



Fenstanton Village Hall

Fantastic news! The full plans for the new Fenstanton Village Hall, to be constructed on Crest Drive, have been presented to Huntingdon District Council planning department. Outline planning permission has already been granted for the hall, so gaining full planning consent should be straightforward and with funding of over £1,000,000 secured, we are confident that building can commence in 2024.


The Fenstanton Village Hall Trust trustees have worked long and hard to reach this milestone. Prior to securing the Crest Drive site no less than twelve other sites, in and around the village, were investigated and discussed with HDC planning development. None of the sites, for a variety of reasons, were considered suitable.

While the search for a suitable site continued, trustees worked hard to raise funds through



a number of activities, such as the Christmas Fayre, race nights, and barn dances.

On acquiring the Crest Drive site, work began on the detailed planning application and the drive began to raise the additional funds needed to bring the dream to fruition. Trustees applied for and were successful in achieving grants from Cambridgeshire County Council, Huntingdon District Council and Fenstanton Parish Council, giving sufficient funding to commence.

Stagecoach East introduces new fares

Stagecoach East has issued a range of new prices for its services, with the aim of encouraging customers to get out and about to explore Cambridgeshire, Bedfordshire and Peterborough.

In developing a range of new prices, the bus operator has increased eligibility for its Small Group, meaning that three adults can now travel around the region's Town zones all day for only £2.67 each. With the Large Group product, five adults can travel all day for just £2.20 each. The new eligibility rules are part of a schedule of new prices that will went live on Sunday 17 September.

For passengers who want to travel over a period of time, with greater flexibility, Flexi 5 and Flexi 10 are still available at the new prices of £4.00 and £3.50 a day. These are



bundles of 5 and 10 tickets that are valid to be used whenever wanted for up to 12 months. Meanwhile, under the new pricing structure, under-19's and students will still get a 30% discount with Youth Tickets.

Stagecoach East has frozen the price of its single tickets over £2.00 and the fare cap remains in place until 31 October 2023. Some prices across the range will rise, but roughly 81% of passengers currently buy single tickets so the majority will see no increase, but will be able to take advantage of the improved options available.



Updates from your District Councillor - Fenstanton Ward, Clare Tevlin



Green Bins: In a bid to keep Huntingdonshire District Council (HDC)'s activity transparent, my focus on this month's update will be on the matter of green bins.

During Cabinet on the 24th August, following a call-in to Overview and Scrutiny, the decision on the green bin implementation was approved. Members have agreed to introduce a fortnightly garden waste subscription service that will come into effect in April 2024. The optional service will cost £57.50 for one garden waste bin to be collected for the whole year. You can find out the latest

For context on the necessity of this, at the time of writing Birmingham City Council has just announced bankruptcy. The prevention of such a dire situation hitting in our district, forms part of the rationale as to why this decision on our financial strategy had to be made. Increasingly authorities (around 65% of councils, including neighbouring councils) have instated a green bin charge.



HDC's Cabinet has reassured that there will be a plan to engage with Towns and Parishes with regards to the implementation and this will be communicated in the coming months and timeframe on implementation.

Cllr Martin Hassall, Executive Councillor for Corporate and Shared Services, said:

"Not all properties in Huntingdonshire require a garden waste collection service as they do not have a garden. Introducing a subscription means that the service will only be paid for by those households that choose to use it. This is similar to bulky waste collections where only households requesting the service have to pay.

The current garden waste collection costs us approximately £800,000 per year, and as the district expands, these costs will rise. Meeting the demand will require additional vehicles and staff. By introducing a chargeable garden waste service, we can ensure that the service remains sustainable."

Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs weighs in: "Whilst the government is pending release of further details on its Waste and Resources Strategy Act, DEFRA is proposing significant changes as to how food waste is collected by councils, set to be the biggest change to recycling in the last 20 years. There are many challenges ahead but it provides an opportunity to transform Huntingdonshire's services, residents will be updated on key decisions concerning this."

