Fen Drayton's new pavilion

The new pavilion

Fen Drayton Parish Council proposes to purchase a modular building with fully-fitted changing rooms, similar to those already used by many schools and sports facilities. It is a cheaper, workable solution when compared with a conventional build, which would cost over £300,000. Also, the facility could be expanded in the future if needed. The cost of the new building will be in the region of £75,000. In order to save money, local volunteers and members of the Drayton Lions football club will dismantle the existing pavilion. A local businessman is kindly donating labour and materials for the groundworks.

£75,000 − how will this be funded?

Funds will be raised from members of the public, the Parish Council, the Drayton Lions football club and grants from local businesses, local councils and national charities such as The Big Lottery and Mick George Community Fund.

The pavilion will be available for all Fen Drayton clubs and groups to use – so we hope to benefit from donations from businesses and individuals within the village. Perhaps a local donor may want the pavilion or individual rooms to be named after them? We're open to offers!

Stagecoach East unveiled as finalist in National Transport Awards 2023

The awards are a leading mark of recognition in the transport industry, so this is a moment of pride for the company, their customers, and hopefully the wider region.



Stagecoach East announces timetable changes for the network in Cambridge, St Ives and Fenstanton

Stagecoach East has announced a series of upcoming timetable changes to their bus network. The changes, which are due to come into effect from Sunday 03 September 2023, will affect Cambridge routes including Citi 2, Citi 5, 8a, 25, Route F and Busway A.

Darren Roe, Managing Director of Stagecoach East, said: "With these changes, we aim to enhance capacity, punctuality, reliability, and convenience on several core routes to provide efficient public transport options that meet current travel needs, supported by current passenger data. We're excited to bring these changes to our network and continue serving our local communities."

Key highlights of the bus service changes are as follows:

Route F, Fenstanton-St Ives: Evening journeys will be introduced from St Ives Bus Station to Fenstanton at 18:25 and 18:40 Monday to Saturday, in addition to the current timetable.

Citi 2, Milton-Cambridge: Minor timetable changes will be made to improve reliability.

Citi 5, Longstanton-Bar Hill-Cambridge: Service changes will offer greater capacity and a new direct link between Bar Hill and St Ives. Some morning journeys towards Cambridge will now start at St Ives Park & Ride before traveling to Longstanton and joining the current route into Cambridge. These services depart St Ives at: 04:48, 05:18, 05:48, 06:18 then 06:53, 07:23, 07:53 and 08:23. Some evening trips from Cambridge will continue on to St Ives after Longstanton. These services depart Cambridge at: 17:20, 17:50, 18:20, 18:50

then 21:15 and 22:15.

Route 8a, Orchard Park-Cambridge: Minor timetable changes will be made to improve reliability.

Route 25, Trumpington P&R-Babraham P&R: Minor timetable changes will be made to improve reliability.

Busway A, St Ives-Cambridge: Changes will be made to improve capacity on Busway journeys. This service will no longer serve St Ives Morrisons in both directions, terminating at Marley Road Industrial Estate. The current short trips between Trumpington and Addenbrookes will run until 16:00 Monday to Friday giving a ten-minute frequency between the two locations. Additionally, there will be limited stops along Histon Road to shorten journey times, the service (inbound and outbound) will now only stop at the Akeman Street bus stop on Histon Road.

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
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

Trains, Boats and Planes

An amble to the west coast of France

The thing my wife and I love about France is our shared history. Love it or hate it, France and the French have followed a similar path to us, often through shared sovereignty and bitter feud. This shared history leaves a rich legacy of architecture and culture in both countries that we are still able to witness.

I understand, that time limitations plus a desire to get to your holiday destination and just chill is for most families the ultimate goal, but there is more to France than miles of golden sand and sea. So, this is an attempt to share some of our favourite places you could experience en-route and around the west coast. This assumes you are driving or hiring a car during your stay. There are a couple of routes to take a car across the Channel, Dover to Calais or Portsmouth to Le Havre, Caen or St Malo, Both Dover and Portsmouth are approximately 135 miles and 2.5 hours from Fenstanton, but for west coast destinations Portsmouth offer the easiest onward journey. However, this means Paris is a bit of a deviation, but if you have a few days spare, then do it!

