific farm jobs. Percy Yates (Grange Cottage), was a stockman, while Joseph Roslyn (New England), Robert Beck (Potton Road) and Hilton-born John Smith living as a boarder in the Prince of Wales were horsekeepers. Further related occupations included fruit picker, implement repairer and two gamekeepers.

The main employers were:

Frederick Allen Rule of New Farm

Frederick Britten of The Green (later called Park Farm, now replaced with a newer building)

Fred Johnson Furniss and Alfred Steward Furniss of The Grange, often called Furniss Brothers Farm

William Furniss of Cross Roads Farm

Christopher Britten, who described himself as 'Farmer looking after horses and milk etc working at home'.

Other farm-related entries were James Sparrow, poultry farmer on the Hilton Road and Walter Burgess, farm manager for Burgess Brothers, Farmers.

The blacksmith William Thomas Rule lived in Potton Road working in the adjacent forge. He described himself as a shoeing and general blacksmith and indicated that he owned the business. Today his home is called Blacksmith Cottage, and the forge, at the end of the building, has now been incorporated into the redesigned house.

While the farmers lived in large substantial buildings, the living conditions for their employees were very different. Many of their homes have fallen down or been demolished. Wraggs Row comprised three or more dwellings on the Green where Clare Cottage now stands. New England was a terraced row of 8 small houses remembered in the road name off Westbrook. A group of thatched cottages adjoined Tithe Lane, known as The Tithe or Tithe Cottages. Another group was on the Potton Road, south of the Forge.

The Darlow family home was exceptionally crowded. George Darlow was a Telegraph Wireman for the Post Office. He was 52, his wife Mary was 39, and with a teenage step-daughter and step-son and five sons and daughters, these nine persons were squashed into five small rooms which included a kitchen and living room.

Nearby the Beck family had spread into two dwellings. Two rooms were occupied by the three eldest sons: Robert, 34, horsekeeper for farmer Rule, Tom, 32, working for Colonel Douglas, at Lattenbury Farm, Hemingford, and Alfred, 29, labourer on Britten Brothers Farm. In the adjacent property John Beck, 70, the father, worked for farmer Rule. His wife Jane, 68, his step-daughter Sarah Hinson, 45 (an agricultural labourer for R. Newnam of Hemingford Grey) and three teenage granddaughters were living with him. It was guite common for family members to work for different farmers with some employed outside the village. Other occupations in Hilton included Sub Postmaster (Arthur Charter), grocer (Emily Charter), butcher (Frederick Childs), grocer and butcher (Robert Smith), baker (John White), carpenter (George Hurst), carpenter's assistant (Alfred Charter) and roadman (Samuel Martin).

The Old George in Graveley Way was a public house, owned by Charles Tyler, a Licenced Victualler. He lived there with his wife Bessie, and three children. In the Potton Road two public houses stood almost opposite each other. The White Horse (later demolished) was home to the implement repairer Christopher Hardy and his family, but there is nothing in the census to suggest alcohol

was served. Harry Hurst, his wife, son and daughter and three other members of the extended family lived in The Prince of Wales, together with a boarder, but again there is no indication that it was a public house in 1921. The Red Cow does not feature in the census, which suggests that it was about to be sold. The same was true of Hilton House which was



eventually sold to Dr Sidney Peters in 1922.

Some villagers worked in nearby localities, including hospital orderlies at the Papworth Tuberculosis Hospital (Ernest Milbourne and George Dawes) and the dental mechanic in St Ives (Ernest White). Also in St Ives, Roland Ingle was a bank clerk, and John Wright hotel porter at The Golden Lion. Charles Harradine was a motor repairer at Godmanchester and Joseph Carter a bricklayer's apprentice in Fenstanton. William Atter, living at The Cedars (now The Old Rectory), was area manager for a firm manufacturing fire extinguishers, while Henry Tyler of Manor House was a Hotel Proprietor.