DEFRA officials in Parliament in September, defended the policy of allowing green bin charging to take place on the grounds it does not impact recycling levels.

Emma Bourne OBE, the director of resources and waste at DEFRA, said: "At the moment, the evidence suggests to us that allowing charging is not inhibiting the recycling levels."

Cambridge Sustainable Travel Zone to be reconsidered following countywide debate cancellation on 7th September: A decision on what happens next is now due to be made by the Greater Cambridge partnership (GCP) board at a further meeting.

Trains, Boats and Planes

Two go mad in Dorset

Tired and deterred by airport chaos, crowded and delayed trains, the grind of motorways and extreme heat in Europe, we decided to stay closer to home. Paul had read Claire Tomalin's 'Thomas Hardy', whose famous works were inspired by the local landscape of Dorset and the people who lived and worked in it.

Heading West

Our five-day break in June took us cross country beyond Oxford to Wiltshire and our first stop was Marlborough High Street. The High Street is one of the broadest in England and full of intriguing artisan shops, good places to eat and the long-established White Horse Bookshop. Paul, then aged 10, won a goldfish at Marlborough Mop Annual Fair in 1953.

Onwards and upwards across Salisbury Plain, passing Stonehenge to Salisbury itself with its magnificent cathedral, which claims Britain's tallest spire, largest Cathedral Close and Cloisters, the world's oldest mechanical clock and the best-preserved original 1215 Magna Carta – all in one beautiful place, well worth a visit. Our final stop was Shaftesbury and Gold Hill of Hovis fame.

Exploring Dorset

Our base in Dorset was Wolferton Manor Gatehouse run by the Landmark Trust. This Tudor Gatehouse, set in beautiful grounds, boasts a ghost and steep ancient stairs not suitable for anyone with mobility difficulties.

Having done our research it was clear that we would have to be selective in our visits during our brief stay. Our first full day began in Lyme Regis which nestles in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty – right at the heart of the UNESCO World Heritage site known as the Jurassic Coast. Descending to the harbour was like stepping back in time to the 1950s. Despite our best efforts we saw no sign of Meryl Streep in her black cloak on The Cobb (a scene from The French Lieutenant's Woman) or Mary Anning, the famous paleontologist, chipping away in search of ammonites.

Day three saw us arriving early at a sundrenched Abbotsbury Subtropical Gardens,





which was magnificent. Fabulous tree ferns, flowers and shrubs which were growing so naturally it was hard to believe they had not always been in place. The land rises and falls in a series of natural valleys which are cool and dark and crossing the Burmese Rope Bridge was a wobbly experience not to be missed. The visit was made complete by a visit to the café with coffee and homemade cake. Jan had to be dragged through the plants for sale area as usual. This is reputed to be Alan Titchmarsh's favourite garden, and we could both see why.

Before supper we paid a visit to Chesil Beach. Particularly 'eerie' is the eight mile stretch between Portland and Abbotsbury, where a lagoon separates the beach from the mainland, so there is no way off but to walk on or walk back.

On day four we visited Durdle Door, a majestic limestone arch on the Jurassic coast. Get there early before the crowds! After lunch it was time for a visit to Thomas Hardy's picturesque and hidden cottage in the woods near Stinsford. The setting was beautiful and our very knowledgeable guide led us around the cottage and garden. It seemed right to call on St Michaels Church at Stinsford next, where the author's heart is buried next to his first wife Emma, his parents and grandparents. It is a green and peaceful place.

Dining out

May we recommend a few places to eat? The Acorn Inn at Evershott, which features in Hardy's 'The Mayor of Casterbridge' serves good quality pub food. We also had delicious meals in Brassica in Beaminster and Yarlbury Cottage in Lower Bockhampton.

We left Dorset knowing that there is much more to see, including Lulworth Cove, Eggerton Hill and Corfe Castle – scene of many of Enid Blyton's Famous Five adventures. Travelling home, STEAM - The Museum of the Great Western Railway in Swindon is a fascinating place for all ages and the Stone Circle at Avebury is a mysterious and magical place.