I would not stay in the centre, but instead find a small hotel or Airbnb in the northern outskirts like L'Isle-Adam. This is a beautiful small town on the River Oise. There is an hourly train service into Gare du Nord, which takes 1 hour, then take the underground to wherever you want to visit. After a day walking around Paris you will be pleased to have a nap on the return train journey which is only €5!

Using L'Isle-Adam as a base my must visit places around the north-west quadrant are Château de Chantilly, Auvers-sur-Oise and Château de Versailles. Château de Chantilly is one of the finest jewels in the crown of France's cultural heritage. This château and park are famous around the world for its racecourse, equine heritage, lace-making and, of course, its whipped cream! https://chateaudechantilly.fr/en/



If you are a Vincent van Gogh fan then drive a few kilometres south along the D4 from L'Isle-Adam to Auvers-sur-Oise. He spent his final months and died in the Auberge Rayoux.



This small 7m³ room is the subject of one of his many paintings along with the Catholic church. Even more opulent

Château de Versailles lies west of Paris and is even more opulent than Château de Chantilly! Built to what we see today by the Sun King Louis XIV you need a full day to take

in 'some of' the Gardens and Palace. It has to be seen to be believed and you must time your visit to see the Fountain shows and Musical Gardens. We have been on several occasions when the fountains are not active. So, check on the website first. https://en.chateauversailles.fr

If you decide to make Le Havre or Caen your port of entry include Falaise and Le Mans centres in the route plan. Falaise is only 50kms south of Caen and was the birthplace of William the Conqueror, or William I, Duke of Normandy. Château Guillaume-le-Conquerante is an impressive site that has stood since the 12th century and amazingly was undamaged during the bombing of Falaise in 1944. The battle of the Falaise Gap (8-20 August 1944) was the final stage of the wider battle of Normandy, and saw the Allies exploit the breakthrough achieved in Operation Cobra to destroy the German position in France in which 50,000 German troops were encircled and taken prisoner.

For destinations in Brittany and generally all the west coast, St. Malo is my favoured port of entry, but means all the above locations are off-piste unless your return trip is via a port further east.

The west coast of France is dominated by the weather coming off the Atlantic so is moderate and varied. This makes the land very fertile and hence is famous for apple and pears in northern parts and vines from the Loire to Bordeaux. It also produces fantastic Mussels, Oysters and other crustaceans. This all makes for fantastic gastronomic delights and is one of the reasons so many people love it, not to mention golden sands, surf and sea!



As any watchers of 'Escape to the Country' know, the presence of a local church and a pub are signature features of desirable village locations. Hilton has desirability in spades. Not only a place of outstanding beauty but with a community spirit like no other as witnessed with Feast Week, as the latest in a calendar of events on offer. I have rarely seen so many opportunities in one place for people to connect with each other and share all that Hilton has on offer.

In villages up and down the country churches are closing causing great sadness. Not just for the few attending but often the whole village turns out in protest – but usually way too late.

Pinpointing the significance of a church's presence is tricky. It's not just characterful buildings. A closed church, no matter how pretty, just doesn't cut the mustard.

The traditional carol service or Remembrance Service cannot totally account for the outcry and sense of loss. Why does the presence of our churches matter despite most of us rarely attending?

Methodism has a long history in Hilton and our church community robustly maintain opportunities for exploring faith however we understand God to be. But as Joni Mitchell's song goes, sometimes you 'don't know what you've got 'til it's gone'. Whilst God changes not, expressions of faith can, do and need to continually evolve.



Are people really no longer interested? Does faith, however understood, have no relevance for people today?

Hardly in my view although I am sure we need to better understand why church doesn't scratch where people itch. However idyllic our setting, human questions about our place in the world and the struggles all experience, continue. Faith has something to offer these kinds of questions and needs.

If the presence of our chapel here has any significance for you, it would be really helpful for us to understand a little more about this. How can our chapel continue to be a living, breathing reality and a place of enquiry for the people of Hilton? How can we best have a conversation? Before it's too late.

Report from meeting on Monday 03 July



New Councillor

Matt Stott has been co-opted as your new parish councillor. Matt has lived in Hilton for the majority of his life and is actively engaged with the community. He is on the PTA for Fenstanton and Hilton Primary School and an assistant coach for the Fenstanton under 7's football team.