Most women were listed as having 'Home Duties'. There were two cooks (one at the Papworth Tuberculosis Hospital), two charwomen, and four domestic servants. Amy Britten and Amelia Mackenzie-Smith were teachers, and Mary Yates was Assistant Overseer and Rate Collector for the Board of Guardians in St Ives.

The famous Scottish painter and artist, Robert Little (born in Greenock), lived in Hilton Hall with his wife Ada and on census night they had two friends from Scotland staying with them, a Glasgow shipowner and his wife. Robert employed two men living in the village, Reuben See as domestic gardener, and Percy Gower as motor driver.

#### Remembering

At the end of October we held our annual service to remember loved ones who had died, recently or a while ago. For some people remembering anniversaries or significant events is an important thing to do. In November, in our benefice, we have our annual services of remembrance. Please see the separate posters for details of the services at Fen Drayton and Fenstanton.

But if you are new to the village where you live you might not know where to find the War Memorials mentioned in the posters. So, for those who need to know, the Fen Drayton War Memorial is where Church Street/Horse & Gate Street/Honey Hill all meet. Please be careful where there are no pavements. The Fenstanton War Memorial is in Fenstanton Parish Council Cemetery near School Lane. The Cemetery is often mistakenly thought to be part of the churchyard. The path separating the two areas helps to identify which part you are in, churchyard or cemetery.

Identity of place and remembering can be helpful in a time of grief and bereavement, although not always. Sometimes it is all too painful depending on who or what we are remembering. I remember that my auntie mourned the loss of my uncle for many years, much to my mum's curiosity, as she couldn't understand why her sister didn't just 'get over it'. I am sure I will not be the only one who can say - my dad went away to war and came back a different person. I have a special remembrance poppy brooch, given to me as my dad served in the Army during WWII. It says on the back: Remembered on 11th November – Lest We Forget. My dad spoke very little about his time abroad. I know he went to Egypt. A printer by trade, he and some mates were involved in a newspaper appropriately called 'The Sphinx' and I keep meaning to research this further. Apparently, there are copies of it in the British Library Archives. Dad returned to the UK, after the war, via Europe as did many service personnel but not all of them....his memories of those times were so difficult he refused to speak about them.

In my own remembering each year, on Remembrance Sunday, I pray for all those who have been or are in times of conflict. I do mean all because my hope is that we will all, whoever we are and no matter where we call home, live in peace in this life, not forgetting those who are now at peace in eternal life. May they rest in peace and rise in glory.

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# Hilton Methodist Church

I write in the week of unseasonal good weather back in October. It was also the week when the world became significantly more unstable with the dramatic escalation of hostilities in Israel and the shocking extent of the attacks on innocent civilians by both sides. The implications will affect us all.

Although Remembrance Day, poppies spreading throughout the country in witness to lives lost, seems ever more poignant, remembering and knowing has not prevented or even reduced death and destruction through war and conflict.

In the same week our guest preacher at Hilton's Methodist Church was Dr Roland Randall, speaking of climatic change, the reason for our clement weather in early October. Highlighting the impact on those with the least in other parts of the world, Dr Randall also told us of increasing impact on the mental health of our young people as existence on our planet becomes ever more fragile. In the face of global powers, political and economic that feel increasingly impossible to have any influence over, I wonder how much unvoiced feelings of impotency play a part.

As I watched the destruction in Israel, I remembered the man born there 2000 years ago. Christ sacrificed his life due to living out a different set of values that challenged the status quo in his day.



Can I not reclaim my agency just a little and sacrifice something of the convenience of my life?

It won't help the conflict in Israel right now but if those of us who can make choices about how we live can't even use our power to, at the very least, demonstrate non-complicity with systems that damage and impede the life of others, how are we to support our young people to retain a sense of self determination and confidence in their power a make a difference to the world they will have to live in?

