

Fenstanton Glebe Allotment Association Autumn Newsletter



It seems only five minutes ago that the allotments were beginning to show new shoots of growth and now we have

almost finished harvesting the summer fruit and vegetables and are starting to clear away the remnants of these crops. Now is the time to prepare overwintering of the beds with mulch and cardboard or fleece, whilst keeping an eye on winter crops such as parsnips, brussels, cabbage, kale and leeks.

It has been a very good growing season, despite the weather and the various slugs and snails, and many plot holders have had a bumper crop of tomatoes. Even green tomatoes can be made into chutney.

We had a children's competition to grow the tallest sunflower during the summer and the winners were Finley and Jacob Taylor with a sunflower measuring 205cm. Well done! The prize was mini gardening tools to encourage them to grow an even taller sunflower next year.


Peter Blake



Updates from Clare Tevlin, your District Councillor

Local Plan:

Huntingdonshire District Council (HDC) is calling on the community to participate in the Local Plan Engagement 2024 - a crucial consultation process, running until 27 November, that will shape the future of Huntingdonshire.

HDC is seeking feedback on several key documents that are essential to the planmaking process. These include:

- Further Options and Issues Paper 2024: This document outlines various options for addressing a series of important issues facing the district.
- Land Availability Assessments: An assessment of sites that were submitted to the council that could be suitable for development.
- Sustainability Appraisals: An analysis of site proposals and options based on their economic, environmental, and social impact.

Under a franchised network, the Combined Authority would contract private bus operators to run services on its behalf but have control over the routes, frequency, fares and overall standards of the region's buses.

Now is the time for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough to review how its buses are operated, to improve services for all. The bus franchising consultation runs until Wednesday 20 November 2024. 


A letter from the home front By Malcolm Lynn

In the early years of the last century, most people kept in touch by letter and postcards, as only very rich people had telephones. Some of the letters and postcards which were sent by members of my family in the early years of the 20th Century have survived and I would like to share this one, which was written in 1916, during the First World War.

The letter-writer, Ethel Walker, was living in Manchester and the recipients were in a small village in north Nottinghamshire. In this letter, Ethel describes some of the effects of the war on everyday life in Manchester and also some of the experiences of her brother, Erny, who has returned home from the front line in France.

Transcript of a letter, (original opposite) from Ethel Walker (my grandmother's cousin), to my great-grandmother and her daughters, Mary and Emily Walker. Ethel, Mary and Emily were all in their mid-20s when the letter was written.





My dear Aunt & Cousins,

Thank you very much for your kind letter, I am glad things are a little more settled now for you. It is so long since I wrote to you I am afraid it will almost give you a shock to have a letter from me. (Now, Emily were you smiling?). Eva (Ethel's sister) has gone to spend the week end with a friend of hers at Bradford, so there are only three of us at home. We had a very quiet Christmas, as neither of the boys were home. Arthur intended coming home but we received a wire from him on Xmas Eve that some munition machinery had broken down & he would have to go & attend to it.

You will probably be surprised to hear we have had Erny (brother) home for 10 days. He had been back in France fourteen months again after being wounded before, & had been 3 months on the Somme, when, after helping to capture the village of Flers, he when [sic] off altogether & collapsed; he was very ill I believe & had to be tied & bound to a stretcher & was taken to a field hospital, then to the base, & next to Boulogne, where he was well looked after. Then the doctor said he must return to England. So he was sent to a private hospital in Sussex (one of Lord Brassey's Houses) where he stayed two months. One night while there (he told us) he thought in his sleep he was in a bombing raid, & got up shouting "Over the top, boys" & jumped on the man in the next bed & knocked him about dreadfully. Of course he didn't know until the next morning when everybody chaffed him about it. It seems he had too much to do on the Somme, he was the only officer in the platoon for two months.