Bonfire Night

The date for Bonfire Night has been agreed as Saturday 04 November and the Council will invite Feast Week to provide refreshments. The Council has agreed to purchase the same fireworks as recent years.

Cooking Courses

Following the success of the cookery workshop in June, two further workshops are planned for Saturday 16 September and Saturday 21 October.

Dredging Spoil

The Council has delegated authority to the Clerk to organise the removal of the remaining dredging spoil from the Wilderness.

Call for Sites

The Huntingdonshire District Council (HDC) call for sites has closed, and 4 sites have been put forward for Hilton. These will now be assessed by HDC officers The sites proposed during the call for sites consultation will now be evaluated by HDC officers against the settlement hierarchy and land assessment criteria. There should be an opportunity to consult on the HELAA once (and if) these sites pass the assessment phase.

D-Day 80 Anniversary

Hilton Parish Council has resolved to light a beacon on Thursday 06 June 2024 to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings. This will be done in line with the national celebrations.



The Lattenburys

One of the other submissions in the HDC call for sites is "The Lattenburys". This is a proposal for two new villages located north of the new A14 between the A1198 and the

Pavilion renovations

The Clerk has already applied for a grant for the renovation of the cricket pavilion from the FCC Community Fund and the Council authorised the Clerk to make an additional application to the Community Ownership Fund.

Westbrook bench

The Council has agreed to accept the refurbished bench from HDC to replace the one that HDC damaged in Westbrook.

Little Piggy Catering





Charlie's Army

Who would know that from behind a cosy café on the High Street in Fenstanton is a brigade of chefs, bakers, porters and managers running an acclaimed event catering business?

Charlie McLaughlin, Owner and Director of Little Piggy took over the run-down bakery in 2022 and undertook a complete refurbishment of the commercial kitchens at the rear for her event catering business. She then turned the shop front into a stylish café which is proving very popular in Fenstanton.

When you understand Charlie's background the name Little Piggy is very apt. She grew up on a pig farm in Yorkshire and learnt about the origins of food from an early age. She would spend

hours on the combine harvester and would weigh the pigs for market with her father. She loved being outside learning how the seasons affect the food we eat.

Her mum, Babs, taught her how to cook and she can remember helping to make family meals at a young age. Mum is still on hand when she needs a fail-safe recipe or some advice about cooking times or preparation techniques. In fact, Mum still cures all the hams and makes all the sausages in her artisan butchery from pigs bred on the family farm that are served at Little Piggy.

Charlie is proud of the provenance of her food and is proud of her products. "You could

say that food runs through the family blood. My brother and his wife run a small chain of fabulous deli cafes in Yorkshire and my sister also has a catering and events company in Yorkshire. We can and do regularly spend hours talking about our favourite subject and unsurprisingly, most of our get-together's involve lots of food."

After studying agriculture at Nottingham University, she worked in the food industry, sourcing fresh fruit and vegetables from farmers in the UK and overseas. However after having her children in 2010 (twin boys) she wanted to begin her own venture doing what she loves most, feeding folk, and so Little Piggy was born. For the first ten years she worked from her home in Longstanton until in 2022. Hearing that Barker's Bakery

was closing, she grabbed the opportunity to have her own commercial kitchen and café.

The Little Piggy café opened earlier this year and has a lovely warm ambience, which is paired with generous and delicious food that makes for a great foodie experience. Charlie explains. "We make and bake everything we serve on site here in Fenstanton. Our homemade sausage rolls and our Piggy Pies, which we craft with all butter pastry are simply too good to

resist, but don't take my our word for it. Pop in sometime and find out for yourself!"

Not long after opening, Little Piggy held some sell-out supper evenings which offered tasty wholesome food and judging by the reviews these were a real hit. We understand more of these events have been added to the events diary. See www.littlepiggyfenstanton.co.uk/events for details

The Highs and Lows




For those hoping for a heatwave this summer, it could be a case of "be careful what you wish for". In June and July surges of searing Saharan heat gripped many European and North African countries with temperatures into the 40C (over 105F) producing wildfires with apocalyptic scenes with crops ruined, evacuations, spoilt holidays and severe health warnings. These images could hardly be further removed from the very temperate unsettled conditions we experienced in the UK during July, in total contrast to the hot, dry July in 2022. In terms of temperature, July 2023 was only about 0.5C (1.0F) below the long term average, following a very warm June which was on a par with the record breaking summer of 1976. So used have we become to repetitive heatwaves during recent summers, that when we get one closer to what used to be "normal" in years gone by, there is a tendency to feel short changed.