# **Hilton Parish Church**

#### Dear Friends,

Archibald Fleming was the first translator of the Gospel of John into Inuktitut, the language of the Inuit, also known as Eskimos. The Gospel tells how, when Jesus rose from the dead and appeared to his disciples, they were filled with joy. Fleming somehow couldn't find the right Inuktitut phrase for 'filled with joy'. One day, he was watching people feed their huskies, and as the meat was



given to the dogs they were leaping and yowling with excitement. Fleming turned to someone nearby and said, 'That's the feeling I want to express; how would you describe the dogs at this moment?' His Inuit friend gave him a phrase, and Fleming hurried to write it down. He came back and read out that verse from the Gospel in Inuktitut, ending with his newly-learned words. His Inuit listeners fell about laughing – what Fleming had written was, 'When the disciples saw the Lord, they wagged their tails.'

The Hebrew and Greek words of the Bible have been translated into over 3,500 other languages. Miles Coverdale published the first complete translation of the Bible into English in 1535. Not everyone finds in the Bible a signpost to God as the source of life and love, but what Coverdale did has had a profound influence on all English speakers. He brought something precious within the reach of all, and in effect said to ordinary people, 'Your understanding and your insight matter, and you have the right to writings that can expand your horizons and hopes.' Much of our modern world has flowed from this gift, from scientific discovery to political freedoms. But still for billions those words do indeed lead to new life in God. They can do for me and you today.

# Life on a Plate

# Sausage Chilli Casserole

#### Ingredients (serves 4)

- 12 tasty sausages
- 1 x white or red onion
- 1 x 500ml Passata or 2 tins of chopped tomatoes
- 1 x beef stock cube
- 2 x tins of mixed beans in water
- 1 x large tin of baked beans
- 1 x punnet of mushrooms
- 1 x bag of curly kale
- 1 tsp mixed herbs
- 2 tsp chilli powder
- 1 tsp brown sauce

#### Preperation

Soften the onion in a pan with a little oil and remove from the pan

Brown the sausages in the pan

Throw all of the ingredients (apart from the kale) in a cooking pot with lid and stir well. Put in the sausages and onion, put the lid on and slam in the oven! Cook for one hour at 180c.

OR put in a cooking pot on the hob, put on the lid and cook on low for an hour and a half, stirring occasionally to stop it from sticking

OR place all ingredients (apart from the kale) in the slow cooker for 3 hours on high.

Add the kale and cook for a further 5 minutes in oven or on hob.

If cooking in the slow cooker stir the kale in and cook for a further 20 mins.

Serve casserole with garlic bread to dip into the sauce.

This is a great dish to serve after trick or treat, or after watching fireworks on bonfire night!

## **Carrots** by Claire Sarkies

#### Success in the garden!

Carrots do not thrive in clay soil and sowing carrot seed in some Hilton gardens can end in disappointment. However, this year's crop from the Community Garden was positively photogenic!



Snapped as they left the ground you can see how numerous, healthy and well-formed they are. We were still harvesting them in the first week of October.

#### **Raised beds**

The virtue of a raised bed is that the soil can be adjusted to suit the seeds. Carrots hate too much nitrogen, so manure and fertilisers are not advised. They enjoy lighter, preferably sandy soil, which can be achieved by adding soil improvers and organic matter. The other trick is to find the right companions to share the bed. Root wrecking carrot flies are drawn to the vegetable's sweet smell, but they can be put off by stronger, less enticing smells such as onions and marigolds. Hence we edged the bed with marigolds and put in some onion sets for good measure. Marigolds give wonderful summer long colour and the onions were good too.

#### **Carrotty facts**

Carrots are an ancient food source. Seeds have been found in Switzerland and

Southern Germany dating back to 2000-3000 years BC.

Carrots we now assume to be orange but 'heirloom' seeds remind us that before the era of mass marketing, there was more diversity, so carrots could be black, purple, red, white or yellow (at least on the outside).