Our benefice of Fen Drayton with Fenstanton was newly formed in June 2018, bringing together the parishes of St Mary's, Fen Drayton and St Peter & St Paul, Fenstanton. While the parish church of St Peter & St Paul remains a parish church, St Mary's became a chapel of ease, meaning it is no longer a parish church. St Mary's can still hold services, including baptisms, weddings and funerals but couples wishing to marry there must obtain a licence first rather than have banns published. The requirements will be discussed with couples at the time of a wedding enquiry.

Whilst on the subject of weddings, there are still many misunderstandings about wedding fees, particularly given by other licensed civil venues. Wedding fees this year, for example, to be married in church are £505, with additional costs for verger/organ/bells. The £505 fees are statutory fees and set before parliament, not by your local church.

Are you an angel?

An angel is a messenger of God, and you probably don't think of yourself as one – a person who went about convinced they were an angel would either be deluded or just insufferably full of themselves. But you might well be an angel all the same.



Let me explain. In the Letter to the Hebrews, near the end of the Christian Bible, there are these lovely words: 'Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some people have entertained angels without knowing it.' Christians, and people of other faiths, believe that hospitality is central to who they are and what they believe. Sikhs are particularly well known for feeding generously those who come to their gurdwaras, or temples. I have enjoyed such generosity myself at a gurdwara in Birmingham – and it is really good, hearty food, not just a frugal meal. One gurdwara in Delhi is famous for feeding several thousand people every day, with no thought of accepting payment. All the food is donated and prepared by the members of the gurdwara.

I love the idea that we could entertain angels by welcoming strangers. The churches of Hilton try to do this in a small way by inviting anyone who would like to come to a simple meal, some shared games and crafts for those who want them, and a time to hear a Christian message, on the second Friday of each month. We call this Friday Feast. Children, older people, and everyone in between, are most welcome. The next occasion will be on Friday 13 October, 5.30 to 7.00 pm. Do come to the parish church in Hilton and be an angel to us.

You may not know it, but you will bring something of God to us just by being there and eating and socialising with us, and we will be very grateful.

Many of you will have heard of the Camino de Santiago (the way of St James). It's a series of pilgrim routes starting in different places all over Europe, all leading to the Cathedral at Santiago de Compostela, where the body of Jesus's disciple, James, the bearer of the Gospel through Europe to Spain, was purportedly returned after his death.

People have been travelling these routes since at least the 9th century. Most well-known today, due to the film 'The Way' and recent TV coverage, is the French route across northern Spain, a journey of nearly 500 miles.

I've just returned from doing the Portuguese route via Finisterre – a trip of just 230 miles or so. Walking in all sorts of conditions, getting up before dawn on some days to avoid the blistering heat, tramping through UK-like rain on others; sleeping in hostels along the way.

So, what's different about walking a pilgrim route compared to a long hike?

Well, it's something to do with being on the road with others; all ages, nationalities and walks of life, all heading in the same direction. It's something to do with being outside your comfort zone and dealing with it; staying open to what this reveals to you, about you. But most of all it's something about going with intention, even if you are not quite sure exactly what your intention is. Putting yourself in the way of encounter and letting whatever happens, happen.



"Which is more important," asked Big Panda, "the journey or the destination?"

"The company." said Tiny Dragon.

We all have a calling of one sort or another.

You don't have to walk hundreds of miles to find your purpose, your core, your centre! But you do need to be intentional, to deliberately give yourself space to discover your own path. Most often this happens through journeying alongside others and creating space just to be, letting Camino do its magic of delivering just what's needed.

So, if anyone wants to 'talk Camino', do get in touch. It would be a privilege to share part of your journey.

Village trees

Athough autumn is fast approaching with leaves changing colour and falling, we have enjoyed a wonderful Indian summer. However, with the dry weather over the past couple of years some trees planted by the parish council struggled to survive. On the football field almost all the new trees have suffered from a combination of vandalism and flooding as well as drought. We hope to replant next year.