This year, as also happened last year, our climate has been stuck in contrasting blocks of weather. The wet conditions in March carried on through April and early May notably producing a wet day for the Coronation of King Charles III. This period lasted 10 weeks. For the rest of May and the first 17 days of June a drought of 36 days ensued culminating with a sustained heatwave over our region and much of the UK during which I measured a temperature of 32C (90F), the highest I have recorded this summer up to the end of July. The unsettled conditions started in July and lasted the whole month.

With June and July 2023, reported as being the warmest ever recorded for each of those

two months globally and with the onset of El Nino after seven years bringing with it the prospect of even higher temperatures, marine heatwaves and other extreme weather events, with climate change continuing to make headlines, here are a few notable events:-

- Canada. Since the start of 2023 there have been 4241 wildfires of which 800 are still raging across the country, caused by drought and high temperatures. Nearly two million hectares of land have been affected with the smoke impacting on air quality spreading into the USA, with apocalyptic images of the sun and moon in the thick haze.
- Phoenix, Arizona. Described as "Hell on Earth", the temperature on every day in July reached or exceeded 43C (110F), eclipsing the previous record of 18 days in June 1974.
- Antarctica. In June, the start of winter, the amount of sea ice was at its lowest ever recorded. The deficiency of 1.3 sq.km equates to an area five times the land area of the UK.
- 4. In July, a super typhoon "Doksuri" with sustained winds of 137 mph wreaked destruction in the northern Philippines and its islands with attendant storm surges and extreme rain flooding. The typhoon later moved into China causing deadly floods in Beijing and other areas.
- Also in July, the US state of Vermont was hit by torrential rainstorms delivering the equivalent of two months rain in two days causing widespread flooding, landslides and evacuations.

Village traffic speed- data collected

There has been little change in the speed of vehicles travelling along the High Street over recent years. According to the data recorded in July 2023 the average speed was 21mph compared to 23mph in December 2021. The data collected in July 2023 shows that far more vehicles are now travelling between 16-20 mph compared to the number recorded in December 2021. Now that the 20mph is in place your Parish Council hopes to see this number increase further as people get used to the new speed limit. There have unfortunately been some instances of speeding and the maximum speed was recorded at 66mph in December 2021 and at 58mph in July 2023. Whilst there is the odd speeding violation, they are few and far between.

There have been reports of vehicles speeding in Headlands and your Parish Council will now be gathering data over the coming weeks via our Movable Vehicle Activated Signs. If it is found that there are significant instances of speeding in the Village your Parish Council will approach the Police to ask for their assistance to provide enforcement.



Crossing - High Street

Your Parish Council has discussed the possibility of installing a crossing on the High Street many times over the years. Cambridgeshire County Council are responsible for Highways and in order to make any changes your Parish Council has to submit a Local Highways Initiative application to CCC. This application must be accompanied by supporting data to prove the need for a change to the Highway before CCC can consider an application. Because of this, your Parish Council has not supported an application as there is not sufficient data to support the need for a crossing.

There is not a suitable location for a crossing on the High Street as the path has to be wide enough to accommodate standing room for those wishing to cross and room for others to pass behind safely. Installing a crossing would mean losing approximately 8 parking spaces significantly impacting our High Street and likely increasing traffic speed, as parked cars slow the traffic. Your Parish Council would like to be clear that it is not a matter of funding or lack of caring about our residents that has prevented a submission for a crossing but the lack of supporting evidence that is required even for a feasibility study to be carried out.

We do hope that this gives a clear explanation, but if you wish to discuss further, please contact your Parish Council Clerk.

Hampton Playing Field - The proposal Time to have your say!



Hilton and the National Garden Scheme: Sunday 2 July

The National Garden scheme, familiar to many by the yellow cover of its handbook, was started in 1926 with a mission to open gardens of "quality, character and interest to the public for charity". Finding funding for nursing, specifically district nursing, was its first goal.

The Charity also supports local projects and earlier this year, our community garden received a generous donation to help finance paths and edging. A plaque on the shed commemorates the grant.