Carotene (meaning from a carrot): betacarotene is a pigment found in plants that gives a yellow/orange colour. Carotene is used in the food industry to colour juices, cakes, butter and margarine. They don't help you see in the dark and if you eat a lot of them you won't turn orange.

#### Recipe: Autumn soup

This tasty soup is easy to make and uses simple ingredients. You can reduce or increase the spice content to suit your family's palate.

To make a very local version: come to the Community Garden next September to collect all the ingredients any Saturday morning between 10.00 and 12.00

#### Ingredients

600g chopped carrots

200g sliced leeks

1 onion chopped

4 sundried or fresh tomatoes

600ml stock or water

A few sprigs of thyme

 $^{1\!\!/_2}$  tablespoon of smoked paprika and a few chilli flakes

#### Preperation

Simply sauté the leeks and onions in a little oil or butter until they soften, (or pop them in a micro-wave.) Add the carrots, tomatoes, stock, herb and spices. Bring to the boil, then simmer for roughly 20 minutes. Liquidise or pulp with a soup wand.

If you have any left over, it freezes well.

#### Village Hall Management Committee Representative

#### **Health Inequalities Grant**

Following the success of this year's grant, the Council has appointed a working group of Cllr Claire Sarkies, Cllr Rob Dulstone, Cllr Sarah Suckling, Cllr Matt Stott and Cllr Richard Norton to make a proposal for this year's grant bid to present to Council.

#### Defibrillator

Hilton Parish Council has granted permission for a defibrillator to be installed on the

Pavilion, subject to a grant and donations to cover the cost. The Clerk will make the grant application.

#### Weed Management

The Council has resolved to respond to the Cambridgeshire County Council weed management survey.

#### Action on Energy Cambridgeshire Autumn Event

Cllr Richard Norton will attend this event on behalf of the Council.

#### **Maintenance Person**

The Council has now appointed a Maintenance Person. The Clerk will carry out the induction process in October.



The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 6th November 2023 in Hilton Village Hall. Agendas will be issued in advance on the village notice boards and the Council's website www.hiltonparishcouncil.com. Parishioners are welcome to speak at council meetings on agenda items.

# **Doctor Dolittle**

Lock down saw 25% of households in the UK acquire a new pet and as a result dog ownership in the country is now a staggering 12 million. On average owners spend £500 pa on their dogs and this has seen a massive growth in the dog grooming business which now employs 80,000 in the UK across 12,000 registered organisations.

One of the best groomers in the country, Fairy Dog Mother, is situated on the High Street in Fenstanton. And, if you have any doubt of their standing, the walls of the salon are festooned with competition winner rosettes and trophies.

Kara Boyd, now aged 30, the owner of the salon enjoys competition and when she is not competing in regional or national grooming events she is either playing netball or racing cars with her brother and father. It was Kara's competitive edge that took her to the quarter finals of the popular BBC1 programme Pooch Perfect.

"I was the youngest competitor," Kara explains. "It was the hardest thing I have done and it was extremely difficult not telling anyone that I was doing the TV programme. It was more scary than receiving the SME Young Business Person of the Year Award at Wembley Arena. Having won the Cambridgeshire title I was invited to the awards dinner thinking it would be nice thing to go to for my family. My parents were in tears when I was announced as the overall winner!"

These are great accolades for Kara who after leaving school with her interest in animals starting working as a kennel maid. Very quickly she applied for a job at Pets at Home when they opened their grooming centre in Huntingdon. By 20 she was managing the outlet and by 21 she had left to set up her own grooming salon. "I started really small, even though it was a gutsy thing to do to set up my own business. I had to work as a carer both ends of the day to keep some money coming in. Slowly I built up the business and in 2019 I opened Fairy Dog Mother on the High Street. This was a very busy year for me as I gave birth to my son, Arthur, who is now four and attends the village school. I never seem to do things by half!"

Kara, who lives in Fenstanton and originates from Papworth Everard, now has customers who come from all over the country with

regulars from Milton Keynes and London. She even has one customer with his dog Alan who lives in Gibraltar.