We were glad to see him again; he arrived on the night of a Zeppelin scare & about 7 o'clock I lighted the hall lamp & put the other lights on at full & said I didn't care what the police said, as I was going to have a bright house and welcome Erny home. Anyhow about 9 o'clock the lights began to go low & by the time Erny arrived we had only candles. Of course the Zepps did not come, but the lights went off in case they did arrive.

It is very dark in the streets here now & the shops close at 8 o'clock, but of course we make the best of it.

Erny had a great many tales to tell us; he was in the village of Guillemont when the "Tanks" were first used. The men had orders to attack the Germans in the main street; they took half of the street, & paused; the other half was bristling with German machine guns & the houses were like forts pouring out shells all the time. Then the men got orders to hold where they were, & up came a "tank"; Erny said the British were scared of it, never mind the huns; anyhow it went straight up the street, right through the houses and out the other side, meanwhile the huns flew in every direction, & hundreds of our Tommies lives were saved.

I don't know whether I am boring you with this news but I could write all night about his adventures, so perhaps I had better conclude. It does seem a long time since I saw any of you but hope we shall meet again before very long, and trust this coming year will bring you more happiness than 1916.



Trains, Boats and Planes

The eighth Wonder of the World

Visiting Sagrada Família, the iconic cathedral designed by Antoni Gaudí in Barcelona, is a mesmerising experience that combines architecture, history, and spirituality. The basilica, which has been under construction since 1882, is one of the most extraordinary landmarks in the world and a UNESCO World Heritage site. Even though it remains unfinished, the Sagrada Família draws millions of visitors annually, offering them a unique blend of modernist design, religious symbolism, and artistic ingenuity.

Arrival and first impressions

As you approach the cathedral, its towering spires dominate the skyline, standing out against the backdrop of modern Barcelona. Gaudí's vision of a "church for the poor" is immediately apparent in its scale and ambition. The cathedral is not just a building; it's a visual narrative that unfolds as you explore it. The exterior façades are adorned with detailed sculptures and biblical scenes, drawing your eye to intricate elements even from a distance.

lifetime, celebrates the birth of Christ and is full of naturalistic detail, reflecting Gaudí's deep love of nature. In contrast, the Passion Facade, designed after Gaudí's death, depicts the suffering and crucifixion of Christ in a more austere, minimalist style. Each façade tells its own story, giving you a sense of the journey through Christ's life.


Inside the basilica

Once inside, you are immediately struck by the soaring columns and the beautiful natural

light filtering through the stained glass windows. Gaudí's inspiration from nature is evident in the tree-like columns that seem to reach up and branch out towards the ceiling, creating the impression of walking through a stone forest. The columns are not just structural but symbolic, with each one representing a different biblical figure or saint. The interior is a symphony of colour and light, thanks to the large, vibrant stained-

glass windows that flood the space with different hues depending on the time of day. In the morning, the windows on the eastern side bathe the interior in warm oranges and yellows, while the western windows bring in cool blues and greens in the afternoon. This play of light creates an ever-changing atmosphere inside the basilica, where you can sit and contemplate the interplay of colours and shapes.

Gaudí's vision and symbolism

Gaudí, who took over the project in 1883, was not just an architect but a visionary. His design for the Sagrada Família is a blend of Gothic and Art Nouveau styles, but what sets it apart is the rich symbolism infused in every detail. The layout of the basilica follows a Latin cross plan, with towering spires that represent the Twelve Apostles, the Virgin Mary, the Four Evangelists, and the tallest one in the center symbolising Jesus Christ. When completed, the central tower will rise 172.5 meters, making it the tallest religious building in Europe.

The architectural details throughout the cathedral are imbued with religious meaning. For instance, the vaulted ceilings and hyperboloid shapes mimic the forms found in nature, which Gaudí believed were God's creation. He used natural forms not only for aesthetic reasons but also as an expression of his deep faith. Walking through the Sagrada Família, you can see how his devotion is reflected in the very fabric of the building.