In return, we felt that we should stage an 'Open Gardens' event in Hilton and enter the hallowed yellow book ourselves. However, we were mindful of the standards expected and as 2 July approached there was considerable nervousness, leading to near obsessional weeding, watering (yes, June was a dry month) and planting to try to live up to expectations.
















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Life on a Plate



Lamb Madras with Bombay Squash

With lamb in season in September and all kinds to squash being grown in gardens, allotments and available in local farm shops this is an ideal recipe for the cooler days in

Autumn that uses both foods.

Serves 4 | Prep time around 30 minutes | Cooking time 3 – 4 hours.

You will need a large ovenproof cooking pot with lid or use a tinfoil lid.

Cooking the lamb

Preheat oven to 170C/325F/Gas3

Put the chilli, garlic and ginger in a small food processor or chopper and blend to a paste.

To the cooking pot add the onion and fry until soft and starting to colour, around 10 mins on low heat. Add the jar of Madras paste, then the garlic, chilli and ginger paste, then the bay leaves and stir.

Add the lamb into the pot and cover with chopped tomatoes, the stock and the tamarind paste, salt and pepper.

Place the lid on, or two layers of tinfoil if there's no lid. Roast the lamb for 3 – 4 hours, basting every hour with the juices from the pot. Cook until the meat is very tender and falling of the bone.

Once cooked remove the lamb from the sauce and simmer the remaining liquid until it reduces in volume by half to make a thick sauce.

Using a fork, shred the lamb and add it back into the sauce.

For the Bombay squash

Cut the squashes up into large chunks, like the size of you would do your roast potatoes. Place them in a pan of cold water and bring to the boil. Cook for 5 minutes and drain.

Heat a large pan and add the oil. Once hot add the mustard seeds. When they start pooping add the chilli powder and turmeric and then the squash pieces. Cook for 5 minutes or until the squash absorbs all the spices.

Serve together with the freshly chopped coriander.



For the lamb

1 x 2.5kg shoulder of lamb

1 jar of Madras paste

1 or 2 green chillies

2 garlic cloves

1 ½cm of root ginger, peeled

1 large onion, peeled and sliced

2 bay leaves

400g tin of chopped tomatoes

200ml beef stock

2tsp tamarind paste

For the Bombay Squash

500g of chopped, peeled and deseeded squash. This should weigh 500g once prepared

4 tbsp vegetable oil

1/2tsp mustard seeds

1/2tsp chilli powder

of that rich flavour."

1/4tsp ground turmeric

2tbsp roughly chopped fresh coriander

Step into the Past

Fenstanton's busy High Street

I, like many other people in the village dislike the amount of traffic that comes along Fenstanton High Street, especially the morning and evening 'rat-runs'. This, together with the 'free for all' parking in the High Street, does at times, cause chaos. The original village bypass was built in 1965 to alleviate this problem but it still exists to this day.

The High Street was once called the Cambridge Road, this changed to the Huntingdon Road at the junction by the old King William IV pub. Since Roman times, this has always been the main through route from Cambridge to St Ives, Huntingdon and beyond. It has always been a busy street even before the invention of the internal combustion engine.

Over the centuries the road would have been used by pilgrims, traders, pack-animal trains, tramps, horse dealers and herds of cattle being moved to the local and London markets. The week long Fenstanton fair would have brought a multitude of people from far and wide. Anything or anyone that needed to be moved would have come through Fenstanton.

From the old photographs it is easy to imagine the High Street devoid of traffic.

Even the late 19th century and early 20th century photographs show the High Street empty of traffic, as seen below. But this is probably an illusion; as it would have been set up specifically for the photographer.

Traffic through the High Street was particularly bad in World War 2 especially after December 1941 when the USA became part of the war effort. The US air force took over a number of Royal Air Force bases (Alconbury for one) and then as the bombing of Germany increased, a large number of new US bases were built locally. Everything that was required to build and maintain these bases had to be trucked-in and most of it came through the village. Then in early 1944 the Australian army set up camp in the village. All their building materials and equipment had to be brought in by road, through the High Street and down Chequer Street.

Fortunately parked vehicles were not a problem as not many people in the village had a car and those who did would have garaged them for the duration of the war. Some years ago I had a conversation with a villager (no longer with us) who lived through the war years and he told me that the High Street was constantly full of lorries, trucks, staff cars etc. Quite often these would come

in a long convoy, especially the US air force vehicles. So, let us now take a glimpse into the past.