"I think dog grooming is not just about washing and trimming dogs, it is also about dog socialisation. It is amazing how all the dogs get on so well, even the infamous XL Bully dogs which are as soft as butter when they are here with us. I believe a lot of dog aggression is created by their owners. Dogs are incredibly sensitive animals and they know when their owner is scared. Or, maybe I am secretly a Doctor Dolittle."

So what is next for Kara? "I have now been nominated for the Liz Paul Grooming Awards in the category 'Up and Coming Groomer of the Year'. However, my real ambition is to set up an academy to train anyone, young or old, to become a dog groomer leading towards a City and Guild qualification or the coveted international recognised standard ICMG."

Considering what Kara has done already, it will be a surprise if she does not achieve her new goal.

#### Message from the chair

At the beginning of October, I met our MP, Anthony Browne, to discuss issues affecting Fen Drayton. We had a wideranging discussion, but a good part of it was spent on the recent upsurge in criminal activity in the village. Mr Browne has set up a meeting with the Police and Crime Commissioner for Cambridgeshire to talk about the problems we're having and to ask what measures they will take to reduce crime in the village.

We also discussed the risk of flooding and hopefully a meeting can be arranged with the whole catchment area, Environment Agency, Cambridge Water and Cambridge County Council to coordinate planning. It's vital we work together to minimise future flooding.

Access to public transport and affordable housing were also on the agenda.

#### Crime

There has been an upsurge in criminal activity in the village, mostly burglaries from sheds and outbuildings. With the nights drawing in this is a good time to



remind ourselves of the police advice on reducing theft from outbuildings:

- Ensure your insurance covers theft from sheds and outbuildings
- Don't leave tools and equipment outside
- Always keep sheds and outbuildings locked. The police recommend using two large hasps and staples on doors plus two closed shackle padlocks on the outside
- Secure windows with internal diamond mesh grilles
- · Property mark your tools
- If you don't have a shed, wrap a heavy padlock around tools and secure to an anchor device.



Wanted - School Governor



## Poppy will do it!

Anyone can be a Scout, and nobody demonstrates that better than Poppy Gowler, who has been volunteering with 1st Fenstanton & Hilton Scouts for over 50 years, and celebrated her 90th birthday in September. When Poppy first moved to Fenstanton decades ago, people told the vicar: *'if you want anything doing, Poppy will do it.'* And that still rings true today.

Poppy has supported generations of Scouts, and has never been afraid to get involved. Her energy and enthusiasm continues to shine through. From a Scout Jamboree in Kent, to a trip to Brownsea Island (the site of the first ever Scout camp), Poppy has taken young people on countless trips away and was camping with us, sleeping in a tent, until just a few years ago. Her determination knows no bounds, as we saw when the Scouts visited an outdoor assault course... as usual, Poppy joined in with the Scouts and successfully scaled the highest obstacle on the course, much to the amazement of the instructors who said she was the oldest person to have achieved it. Poppy said:

'There's no such thing as can't. You can. Where there's a will, there's a way. I chose to go over the highest obstacle but if I'd had my trainers and not my good trousers, I could have done the crawling under all the nets too. I would have gone through the mud. Like the instructor said: if you keep walking, you don't sink in.'

Poppy often tells parents that if they're not involved, they don't know what they're missing! She shows that Scouts is just as much fun for the adults too. Poppy's attitude is rooted in her ethos that while Scouts is all about young people learning skills for life, adults can also learn a lot from the young people themselves:

'I'm quite prepared to get down and do what they do or get involved. We learn from each other. When you open yourself up to learn from them, you're not talking down to them, you're with them. I think it's Scouts that keeps me fit, keeps me involved, keeps me with the young



folk. I've adapted as my children grew up and I think that's what makes a difference — that I can adapt to things and still enjoy it.'