Affordable housing development

The lease between the parish council and bhpa to enable the footpath between the new housing development and the village hall field has now been finalised.

Cambridge Road bridge

Cambridge Road is a well-used route between Fen Drayton and the A1307. The narrow bridge near the Swavesey Road junction has seen of a number of minor accidents and near misses. The existing signs advising vehicles to give way to traffic leaving the village need replacing and road markings added to slow down vehicles approaching the bridge. CCC Highways has estimated the cost to be between £14,000 and £19,000

depending on the scope of the improvements. Fortunately, Fen Drayton has been allocated £9,000 from the Northstowe S106 funds to be used towards traffic calming. The parish council plans to cover the remaining cost via a Local Highways Initiative whereby it and CCC share the cost. The parish council has submitted the LHI application and, if successful, work on the improvements will take place in 2024.

Community warden

During August, the Mobile (Community) Warden Scheme Grant Review 2024-28 was presented to South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC).

Owing to the predicted growth in people aged over 65 in the next 20 years, giving older and/or vulnerable people greater access to a local warden scheme is a key priority of SCDC's Business Plan 2019-2024.

Unfortunately, as people age they become susceptible to physical and mental deterioration and develop feelings of loneliness and isolation.

The community warden schemes aim to extend the independence of older people and stave off the need for, or complement, care packages. The report recommended that £100,000 be provided to continue the scheme for 2024/25, with a review for funding extended from 2025 to 2028.

SCDC is working to increase the promotion of the schemes to organisations with links to the elderly residents of South Cambridgeshire. Currently there are 19 schemes covering 50 parishes, helping nearly 300 people. To find out more about the service covering Fen Drayton, Fenstanton and Lolworth, see the article by Age UK's Rachael Mortimer in this magazine.

Sue Ellington - South Cambs district councillor

As summer ends and we start the run up to Christmas, let's hope it is not so cold that we need to use excessive expensive energy to keep warm!

As I predicted, the bin collection service has gone onto a four-day week from mid September. This appears to go against the principle of getting staff to do the same amount of work in four days that they did in five, as two new crews have been employed to make the four-day week viable. I would be interested to hear about any issues the change causes, so that I can feed them back to the officers running the service. There have been further discussions with government ministers

about whether the trial should continue, but I believe this is a genie that will be very difficult to put back in its bottle!

I'm pleased to say the district council has found a small amount of additional money to help with the community warden scheme. It will not meet all the shortfall in all the community warden schemes, but we have raised awareness and hope that the county council will see it as a priority and recognise the contribution the service makes to keeping elderly people in their own homes.

Business Spotlight

Farm to fork

If the provenance of your food matters then you need to look no further than Rosegate Farm in Swavesey. Known locally for its strawberries and raspberries, Ben and Lydia Baker have farmed here for over 50 years and are passionate about sustainable production, low food miles and selling back into the local community.



However, it was when their youngest son joined the business back in 2010 that things started to get interesting. David, now 36, graduated in BioSci at Warwick University and missing his roots in agriculture started working on various farms throughout the UK. To gain further experience he travelled to New Zealand and whilst working on a dairy farm there he hatched his business plan.

"I wanted to farm my own animals and sell the produce directly from the farm. Nothing can be more sustainable than that."

So on his return from New Zealand he bought ten pigs fattened them and six months later bought 12 sheep. A year after that he took on his own field tenancy and bought four cows.

"In 2011," David explains, "I built with the help of Dad my first shop on the farm which opened one week in every three. Gradually we increased our customers through word of mouth and this in turn meant we could increase our livestock. Finally, in 2016 we reached my goal of having three different types of meats available over one weekend, all produced on our own farm. Prior to that it was pork one week, the next week lamb and beef the following."



Through the quality of David's product trade grew over the next two years until he opened his current shop in March 2019, three weeks before the first lockdown!