Mrs Tibbet's walk around Fenstanton in 1777

This is an extract from a talk that Gertrude Peet gave to the WI in September 1921. At the time it was illustrated by a copy of the Lancelot Brown's 1777 map of the village, together with hand drawn pictures. This extract has been edited and expanded by me. The original papers are held in the Norris Museum.

"Mrs Tibbet can hear the coach horn sounding, she knows by the sound it is the London mail coach. It is about to pass the toll-gate (situated by the bridge at the north end of the village where Low Road starts) and soon will be coming up the High Street.

As there were then the low hedges to the common, she could see the dust flying, quite a cloud. The outside fares from St Ives to London cost 6/6p (£43). Inside the coach the fare costs 13/- (£86), children on the lap are half price and 14 pounds (6.4KG) of luggage allowed.

Whilst Mrs Tibbet was looking at the old lady perched on the top of the coach when it pulled up at the Rose & Crown Inn, (now made into a private house), she nearly got run over by another coach heading towards St Ives. Already there was a private coach with some nobleman's crest painted on the coach door blocking the road. This made three coaches waiting in the High Street. She could see that there was another coach waiting at the George Inn. She felt really glad that she did not live in such a dangerous street as the High Street."

At this time (1777) Peter Cowling lived at Petersfield. He seems to have been the landlord of the Chequers (Chequer Street), and The Bell (Bell Lane). Also he was the landlord of the Rose & Crown (private house next to the fish & chip shop) and The George (now The Duchess). There are two Peter Cowling memorial tablets in the parish church; the landlord of these pubs would be the Cowling who was the magistrate of Huntingdon, who died in 1824 aged 71 years.

"Outside of the George Inn was a fire spit, Mrs Tibbet could see the joint of beef being



worked round and round, by a dog in a wheel that had to keep moving, like a squirrel in a cage. By the constant turning of the joint it will keep from burning. Another dog sits ready to be put in the wheel.

When Mrs Tibbet reached the George Inn, she stopped to read the bill that was plackarded as thus. "A special coach will start from this hotel each day of the St Ives races, in time to see the 'Cock Fight' in the Crown yard at 110'clock before the races which start at 4 o'clock on St Ives' meadow (which was a good two-mile course, the most in England). A regular match of cock-fighting will be held at the Crown during the races."

"Oh dear." she said, "That's in August, just when the corn wants bringing in. Just then Mrs Tibbet caught site of Mrs Butler's sedan chair being carried from Oaklands House (sometimes known as The Oaklands). Mrs Butler, not being one for walking, always used her grandmother's sedan chair, she did not mind if it was fashionable or not. Mrs Butler on seeing Mrs Tibbet immediately had the footmen stop and set down the chair and then the sedan door opened so she could ask Mrs Tibbet how she was and admire her child. Mrs Tibbet made a curtsey and was pleased to see Mrs Butler."

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

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Greenways

The Greenways scheme will create a 150km network of sustainable travel corridors, mostly for non-motorised transport: 'to encourage commuting by active travel modes into Cambridge city centre from the surrounding villages in South Cambridgeshire.'

For Fen Drayton, this means improving the Holywell Ferry Road surface between the village and busway. The public consultation closed on 31 March and the 270-page report was presented at the Greater Cambridge Partnership meeting on 8 June. Fen Drayton Parish Council (FDPC) had requested a change in the design of the traffic calming proposals. flood protection, some form of lighting and secure bicycle storage at the bus stop. In response, the report proposed to: 'develop the design proposals further along this section to preliminary design stage, taking into account some of the specific changes and comments raised through public engagement.' We'll keep you updated!

Bicycle thefts

There has been a recent spate of bicycle thefts from the guided busway bus stop. Thieves cut through chains and padlocks and where the locks couldn't be cut, bikes were damaged beyond repair. The police have increased patrols and recommend that owners register their bikes on the BikeRegister database. FDPC is investigating other measures to protect bikes at the bus stop.



Community support: cost of living crisis and community warden

Fen Drayton's small charity, The Town Lands, was set up in 1927 to help residents in need. When the cost of living crisis hit last year the charity provided grants in the form of supermarket gift cards to help Fen Drayton households. The charity hopes to repeat the scheme later this year.