Climbing the towers

One of the highlights of visiting the cathedral is the opportunity to climb one of its towers,

offering breathtaking views of Barcelona. You can either take an elevator or climb the narrow spiral staircase to the top. Once there, the panoramic view reveals the sprawling city, with its mix of ancient and modern architecture framed by the Mediterranean Sea in the distance. The climb itself is an exhilarating experience, as the towers are intricately designed and filled with small windows that provide glimpses of the city below.

You must book

Visiting the cathedral is an unforgettable journey into the mind of one of the greatest architects in history. It's a place where art, faith, and nature come together to create something truly extraordinary. Gaudí's masterpiece, though still unfinished, stands as a testament to human creativity and devotion, leaving you in awe of its beauty and grandeur. Whether you're an art lover, a history enthusiast, or simply someone seeking inspiration, the Sagrada Família is a must.

Floods in Fen Drayton get worse

This September going into October, the RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes, the High Street, Daintrees Road area and the recreational ground have once again flooded. As you can see from the photographs taken at the time it is getting worse. People have reported that as other people walk past their houses water washes into their front room. Amazon delivery drivers couldn't reach their destinations due to flooding. Council employees were unable to close valves for drains, because the water was too deep.



A flood in 2013 caused a seal to swim an estimated more than 50 miles along a flooded river to the RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes where

it was filmed "hopping" into a lake. A man stated he thought it was a dog drowning, but he took a closer look which revealed it was in fact a seal. It was spotted five years later swimming down a river.

Three out of four sluice gates in St Ives are broken. And, Bedford had to let their water out of their sluice gates because their gates couldn't hold it anymore.

The high street is often too deep on the grass for some welly boots and it is looking quite rainy for the rest of the coming weeks.



How could you protect your house from a flood?

Firstly, to be prepared for the next flood, buy sand bags to put around the door, roughly four high, if you have stairs going up to the house five to six sand bags two wide at the front and one wide on the sides. Then if you have any plywood, build a box around the door and seal it. Every time it floods you can then put the box and sand bags down quickly. Be prepared to add stability to the wood so have 2"x 4" timbers going across to help it stay robust. That way you can pop it in front of the door every year along with the sand bags.



Ever felt you were living in a parallel universe? As I write, my sister has been on the phone asking for ideas for Christmas presents and the shops are filling with Christmas paraphernalia (she always gets in first!). The nation's mind seems focussed on the pending budget alongside the contents of Keir Starmer's wardrobe.

At the same time, we have seen the first anniversary of Hamas' atrocities on Israelis with many hostages still captive, and a year of Israeli retaliation (currently being investigated as genocide) now spreading to Syria and Lebanon. Mentions of World War 3 are made and are not mad mutterings. I wonder what the world will look like by the time you read this, just a few weeks on.

Most of us prefer to ignore what we can't control or influence especially all the while we are not directly affected. The AA mantra, adopted from the theologian, Niebuhr, comes to mind - calling for serenity in the face of that we cannot change, courage to change the things we can and the wisdom to know the difference.

There is little we can, individually, do to influence the world stage. But if you want serenity don't ignore the little. Remember the butterfly effect – the work of the mathematician Lorenz, otherwise known as Chaos Theory - demonstrating how something as small as the flapping of fragile wings in one part of the world contributes to the intensity and path of a tornado in another.

How each of us flaps our wings, how we live our lives, matters. The reality is that he world as we know it teeters on the edge of chaos in all sorts of ways right now.

- Glue a paper straw to the back.

TIPS:

- Roll your straw up in green paper, or paint it beforehand for an aesthetically pleasing finish.
- Add some mini pom-poms in the middle to really give it the WOW factor.