Since then the business has continued to grow and now they have additional tenancies around Boxworth, Swavesey and Childerley which allows him to maintain his current levels of supply. All the animals that David rears enjoy the most natural life he can give them. The pigs, for example, spend the summer rooting around the orchards, especially enjoying windfall plums and apples. They then move inside to spacious, straw-bedded pens for the winter providing protection from the coldest weather. All the animals are transported to a small local abattoir by David himself ensuring the minimum of stress.

You do not go from zero to hero overnight in farming. David, now father of two children, reflects on his journey. "It has taken years to get to where we are now. It takes time to build up your own stock. However the passion we have for our livestock, their genetics and

welfare, we believe should translate into something special on your plate. Whether it's a finest steak, home dry-cured bacon or our ever popular sausages, handmade fresh at the farm from a 100 year old recipe, the butchery is traditional and



simple. So much of the meat you buy cut fresh in front of you is done by the people who raised it."

The shop can be found on Rose and Crown Road, Swavesey and is now open weekly Thursday (13.30-17.30), Friday (08.30-17.30) and Saturday (08.30-13.00). Believe me it is worth a visit if only for the homemade sausage rolls.

Latest news from Fenstanton Parish Council The mystery of the village sign






The village sign in the High Street as you drove from Cambridge to Huntingdon was signposted Cambridge, Huntingdon, Conington and Swan Road. Signs like these came into use in the 1930's and, as ours was on a major road, would have been taken down during the war and reinstalled after. Back then, of course, apart from Oaklands House and the Rookery Lodge, Swan Road pretty much marked the edge of the village.

We guess that the signs, apart from Swan Road, were removed when Fenstanton's bypass (now Cambridge Road) was upgraded and both Conington and Hilton Road were cut in half, hence no need for a sign to Conington.

Sometime after, we're not sure when, the sign for Swan Road also disappeared, leaving just the post with the Fenstanton roundel. Then, sometime between 2010 and 2014, following damage caused by a collision, the post was removed completely and a piece of Fenstanton's history was lost.



Fast forward to May 2023 and a lady called into the Parish Council office and asked if we would like a sign that her late husband had been storing in his shed.

The sign is now with Keith Collier, a resident of Swan Road and owner of Keith Collier Engineering, where it is being refurbished ready to take its place, once again, in our village.

Play parks and CCTV

In recent months there have been a number of instances of vandalism and drug taking in our village and recently a report of a syringe being found at our Chequer Street play area. This is sad to see. Your Parish Council is doing what it can to stop this happening. Any reports made to your Clerk are reported to the Police. Hedges and trees are being cut back to give more visibility and your Parish Council is considering installing CCTV at the MUGA and Chequer Street.

If you see any unwanted behaviour please report this to your Clerk and also to the Police online at cambs.police.uk or by telephoning 101.

Unfortunately, some Parish Council signs have been removed. Whilst new signage is sought, please be reminded that dogs are **NOT permitted** in the play areas.

On a more positive note, the slide at Pitfield Park has now been replaced.

The Annual Inspection of our play parks has recently been completed and your Parish Council will be discussing any issues raised in the report at our General Purposes meeting on 28 September.

AGAR - Annual Governance & Accountability Return

The audit of accounts for Fenstanton Parish Council for the year ended 31 March 2023 has been completed and the accounts will be published by 30 September 2023.

The AGAR is available for inspection by any local government elector of the area of Fenstanton Parish Council on application to the Clerk. Copies will be provided to any person on payment of £2.00 for each copy of the Annual Governance & Accountability Return.



Watercourses and blocked drains

Your Parish Council is working with Cambridge County Council to establish riparian rights owners in order to ensure they see that their ditches/drains are kept clear. In July agricultural landowners and residents with riparian responsibilities were written to by CCC to request that they attend to their sections of watercourse. CCC intends to write again, as unfortunately they received little response to the original letter sent.