The charity also gave funds to Age UK Cambridgeshire and Peterborough for Rachael, the community warden, to assist Fen Drayton residents. Everyone Rachael helped said she had improved their lives in terms of practical support and relieving loneliness. The charity provides 10 weeks' free use of the service, after which clients pay a small weekly charge. (See the advert in this magazine for more information.)

Affordable housing

The housing association, bpha, is now appointing contractors and is expects to start building the 14 affordable homes in Cootes Lane later this year. It aims to have people moving in next summer.

I'm delighted to contribute to this new magazine which will enable our three strong communities to share information.

South Cambs District Council continues to trial a four-day week for all full-time desk-based staff, whereby they complete their normal 37-hour week in 30 hours, for the same pay. SCDC also proposes to include refuse collectors in the four-day week trial, which will require extra lorries and staff. The trial aims to improve recruitment and staff retention

I was pleased that the Environment Agency objected to the application to build on Bourn Airfield, due to shortage of water. I recognise the need for more housing, but feel that we lack the infrastructure to support the enormous growth of recent years. We need time to build reservoirs, roads, schools, and medical facilities before we have more major developments.

I'm trying to find more funding for the community warden scheme, which helps elderly people to remain in their own homes. The warden contacts each client every day to check all's well, collects medicines and does essential food shopping, and also provides information on who to contact for help or advice.

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Afoot in the Garden

Autumn is a time to enjoy the last of the summer sun and the vivid late summer flowers. As the ice in your g+t melts take time to appreciate all your hard work and plan for an even better garden next year.

Now is the time to plant spring bulbs

Prepare the ground before you plant bulbs. Weeding, watering and mulching with a layer of compost beforehand will keep the soil moist, make planting easier and keep your boots clean. Daffodils do best in damp shadier areas although dwarf daffodils (narcissus) are more tolerant of sun. Tulips need a sunny spot if they are to flower the following year.

Plant early, mid and late flowering tulips to extend the flowing period. Smaller bulbs like crocus, iris and narcissus can be planted at the front of borders or in pots, while snowdrops are best planted in early spring, when in growth. Remember to plant taller bulbs far enough into your borders for the flush of spring growth to cover over the dying foliage.

Plan improvements

While you are taking that well-earned drink ask, does your planting give you colour throughout the year?

Does the layout of your patio and paths work? Would mulching regularly reduce the amount of weeding you do?

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Bird's Eye View

An update from Fen Drayton Lakes



During the summer months things slow down here at Fen Drayton Lakes. Our breeding bird surveys are completed by this point and although many of our migrant species have finished nesting and rearing young and have already departed back to their African wintering grounds, others are still busy so we cannot yet start our intrusive habitat management work. Reserve work at this time of year therefore tends to revolve around maintaining our infrastructure for visitors.

Nature reserves are a haven for walkers, nature enthusiasts and families so wellmaintained trails are essential to ensure accessibility for all visitors and allow people to navigate through the reserve. With our 16km of footpath around riverside fields and 9 lakes, we and our volunteer groups are always busy keeping the ever-encroaching vegetation at bay. Species such as Bramble, Hawthorn and Dog Rose that line the paths are all fast growing so we routinely walk around the trails, shears in hand, to cut back the new growth that would soon close up the paths if left unchecked. Although many of the footpaths are public rights of way and mown by the local council, we also take time to strim certain areas to keep Stinging Nettles under control, particularly around the benches and picnic tables.

By maintaining these designated pathways, visitors can explore our diverse habitats without causing harm or disturbance to the delicate ecosystems. Moreover, accessible infrastructure enables people with limited mobility to connect with nature, ensuring inclusivity and equal opportunities for everyone.

Nature reserves also have an important role to play in environmental education, offering a valuable space to learn about ecosystems, their inhabitants and the threats they face. Here at Fen Drayton Lakes our Discovery Zone area is used by local schools and youth

groups, such as Beavers and Cub Scouts, and is another area that we spend time maintaining throughout the summer to ensure that visiting groups get the most out of their trips to the reserve, thereby fostering a deeper understanding and appreciation for the natural world.

By prioritising accessibility, safety and education we aim to create an environment here at Fen Drayton Lakes that fosters a deeper connection between people and the natural world.