Local Plan Consultation

Huntingdonshire District Council is consulting on the revision of their adopted Local Plan. The Call for Sites has identified 4 separate sites in Hilton:

- · Land West of Potton Road
- · Land East of The Paddocks
- · Land North of New England
- · Land North of High Street

The current consultation is in three parts. The land availability consultation evaluates the proposed sites. This paper discounts the land north of New England due to the flood risk and reduces the proposed number of properties on the land West of Potton Road. The sustainability appraisal looks at the sustainability of Hilton and scores it against the set criteria. The further issues and options paper consults potential strategy and policy areas. Non-Court Dispute Resolution – New rules to guide separating couples and parents away from Court

Non-Court Dispute Resolution (NCDR) is a current buzzword in the Family Law world. Following recent rule changes, if someone is thinking of going to Court over family matters, whether in relation to a financial dispute with their spouse in divorce proceedings, or a disagreement with their spouse or former partner over children arrangements, they must now show active attempts to resolve their disputes by alternative means before making an application to the Court. These attempts do not end even after an application to the Court is made and must continue at various stages throughout their case whilst it is ongoing. For example, parties will now need to complete a form shortly before each Court hearing setting out their views on using NCDR as a method of settling their dispute.

Non-Court Dispute Resolution includes mediation, arbitration, private hearings (where the parties agree to appoint an experienced family law barrister as a private Judge to try and resolve their dispute) and collaborative family law.

NCDR has a reputation of being less confrontational, quicker and as a result often more cost effective than the Court process. Early resolution may also aid in preserving relationships. This is particularly important in cases where co-parenting is involved.

Until now, the Courts have not really pushed the non-Court method, one of the sticking points being that no one can be forced to negotiate as it is a voluntary process. Therefore, if one party does not want to engage with mediation, for example, then the whole process can fail. However, following the introduction of the new rules, this is likely to change. We may now see the Court compelling parties to attempt to resolve their disputes in an alternative way even if the parties are not necessarily keen to do so. The parties are also being encouraged to engage with NCDR to avoid the risk of a Court imposing

a costs Order against them for increasing the other party's legal costs unnecessarily for refusing to engage in NCDR.

Whilst the new rules stop short of mandating NCDR, they definitely tip the scales in its favour. The strong message is that separating couples and parents must try to agree matters out of Court first or risk the Court penalising them for avoiding NCDR. The aim being to reduce the number of disputes that go to Court which should benefit everyone involved in family Court proceedings with the significant delays in the Court system. This could have the advantage of a quicker settlement at a lower cost and more amicable resolution in family disputes.

Which NCDR option that is most suitable to you will be entirely dependent on the circumstances of your case. We believe these structures play a crucial role in helping to prevent flooding in Fenstanton and the surrounding areas. We are committed to continuing to work closely with other local authorities and interested parties to ensure the Environment Agency does all it can to make the repairs possible, and to help protect our community from future flood risks.



Inconsiderate parking



This subject seems to be a regular theme in our recent Parish Council reports.

Rookery Way residents have long faced the challenges of dangerous and inconsiderate parking practices, including blocked driveways, particularly since the Post Office moved its location. The recent roadworks exacerbated the issue. Furthermore, homes situated between traffic lights often have limited visibility, making it difficult to determine when the lights are red. This can lead to dangerous situations, as residents may exit their driveways and encounter oncoming vehicles, please be aware.

Your Parish Council has also received reports of dangerous parking near the junction by the United Reformed Church in Church Lane. There have been several accidents here and inconsiderate parking can make visibility even more of an issue at this already tricky junction. We remind all residents to be mindful of their parking habits and utilise designated parking areas whenever possible.

A new bench for the village

Following a request made by a resident, your Parish Council has agreed to purchase and install a new bench near the village sign. We hope the bench will provide a more comfortable seating option than the base of the sign itself.

New tree planting initiative – A tree for your garden

Your Parish Council remains committed to its tree planting initiative as part of our zero emissions efforts. Sprinkle 3 or 4 tablespoons of Demerara sugar on top of the cream


To caramelise, place the dish under a very hot grill or use a kitchen blow lamp


Put the dish immediately into the oven fridge for about 3 hours until it's all firm.