Two trees will be planted adjacent to Bay 3 and your Parish Council will be planting a further four trees in the coming weeks.

- 2) To reduce the running costs of the operations as part of the overall need to reduce costs across the Council as part of its budget planning process.

Your Parish Council is concerned about the detrimental effects leaving the weeds may have, possibly causing blockages in our drains and damage to footpaths. Therefore, as a one-off, your Parish Council will carry out the work using a qualified Contractor at the earliest opportunity when the correct conditions allow.

# Afoot in the Garden

## Preparing for the Winter ahead

The ghosts, ghouls and witches have eaten the last of the pumpkin pie and toffee apples await the bonfires. It's muddy grass season again and most of autumn's leaves are on the ground. Oak and beech leaves are among the last to fall. Garden bed and border preparation, seed sowing, planting, pruning and mulching are among gardeners' November tasks.

## Planting, sowing and pruning

November is still a good time to plant trees, shrubs and autumn bulbs, Sow sweet peas and hardy annuals in the flower garden, broad beans and peas in the vegetable garden. In frames you can sow hardy veg-like radish, spinach, lettuce, endive, chicory and spring onions. Dried foliage on herbaceous perrenials can be tidied up. Small garden and fruit trees can be pruned as can roses, shrubs and climbers.

Other than soil problems the two main reasons lawns become muddy is wear and shade. Wear is often a problem at the point where you first step onto a lawn especially from a step. The simple answer is 'lay a paving slab'. Lawns in shade can be improved by pruning back overhanging plants and sowing shady mix lawn seed over the area. Lawn sand is ideal in shady areas as it controls moss and improves drainage.

Autumn leaves are among gardeners' free friends. Rake them off lawns and into borders or collect them for your compost bin. You could use accelerators or a nitrogen rich fertiliser to aid composting. We had an eccentric Scottish lady who when we asked for access to her toilet, produced a large jug! Her instructions for the end of the day were pore the contents on the 'wee' compost heap and 'don't forget to wash the jug out!' So a free accelerator is always available! raypuddefoot@gmail.com





# An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

# RSPB

Low Hill is an unassuming yet fascinating feature of Fen Drayton Lakes. It lies within Elney Lake (historically known as Low Fen), on a peninsula which protrudes in from the western side. For most people visiting, it merely looks like a raised mound covered by grass with a margin of reeds, but that belies the history that lies underneath.

Until recently we didn't know much about it but learned more thanks to the work of a student, James Foard, who brought together literature from various sources during his studies and shared them with us.

Low Hill is a type of 'bowl barrow' or tumulus, a mound of earthen construction about 25m in diameter by 1m high. Barrows were sites where burials were made. These were sometimes for just one person or for multiple people. Burial mounds were often built on higher ground so their cultural significance would be visible to people. Finding higher ground is a tricky ask in the fens as there are few areas with suitable topography, so this early example was built up artificially to raise it above the level of the floodplain.

Due to the shape and structure of the barrow, it is thought to pre-date the Romans and is suspected to be from the Bronze Age. Barrows from this period are rare features within Cambridgeshire and this one represents an excellent example, being of a large size and well preserved.

However, there are some unknowns as to what else very early examples may have been used for since they were created. Within the Ouse Valley, two thirds of barrows have been found to be either reused, modified or incorporated into other monuments over time.

The site has never been excavated so these facets of its history can only be alluded to, based on similar sites elsewhere. Thus, what is known about Low Hill is not a complete picture and one which likely has more stories to tell. In the eyes of James, it stands "as a monument to the people that have lived and died here throughout prehistory and their lost funerary traditions and ritual practices".

When the area was dug out for gravel in the 1990s, Low Hill was preserved. We maintain the monument nowadays by making sure scrub and trees don't take over and affect the archaeology within. It is a great corner for wildlife, and we have even found Harvest Mouse nests in the grass there. Over time we plan to make more of it by installing an information board at the viewpoint by the guided busway.



## Wednesday Wander