Your Parish Council is also in discussions and meetings with representatives from Cambridge County Council to discuss the blocked drain and failed culvert at Hall Green Lane/Manor Drive. It is hoped that with further investigation your Parish Council can understand why this area continually floods and that CCC can resolve the issue.

Hampton Playing Field - The proposal

Finally, a plea to the community. We play on various pitches within the village, including the school, Hall Green Lane and the cricket field off Behagg Way.







Life on a Plate

Parsley, sage, rosemary and thyme...

It is difficult to think of these herbs without hearing Simon and Garfunkel singing them on their way to 'Strawberry Fair". As well as pleasing the ear, these herbs also please our palates, bringing extra flavour to many recipes.

Culinary herbs, as distinct from medicinal ones, have been cultivated in gardens throughout the centuries. When meat was salted to preserve it or old and tough, in lean times, herbs helped to revitalise it. Nowadays, with sophisticated food preservation, we have a good supply of food and can afford to experiment and discriminate.

Our range of herbs has expanded and we have the luxury of being able to add Mediterranean herbs such as basil or Asian ones such as coriander. Both herbs are available to buy potted up in supermarkets. The pots are small and grow well on a sunny window-sill for a few weeks if kept wellwatered. If re-potted in larger pots with more soil, the herbs, rewardingly last longer, but they are annuals and need to be re-sown (or bought again) every year.



Parsley is another annual herb and notoriously hard to germinate. Advice on encouraging the seeds includes either pouring boiling water on them, or putting them in the fridge overnight....hmm worryingly contradictory! Another approach is to buy a supermarket pot or two and plant it, or them, outside where with more light and soil they will establish themselves and even colonise by spreading their own seed.



Sage, rosemary, thyme and are perennials. All of them have interesting foliage and look good in borders or containers. There are purple sages, tri-colour sages; thymes come in different sizes and colours and rosemary looks good in large clay pots as shown in the famous Sissinghurst Garden. They are all ornamental as well as tasty.

Growing herbs near the kitchen door is a huge help. A bay tree within reach, an old sink filled with herbs, a patio pot of mint (grown alone to stop its creeping roots interfering with every other plant) are all aids to the cook and spare him/her a dowsing in wet weather.

Another source of 'fines herbes' for that classic French omelette I've never made is to visit the Hilton Community Garden which has its own herb bed just in front of the fruit cage. The plants are labelled. Please help yourselves: pick with care and leave some for others.

This year the Community Garden has been more productive because of the better growing conditions. Beans, potatoes, leeks ,carrots and tomatoes in particular have done well enough for us to be able to bag them up and offer them to Hiltonians on Saturdays mornings from 11.00am -12.00 noon.

Spiced Apple Tray Bake

Quite a few of you often pick up our windfall apples from the bucket outside Honey Hill House in Fen Drayton and we love that they're not all going to waste!

If you're stuck for ideas, this is my all-time-favourite Spiced Apple Tray bake recipe! A bit crumbly, but very yummy!

Ingredients

1½ lb (680g) cooking apples (peeled, cored and finely chopped). I've also used eating apples.

3 oz (85g) sultanas/raisins
1½ oz (40g) chopped mixed nuts
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon (add in 2 tsp
mixed spice if you like)
3 oz (85g) demerara sugar
6 oz (170g) granulated sugar
7½ oz (210g) self-raising flour
6 oz (170g) butter (melted)
2 small eggs (beaten) - for double quantities
3 large eggs is fine

Preperation

Set the oven to Gas mark 4, 180° C ($160-170^{\circ}$ C if a fan oven) . Grease & line a roasting tin 12×8 inches (20×30 cm).

Mix the chopped apples, sultanas, nuts, spices and demerara sugar together. In a separate bowl beat the granulated sugar, flour, melted butter and beaten eggs together to make a thick batter. Spread half the batter on the base of the tin.

Mix the remaining batter in with the apple mixture and dollop this on top of the batter and lightly press down. Bake for about 50-60 mins. It should be springy to touch and well risen but a skewer test doesn't always work because it's a sticky cake!