The local tooth fairy

Kiran and Ajay Patel spent three years looking for their next house move before finding a suitable property in Fenstanton.

"We were living in St Ives with our two children and were keen to find a property where I could establish my own practice", Kirán explains. She is a qualified dentist having originally studied human biology in Manchester, Kiran then spent a further five years studying dentistry qualifying in 2010. Her early school life was very transient as her father served in the RAF having joined at 16 and she studied wherever he was posted. Her parents were Ugandan refugees having fled their home country as part of the Idi Amin expulsion in the seventies. Arriving in the UK with only what they could carry, they took refuge in Leicester. Kiran's grandmother who is 91 has remained there and she visits her often.

"My father saw action in The Falklands and in Afghanistan before retiring from the service after 35 years of active duty. He now has the most unlikely job as a Guinness Book of Records adjudicator", Kiran continues. "He definitely installed in me his work ethic and now I could not be busier. When not practising as a dentist I volunteer with DentAid helping deliver their BrightBites programme. This involves visiting schools and educating children about the importance of dental care





through practical fun activities. I have already

done a session in the local primary school and I am going to the nursery next week. Our children are the key to good future dental

For Kiran child dental care is close to her heart and she cannot wait until she can offer this service to local children in her practice, but that is not as easy as it sounds. "I wish I could flick a switch and start taking on NHS patients. I have to wait until a local tender comes up for renewal to undertake the work and even then we have to bid for the work, hoping our bid is sufficient and successful. And, we will be bidding against other dentists who already have the contract. I think it is criminal that the population has grown and there is no provision for extra dental contracts in the area. Until then to survive we have to rely on private patients and I work elsewhere to balance the books."

To try and bridge the gap in child dental care at her practice Kiran offers a cost-effective private insurance plan called Practice Plan and any adult undertaking an initial assessment can have their child, under five, assessed free of charge. If the new patient were to join the scheme then their children would receive regular free dental appointments.

When asked what Kiran does when not working she replied, "My two children are everything to me and it is difficult balancing being a full-time mum and a dentist at the same time. There are multiple clubs, karate, swimming and football to name a few. My son plays for the under 10 Fenstanton team so I spend a lot of time on the sidelines! And, like my parents did with me I will be encouraging a good education amongst my children."

September/October floods

Following the heavy rain in the last week of September, the water levels in the River Great Ouse rose dramatically and floods ensued - the earliest time in the autumn that anyone could remember!

In Fen Drayton heavy rainfall caused an increase in the water level in Oxholme Drain that runs alongside the High Street. Within two days the High Street and Daintrees Road were flooded to a depth impassable for cars. The road was closed to prevent vehicles driving too fast through the flood water and causing bow waves. The Fen Drayton flood group and residents worked together to minimise the chance of any houses being flooded.

The major issue was the lack of access for emergency vehicles: an ambulance to attend to a small child and a fire engine to deal with a car stuck in the flood.

At the request of the parish council earlier this year, Cambridgeshire County Council agreed to put one-way valves on the road drains at the south end of the High Street. These should be fitted by the end of October. They will delay the flooding of the road, not prevent it.



To seek a long term solution, the parish council met with CCC, its consultants (Atkins) and SCDC on 1 October. The PC presented data and analysis and suggested some short and long term actions. At the meeting, the key issue became the current flood. Cllr Mandy Smith, our county council representative, tried to get CCC to do something immediately, but, given the extent and amount of flooding across the county, a short term fix was not possible. Fortunately, the water receded within a few days as the river levels dropped quickly. Fen Drayton PC has set up further meetings with CCC and SCDC to look for a short-term solution to moderate the impact of future floods.

As usual, the cafe will serve freshlymade tea, coffee and cakes, plus, for the winter months, delicious soup and crusty bread.








News from Fenstanton and Hilton Primary and Preschool