Serve hot or cold, on its own or with custard, cream or ice-cream

Now come and get those apples!

Step into the Past

History of Fen Drayton

Firstly, many thanks to all involved in the new Journal Magazine, which is much appreciated.

I was going to offer a simple history of Fen Drayton and yes I was going to crib from the previous ones we did for the Fen Drayton News and the Millennium 2000 Book. But I've gone off piste!

Where to start. 100 Million years ago?

Ridiculous you might say, but no. The fossils we found in the gravel workings of the late 1950's/early60's that were coming up from 30 feet down were indeed from that deep time. Ammonites and sea-urchins etc. Of course, when they were alive the sea they were swimming in was warm and dinosaurs ruled the land. Perhaps a later piece could be done on the old fossils, the later fossils of mammoth and items connected to earlier humans who 'walked our way', a few thousands of years ago.

So, throwing one bit of paper in the bin, I had further thoughts. How about our oldest building and oldest photograph?

There are many interesting things to say about our oldest building; St Marys Church built c1300, particularly how a victorian cleric was able to rescue it from its very poor condition so that we have it today.

Also further down the village there was a very large Methodist Chapel that we do not have today. Whilst looking through pictures of these two buildings I noticed a very passable drawing of St Marys (opposite page) by our last Vicar John Yule. Then another drawing

by someone who offered some connections to both Fenstanton and Hilton. His name was Frank Stukins. His family lived at Three Ways Cottage opposite the Three Tuns. Born about 1920, life dealt him an early blow when he contracted polio and was disabled.

When he left school he became a delivery boy for a grocers shop (The International Stores I think) just over the bridge in St.Ives. With difficulty he rode a delivery bike around St.Ives. Later in his life he became a clerk in the office of The Land Settlement Association Fen Drayton.

Then he got a job with International Combustion Derby putting together kitting lists for major boiler and power plants and

moved to Duffield. He rode a large three wheel bike and would take it back and forth on the train. He never asked for help or assistance with his disability and was highly thought of by employers. When computers came in he thought his job was finished. However the computer programming made mistakes and Frank famously did a test against a computer and put a big project together quicker and more accurately. So, his job lasted a few more years until retirement. Frank had many friends in Hilton and attended the Methodist Church whenever possible. Maybe someone remembers him?

Frank had a sister Doris (Stukins). Again from

difficult beginnings Doris found her place in the large land settlement packing shed, organising the packing and marketing of the flowers and vegetables. She was known not to stand any nonsense and would ring around markets to get the best price for the growers. She retired to Fenstanton and took up lawn bowls and apparently became a very good bowler in Miss Pitfields time. Perhaps someone remembers her? (and has a photo)

Also shown is an 1866 photograph (left) of the newly built Wesleyan Methodist Chapel in what was then Green Lane, later named Cootes Lane after Mr Thomas Coote of Fenstanton and St.Ives. The Chapel was built by Mr Cooper for £1,100 and was demolished in 1986. Much more can be said on both buildings in the future.

Report from meeting on Monday 04 September

County Broadband

Craig Larter of County Broadband attended the meeting to provide an update regarding their project to roll out ultrafast broadband. The delays have been caused by their contractor being unable to meet agreed timescales and so County Broadband has now appointed a new contractor.

The installation work in the village is due to commence on 02 October and will be expected to be completed in February. There will then be a period of 12 weeks for surveying the new network and connecting the preorder customers. New customers will then be connected once the preorder customers are complete.

Wilderness/Green Scrub

The Council has authorised the Maintenance Contractor to clear the scrub from the Wilderness and Green

Royal British Legion

The Council has agreed to donate £60 to the Royal British Legion.

Maze Repairs

The Council noted receipt of the first quote for the maze repairs for £3,290 and requested two further quotes.

CAPALC Conference

The Clerk will attend the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Association of Local Councils Conference on behalf of the Council.

Path Maintenance

The Council noted the comments made about the maintenance of the footpaths and agreed that, in the absence of a Maintenance Person, the volunteers' group would be asked to work on these paths.

Playground Inspection

The report for the inspection was received and whilst all matters were either low or very low risk, the Council has asked the Clerk to obtain quotes for a secondary safety device for the basket swing.

Highway Improvement Strategy

The LHI working group has been tasked with producing a long term strategy for highway improvements to present to a future council meeting.

School Bus Stops

Concerns have been raised about the location of the Swavesey School bus stop and the need for the students to cross Potton



Road. The Clerk will write to the school, bus company and CCC school transport department to request that the Potton Road stop is reinstated in addition to the Scotts Crescent stop to prevent the students having to cross the Potton Road

Community Gritting Scheme

This scheme is open for volunteers again and any interested parishioners are requested to contact the Clerk.

HDC Climate Conversation

Cllr Rob Dulstone will attend this event on behalf of the Council.

Afoot in the Garden

My third garden wish is for the clocks to change with the seasons, 30 minitues a season, 4 times a year!!!!! From sunday 29th gardening will be restricted by the dark evenings which makes october an important month for winter prep.

Preparing for the Winter ahead

Clean patios and paths, especially in shady areas, and repoint as necessary, they will be less slippery in winters frost and snow? Hose pipes can be drained and packed away for the winter while taps should be isolated or wrapped to prevent them from freezing. Check the stability of fencing and timber structures, oil hinges, check latches locks and lighting.

Many modern garden plants were not deemed hardy 40 years ago. Last winter's plant losses reminded me to follow the old rules for winter protection. Delay pruning until spring can keep frost from the heart of less hardy plants. Mulching will add more protection especially if the mulch is distributed around the base. This spring I found a dead Star Jasmine (trachelospermum) while 2m away mulched banana trees where merrily throwing out leaves. Phormiums and cordylines etc should be wrapped.

Mulching regularly helps improve water retention, soil structure and feeds the soil while worms love it and Blackbirds and Robins love worms. Plants in pots are 6 degrees more susceptible to frost, place them against a wall and wrap to the wall in cold spells is great protection.

October is not to late for bulb planting or sowing hardy annuals. Sweet peas can be sown and shrubs can be propagated from hardwood cuttings.

While the soil is still warm enough for root growth perennials can be divided and trees and shrubs planted. Lawns can be scarified and any bare patches re sown with grass seed mixed with top soil/John Innes compost.

An update from Fen Drayton Lakes



Whilst out working around the reserve, it's quite common for curious visitors to approach us with questions about how we manage this expansive site and how many staff members are responsible for its upkeep. Their reactions are typically a mix of surprise and appreciation when we say that only two of us are entrusted with the on-site care and maintenance of this sprawling, almost 400-hectare reserve, complete with an extensive network of around 16 kilometres of pathways.

It's at this point that we can take the opportunity to extol our unsung heroes without whom we would not be able to cope – our extraordinary team of volunteers, upon whose dedication we heavily rely.

These outstanding individuals play a pivotal role in ensuring the smooth functioning of our reserve. Whether they're walking the trails to pick up litter, inspecting infrastructure for signs of wear and tear, running events to engage the

community, extending warm welcomes to visitors in the car park, conducting breeding bird and biodiversity surveys, or undertaking crucial habitat and infrastructure management work, it's safe to say there is virtually no aspect of our operations in which volunteers aren't deeply embedded and we simply could not manage without them. To date this year, from January through to early September, we have logged almost 2000 volunteer hours across the various roles.

Our volunteer force is as diverse as the reserve habitats they help protect. Spanning a wide range of ages, from enthusiastic teenagers to experienced octogenarians, they represent an eclectic mix of backgrounds and interests. Some among them are keen

birders and nature enthusiasts, while others simply relish the opportunity to spend a few hours outdoors either alone or with other like-minded people. What unites them all is a passion for our reserve, a shared eagerness to be actively involved and an invaluable commitment to its sustained management and success.


